DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held October 20, 1887.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews, and Marshall.

The minutes of the meetings held October 13 and 14, 1887, were read and approved.

A communication from George A. Dearborn, Dock Master, recommending that Henry Fischer be permitted to place an ordinary derrick on the bulkhead foot of East Sixtieth and East Sixty-second streets, East river, was,

On motion, laid on the table, and the Secretary directed to request the Dock Master to call on the Commissioners.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Hon. Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor—Acknowledging receipt of a copy of the Annual Report of the Department for the year ending April 30, 1887.

From Comptroller of the City—Approving sureties of Duncan Gillies and the Pacific Improvement Company.

From Owens & Co.—Requesting the Department to dredge in front of the bulkhead foot of East Forty-seventh street, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From D. Phoenix Ingraham—Protesting against the granting of a permit to the Second Avenue Railroad Company to retain a "Starter's House" on or near the dock at the end of Second avenue; and also stating that the large house and watering-trough now there is an obstruction to the free use of the only public dock on the Harlem river between One Hundred and Seventeenth street and Madison avenue. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report respecting the obstruction complained of at Second avenue, Harlem river.

From W. M. Bassett, Agent Central Vermont Railroad and Steamer Line—Requesting permission to extend shed on Pier 36, East river, about thirty feet, to correspond in length with the shed on new portion of said pier. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Morris & Cumings Dredging Company—Stating that they will commence dredging for the Consolidated Gas Company, foot of Nineteenth street, North river, on Wednesday, 19th instant.

From Consolidated Gas Company—Stating that the order to dredge in front of the bulkhead between Sixteenth and Eighteenth streets, North river, has been given to the Morris & Cumings Dredging Company, who have commenced the work.

From Frank R. Bonnell—Requesting permit to drive seven spring piles on south side and end of Pier 6, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Sulurban Rapid Transit Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of permit for temporary coal bin on the easterly side of the Harlem river.

From Old Dominion Steamship Company:

1st. Relating to occupation of Pier, new 43, North river. The President authorized to advise said company that the Dock Master has been directed to collect wharfage for the use of said pier, from and including October 14th inst., in accordance with the agreement made for the use thereof.

2d. Requesting permit to attach water meter to the pipes at Pier, new 43, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.

From Knickerbocker Ice Company and D. C. Newell:

1st. Stating that the work of dredging between Eighteenth and Nineteenth, and Nineteenth and Twentieth, and Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, North river, will receive immediate attention.

2d. Requesting renewal of permit for open shed, bridge and engine-house at bulkhead foot of Twentieth street, North river; bridge, engine and scale-house foot of Forty-third street, North river; and bridge, engine and scale-house foot of Bank street, North river. Permit granted for bridge, engine and scale-house at Bank and Forty-third streets, North river, to remain during the will of the Board. The application for bridge, engine-house and open shed at bulkhead foot of Twentieth street, North river, was referred to the Dock Master to examine and report.

From Schwarzschild & Sulzberger—Requesting permit to replace bearing piles in front of pile platform between Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.

From New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company—Requesting permit for the relaying of three plank walks from Ferry-house foot of Chambers street, North river, to the crosswalks on West street. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the said plank walks to be placed thereat under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and remain during the will of the Board, was approved.

From William P. Clyde & Co.—Requesting permit to drive piles, etc., under Pier 34, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and kept within existing lines, was approved.

From F. E. Bean—Requesting renewal of permit for platform, tally-house and scales on the bulkhead between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, North river. Permit granted, to be and remain during the will of the Board.

From C. P. Huntington, lessee—Agreeing to pay 3 1/2 per cent. of the whole cost under the contract for rebuilding Pier, new 37, North river.

From Henry Fischer—Requesting permits for derricks at Fifty-fourth, Sixtieth and Sixty-second streets, East river. The action of the Secretary in directing the Dock Master to examine and report was approved.

From Brooklyn and New York Ferry Company—Requesting permission to dredge to make twelve to fourteen feet at mean low water for a width of seventy-five feet along the northerly or easterly side of Pier 57, East river, Broome Slip. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.

From Chauncey M. Depew, President, etc., West Shore Railroad—Requesting a permit to lay tracks and to do the necessary work in connection with the same upon the Pier foot of Thirty-sixth street, North river, in accordance with the plans submitted. The action of the President and Commissioner Marshall in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and remain during the will of the Board, was approved.

From Consolidated Gas Company of New York—Stating that the said company does not own or occupy north half of Pier at Eleventh street and the property between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, East river.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending October 15, 1887.

3d. Reporting that he had examined the plans submitted by the Gas Engine and Power Company for the erection of platforms, sheds, etc., near Morris Dock on the Harlem river, and find them proper and sufficient for the purpose, and recommend that they be approved.

On motion, the report was received and recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting completion of crib-bulkhead foot of Seventy-sixth street, East river, and recommending that the time for the completion of the contract be extended to October 16th instant, inclusive, and also that the Commissioner of Public Works be requested to have the street cleared

of the obstructions left there by the contractor who built the sewer, in order that a good and proper access may be made to the crib-work bulkhead.

On motion, the time for the completion of said contract was extended to October 16, 1887, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief, provided the written consent of the sureties is filed in this office, and the President was authorized to send to the Commissioner of Public Works a copy of the Engineer-in-Chief's report respecting the obstructions in said street and request the removal of the same.

5th. Reporting completion of Pier, new 61, North river, under Contract No. 248. The action of the President in notifying the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company that the said pier was completed and ready for occupation commencing October 20th instant, was approved.

6th. Reporting repairs required to Pier at Fifty-eighth street, North river. The action of the President in notifying the lessees to repair, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.

