IN BOARD OF BUILDINGS, SEPTEMBER 18, 1901.

Present—Commissioners Wallace, Guilfoyle and Campbell.

The minutes of the meeting of September 11, 1901, were read and, on motion, approved. Petitions were submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 1307, New Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the erection of a frame building 20 feet by 47 feet and 12 feet high, same to be covered with galvanized iron, as stated in petition; east side First avenue, between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, and extending through to Exterior street. Petitioner, A. V. Porter. Approved.

Plan 2137, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow a one-story extension to be built with brick walls 8 inches thick; walls will be laid up in cement mortar, as stated in petition; No. 119 West Fifty-first street. Petitioners, Casey & Dillon. Approved.

Plan 2121, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow pent-house on roof to be constructed of steel framework and terra-cotta blocks covered on the outside with corrugated galvanized iron, instead of brick walls, as stated in petition; southwest corner of Thirtieth street and Fifth avenue (Holland House). Petitioners, Harding & Gooch. Approved.

Plan 2098, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow wall of the one-story extension to be constructed of angle-iron frame, filled in with 4-inch terra-cotta blocks, covered on the outside with metal, instead of 12-inch brick walls, as stated in petition; No. 12 East Seventy-fifth street. Petitioner, A. Oppenheimer. Approved.

Plan 2160, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow rear wall of proposed extension to be built with a steel frame filled in with a 4-inch hollow block and covered on the outside with copper; all frames and sashes will be framed with steel, copper and glass, as stated in petition; No. 2 Wall street. Petitioner, First National Bank of New York. Referred to the President (approved).

Plan 1968, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition for a reconsideration of the decision of the Board of Buildings, at a meeting held September 4, 1901, so as to allow pent-house to be removed which covers practically the entire building, and then build three additional stories, making same twelve stories high, the same to be done without lining the present walls, and also to set aside section 105 so far as the present building is concerned and apply same only to the three new stories, as stated in petition; north side Liberty street, between West and Washington streets. Petitioners, Central Railroad of New Jersey. Denied.

Plan 1985, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow partitions and platforms to be built as shown on plans, work being entirely inside the building, as stated in petition; northwest corner Bowery and Bayard street. Petitioners, Metropolitan Street Railway Company. Withdrawn.

Permit No. 1264, Alterations to Buildings, 1901, Brooklyn—Petition to modify the provisions of the Building Code, so as to allow the alteration of a building (frame) less than 25 feet in height, said alteration to consist of a frame extension in the fire limits; premises, one building south side Halsey street, 90 feet east of Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City. Petitioner, Paul W. Ledoux. Approved.

In the matter of the application of the Metropolitan Fireproofing Company, requesting that the test for weight made on their floor arches in August, 1895, at warehouse at corner of Varick and Spring streets, be accepted in liquidation of requirement for tests of fireproof arches for spans up to 6 feet, which was referred to the President, the President presented a report thereon which was adopted and the application approved, and the use of the Metropolitan System allowed for loads up to 150 pounds per square foot, on spans up to 6 feet.

As a result of tests, conducted under the supervision of this Department, the Board approved the following applications:

The Guy B. Waite Company's Flat Floor Arches, tested at No. 507 West Fourteenth street, approved for working loads up to 150 pounds per square foot of floor surface, for use in The City of New York.

The Roebling Construction Company's System "B" Flat Concrete Floor Arch, tested in the new police station on Sedgwick avenue, High Bridge, approved for loads up to 107 pounds per square foot.

The following partitions were approved for use when constructed as tested, on condition that each story of partitions and elevator shafts be self-supporting, the partitions to be properly braced vertically, all elevator shafts to have angle-iron constructions at corners and openings in same properly framed and that the dumb-waiter shafts be not allowed to be built over 45 feet in height without angle-iron construction and that any variance or change in the composition or method of constructing these partitions shall be declared to this Department in order that, if necessary, further tests shall be made by them to demonstrate the efficiency of such new constructions:

Union Fireproof Company's Concrete Partitions.
Sanitary Fireproofing and Construction Company's Partitions.
Schratweiser's Metal Lath and Plaster Partitions.
S. G. Brinckman's Solid Porous Terra-cotta Partitions.
H. W. Bell's Solid and Hollow Partitions.

The following partitions were approved for use when constructed as tested, except where prohibited in section 37, chapter 334, Laws of 1901, in relation to tenement-houses, on condition that each story of partitions and elevator shafts be self-supporting, the partitions to be properly braced vertically, all elevator shafts to have angle-iron constructions at corners and openings in same properly framed and that the dumb-waiter shafts be not allowed to be built over 45 feet in height without angle-iron construction and that any variance or change in the composition or method of constructing these partitions shall be declared to this Department in order that, if necessary, further tests shall be made by them to demonstrate the efficiency of such new constructions:

Norman Fireproof Construction Company's Partitions (Mela Patents).
Metropolitan Fireproofing Company's Partitions.
White Fireproof and Construction Company's Solid and Hollow Partitions.

In the matter of the application of the Standard Paint Company for official approval of their two and three ply P. & B. Ruberoid Roofing, which was referred to the President, the President presented a report thereon, which was adopted, and the application approved for use, as provided for in section 94 of the Code.

John W. Rapp's Floor Arches of 6-foot, 10-foot and 12-foot spans segmental construction, and the 6-foot flat construction, known as type "B," tested at the northeast corner of One Hundred and Eighth street and Broadway, approved (when constructed as tested), as follows:

The 6-foot span, type "B," segmental construction, for loads up to 300 pounds per square foot.

The 6-foot span, type "D," flat construction, for loads up to 150 pounds per square foot.

The 10-foot span, type "B," segmental construction, for loads up to 300 pounds per square foot.

The 12-foot span, type "A," segmental construction, for loads up to 300 pounds per square foot.

An application was received from Messrs. Paul Kuhne & Co., with a drawing of a test structure of their Fireproof Floor System No. 1, with sheet-metal structural element and concrete filling, which was referred to the President.

A communication was received from Messrs. Tucker & Vinton, with a drawing of two proposed test sections of the Pelton Fireproof Floor Construction, which was referred to the President.

On motion of Commissioner Guilfoyle, it was ordered that the offices of this Department be closed on Thursday, September 19, as a mark of respect to the memory of President McKinley.

On motion the Board then adjourned.

Whereas, This Board, after duly considering all matters submitted in connection therewith, have concluded that prompt and full response to the desires and requirements of the petitioners will tend to serve the best interests of this City and that of all concerned; therefore

Resolved, That recommendation be and hereby is made to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that it extend to the aforementioned subject-matter its most favorable consideration and prompt action toward having said avenue opened and extended under the Long Island Railroad tracks as aforesaid in manner as provided by law.

SIR—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 230 of the Laws of 1898, I beg to submit the following report of the proceedings of my Bureau for the three months ending September 30, 1901:
