

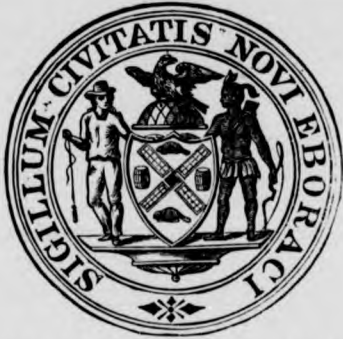

## BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court-house, Thursday, January 14, 1875, at 2.30 o'clock P. M.

Present—Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, and E. Delafield Smith, Counsel to the Corporation.  
Absent—John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting of December 10, 1874, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists, transmitted by the Board of Assessors, with communication dated December 1, 1874, and received by the Chief Clerk of this Board, January 5, 1875, viz.:

1. Forty-third street—Paving with stone blocks, between Madison avenue and the Grand Central Railroad Depot.
2. Second avenue—Paving with stone blocks, from Sixty-sixth to Eighty-sixth street.
3. Fifty-seventh street—Paving with Belgian pavement, from Second to Lexington avenue.
4. Third avenue, west side—Curb and gutter and reflag, from Sixty-sixth to Sixty-ninth street.
5. Eighty-sixth street, regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter, and flag (4 feet wide), from Eighth avenue to River Drive.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion of the Comptroller, they were severally confirmed—All of the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving Eightieth street, from Madison to Fifth avenue, with trap-block pavement, received from the Board of Assessors, January 5, 1875, with communication, dated December 31, 1874, with objections to the same, filed by Mr. C. P. Huntington, was also presented to the Board by the Comptroller.

After consideration of the said objections, and hearing the communication of the Commissioner of Public Works in regard to this matter, of which a copy was transmitted by the Board of Assessors, on motion of the Comptroller, the objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—All of the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented a communication received from the Board of Assessors, dated December 29, 1874, inclosing report from the Commissioner of Public Works, in regard to the sums charged for Engineers' fees, and included in the assessment lists for Sewers in Seventh avenue, and in Sixth, Seventh, and St. Nicholas avenues, in relation to which this Board called for information at meeting of December 10, 1874.

On motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the matter was laid over for further consideration.

At 2.55 o'clock P. M., on motion of the Comptroller, the Board adjourned.

of the Health Department, held at its office, No. 301 Mott Street, on the 10th day of January, 1875, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 56 of the Sanitary Code be amended to read as follows:

SEC. 56. That the keeping and slaughtering of all cattle, and the preparation and keeping of all meat and fish, birds and fowl, shall be in that manner which is, or is generally reputed or known to be, best adapted to secure and continue their safety and wholesomeness as food. Neither the slaughtering nor the driving of cattle shall be permitted or conducted at any place in the City of New York south of Fortieth Street; nor shall the slaughtering of cattle be conducted at any place in the City of New York north of said street, without a special written permit from this Department; unless the same shall be done in buildings located directly upon the water front, each having a capacity sufficient for the yarding and slaughtering daily of one-half of the entire number of cattle, or hogs, or small stock (all or separately, according to the particular object of each abattoir) slaughtered in this City, at the time the application for the permit for such abattoir shall be made; and so constructed as to receive all stock deliverable thereat, directly from the cars or transports; and to discharge therefrom all liquid refuse below low-water mark, and to secure the proper care and disposition of all parts of the slaughtered animals upon the premises, or the immediate removal thereof by means of boats.