7th. Reporting that he had investigated the complaints made against Watchmen John McDougal and Nicholas F. Kenneally and Acting Watchman Patrick Butler, for being off post and inattention to duty, and had reprimanded them and given them directions for their future guidance, and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, the action of the Engineer-in-Chief was approved.

8th. Reporting non-commencement of repairs to the east and west half of Piers 2 and 3, East river, and the bulkhead between Ninetieth and Ninety-first streets, East river. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.

9th. Reporting non-removal of fence, etc., at Thirty-seventh street, East river. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.

10th. Reference to damage to Pier 46, East river, by the piling of lumber on same. The President authorized to notify Mr. Ronan to call on the Commissioners on or before Tuesday, 25th instant, and settle for the amount of damage done to said pier, or the claim will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 5923, respecting the removal of stone dumped into the half slip adjoining Pier at West Fifty-fifth street, North river, from scow belonging to Brown & Fleming, and stating that as near as he can ascertain there were four large stones accidentally dumped there, three of which have been removed; the fourth slipped under the dock or sunk in the mud, and was not found.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7065, repairs required to Pier at West Eleventh street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair as recommended in his report, at a cost of about \$50, was approved.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7068, in reference to the application of O'Connell & Coffey for an extension of time to complete the building of a Pier, etc., at One Hundred and Thirty-second street, North river, under Contract No. 246, and recommending that the time be extended to November 10, 1887.

On motion, the time was extended to November 10, 1887, provided the written consent of the sureties is filed in this office. The President authorized to notify O'Connell & Coffey that the work must be completed by that time, as no other extension will be granted, and penalty of \$50 per day will be imposed for each and every day that the work remains incomplete after that date, as provided for in the contract.

14th. Reporting completion of repairs to bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river, and non-removal of temporary coal pocket or chute erected on bulkhead foot of Twentieth street, East river. The Secretary directed to notify H. L. Herbert & Co. to remove said temporary coal pocket or chute forthwith, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will remove it at their cost and expense.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6758, that he had directed and superintended driving three piles on the upper side of bulkhead platform south of Fifty-seventh street, East river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 6950 and 7063, that he had repaired Pier, new 59, North river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6863, that he had directed and superintended the renewing of the sheathing and placing additional fenders on the south side of Pier 27, East river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7000, that he had directed and superintended repairing Pier 8, East river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7036, that he had repaired Pier at Eighteenth street, North river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7039, that he had directed and superintended the refastening of fender piles on outer corners of Pier 15, East river.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7054, that he had repaired Pier at Little West Twelfth street, North river.

22d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7062, that he had repaired the sheathing on Pier at West Fifty-first street, North river.

23d. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 6997 and 7001, that he had superintended and directed cutting gangways in Pier, new 32, East river.

24th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6805, that he had repaired the buildings at Seventeenth Street Yard, East river.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7051, submitting form of contract and specifications for about 1,500,000 feet of yellow pine timber, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the form of contract and specifications, as prepared and submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief, for furnishing and delivering to the Department about one million five hundred thousand feet, board measure, of sawed yellow pine timber, be and hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed, and proper advertisements, inviting estimates for doing said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

The following preamble and resolution were, on motion, adopted:

Whereas, Application has been made by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for permission to fill in certain ditches across the meadow flats at or near the foot of Willis avenue and the point of the company's float bridge, Harlem river, it being the intention of the company to replace said ditches by a stone sewer;

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company to do the work of filling in at the premises above described upon plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Board of this Department; and provided that the work so performed shall be under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief; and provided, also, that no filling in shall be made in places which can be reached by the water of the river or harbor until a proper retaining structure shall be constructed in front of the area to be so filled in; and further provided that the said New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company shall assent, in writing, to the terms and conditions as set forth in this resolution, within ten days from the date thereof.

The following preamble and resolution were,

On motion, adopted:

Whereas, It is claimed that a permit or license was granted to Edward Roberts to build a temporary bridge or bulkhead on land belonging to the City, lying between Ninety-third and Ninety-fourth streets, East river, said alleged permit or license bearing date of April 11, 1868, and claimed to be signed by George W. McLean, the then Street Commissioner in the City of New York;

Resolved, That said permit or license claimed to be held or exercised by Edward Roberts, his heirs, representatives or assigns, to build or maintain such temporary bridge or bulkhead on land belonging to the City of New York, at or near the premises therein described, be and hereby is revoked from and after this date, October 20, 1887.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, reported that he had received the following estimate for furnishing the Department with 4,100 cubic yards of cobble-stones, and 6,400 cubic yards of rip-rap: John A. Bouker, cobble-stones, \$1.00 per cubic yard; rip-rap, 70 cents per cubic yard, and had awarded the same to John A. Bouker, he being the only bidder.

On motion, his action was approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the President of this Board be requested to send to the East River Ferry Company a statement of the expenses incurred for repairs of the tug "Manhattan," which was damaged by collision with the ferry-boat "Flushing," owned by the company, on June 20, 1887, and to demand payment of same.

From Edward Abel, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting repairs required to Pier 40, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.

2d. In reference to the application of C. H. Mallory & Co., for permission to retain hoisting engines and tally-houses on Piers 20 and 21, East river.

On motion, permit was granted to C. H. Mallory & Co. to retain three hoisting engines and two tally-houses on Pier 20, East river, and two hoisting engines and one tally-house on Pier 21, East river, to remain during the will of the Board.

The President stated that he had been served with a summons in the suit of Goldsborough Banyer, as Trustee, etc., against the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York, for damages to certain bulkhead property extending fifty feet southwardly from Morton street, North river.

On motion, the President was authorized to request the Counsel to the Corporation to take such action as may be necessary to protect the interests of the City.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending October 18, 1887, amounting to \$4,471.07, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to be occupied by others, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
