GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith a report made to me by Mr. Chandler Withington in regard to the application of the Board of Education for an issue, during the year 1901, of bonds to the amount of \$14,031,325, for the construction of new school buildings and the acquisition of sites therefor.

Mr. Withington's report deals in detail with each proposed new site and each new building, and discriminates between such as are needed either at once or in the near future, and those which are designed to meet more remote future demands of the school system. The conclusion is reached that a bond issue for the year 1901 should be authorized to provide the following additional credits for the school building funds of the several boroughs:

In presenting the resolution of November 28, 1900, requesting an issue of one hundred millions of bonds, the Board of Education has, doubtless, not attempted any consideration of the City's financial ability to grant any such enormous sum in one year. On the contrary, it has probably been actuated solely by the desire to place itself on record in regard to what it deems to be the amount necessary to wisely anticipate the growth and development of the school system. I am not prepared to deny that it might be desirable for the City to authorize even at large a bond issue as that requested by the Board of Education if that could be done without prejudicing the necessary development of the city in other directions. But it can scarcely be necessary to demonstrate to the members of this Board, familiar as they are with the many heavy and urgent demands made upon the City's bond-issuing power, that the granting of this request in its entirety would be absolutely impossible unless the City were to suspend other most necessary improvements, some of which are perhaps even more vital to the health, comfort and prosperity of our citizens.

One disadvantage which the City authorities and the Board of Education in particular have hitherto labored under has been the lack of any definite policy in regard to the amount of money which should be appropriated annually for new buildings. In the City of New York prior to consolidation there was a great outburst of activity in this direction, during 1867, which succeeded a long period of neglect in which school accommodations had been suffered to fall far behind the demand. This movement reached its climax in 1867, when over six millions of bonds were issued. Since consolidation the bond issues have been as follows:

In view of the fact that the amount of bonds issued in any one year does not necessarily correspond with the bonds authorized in that year, it is well to state that the bond authorizations since consolidation have been as follows: In 1898, none, owing to the suspension of all bond issues for new work on account of the debt-limit difficulty; in 1899, \$7,637,640 (or an average of \$3,818,820 for these two years), and in 1900, \$5,500,000.

The average annual bond issues (including premiums on bonds sold), appropriations from budgets and miscellaneous receipts available for school building purposes in the several boroughs for the past ten years has been as follows:

On the basis at which 3½ per cent. City bonds have sold during the past year, an issue of \$5,500,000 would net with premiums about \$5,900,000. It seems to me that the precedent set

last year of authorizing an issue of \$5,500,000 for these purposes might well be followed in the future, and it would also seem that if the Board of Education could be assured of a regular annual issue of this amount, it would be enabled to plan with greater foresight and accuracy for the housing of the school population of the future. No Board of Estimate and Apportionment can, of course, take action which will bind its successors, but it is not unlikely that a precedent of this kind, if based on reasons of sound public policy, would be followed hereafter. It may not be amiss in this connection to state that the Commission recently appointed to recommend to the Legislature a revision of the Greater New York Charter has proposed that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have power to authorize the issue of bonds for school-house purposes to the amount of \$5,500,000 annually without the concurrence of the local legislative body.

It would seem that the selection of this particular amount has been based, as my own recommendation now is, upon the actual statistics of the last ten years. It is, of course, not unlikely that after the annual expenditure of such a sum for, say, ten years, it will be possible to reduce the amount. At present, however, I believe that the exigencies of the school building situation demand such an annual appropriation, and that a proper regard for the physical development of the City, including among many other things the problem of better transit facilities, will not permit the appropriation of any larger sum. The following resolution is therefore offered for adoption.

Sites for New Buildings, etc., Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

1. Nos. 66 to 68 Broome street, to enlarge Public School 110—
It is proposed to acquire a lot 75 feet by 99 feet (11 inches south of the present school). This school is overcrowded and no relief can be had from adjacent schools. I consider this site necessary.
2. Dominick, Clark and Broome streets, new site for Public School 38—
It is proposed to abandon the present school on the east side of Clark street and acquire a new site on the west side of Clark street, between Broome and Dominick streets. The old school

is full but not overcrowded, but the building is old and will eventually have to be rebuilt, but I do not consider it urgent and necessary that it be done this year.

