Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Education, held December 26, 1901, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the sum of sixty-eight hundred and twenty-seven dollars and eighty-one cents (\$6,827.81) be, and the same is hereby appropriated from premiums derived from the sale of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, heretofore issued pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter; said sum to be applied (in addition to the appropriation authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 14, 1901) to the settlement of the awards, costs, charges, expenses, interest, etc., in the proceeding to acquire title to the site on Avenue C, East Thirteenth and East Fourteenth streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn; requisition for said sum of sixty-eight hundred and twenty-seven dollars and eighty-one cents (\$6,827.81) being hereby made upon the Comptroller."

In reply I would report, as stated by the Board of Education, that \$25,423.75 was approved as being sufficient to pay the awards, costs, charges and expenses and expert witnesses' fees in the proceedings to acquire title to the following sites in the Borough of Brooklyn:

1. Avenue C, East Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets;
2. Fifteenth avenue, Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets.

The deficiency existing, to pay the awards, costs, etc., in the Fifteenth avenue site, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can properly give its approval of an appropriation of \$6,827.81, from the premiums derived from the sale of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, heretofore issued pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, said sum to be applied to the settlement of the awards, costs, etc., in the proceedings to acquire title to the site on Avenue C, East Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the appropriation of six thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven dollars and eighty-one cents (\$6,827.81) from premiums derived from the sale of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, said sum to be applied (in addition to the appropriation authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 14, 1901) to the settlement of the awards, costs, charges, expenses, etc., in the proceedings to acquire title to the site on Avenue C, East Thirteenth and East Fourteenth streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise this Board, by written opinion, as to its powers in connection with public improvements under section 243 of the Charter, or under such other sections of the Charter as relate to said subject, and especially as to its power to rescind, reconsider or in any manner modify any action taken by the late Board of Public Improvements of the City, and that he send a copy of such opinion to each member of the Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the Borough Presidents be requested to meet and confer for the purpose of preparing a uniform contract and specifications for all asphalt pavings and repavings, and to report such a contract and specifications to this Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Mayor presented the following:

January 6, 1902.

Sir—By direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I call your attention to section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, reading as follows:

"The salaries of all officers whose offices may be created by the Board of Aldermen for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of this act shall, subject to the other provisions of this act, be prescribed by ordinance or resolution. It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen, upon the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to fix the salary of every officer or person whose compensation is paid out of the city treasury, other than day laborers, and teachers, examiners and members of the supervising staff of the Department of Education, irrespective of the amount fixed by this act, except that no change shall be made in the salary of an elected officer or head of a department during his tenure of office. Salaries need not be uniform throughout the several boroughs, but may, in the discretion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be made to consist of two elements—first, remuneration for work done, which shall be the same throughout all the boroughs for positions of like character; second, an additional sum, based upon an estimate of the prevailing rentals and expenses of living in the borough where the services rendered are performed, and which may vary in the several boroughs. The Board of Aldermen may reduce, but may not increase, any salary recommended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; but the action of the Board of Aldermen on reducing any salary so recommended shall be subject to the veto power of the Mayor, as provided in section 40 of this act. In case the Board of Aldermen shall vote to reduce more than one salary the Mayor may approve the reduction of one or more salaries, and may disapprove the reduction of others. In such case the reductions he shall approve shall become effective; and as to those which he shall not approve, the recommendations of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall become effective unless the reductions be again passed by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Aldermen in the manner provided in section 40 of this act. All salaries as fixed on the first day of January, nineteen hundred and two, shall continue in force until fixed by the Board of Aldermen as in this section provided."

In the same connection, I ask your attention to the last sentence of section 10 of the said Charter, reading as follows:

"Between January first and May first, in the year nineteen hundred and two, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have power from time to time to alter, modify and amend the budget for the year nineteen hundred and two; to change the titles, terms and conditions of appropriations contained therein; to add new appropriations and abolish any that may be found unnecessary; and in furtherance of these purposes shall have the power, if additional funds be required, to direct the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds redeemable from the tax-levy of the year nineteen hundred and three."

From the foregoing references it is clear that a most important duty is thus laid upon the City Government, and it is also evident that this duty must be performed before the first of May. In order to enable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make the necessary recommendations as to salaries, called for by section 56 of the Charter, you are hereby directed to submit in the form of one copy to the Mayor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, one copy to the Comptroller and one copy to the Board of Aldermen, not later than the first of March, a classification of the working force of your department, in which you shall specify in detail the salary proper to be paid to every officer of the department, with the following exceptions:

First—No change should be recommended as to officers whose salaries are fixed by the Charter.

