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**BOARD OF POLICE.****Report for Quarter ending June 30, 1895.**

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, NEW YORK, July 1, 1895.  
Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, New York City:

SIR—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending June 30, 1895:

**REPORT.**

On the 30th day of June, 1895, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons and probationary employees, was 3,756.

**SICK TIME.**

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in the schedule marked "A," from which it will be seen that—

Those passed have been referred in regular order to the Police Civil Service Examining Board. During the preceding quarter there were 249 examined, of which number 194 were passed and 55 rejected.

**ARRESTS.**

The number of persons arrested by the Police force for the quarter was—Males, 23,535; females, 5,715; total, 29,250.

Number of arrests for preceding quarter was 24,695.

Number arrested for principal felonies was 1,409; number discharged without trial, 357; number acquitted, 119; number convicted, 280; number sent to other authorities, 16; number died, 3; number escaped, 1; number pending, 633; total, 1,409.

The number of lodgings furnished to indigent persons in the station-houses during the quarter was: Males, 8,727; females, 5,517; total, 14,244.

Lodgings furnished during the preceding quarter, 18,507.

**LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").**

Males, 704; females, 351; total, 1,055. Restored to parents or guardians, 226; brought to Central Office, 829; total, 1,055.

Schedule "B" exhibits a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and frequently is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

The number of persons committed to and detained in the House of Detention for Witnesses during the quarter was: Remaining in House March 31, 1895, 26; committed during April, 1895, 21; total, 47; discharged during April, 33. Remaining in House May 1, 1895, 14; committed during May, 27; total, 41; discharged during May, 20. Remaining in House June 1, 1895, 21; committed during June, 49; total, 70; discharged during June, 47. Remaining in House July 1, 1895, 23.

The aggregate number of days' detention was 1,722½; number of meals furnished, 5,170, at a cost of 25 cents each, \$1,292.50.

For the names of persons detained and other details see schedule annexed marked "C."

**SANITARY COMPANY.**

The transactions of the Sanitary Company for the quarter, setting forth the number of steam boilers examined and their condition, and the number of applications for examination as Engineers, will be found in schedule annexed marked "D."

**PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.**

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners, and other transactions of the Property Clerk's Office, will be found in schedule annexed marked "E."

**FINANCIAL.**

The Treasurer has made payments during the quarter to the amounts following: For account of the Police Department proper, \$1,374,376.74; for account of the Bureau of Elections, \$1,500.03; total, \$1,375,876.77.

**DISCIPLINE OF THE FORCE.**

The number of charges preferred against members of the force and filed in the office of the Chief Clerk during the quarter was: April, 323; May, 244; June, 277; total, 844. Charges on file and undisposed of March 31, 1895, 420—1,264. Dismissed, 10; fines, 576; reprimands, 16; complaints dismissed and withdrawn, 121; no disposition, 541; total, 1,264.