3. Essex and Norfolk streets, between Grand and Hester streets, in rear of Public School 75.—
It is proposed to acquire one lot 24 feet 10 inches by 100 feet on Norfolk street, one 75 feet by 100 feet on Essex street. The present school has 314 part-time classes and no relief from adjacent schools; therefore I would suggest that the City purchase the premises 75 feet by 100 feet on Essex street, which will relieve the present congestion.

4. Block bounded by Manhattan, East Houston, Lewis and East Third streets.—
This neighborhood is very thickly settled and all of the schools adjacent to the proposed site have part-time classes; therefore, I consider this site necessary. The Board of Education on August 1, 1900, notified the Corporation Counsel to proceed with the condemnation of the property.

5. Plot north side of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, between Gerard and Walton avenues.—
Neighborhood does not warrant a new school. Public School 178, which will be opened within this year, will be sufficient for the present.

6. 12 Lots, Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, between First and Second avenues.—
The City leases premises Nos. 306, 308, 310, 312, 314 East Ninety-sixth street, at an annual rental of \$9,000; lease expires February 1, 1902. These leased buildings are designated as Public School 150, and have a seating capacity of 1,483, and an average attendance of 1,475. The proposed site, which is just east of the above premises, is required in order to give up the leased property. This is a growing neighborhood and I consider the proposed site necessary.

7. Dongan street, between Kelly street and Intervale avenue.—
This new site is proposed to relieve Public Schools 133 and 152 and give up leased annexes. This site will eventually be required, but for the present I think it better to build an addition to Public School 152 at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Union avenue.

8. One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-eighth streets, between Seventh and Eighth avenues.—
In my opinion, a school in this neighborhood is not necessary at present. Public School 5 at One Hundred and Forty-first street and Edgecombe avenue, is not full, and Public School 186, at One Hundred and Forty-sixth street and Amsterdam avenue, when built, will relieve this neighborhood. On October 10, 1900, the Corporation Counsel was requested by the Board of Education to proceed with the condemnation of this property.

9. Southwest corner of One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street and Prospect avenue.—
Not needed at present. Public School 173, at One Hundred and Eighty-third street and Cambridge avenue, will be sufficient for this neighborhood for some time.

10. North side of Eighty-second street, between First and Second avenues.—
A school will be needed in this vicinity within a year or two to relieve Public Schools 73, 83, 96, 158 and 30, but the necessity is not urgent at present.

11. One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth streets, between Lenox and Seventh avenues.—
Public School 119, at One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, when finished, will relieve Public School 89, and the Board of Education is condemning the southwest corner of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Lenox avenue for an addition to Public School 89; therefore this site is not needed at present.

12. Plot on north side of Two Hundred and Fifty-third street, between Von Humboldt and Faraday avenues, Kiverdale.—
The neighborhood does not warrant a school at present.

13. Addition to Public School 15, East Fourth and Fifth streets, between Avenues C and D.—
This school building, including an annex at No. 722 Fifth street, which is leased at \$780 per annum, has 484 part-time classes. I consider the addition necessary.

14. Addition to Public School 31, southwest corner of Gouverneur and Monroe streets.—
The present school is overcrowded, having 348 part-time classes, hence I consider this site necessary. The Board of Education on August 1, 1900, requested the Corporation Counsel to proceed with the condemnation of the property. It is proposed to purchase a plot east of the present school building 64 feet 11 inches by 122 feet 7 1/2 inches.

15. Addition to Public School 57, north side of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Third and Lexington avenues.—
It is proposed to purchase two lots in rear of present building (19 feet by 100 feet 11 inches and 22 feet 4 inches by 100 feet 11 inches). The Primary Department of present Public School 57 has 403 part-time classes, and the City leases an annex at No. 162 East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, which has 247 sittings. The adjacent school can give no relief, therefore I consider this addition necessary. On August 1, 1900, the Corporation Counsel was requested by the Board of Education to proceed with the condemnation of the property.

16. Addition to Public School 161, north side of Delancey street, between Orchard and Ludlow streets.—
The Board of Education on August 1, 1900, requested the Corporation Counsel to proceed with the condemnation of this property. The present school is about full, but as children are taught in part-time classes, therefore I do not see the immediate necessity for an addition.

17. Addition to Public School 144, east side of James street, between Oak and Cherry streets.—
This school has 217 part-time classes, but Public School 177, corner of Market and Monroe streets, will be opened this year and will relieve Public School 144.

18. Addition to Public School 8, north side of King street, between Varick and Congress streets.—
Not necessary. Public School 8 has about 100 extra sittings.