Second—No change should be recommended as to the enlisted force of the Police Department, the Fire Department or the Street Cleaning Department.

Third—You will perceive, also, that day laborers, and teachers, examiners and members of the supervising staff of the Department of Education are excepted.

In making the foregoing classification you are directed to assume that the working force of your department as it stood on the 31st of December, 1898, represents, theoretically, the outside force that is appropriate for your department. You are at liberty to propose a force larger, in any respect, if in your judgment it is necessary to do so; but, in every case in which you propose an enlargement of the

force, you are directed to state in writing your reasons for believing that such addition is necessary.

In classifying the clerical force of your department, you are directed to divide the clerks into classes, on the basis of Rule XIII. of the United States Civil Service Regulations (a copy of which is hereto appended) so that the Board of Aldermen, when it comes to take final action, may be in position to provide that there shall be in your department so many clerks of the first class, so many of the second class, and the like. In other words, it is the desire of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to propose a plan to the Board of Aldermen which shall insure the payment of the same salary in all departments for the same sort of work. It is also desired to create a system which shall provide for the promotion of the clerks, from class to class, on a basis of merit, and not of favoritism.

Officers presiding over departments that did not exist in 1898, or having in charge bureaus that have been transferred from other departments, naturally, cannot make the comparison with the organization of 1898, that has been asked for. They should, however, prepare the classification called for, and make whatever comparison the circumstances may allow.

You are reminded again of the importance of submitting this information to the Mayor not later than the first of March. After it is received by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, time will be necessary for the review of the situation by that board, and for the preparation of its report to the Board of Aldermen; and time will be needed also by the Board of Aldermen for the consideration of the report of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Owing to the fact that the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to readjust the budget expires on the first of May, the work must be entirely completed before that date.

Rule XIII. of the United States Civil Service Regulations.

The officers and employees in all branches of the classified service of the United States, for the purpose of these rules, shall be arranged in the following classes, unless otherwise provided by law:

Class A—All persons receiving an annual salary of less than \$720, or a compensation at the rate of less than \$720 per annum.

Class B—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$720 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$720 or more, but less than \$840 per annum.

Class C—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$840 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$840 or more, but less than \$900 per annum.

Class D—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$900 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$900 or more, but less than \$1,000 per annum.

Class E—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$1,000 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$1,000 or more, but less than \$1,200 per annum.

Class 1—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$1,200 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$1,200 or more, but less than \$1,400 per annum.

Class 2—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$1,400 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$1,400 or more, but less than \$1,600 per annum.

Class 3—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$1,600 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$1,600 or more, but less than \$1,800 per annum.

Class 4—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$1,800 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$1,800 or more, but less than \$2,000 per annum.

Class 5—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$2,000 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$2,000 or more, but less than \$2,500 per annum.

Class 6—All persons receiving an annual salary of \$2,500 or more, or a compensation at the rate of \$2,500 or more per annum.

And requested the authority of this Board to have copies thereof sent to the Borough Presidents and all departments of the city government having a clerical force attached to them.

The President of the Borough of Queens moved that such authority be granted.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Whereas, Section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, contains the following provisions of law:

"The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond shall constitute the Board of Estimate and Apportionment," and

Whereas, Section 10 of said Charter provides that "between January 1st and May 1st, 1902, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have the power from time to time alter, modify and amend the budget for the year 1902; to change the titles, terms and conditions of appropriations contained therein; to add new appropriations and abolish any that may be found unnecessary; and in furtherance of these purposes shall have the power, if additional funds be required, to direct the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds redeemable from the tax levy of the year 1903," and

Whereas, In order to enable said Board to comply with the provisions of said section 10, it will be necessary for the Presidents of the several boroughs, the heads of departments, bureaus, offices, boards and commissioners, to transmit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, not later than March 1st, 1902, an estimate in writing, herein called a departmental estimate, of the amount of expenditure, specifying in detail the objects thereof required in their respective departments, bureaus, offices, boards and commissions, including a statement of each of the salaries of their officers, clerks, employees and subordinates."

"Duplicates of these departmental estimates and statements shall be sent at the same time to the Board of Aldermen."

