WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

During the Quarter Ending June 30, 1907.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 1,086 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 2,859 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code the Sanitary Code.

Orders Issued by the Board of Health.

Orders of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued under the supervision of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendents of the various boroughs, upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. These orders call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code and Health Laws in each case, and require the necessary alterations, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within three days from the receipt of the order. If upon reinspection it is found that the requirements of the order have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under sections 1172 and 1222, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

Certified copies of the records of vital statistics as may be found to be on file in the Bureau of Records are furnished to applicants authorized to receive same, namely, interested parties, next of kin, legal representatives, etc., upon payment of the fee in such cases prescribed by the Board of Health. Written orders are signed by the Assistant Chief Clerk in the various boroughs and issued to the Assistant Registrar of Records, authorizing the search and issuance of a transcript of the record, which, in accordance with the regulations of the Board, is authenticated by affixing the seal of the Department of Health and attested by the signature of the Assistant Chief Clerk of the Borough. When search is made and the record is not found to be on file, an official certificate is issued to that effect.

Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir-In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of January, February and March, 1907.

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, is charged with the following duties:

I. To make the topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following three (3) divisions of work:

(a) The preparation of a design for the street system in those parts of the borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street systems and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment

(b) The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and copper bolts on the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

(c) The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, pro-files, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the matter

of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

2. To keep in custody the record and maps of all matters pertaining to work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also keeping in custody all maps filed in relation to the Borough of The Bronx under the department of Public Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

3. To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

1-(a) Preparation of the Design of a Street System, Maps, Showing Changes of Adopted Street Systems, etc.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, approved a tentative plan of the street system east of the Bronx river, which amended previously filed plans and laid out streets over such areas which had not been taken up.

Calculations, maps and plans showing dimensions of blocks and grades of streets

and avenues were progressed on those sections which are not interfered with the proposed railroads through the borough.

The fixture sheets, which show the relation between the new street system and existing street lines and property lines by dimensions and co-ordinates, were prog-

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, grades, etc., which had been before the Local Boards, and for which maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption and filing.

Studies to extend the present adopted street system from the Eastern boulevard easterly to the Sound are well advanced, and a map covering the eastern part of this district is ready for adoption

district is ready for adoption.

Studies and maps were made rearranging the street system showing the lines of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway, from the Bronx river to the northern boundary of the City; also for the Clason's Point section.

Examinations and alterations of the proposed grades of the above railway, from

Willis avenue to the Bronx river, were also made.

Comparative lists were prepared showing the grades of the railroad, the grades of the intersecting avenues and streets, the clearance under the bridges crossing the treets, for the purpose of making a complete report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

A design for a bridge in Jerome avenue over the Mosholu parkway showing elevations and sections, was prepared. This design was executed in water colors, with landscape surroundings.

The system of house numbering in the Borough of The Bronx was determined as delineated in the report of the Topographical Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1906, and the sending out of notices for the district west of the Bronx river was practically completed.