19. Addition to Public School 23, Mulberry street, between Bayard and Canal streets.—
Public School 23 is not full in Grammar Department, but the Primary Department has 66 part-time classes. The school may be considered full, but not sufficiently crowded to warrant immediate relief. Public School 108 could relieve it, as it has about 75 extra sittings.

20. Addition to Public School 84, north side of Forty-ninth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues.—
Not necessary, for Public School 58, which has 150 extra sittings in each department, can relieve this school.

21. Addition to Public School 141, Fifty-seventh and Fifty-eighth streets, between Ninth and Tenth avenues.—
The present building has 150 extra sittings in the Grammar Department and 75 in Primary Department, therefore an addition is not required at present.

22. Addition to Public School 122, First avenue, between Ninth and Tenth streets.—
No immediate necessity for this addition; the school is practically full, but has no part-time classes.

23. Addition to Public School 45, south side of Twenty-fifth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues.—
The Corporation Counsel on August 1, 1900, was requested by the Board of Education to proceed with the condemnation of this site. The present building is not crowded; there are 211 extra sittings in the Grammar Department and 54 in the Primary Department; therefore no necessity for an addition for extra sittings.

24. Addition to Public School 73, north side of Forty-sixth street, between Second and Third avenues.—
The Corporation Counsel on October 10, 1900, was requested by the Board of Education to proceed with the condemnation of this site. The present building has in the Grammar Department 105 extra sittings and 63 in the Primary Department; hence site not required to provide for extra sittings.

25. Addition to Public School 104, Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, between First avenue and Avenue A.—
Public School 104 has 41 extra sittings; therefore an additional site is needed for extra sittings. Good for light and air, but would not advise it at present.

26. Addition to Public School 50, south side of Twenty-first street, between First and Second avenues.—
The present building has 232 extra sittings; hence addition not needed for more seating capacity.

27. Public School 121, south side of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, between Second and Third avenues.—
The Board of Education on September 26, 1900, requested the Corporation Counsel to proceed with the condemnation of this site. It is not needed to give additional accommodation, as Public School 121 has 102 extra sittings.

28. Public School 56, Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, between Eighth and Ninth avenues (interior lot).—
This interior plot will eventually be required for light and air, but as there are a number of extra sittings, both in the Primary and Grammar Departments, I would not advise it at present.

29. Public School 27, Forty-first and Forty-second streets, between Second and Third avenues (interior lot).—
Good for light and air, but not required for additional sittings, as present Public School 27 has a number of extra sittings; hence no immediate necessity.

30. Public School 151, north side of Ninety-first street, between First and Second avenues.—
This site is not required for light or air, nor for extra accommodations, as there are extra sittings in Public School 151 at present.

31. Public School 59, south side of Fifty-seventh street, between Second and Third avenues.—
The present building has 115 extra sittings in the Grammar Department, and the Primary Department is practically full, but no immediate necessity for an addition.

32. Public School 66, north side of Two Hundred and Thirty-second street, Kingsbridge.—
Not required for light or air nor for additional accommodations, as the present Public School 66 has 459 extra sittings.

33. Addition to Public School 135, First avenue, between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets.—
The present building has only 66 children taught in part-time classes, hence no immediate necessity for an addition as proposed, 28 by 100 feet.

34. Addition to Public School 64, Fordham.—
There are 512 extra sittings in the present building; nor is this additional site required for light and air.

35. Addition to Public School 136, No. 72 Monroe street (east side of school).—
There are 475 part-time classes at present, and I advise the acquisition of this site to give more accommodations.

36. Addition to Public School 155, strip on east side of Andrews avenue, north of school 50, by 178 feet 5 inches.—
The money, \$3,000, was authorized for the purchase of this site by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 6, 1897.

37. Plot southwest corner of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and College avenue.—
It is proposed to acquire a plot 150 by 200 feet on College avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-fourth and One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets.

There is a school on the northwest corner of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and College avenue, designated as Public School 60, which has 210 extra sittings; hence the plot proposed is not necessary for extra accommodations nor for light and air.

38. Public School 69, south side of Fifty-fifth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues.—
Not required for extra accommodations as the present building has a number of extra sittings; nor do I consider it of sufficient importance to be acquired for light and air.

