

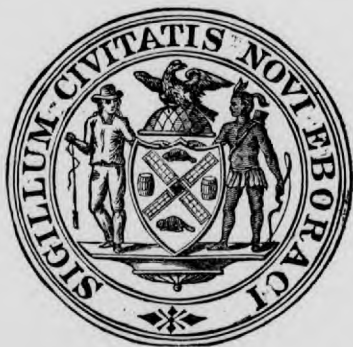

The 769 deaths represent a death-rate of 25.33 per 1,000, against 24.75 for the previous week, and 25.58 for the corresponding week of 1888.

The increase of 18 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 5 deaths from enteric fever, 11 from heart diseases, 7 from Bright's disease, and 23 from violence, including 4 judicial executions. There was a decrease of 30 in the deaths from phthisis.

The increase of enteric fever was most marked in the Ninth and Nineteenth Wards.

2. White Pine, Yellow Pine, Norway Pine, Cypress or Spruce Piles, about 61 (It is expected that the piles will have to be from about 45 feet to about 50 feet long, to meet the requirements of the specifications for driving.)  
3. Labor and Materials for Relaying Old Sidewalk Stone or Flagging, about 60 square yards.  
4. Labor of Excavating Old Cribwork and the necessary filling in its rear and disposal of material, about 790 cubic yards.  
5. Labor of Back-filling about 485
