WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU.

During the Quarter Ending June 30, 1907.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

Orders Issued by the Board of Health.

Orders of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued under the supervision of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendents of the various boroughs, upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. These orders call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code and Health Laws in each case, and require the necessary alterations, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within three days from the receipt of the order. If upon reinspection it is found that the requirements of the order have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under sections 1172 and 1222, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

Searches and Transcripts of Births, Marriages and Deaths.

Certified copies of the records of vital statistics as may be found to be on file in the Bureau of Records are furnished to applicants authorized to receive same, namely, interested parties, next of kin, legal representatives, etc., upon payment of the fee in such cases prescribed by the Board of Health. Written orders are signed by the Assistant Chief Clerk in the various boroughs and issued to the Assistant Registrar of Records, authorizing the search and issuance of a transcript of the record, which, in accordance with the regulations of the Board, is authenticated by affixing the seal of the Department of Health and attested by the signature of the Assistant Chief Clerk of the Borough. When search is made and the record is not found to be on file, an official certificate is issued to that effect.

Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of January, February and March, 1907.

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, is charged with the following duties:

1. To make the topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following three (3) divisions of work:

(a) The preparation of a design for the street system in those parts of the borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street systems and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b) The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and copper bolts on the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

(c) The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

2. To keep in custody the record and maps of all matters pertaining to work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also keeping in custody all maps filed in relation to the Borough of The Bronx under the department of Public Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

3. To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

1-(a) Preparation of the Design of a Street System, Maps, Showing Changes of Adopted Street Systems, etc.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, approved a tentative plan of the street system east of the Bronx river, which amended previously filed plans and laid out streets over such areas which had not been taken up.

Calculations, maps and plans showing dimensions of blocks and grades of streets and avenues were progressed on those sections which are not interfered with the proposed railroads through the borough.

The fixture sheets, which show the relation between the new street system and existing street lines and property lines by dimensions and co-ordinates, were progressed.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, grades, etc., which had been before the Local Boards, and for which maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption and filing.

Studies to extend the present adopted street system from the Eastern boulevard easterly to the Sound are well advanced, and a map covering the eastern part of this district is ready for adoption.

Studies and maps were made rearranging the street system showing the lines of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway, from the Bronx river to the northern boundary of the City; also for the Clason's Point section.

Examinations and alterations of the proposed grades of the above railway, from Willis avenue to the Bronx river, were also made.

Comparative lists were prepared showing the grades of the railroad, the grades of the intersecting avenues and streets, the clearance under the bridges crossing the streets, for the purpose of making a complete report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

A design for a bridge in Jerome avenue over the Moshulu parkway showing elevations and sections, was prepared. This design was executed in water colors, with landscape surroundings.

A number of petitions were received by the Local Boards for amendments to the filed maps; on some of them action was taken and maps were forwarded for consideration and adoption. They were as follows:

2. Map or plan showing the locating, laying out and the grades of Castle Hill avenue, from West Farms road to the public place at the southerly terminus, and the public place at the southerly terminus of Castle Hill avenue, fronting on Westchester creek, East river and Barretto creek.

3. Map or plan showing the change of the street system and the grades in the territory bounded by Featherbed lane, Macomb's road, Featherbed lane, Nelson avenue, Macomb's road, Aqueduct avenue, Tremont avenue, West One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Jerome avenue.

4. Map or plan showing the widening of West Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Riverdale avenue and Cambridge avenue, and changing the grades of said West Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Riverdale avenue and Netherland avenue, and the connecting avenues between West Two Hundred and Thirty-second street and West Two Hundred and Thirty-sixth street.

5. Amendment in regard to the street system bounded by the Bronx river, Bronx Park, Rhineland avenue, Bear Swamp road, the line of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, Bronx River avenue and East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street.

6. Map or plan showing the proposed street lay out in the territory bounded by Middletown road, Pelham Bay Park, Long Island Sound, Fort Schuyler reservation, East river, Huntington avenue, Eastern boulevard, Balcom avenue and Appleton road (Throgg's Neck section).

7. Map or plan showing the laying out and the grades of West One Hundred and Ninety-second street, across the new lines of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad and the change of grades of West One Hundred and Ninety-second street, from Bailey avenue to the Harlem river.