39. Public School 79, near tenement on Lot No. 44, First street.—
It is proposed to purchase a plot (25 feet by 28 feet) for light and air. While this addition for ventilation, etc., is good, I do not consider it of sufficient importance to be acquired at present.

40. Eagle avenue, between Clifton avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-third street.—
It is proposed to acquire a plot (75 feet by 130 feet) on the east side of Eagle avenue, south of the present school building, Public School 90. This school has 724 children taught in part-time classes in the Primary Department, and has an annex at One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and Tinton avenue, which is leased. While this school is overcrowded at present, it will be relieved by the school at One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and Tinton avenue, the money for which site was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 11, 1900; therefore no immediate necessity for the additional site on Eagle avenue.

41. Three sites for new buildings in the Borough of The Bronx.—
Of the three, two have been decided upon; one to relieve Public School 85 and one in the neighborhood of Brook avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street; the other has not been selected by the Board of Education. The site to relieve Public School 85 I consider necessary; the others are not needed at present.

42. One site for new building in the Tenth Ward, Borough of Manhattan.—
It is proposed to select a site in the neighborhood of Public School 174. This is a very thickly settled neighborhood, and I consider an additional school in this vicinity necessary.

Sites for New Buildings, etc., Borough of Brooklyn.

1. To relieve Public School 2, Forty-sixth street, near Third avenue, and Public School 118, Fifty-sixth street, corner Fourth avenue.—
The site proposed is on Sixth avenue, between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh streets (200 feet 4 inches by 200 feet). Public School 2 has 1,047 part-time classes and Public School 118 1,161 part-time classes. The City owns a site on Fourth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, and the contract has been let for a school building, to be known as Public School 136, containing twenty-two classrooms, and the City has just acquired an addition to Public School 118. These two additions will greatly relieve the congestion at Public Schools 2 and 118, but as this is a rapidly growing neighborhood the site suggested at Fifty-sixth street and Sixth avenue will be required in the very near future; hence I would advise that it be allowed.

2. To relieve Public School 10, Seventh avenue near Seventeenth street, and Public School 107, Eighth avenue, corner of Thirteenth street.—
Both of these schools have children taught in part-time classes, but as the City has a plot (200 feet by 200 feet) at Eleventh avenue and Windsor place, which is in the vicinity of Public School 10 and 107, an additional site is not required.

3. To relieve Public School 74, Bushwick avenue, near Kew-Forest street, Public School 75, Evergreen avenue, corner of Ralph street, and Public School 86, Irving avenue, corner of Hammon street.—
Public Schools 74 and 75, have more sittings than average attendance. Public School 86 has 800 part-time classes, but Public School 123 (with 26 classrooms) just completed, will relieve Public School 86; therefore, no additional site is required at present to relieve Public School 74, 75 and 86.

4. To relieve Public School 43, Boerum street, near Manhattan avenue, and Public School 21, McKibbin street, near Manhattan avenue.—
Both of these schools are overcrowded; at Public School 43 there are 1,694 children taught in part-time classes and at Public School 21, 1,445. The proposed site is on Leonard street, between Boerum and McKibbin streets.

This site I consider very necessary to relieve the congestion at Public Schools 43 and 21.

5. To relieve Public School 60, Putnam avenue, corner of Hamburg avenue, and Public School 85, Livingston avenue, corner of Covert street.—
Both of these schools have part-time classes; at Public School 60 there are 315, and at Public School 85, 710. The proposed site is an addition to Public School 85. As both of these schools are congested, I consider the addition to Public School 85 advantageous, and advise it be accepted.

6. To relieve Public School 33, Heyward street, near Broadway, Public School 71, Heyward street, near Lee avenue, and Public School 16, Wilson street, near Bedford avenue.—
Public School 16 has more sittings than average attendance, hence needs no relief. Public Schools 33 and 71 are both overcrowded, but the Board of Education is building a school with 36 classrooms on Harrison avenue, between Rutledge and Heyward streets (designated as Public School 122), which will probably be completed in June, 1901. This school when completed will give the necessary relief to Public Schools 33 and 71; hence no new site is required in this vicinity.

7. To relieve Public School 79, Kew-Forest street, near Summer avenue, and Public School 54, Watworth street, near Myrtle avenue.—
Both of these schools are congested; at Public School 79 there are 575 children taught in part-time classes and 654 at Public School 54. The site has not definitely been decided upon, but it will probably be 200 feet by 200 feet. In order to relieve the overcrowding at Public Schools 79 and 54, I would advise that this site be allowed.

8. To relieve Public School 18, Mauger street, near Leonard street, and Public School 40, Union avenue, near Metropolitan avenue.—
The City owns a site on Manhattan avenue, between Conselyea street and Metropolitan avenue, but for some reason 200 feet was acquired on Conselyea street and only 154 feet on Metropolitan avenue. It is now proposed to acquire the plot, 45 feet by 86 feet, to square the premises. This I consider advisable, as the entire site is required to relieve Public Schools 18 and 40.

9. Commercial High School.—
The proposed site has not been located; the present school is on Bedford avenue and Jefferson street. I do not consider that a new site is required at present, as there are only 432 pupils on the register and there are 655 sittings in the present building.

10. Eastern District High School.—
The proposed site is the entire block bounded by Division avenue, Roehling, Havemeyer and South Ninth streets. The present location is on Idiggs avenue and South Third street. This High School has only 320 pupils on the register, and I do not see the necessity of acquiring a site for a new High School building for so few scholars.

Sites for New Buildings, Borough of Queens.

1. Steinway avenue, Long Island City, for addition to Public School 8.—
It is proposed to acquire a site in rear of present building. This school is full; its capacity is 920 and there are 944 pupils on the register. Therefore, I would recommend this additional site to be acquired.

2. Twenty-one lots, Hollis, adjoining Public School 35.—
This site not necessary; capacity of present school building is 320, and there are only 142 pupils in the school at present.

3. Two and one-half acres at Creedmoor, adjoining Public School 33.—
I cannot see the necessity for an additional site for a school with only 38 pupils.

4. Sanford avenue, east of present High School 20, Flushing.—
The present school property bounds this proposed lot on both sides, hence it is needed to square out the school premises, and necessary to allow an extension to be made to the present school building.

5. About four lots at Far Rockaway, adjoining High School 39.—
The average attendance at this school is 350, and the sitting capacity of the present building 600; hence I do not consider this addition necessary at present.

6. Bleecker street and Covert avenue, Metropolitan avenue addition to Public School 75.—
This school is in a thickly settled and growing neighborhood. The old school has just been enlarged, but at present it has an average attendance nearly equal to its sitting capacity; hence I would advise that this additional site be allowed.

7. Four lots at College Point, adjoining Public School 27—

These lots will eventually be required when it is required to enlarge this school, but as the average attendance is only 649, and the sitting capacity is 920, I do not see the necessity for acquiring this additional site at present.

8. For addition to Public School 4, Long Island City—

This school is running to nearly its full capacity and an additional site will soon be required; therefore, I would advise that this be allowed.

9. High School, Long Island City—

On October 12, 1900, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the expenditure of \$22,230 for a High School site on Willis avenue, Academy and Radde streets, hence it is not required to allow for another site.

- No. 1. Buxtonway avenue, Long Island City, for addition to Public School 8.
No. 2. Sanford avenue, east of present High School No. 20, Flushing.
No. 6. Blandford street and Grand avenue, Macdonald avenue, addition to Public School 75.
No. 8. For addition to Public School 14, Long Island City.
I estimate the above sites at \$47,920.

NEW SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND ADDITIONS.

Borough of Manhattan and The Bronx.

1. Addition to Public School 22, Stanton and Sheriff streets..... \$122,850 00

It is proposed to erect an addition with 15 classrooms on Sheriff street, north of present school building, and removal some of the old building. This addition is needed, as there are twenty-two classes at this school.

2. New building Public School 180, One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, near Amsterdam avenue..... \$520,420 00

A new building containing 48 class-rooms on a site 1350 feet by another 18 feet. A new school is greatly needed in this neighborhood as there is none between One Hundred and Twenty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets.

3. New building, Public School 185, Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh streets, between First avenue and Avenue A..... \$191,120 00

New building to contain 15 classrooms, giving accommodations for about 2,400 children. This building will eventually be required to relieve Public School 82 and 74, but at present there is no immediate necessity for its erection. Public School 82, including an annex with 60 sittings, has 241 part-time classes, while Public School 74 has a few extra-sittings.

4. New building, Public School 170, Arthur Avenue and Vicar street..... \$131,940 00

It is proposed to erect a building containing 10 class-rooms, accommodating about 800 children; the site is owned by the City. This school is necessary to give the place of the building designated for Public School 100, which is based on a projected total of \$1,250. The present school has 480 pupils on the register.