Resolved, That the Comptroller request the Presidents of the several boroughs, the heads of departments, bureaus, offices, boards and commissions of the City of New York, and of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and the officers of institutions entitled by law to receive money from the City Treasury, or to incur expenditures payable therefrom, to send their estimates of expenditure for the year 1902, in conformity with the foregoing provisions of law, in triplicate, one copy to the Mayor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; one copy to the Comptroller, and one copy to the Board of Aldermen, on or before March 1st, 1902.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller presented a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated January 2, 1902, requesting the transfer of appropriate amounts from the Department of Bridges to the President of the Borough of The Bronx to enable him to properly carry out the duties devolved upon him in construction and maintenance of bridges under his jurisdiction. Also a communication from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated January 4, 1902, enclosing a summary of the approximate cost of the repairs and maintenance of the various bridges, and a list of the persons employed on the bridges required to be transferred to the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

The Mayor moved that they be referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report,

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx and Richmond, having been members of the former Board of Public Improvements, be appointed a Committee to examine and report to this Board concerning the maps, records and employees of said Board, and also as to what engineering force, or other employees, this Board needs for the performance of its duties concerning public improvements.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller presented the following:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:

The petition of the Board of Education respectfully shows:

That the Board of Education, as required by law, advertised for bids for printing for the year 1902.

Several bids were received and opened, but no award has yet been made.

The lowest aggregate bidder is the Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company, whose bid aggregates about thirty-four thousand dollars.

The bid next higher than the lowest is John B. Watkins, and is about thirty-six thousand dollars, the difference being about \$2,000.

The Wynkoop-Hallenbeck-Crawford Company had the contract for printing for the year 1901. The work was performed in such an unsatisfactory manner, by reason of the continued delay in making deliveries, that the Board of Education, at a meeting held on December 11th, 1901, cancelled the contract for the year 1901.

Pursuant to section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Education is compelled to award the contract for 1902 to the lowest bidder, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment consents otherwise.

To award the contract to the lowest bidder in this case would seriously embarrass the work of the Board of Education for the current year.

Evidence of the delay on the part of the contractor will be submitted, if desired.

The difference between the two bids is twenty-four hundred dollars, and we respectfully ask that the contract be awarded to the next lowest bidder.

Resolved, That the aforesaid request of the Board of Education be disapproved.

De Forest, Tenement House Commissioner, dated January 1, 1902, requesting the transfer of \$5,891.66 from the appropriation made to the Tenement House Department, to the Health Department to enable the said department to continue the enforcement of the Tenement House laws during the month of January.

The Mayor moved that it be referred to the Comptroller for examination and report.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller presented a communication from the Board of Coroners of the Borough of Queens, dated January 4, 1902, transmitting a revised departmental estimate for the year 1902.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the matter be referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report, and that the Comptroller direct the Board of Coroners of the Borough of Queens that they must gauge their expenses to keep within \$19,000 annually until an appropriation is made.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—City of New York,

The Board met in pursuance of a resolution adopted January 6, 1902.

Present—Seth Low, The Mayor; Edward M. Grout, The Comptroller; Chas. V. Fornes, The President of the Board of Aldermen; Jacob A. Cantor, The President of the Borough of Manhattan; J. Edwd. Swanstrom, The President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, The President of the Borough of the Bronx; Joseph Cassidy, The President of the Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, The President of the Borough of Richmond.

The reading of the minutes of the meetings held December 19 and 26, 1901, January 6, 1902, was dispensed with.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

City of New York—Department of Finance,
Comptroller's Office, January 13, 1902.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The following report is submitted in accordance with the following resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Resolved, That the Comptroller and the Presidents of the boroughs of The Bronx and Richmond, having been members of the former Board of Public Improvements, be appointed a committee to examine and report to this board concerning the maps, records and employees of said board, and also as to what engineering force, or other employees, this board needs for the performance of its duties concerning public improvements."

Your committee agrees as follows:

That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is not charged with any duty of making maps in the first instance, and that it has nothing to do with flagging sidewalks, fencing vacant lots and grading lots, in accordance with Section 435 of the Charter, except as agreement may be reached by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as to the amount to be expended within any fixed period for such purposes. That the primary duty of completing the map of the City of New York is transferred from the Board of Public Improvements to the Borough Presidents, and that the only duty the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has in this matter is to approve or disapprove such maps when they are presented for filing.

That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has the same power to change the map of the city as the Board of Public Improvements.

That as to other assessable improvements, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has substantially the same powers as the Board of Public Improvements (Section 434 of the Charter).

That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has substantially the same powers as the Board of Street Openings in the former City of New York (Section 243 of the Charter).

Your committee makes the following recommendations to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

First—That it is immediately necessary to have an engineer to advise the board as to the matters that come before it, and that the board determine hereafter, as occasion may arise, whether or not any, and if any, what additional engineering force it may need.

That the Borough Presidents be requested to meet and agree upon an assignment among themselves of the staff of the Topographical Bureau.

That the minutes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be separated as to financial and public improvement matters.

Second—That instead of electing as secretary one of its members (as was formerly the rule) the Board of Estimate and Apportionment elect as secretary the Deputy Comptroller assigned by the Comptroller to attend to matters relating to said board.

Third, That the present Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be continued as clerk of financial matters coming before such Board, and that Colonel John H. Mooney, Secretary of the former Board of Public Improvements, be designated to act as clerk of public improvement matters coming before the Board, and that the salary of each be fixed at \$3,500 per annum.

Fourth—That all clerical employees of the former Board of Public Improvements be employed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment until it can be determined which of said employees are required.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx took the position (basing his opinion on his experience before the former Board of Street Openings, when he was acting as Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards) that it is unnecessary for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to have a Chief Engineer, or an engineering force, and that any matters on which the Board desired to be advised of any engineering character be referred to the Engineers of the Department of Finance.

Board of Public Improvements, to such positions as the Borough Presidents determine, and to report their recommendations to this Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Comptroller offered the following:

Dear Sir—By paragraph 1 of section 242 of the amended Greater New York Charter, power is conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment,

"To appropriate, from time to time, for the maintenance, improvement and extension of the system of water supply of the Borough of Brooklyn, the moneys received from water rents in the said Borough, subject, however, to the charges now imposed by law upon said revenues."

Herewith I present an estimate of the amounts payable from water rents for the maintenance and improvement of the Brooklyn water system for the year 1902. This estimate may be summarized as follows:

This amount is within the limit required by law, which prescribes that, from the "Water Revenue Fund," ample moneys be reserved to defray the interest upon the bonded water debt and sinking fund charges.

A reduction of one hundred and thirty (130) men from the present force, and the consequent partial reorganization of the service cannot be immediately effected. Thus, for instance, until your Honorable Body and the Board of Aldermen shall have authorized the creation of the position of Chief Engineer for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, as recommended in my communication of even date to your Honorable Board, and this position shall have been filled, the present Engineer-in-Charge and the Engineer of Water Supply, who are to be superseded by the proposed Chief Engineer at a saving of four thousand (\$4,000) dollars per annum, must continue in their present positions, in order not to cripple the service. There may be delays in the transfer or removal of some of the other men; and inasmuch as all the men whose services are to be dispensed with have been employed since the 1st of January, it will be necessary to make provisions for paying these men from the 1st of January until their services are dispensed with, and this may be done either by approving the present budget, to go into operation, say, on or before February 15, and authorizing in the interval payments on salaries and wages, as per payroll of December, 1901, which payroll represents the present force; or by approving the present budget (leaving the Commissioner to put it into operation as soon as practicable), and authorizing the latter to pay for salaries and wages as may be required, until the proposed reductions shall have been made, a sum not to exceed nine thousand four hundred (\$9,400) dollars per month, which sum represents the difference between the present payroll and the average monthly payroll under the budget submitted herewith.

OPENING OF PAERDEGAT BASIN, BROOKLYN.

The following communications were read:

Law Department, New York, July 26, 1901.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President of the Board of Public Improvements:

Sir—I have received your communication of July 22, 1901, which reads as follows: "Inclosed herewith I send you a copy of a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Borough of Brooklyn on the 7th day of May, 1901. In compliance with this resolution a resolution was prepared by this Board, copy of which is also herewith inclosed, and submitted for approval of the Board at a meeting held on the 26th day of June, 1901."

"The Deputy Comptroller, as a member of the Board, objected to the adoption of this resolution on the ground that this Board had no authority to acquire title to a sewer basin, and the matter was accordingly laid over."

"I have now to ask that you will inform me as to the proper course for this Board to take in the matter, and as it is a case of very much urgency an early reply is requested."

I have received also a further communication from you of the same date referring me to section 561 of the Greater New York Charter so far as it is applicable to the subject-matter of your first communication.

I beg leave to advise you that, in my judgment, the procedure followed by the Board of Public Improvements in this matter is in every sense regular. I cannot, however, institute condemnation proceedings to acquire the property in question for sewer purposes of The City of New York without the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, given by a concurrent vote of all its members, as provided by section 255 of the Charter.

I would advise you therefore to have the matter laid before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its consideration, with the information referred to in said section 255.

If the matter is approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided in said section 255, I shall then be in a position to institute the condemnation proceedings necessary to acquire title to the property in question.

