Six—There were 530 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 7, 1878, which is a decrease of 23, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 9 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending August 31, 1878, was 553, which is 37.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.48 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,085,741.