5. Addition to Public School 31, West Forty-fifth street, near First avenue..... \$147,430 00

This is to be an addition with 15 class-rooms built on Forty-fifth street, in rear of present Public School 31, on West Forty-fifth street. In the future this addition will be required for at present no necessary. The Grammar Department of present building has extra sitting 25 and the Primary Department only 10, are overcrowded.

6. Addition to Public School 70, Seventy-fifth street, near Third avenue..... \$147,490 00

It is proposed to erect an addition with 15 class-rooms in rear of Public School 70. I do not suppose that addition essential at present as there are extra sittings in the present building, but in view of the register.

It is proposed to erect an addition on Thirtieth street, in rear of Public School 90, to provide for 25 class-rooms. This addition is not required now. The report shows that there are more sittings than scholars.

The new building proposed is to have 15 class-rooms, accommodating about 900 pupils. In my opinion the neighborhood does not warrant a new school; Public School 160 at One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Audubon avenue has 650 more sittings than pupils on register.

13. New building, Public School 191, Juliana street..... \$147,420 00

New school to have 18 class-rooms, which will give about 900 sittings. This building, at Williamsburg, will not be needed for some time; the report shows there are a number of extra sittings in Public School 98, which is only a few blocks north of this site; hence Public School 98 will accommodate this neighborhood for some time.

I have shown that it is not necessary to acquire but five of the additional sites specified, hence it will only be necessary to provide for five new buildings with 30 class-rooms each, or 150 class-rooms in all, and at \$7,000 per class-room (which is a fair estimate for construction, heating, sanitary work and furniture), will make the estimate for these five buildings, \$1,050,000.

2. Three new high school buildings (Commercial, Eastern District and Manual Training)..... \$1,350,000 00

As reported on the sites required for Commercial and Eastern District High Schools, I do not consider the number of scholars taught at these high schools warrants the acquisition of new sites; hence I do not think new buildings should be provided for. The City has lately acquired a site for the Manual Training High School on the eastern side of Seventy avenue, between Fourth and Fifth streets (not less than 237 feet 10 inches). The present quarters are on the corner of Court and Lavinia streets, in a building leased from Felix Campbell at \$4,000 per annum; lease expires July 1, 1907. The quarters are not well adapted for the purpose, but as there are only 754 pupils on the register, I do not consider it urgent to erect a building costing at least \$450,000.

Considering the list as submitted, I would advise that buildings be erected:

- To relieve Public School 2 and Public School 118.

- To relieve Public School 43 and Public School 21.

- To relieve Public School 106 and Public School 85.

- To relieve Public School 79 and Public School 54.

- To relieve Public School 18 and Public School 20.

and estimate that they can be built for \$1,050,000.

NEW SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND ADDITIONS.

Borough of Queens.

1. Addition to Public School 7..... \$163,800 00

This addition is not needed immediately, as this public school has only 945 scholars on the register and has a seating capacity of 1,000.

2. Addition to Public School 8..... \$163,800 00

The present school building has an attendance beyond its capacity, hence I would advise this addition.

3. Addition to Public School 22, Flushing..... \$31,500 00

Not necessary. Present school building has a capacity of 120 sittings and an average attendance of only 201.

4. Addition to Public School 23, Flushing..... \$31,500 00

Not required at present. This school has 160 sittings and only an average attendance of 154.

5. New building, Public School 25, Flushing..... \$50,500 00

Present school has a capacity of 80, and there are only 48 on the register. Not necessary.

6. Addition to Public School 57, Morris Park..... \$51,500 00

Not necessary. The average attendance is 68 less than the sitting capacity.

7. Addition to Public School 75, Metropolitan avenue..... \$103,800 00

The present school is full and as it is in a growing neighborhood, I consider additional facilities necessary.

8. New High School Building, Long Island City..... \$250,000 00

I do not consider that an attendance of 214 scholars in Long Island City warrants a new high school building.

9. Vernon avenue and Hamilton avenue..... \$163,800 00

This is to take the place of Public School 77 and annex to Public School 77, which has a total average attendance of 404 and a capacity of 480. Therefore, I do not consider a new school building is required.

10. Greenpoint avenue and Pearl street..... \$710,000 00

I do not consider the neighborhood warrants a school building, as it is just at the entrance to Calvary Cemetery.