Sir—In response to an oral request concerning the assessed valuations about Paerdegat Basin, from Flatlands avenue to Jamaica Bay, I transmit herewith the following figures. These figures are computed from the valuations assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments of New York City:

1. Land in Paerdegat Basin, from Flatlands avenue to Jamaica Bay; assessed valuation about \$3,300.

Note—This land is not separately assessed in the books of the Commissioners, but was determined by computation.

2. Land included in assessment area for acquiring title to Paerdegat Basin, from Flatlands avenue to Jamaica Bay. In this case the limit of assessment would probably be fixed by the Commission. For the present purpose I assumed the limit to be as follows:

1. Bounded on the north by the centre line of Flatlands avenue;
2. Bounded on the west by a line drawn parallel to Paerdegat Basin and 300 feet west of its westerly side, from the centre of Flatlands avenue to the south of Avenue T, and thence along centre of Avenue T to Jamaica Bay;
3. Bounded on the south by Jamaica Bay; and
4. Bounded on the east by a line drawn southerly, from Flatlands avenue parallel to Paerdegat Basin and distant 300 feet easterly of its easterly side to Jamaica Bay.

The assessed valuations included within the above limits amount to \$6,700. In view of the low figures given in this assessed valuation it seems very probable that the limit of assessment would be extended considerably beyond the limits here assumed.

Dear Sir—In the matter of the resolution adopted by the Board of Public Improvements, July 31, 1901, for acquiring title by the City, under section 561 of the Charter, to Paerdegat Basin, between Flatlands avenue and Jamaica Bay, and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval, I beg to report:

The various resolutions which have been before the Board of Public Improvements during the past year relating to Paerdegat Basin and avenues, as evidenced in the papers attached, have all been initiated for the purpose of constructing sewer outlets for an extensive district.

The purpose of the present resolution is to provide an outlet for surface storm water overflow from the proposed sewer in Flatlands avenue, which is greatly needed.

Paerdegat Basin between the limits above specified is laid down upon the Commissioner's map of Brooklyn as a proposed waterway, 300 feet in width for the most part, with streets or quays on each side thereof, 100 feet in width, making the total width of the proposed improvement 500 feet.

There appears to be no immediate need for constructing this waterway or the adjoining streets. The present need is confined simply to the needs of local drainage. The present site of the basin lies within an extensive salt meadow swamp or marsh and contains for the most part within its limits an irregular tidal stream.

From the information obtained in my examination, I am of the opinion that it is desirable to acquire enough land within the limits of the basin as laid down upon the Commissioners' map for the immediate needs of drainage. The amount of land to be acquired for this purpose might include:

First—A strip 80 feet wide, which would probably be sufficient for drainage purposes, extending from Flatlands avenue to Jamaica Bay.

Second—All the land included within the basin, as laid down on the map, or about 300 feet in width and between Flatlands avenue and Jamaica Bay, as described in the above resolution.

Third—All the land included within the basin and its adjoining streets or quays, a strip approximately 500 feet wide, extending from Flatlands avenue to Jamaica Bay.

I am of the opinion that the cost of constructing a drainage channel through a strip limited in width to 80 feet would very much exceed the additional cost of procuring a strip as wide as that required in case 2, which would allow the use for a considerable period of the greater part of the present tidal stream.

The third case I consider impracticable, since under the resolution it is intended to acquire title to the property under section 561 of the Charter, which limits the purpose for which the property is obtained to the uses of drainage. It would, therefore, appear probable that title to the adjoining streets cannot be acquired under the present resolution.

I am of the opinion that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment might properly approve of the initiation of proceedings by the Corporation Counsel.

Flatbush avenue, from its westerly intersection with Avenue G and Flatbush avenue to the easterly intersection of Flatbush avenue and Avenue G;
Avenue G, from Flatbush avenue to East Thirty-first street;
East Thirty-first street, from Avenue G to Paerdegat avenue (south side);
Paerdegat avenue (south side), from East Thirty-first street to East Forty-fifth street;

—I report as follows:

Said avenue and streets are located in the Thirty-second Ward (Flatlands), Borough of Brooklyn. The sewers for which application is made are shown on Sewer Map "Y," District No. 45, filed March 13, 1899.

