WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases:

The number of inspections and reinspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 179,258, classified as follows:

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 585 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 185 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 30 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds; and 47 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

The deaths for the quarter were 10,003, being 1,343 more than for the corresponding quarter of 1890, and the death-rate being 23.54 against 21.00 for the previous year.

This increase of 1,343 deaths, as compared with 1890, was chiefly due to an increase of 98 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 144 from scarlet fever, of 138 from diarrhoeal diseases, of 130 from influenza, of 85 from heart diseases, of 56 from croup, of 298 from pneumonia, and of 60 from violent causes; these being the largest items of increase.

The death-rate was larger than the average for five years previous, viz.: 23.54, as compared with 22.81.

Contagious and infectious diseases, as a whole, showed an increase as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1890, but a decrease, with the exception of typhoid fever and scarlet fever, as compared with the average rate for the previous five years, the greatest decrease being in measles.

The actual numbers, compared respectively with those of 1890, are as follows: Diphtheria, 426 against 328; typhoid fever, 136 against 112; measles, 83 against 151; scarlet fever, 248 against 104, and whooping-cough, 49 against 93—a total of 942 for 1891 against 788 for 1890.

The death-rate from diarrhoeal diseases was .89 against the five-year average of .73; of phthisis, 2.96 against 3.35; of heart diseases, 1.38 against 1.30; of pneumonia, 3.48 against 2.83, and by violent causes, .99 against .93.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 3,689 against 3,098 in 1890, and an average of 3,293 for the five years previous; the death-rate, based upon the total estimated population being 8.68 against the five-year average of 8.46.

This general increase of mortality was probably due entirely to the lingering influence of the "influenza," which was felt more or less through the entire quarter, rising to the proportions of a slight epidemic in the latter part of December. So far the disease, although very prevalent, is much milder in type, and there seems no prospect at present of such a thundering attack as this city suffered in January, 1890, and April, 1891.

The number of births reported for the quarter was 12,807, a decrease of 901 from the previous quarter, but an increase of 2,466 over the corresponding quarter of 1890. The decrease from the summer quarter is not surprising, for the figures for the last quarter of the year represent almost entirely current reports, while in the summer quarter the resort to legal measures resulted in a flood of long delayed reports belonging to earlier parts of the year.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending December 31, 1891, the number of notices issued by the Board was 4,861. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents, to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.