I would recommend that an allowance be made to build the following:

Addition to Public School 8..... \$163,800 00

Addition to Public School 75..... 163,800 00

NEW SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND ADDITIONS.

Borough of Richmond.

New High School, St. George..... \$250,000 00

There are only 263 high school scholars on the register for the entire Borough of Richmond; hence I do not consider there are a sufficient number of pupils to warrant the erection of a High School building at the cost of \$250,000.

RECAPITULATION.

In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, the amounts to be allowed for sites and buildings must be taken together, for I find that the bond issue for each is considered by the Board of Education as one, and has been kept as a continuous account, the account being credited with all moneys authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for either sites or buildings; and whenever the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approves of an expenditure for sites or contracts for the erection of buildings, these amounts are charged against the account.

This being a running account, the Board of Education has asked for the erection of additions and new buildings that have been specified in previous requests.

In view of the manner in which the account is kept for sites and buildings the most logical way to obtain what is requested for this year is to take the balance on hand in the Board of Education, subtract any liabilities that may be chargeable against it for sites previously authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and for any contracts that may be necessary to finish the buildings which have been started, and take this balance from the total recommended for sites and buildings from the present request.

Sir—The Board of Education, at a meeting held January 23, 1901, adopted resolutions requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the action of the Board of Education, in the selection of a site for school purposes, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for a plot 25 feet by 100 feet in size, situated on the northerly side of McKibbin street, distant 125 feet westerly from Graham avenue; and also requesting that the Corporation Counsel be authorized to take such proceedings as may be necessary for the acquisition of such site, pursuant to chapter 284 of the Laws of 1900; and further, deeming it for the public interest that title to the lands should be acquired by the City at a fixed or specified time, direct, that at a date four months after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate, who may be appointed by the Supreme Court, in the proceedings to acquire title to the said lands and premises, title to the same and all interest therein shall vest in the City.

BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

An adjourned meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Friday, February 2, 1901, at 11.30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Maurice F. Holahan, President of the Board of Public Improvements.

On motion of the Comptroller, the minutes of the meeting of January 18, 1901, were approved as printed.

BUSINESS OF THE BOARD.

The following assessment lists as noted below, which were referred to the Comptroller at meeting of January 18, 1901, for examination and report by Engineers in regard to the charges included therein for interest and for engineering and inspection to which objections had been filed, were presented by the Comptroller, and on motion taken up for action.

After hearing Judge Ernest Hall, of counsel, and Thomas S. Bassford, attorney for the objectors, on motion, the several assessment lists were referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to reduce the assessments in the amount stated in each case and to reapportion the same in accordance with such reductions, as follows—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative:

No. 6276. Sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street (Welch street), from existing sewer in Webster avenue to Morris avenue; in Tullman avenue, etc., \$2,800. No. 6143. Sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, from existing sewer in Walnut avenue to Cypress avenue, and in Wales avenue, etc., \$2,000.

No. 6099. Regulating, grading, etc., Spencer place, from East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, \$400.

No. 6121. Sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, from the existing sewer in River avenue to Mott avenue; in Mott avenue, etc., \$2,600.

The assessment list for sewers and appurtenances in Sheridan avenue, between East One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street and East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, and in East One Hundred and Fifty-third street and Mott avenue, between Sheridan avenue and the Spuyten Duyvil and Fort Morris Railroad, which was referred to the Comptroller at meeting of January 18, 1901, for examination and report by Engineer in regard to the expenses included therein for interest and for engineering and inspection, to which objections had been filed, was presented by the Comptroller and, on motion, taken up for action.

After hearing Judge Ernest Hall, of counsel, and Thomas S. Bassford, attorney for Henry Lewis Morris, objector, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, etc., in Brook avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Webster avenue, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, and objections of Ernst Marx Nathan Company and others, by C. H. Augustine, attorney; Margaretha Omer and others, by McCarty & Baldwin, attorneys; Adam B. Wachler and others, by H. A. Shyman, attorney, and petitions for awards for damages of Kasper Pirmann and others, by McCarty & Baldwin, attorneys, together with a report of the Commissioner of Highways of December 14, 1900, upon the objections filed by Mr. Shyman, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 23, 1901.

McCarty & Baldwin, attorneys, were heard in opposition to the action of the Board of Assessors in disallowing the claims of Margaretha Omer and others for damages to their property, and where awards were allowed their other clients, to the inadequacy of the same, and also alleged that the assessments on their property far exceed the benefits derived from the improvement.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Creston avenue, from the existing sewer in Furham road to Kingsbridge road, and objections of John P. Flann, by U. S. Goodford, attorney, together with report of the Department of Sewers in regard to the objections, dated January 23, 1901, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 26, 1901.

Judge Ernest Hall, of counsel, and Thomas S. Bassford, attorney for the objector, were heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that the expenses connected with the improvement are excessive.

Mr. J. H. Frick, Engineer of the Department of Sewers, was heard in explanation. On motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

On motion of the President of the Board of Public Improvements, the action of the Board confirming the said assessment was rescinded, and the consideration of the same was postponed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

Subsequently, the assessment list was again taken up for action and, on motion, it was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the amount thereof in the sum of \$400, and to reapportion the assessment in accordance with the said reduction, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Cypress avenue, between Bronx Kills and East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, and objections of Henry Lewis Morris, by T. S. Bassford, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 30, 1901.

After hearing Judge Ernest Hall, of counsel, and Thomas S. Bassford, attorney for Mr. Morris, in opposition to the excessive charges included in the assessment for the expenses connected with the improvement, on motion, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the assessment in the sum of \$800, and to reapportion the assessment in accordance with such reduction, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks, etc., in One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, from Sheridan avenue to the New York and Harlem Railroad, and objections of Julius M. Livingston and others, by T. H. Baldwin, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 5, 1901.

Mr. Geo. E. Baldwin, attorney, representing T. H. Baldwin, attorney, was heard in opposition to the appurtenance of the assessment, claiming that as the street is a great connecting link between Boston road at One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Bascobel avenue at Jerome avenue, connecting with Washington Bridge and the Borough of Manhattan, the area of benefit should be extended. Mr. Baldwin further stated that by the improvement of the street in its present condition more damage than benefit had accrued to the abutting property in many instances.

On motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks and placing fences in St. Joseph's street, from Robbins avenue to Whitlock avenue, and objections of Max Weil, by Edward S. Kaufman, attorney, and H. H. Sherman, of counsel; Elizabeth W. Lester, by W. H. Peirce, attorney. Also, petition for damages to property of Elizabeth W. Lester, filed by W. H. Peirce, attorney, together with opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated January 18, 1901, in reference to the claim of Mrs. Lester, and report of the Department of Highways, dated September 5, 1900, in reply to the objections raised by Mr. Peirce, attorney, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 5, 1901.

Mr. Kaufman and Mr. Sherman appeared.

Mr. Peck, attorney, was heard in behalf of Mrs. Lester, claiming an award for damages to her property by reason of the change in the grade of the said street, and also objected to the alleged excessive expense charged to the assessment for inspection fees.

The Assessors stated that the property of Mrs. Lester was allowed \$750 by the Commission for damages in the matter of the widening of St. Joseph's street, and as they considered that only the buildings of Mrs. Lester had been damaged by the change of grade, they had disallowed her claim.

On motion, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the amount thereof in the sum of \$800, and to reappportion the assessment in accordance with the said reduction, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewers and appurtenances in Aqueduct Avenue, from the existing sewer in Fordham road to summit south of East One Hundred and Eighty-third street, and in Andrews Avenue, from the existing sewer in Fordham road to East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, and in Loring place, from the existing sewer in Fordham road to East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, with objections of W. D. Peck as part owner, and as attorney, and transcript of testimony taken before the Board of Assessors, and exhibits submitted as part of the testimony in regard to the expenses connected with the work in question, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 5, 1901.

Mr. Peck was heard in opposition to the excessive expenses for surveying, inspecting and interest, amounting to \$12,050.67.

The Assessors stated that considerable testimony had been submitted by Mr. Peck showing that the expenses connected with the improvement were very much greater than usually charged against work of this character, and that in their opinion the claim of Mr. Peck is a just one and that some relief should be granted in the matter.

On motion, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to reduce the amount thereof in the sum of \$4,500, and to reappportion the assessment in accordance with the said reduction, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer in East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, from Inwood Avenue to the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and objections of trustees of William Astor, by John C. Shaw, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 5, 1901.

Mr. Shaw, attorney, appeared by representative in opposition to the amount of the assessment upon the property of his clients, claiming that the Assessors in making the assessment have exceeded one half of the fair value of the said property, and requested that an apportionment of the same be made.

On motion, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.