As none of the avenues and streets, but one, are legally open, i. e., Flatbush avenue, confirmed September 6, 1873, and the entire costs of the improvements are to be levied as assessments, I recommend that the petition be returned to the Local Board of Public Improvements with a request that it be held in abeyance until such time as the avenues and streets are legally opened, and also recommend that the Local Board of Public Improvements, Borough of Brooklyn, recommend that proceedings be initiated for acquiring title to the following:

Paerdegat avenue (south side), from East Thirty-first street to East Forty-fifth street, and from Avenue G to Flatlands avenue;

Avenue G, from Coney Island avenue to Flatbush avenue, and from Flatbush avenue to Paerdegat avenue (south side);

Dear Sir—In regard to the recommendation of the Local Board of the Fifth and Eighth districts, Borough of Brooklyn, to open Paerdegat avenue, between Flatbush avenue and Jamaica Bay, you having referred to me a communication to you from the Commissioner of Sewers dated February 5, 1901, together with a copy of a report by the Chief Topographical Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements upon the subject, with directions to investigate and report, I beg to state that careful consideration has been given as to whether it is absolutely necessary or not to construct a sewer in Paerdegat avenue, and the conclusion arrived at is as follows:

That if the entire length of the Paerdegat basin or canal remains upon the Commissioner's Map of the Borough of Brooklyn it will be necessary to continue Paerdegat avenue on said map, and to use considerable lengths of said avenue for important main sewers, for the following reasons: Paerdegat avenue and Paerdegat basin follow the line of a valley of low elevation, into which the natural drainage of a large territory in Flatlands is conducted. The fact that the said basin, or canal, is

called for on the map of the borough necessitates main sewers on either side of the same and in Paerdegat avenue, because sewers could not cross the land designated for the construction of a canal, unless said land thereby became useless for the intention shown on the map, by prohibiting the construction of a canal at some future date.

The entire territory in question is of low elevation, as the name of Flatlands implies, the highest elevation being about 26 feet above tide and the surface elevation of slight declivities extending over wide areas; therefore it is obvious that every advantage must be taken of the slightest fall to obtain efficient sewerage and drainage. When the surface elevation of the territory and the existence of the canal are considered together, I am of the opinion that the best results have been obtained in providing for main sewers in Paerdegat avenue.

Should Paerdegat avenue and Paerdegat basin be eliminated from the Commissioner's Map of Brooklyn, from its head to Flatlands avenue, by due process of law, and all streets extended across the present location, a change of drainage plan could readily be made. It is absolutely necessary, however, that both canal and avenue should exist, from Flatlands avenue to Jamaica Bay, for the drainage of the territory in question.

If it is the sense of the people in the vicinity that the canal should remain, and the authorities should so decide, the sources of the water supply of the Flatbush Water Works will not be further vitiated by the construction of a sewer in Paerdegat avenue. Permit me to explain.

The water supplied by the Flatbush Water Works is obtained from a water table of water-bearing mud, which is at a considerable depth below the elevation at which the sewers will be laid. The construction of sewers in that vicinity would interrupt the percolation from cesspools of at least 2,000 houses to the underground reservoir and convey such detrimental matter to tidewater; thus, it will be seen that the construction of sewers will tend to further purify the water supplied rather than to vitiate it. It is well known that the amount of water delivered by the water company is obtained from a watershed of at least from 3 to 6 square miles, the rainfall from which gradually and continually finds its way to the underground reservoir; that part which is furnished from the shed of their property is insignificant when compared with the actual amount of water obtained.

As an error has been made in the recommendation of the opening of Paerdegat avenue, in so far as such avenue is not laid down on the Commissioner's Map, between Flatbush avenue and East Thirty-first street, nor is it continuous from East Thirty-first street to Jamaica Bay, I respectfully suggest that the Local Boards of the Fifth and Eighth districts, Borough of Brooklyn, may be requested to rescind the resolution, which has been passed, and to hold in abeyance any further action of opening Paerdegat avenue until some decision is arrived at as to the advisability of striking Paerdegat avenue and Paerdegat basin from the Commissioner's Map, from East Thirty-first street to Flatlands avenue.

PUBLIC SCHOOL 139, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

This new building is to be erected on a plot facing Avenue C, between East Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, Flatbush, Borough of Brooklyn.

The building will be four stories and basement high and will contain thirty-two class-rooms, four of which, by means of sliding doors, constitute the assembly-room.

The building occupying an exposed position, visible from all sides, necessitated that the trim of front and ends should be extended also to the rear so as to give a uniform appearance.

The exterior will be of light brick with limestone trimmings to the height of the second story window sills and above that point of red brick with gray terra cotta and brick trimmings.

The structure will be of fireproof construction throughout, the basement and corridors on each floor being paved with asphalt.

Each classroom will be 22 x 30 feet in size allowing for individual seating and an aisle between each row of desks also at each side and at the front and rear of the rooms. The wardrobes are so arranged as to be thoroughly ventilated to the outer air yet accessible to the class-rooms so as to permit of a teacher having the children properly clothed for the street before sending them out into the corridors for dismissal.

Ample means for intercommunication between the various floors is provided by means of five stairways constructed of iron and stone with handrails on each side suitable for the use of children. The railings are so arranged that in case of panic no child can be pushed over to the floor below.

Provision is made for teachers' wardrobes, lockers and toilet rooms together with a large number of store closets for school supplies.

The building will be heated by what is known as the Plenum System, the interior heating and ventilating flues above the level of the ceiling of the basement to be included in the contract for general construction. Contract awarded by the Board of Education on December 11, 1901 to George Hildebrand, the lowest bidder, for the sum of \$119,747.

Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, addressed to you under date of January 2, and in explanation thereof, I beg to state that the list of bridges set forth in said communication and numbered 1 to 33, inclusive, is correct, and said bridges under the operation of the Greater New York Charter in effect January 1, 1902, are under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

There remain under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges the five bridges in said communication mentioned, numbered 1 to 5 inclusive.

I transmit herewith statement showing Departmental Estimate for the year 1902 for the salaries of Deputy Commissioner and employees, contingencies and maintenance of and repairs to bridges in the Borough of The Bronx, showing an appropriation of \$71,200, of which the sum of \$41,200 will not be needed by this Department.

I also transmit summary of approximate cost of repairs and maintenance of bridges to be retained by the Department of Bridges for the year commencing January 1, 1902, \$28,187.50, to which should be added for maintenance of Kings Bridge and Farmer's Bridge, over Spuyten Duyvil Creek, \$1,812.50, making a total of the sum appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of \$30,000 required by this Department for the year 1902 for the maintenance and care of bridges in the Borough of The Bronx and Spuyten Duyvil Creek.

I also inclose summary of approximate cost of repairs and maintenance of bridges to be transferred to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, \$43,012.50, from which should be deducted \$1,812.50 for the maintenance and care of the two bridges over Spuyten Duyvil Creek, thus leaving \$41,200.

I also transmit a list of the names of persons employed on the bridges to be transferred to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, none of whom will be needed in this Department when such transfer is completed.

I return herewith communication addressed to you by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, received from you on the 3d instant.

The above was written before the receipt of your communication of even date, and supplies, I believe, the request therein made, except as to the number of bridges. There are five bridges in the Borough of The Bronx proper and two over the Spuyten Duyvil Creek which are classed with the bridges over the Harlem River.

This will undoubtedly mean the enforcement of the law by the Health Department throughout the month of January.

I inclose herewith a copy of a letter from Dr. Ernst J. Lederle, the Health Commissioner, in regard to this subject, showing that because of this work the expenses of the Health Department will be increased by \$5,891.66 2-3 for the month of January.

Sirs—I beg respectfully to report that I have appointed as First Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities Mr. James Edward Dougherty, and as Second Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities Mr. Charles Ebenezer Teale, such appointments having been made by me on January 1, 1902. While the Charter specifically authorizes me to appoint a First Deputy and a Second Deputy, it does not fix their salaries, nor does the head of this Department appear to have any authority in fixing their salaries. I beg respectfully to request, therefore, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take such action as may be necessary, subject to ratification by the Board of Aldermen, to fix the salaries of these positions.

I would respectfully suggest that the salaries be fixed at \$5,000 per annum each. The former Deputy to the Commissioner of Public Charities for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx received a salary of \$5,000 per annum, and the Deputy to the Commissioner of Public Charities for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens

received the same amount. In the provisional estimate of expenses of this Department for the year 1902, the salaries of the First and Second Deputies were estimated at \$5,000 per annum each.

Under the provisions of the Charter in operation prior to January 1, 1902, the salaries of Commissioners and Deputies in this department were as follows:

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the four days ending January 23, 1902.

A petition from merchants and citizens in the vicinity of Old Slip Pier and protests from the owners of the adjoining piers were received requesting the revocation of the permit granted Brown & Fleming for a dumping board on said Old Slip Pier, East River. After a hearing, the matter was laid over for consideration and Brown & Fleming were directed to do no further work pending decision.

Petitions from merchants and transportation men using the canal basin between Fifty-second and Fifty-fourth streets, North river, were received, requesting that if possible the lease of the north side of the West Fifty-second street Pier to Nicholas C. Cunningham be canceled and that the entire basin be reserved for the sole use of Hudson River traffic. Both sides were given a hearing and the parties in interest were informed that the matter will receive immediate consideration.

A petition was received from residents of the Borough of Brooklyn for the establishment of a ferry between Broadway, Brooklyn, and East Forty-second street, Manhattan, and after a hearing, this application was also laid over for investigation.

Subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, permission was granted the North German Lloyd Steamship Company to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Commissioner, for berthing the steamship Kron Prinz Wilhelm and the German Imperial Yacht Hohenzollern, the West Thirty-fourth Street Pier, the compensation therefor to be at the rate of \$95 per day; and the Engineer in Chief was directed to arrange without contract, at a cost not to exceed one thousand dollars, for the heating and lighting of said pier during the visit of Prince Henry of Prussia.

In accordance with suggestion of the Corporation Counsel, the Attorney General was requested to fix a day for a conference with the Law Department and the Commissioner of Docks, with a view to fixing upon terms and conditions to be in-

serted in grants of land under water to be hereafter made, to protect the interests of The City of New York; and the Corporation Counsel was requested to file a protest against the issuance of a grant to Gottfried Westermacher of land under water in Jamaica Bay, application for which is dated December 28, 1901, on the ground that the title to said lands under water is vested in The City of New York.

The War Department was notified that the Commissioner of Docks will erect a shed on Wall Street Pier No. 12, East river, and lease said pier and shed to the United States of America, except the northerly side of the pier, until June 30, 1903, the lease to commence July 1, 1902, or as soon thereafter as the shed shall have been completed; the lease to contain an option of renewal yearly, not to extend, however, beyond the 30th day of June, 1912, and each renewal to be for not more than one fiscal year; the rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$13,000 per annum payable monthly, and for each renewal term \$100 advance on the rental of the preceding term. This offer to be of no force or effect unless accepted within five days and unless the same shall have been first approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution in writing.

The Engineer in Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the erection of a shed on Wall Street Pier No. 12, East river.

The Corporation Counsel, in accordance with recommendation of the Engineer in Chief, was requested to commence proceedings for the acquisition of the private interests in and to Market Slip Pier West, East River, with adjoining bulkhead.

A recommendation of the Engineer in Chief that the Corporation Counsel be requested to commence proceedings for the acquisition of the private interests in Peck Slip Pier West and Peck Slip Pier East, East River, was filed, and the Department of Taxes and Assessments was requested to furnish a statement of the assessed valuations of such private interests.

The Comptroller, in response to inquiry, was notified that this Department desires to acquire title to all the property between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, North river.

The Engineer in Chief reported that the construction of the shed on Rutgers Slip Pier West No. 33, East River, has been suspended, and on his recommendation the contractors and sureties on contract No. 699 were notified that unless the work

is resumed and proceeded with as rapidly as possible the contract will be completed by this Department and the cost deducted from the amount due on the contract.

The permit granted the Bridgeport Steamboat Company to land the steamer Rosedale at the East Thirty-first Street Pier was revoked to take effect as of December 28, 1901, the date upon which they discontinued landing.

The action of the Board of Docks December 31, 1901, granting to John F. Walsh a lease of the north half of the East Nineteenth Street Pier was rescinded, the resolution not having been accepted; and permit was granted said John F. Walsh to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Commissioner, the north side of the East Eighth Street Pier as a berth for a dry dock, the compensation for the privilege to be hereafter determined, provided said John F. Walsh will put the premises in safe condition and file in this office an agreement that he will hold himself liable for any damage or injury that may occur on or in proximity to the north half of the pier.

Reuben G. Fox was authorized to furnish copies of legislative bills during the session of 1902, the sum of fifty dollars to be paid him for such service.

The proofs of contract No. 721 for furnishing manila rope, No. 722 for furnishing sand and broken stone, No. 723 for furnishing white oak piles and No. 724 for dredging between West Thirteenth and West Fifteenth streets, North river, were sent to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

The new tug now being built under contract No. 705 was named "Brooklyn;" and the Assistant Secretary was directed to take the necessary steps to have the name of the tug "Pier" changed to "Richmond."

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether the new charter interferes with the former practice of the Department of granting berths for vessels and permits to occupy wharf property.

The Department of Water Supply, on recommendation of the Engineer in Chief, was requested to find another location for the pipes now stored on the East Twentieth Street Pier.

An extension of time to and including May 1, 1902, was granted James D. Leary for the completion of the crib bulkheads between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, under contract No. 710, provided the consent of the sureties be filed.

Permits granted, work to be done under supervision of Engineer in Chief:

Theodore F. Tone, to repair coal hopper on bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street Pier and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, North River.

Albert H. Hastorf, to dredge under the dumping boards at the bulkhead between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, North river, and foot of Thirtieth street, East river.