8. Plan and profile showing the change of grades in Jerome avenue, from Minerva place to East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street.

9. Map or plan showing the restoring of the former White Plains road northerly of East Two Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, and the laying out of a public place at its intersection.

10. Plan and profile showing change of grades in Burke avenue (Morris street), from White Plains road to the East river and its extension and grades, from the Bronx river to Webster avenue; also change of grades in avenues and streets within the area bounded by White Plains road, Burke avenue, Olinville avenue, Adea avenue, Bronx boulevard, Newell avenue and Rosewood street.

11. Map or plan showing the locating and laying out of Prospect court, in the block bounded by East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, Union avenue, Home street and Prospect avenue, from the western line of Prospect avenue to a point 220 feet westerly therefrom.

12. Map or plan showing the change of lines and grades of Bailey avenue, from West Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Van Courtlandt avenue; also connecting street to Albany road, the extension of Cannon place, from West Two Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Bailey avenue, and the laying out of a public place and stairway at the intersection of Bailey avenue and Cannon place.

13. Plan and profile showing the prolongation and the grades of West Two Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Faraday avenue to Fieldston road.

14. Plan and profile showing the change of grade in Harlem River terrace, from Cedar avenue to within 180 feet of West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, and the grade of the 50-foot street located 392.94 feet south of West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, connecting Harlem River terrace with Cedar avenue.

15. Map or plan showing the extension of Ludlow avenue (Eastern boulevard), from the Bronx river to Whitlock avenue; the widening of Whitlock avenue, from Ludlow avenue to Hunt's Point road, and the laying out of a public place at Southern boulevard and Hunt's Point road, opposite Dongan street; also the grades of the proposed extensions, widening and streets affected.

16. Map or plan showing locating and laying out, extension and the grades of Lafayette street, from Prospect avenue to East One Hundred and Seventieth street.

17. Sketch to discontinue street system south of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street and east of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad yards.

18. Map or plan amending and modifying the street system east of the Bronx river, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, within the area bounded by Fort Schuyler road, Maitland avenue, Mayflower avenue, Zulette avenue, Crosby avenue and Waterbury avenue. (Amendment "G".)

The following maps were forwarded for filing in triplicate:

1. Map or plan showing the locating and laying out and the grades of streets, avenues and public parks within the area bounded by Undercliff avenue, West One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, Aqueduct avenue and Washington Bridge.

2. Map or plan showing the laying out of White Plains road, from the existing White Plains road, near Unionport road, to White Plains road, near East One Hundred and Ninety-eighth street (Thwaite's place).

3. Map or plan showing the widening of Mott avenue, on the easterly side, south of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and of Park avenue, on the westerly side, south of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and the change of grade of Mott avenue necessitated by the widening.

Surveys, studies, maps, etc., were prepared in relation to establishing grades as follows:

1. Map or plan showing the laying out and the grades of West One Hundred and Ninety-second street, across the new lines of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, and the change of grades of West One Hundred and Ninety-second street, from Bailey avenue to Harlem river.

2. Plan and profile of Jerome avenue, from Minerva place to East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, showing change of grades of Jerome avenue and of intersecting streets affected thereby.

3. Map or plan showing widening of West Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Riverdale avenue and Cambridge avenue, and changing the grades of West Two Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Riverdale avenue and Netherland avenue, and the connecting streets between West Two Hundred and Thirty-second street and West Two Hundred and Thirty-sixth street.

4. Plan and profile showing the change of grade in Harlem River terrace, from Cedar avenue to West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, and the grade of the

50-foot street located 392.94 feet south of West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, connecting Harlem River terrace with Cedar avenue.

5. Plan and profile showing the prolongation and the grades of West Two Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Faraday avenue to Fieldston road.

6. Map showing the bridge location at Baychester avenue station (Main street), also showing the right of way of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad.

7. Section 50 of the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx.

8. Taylor avenue, from West Farms road to the East river.

Grade studies and profiles for the remaining sections of the final maps are in progress.

This work is still delayed on account of the uncertainty of the location of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway and the New York and Port Chester Railroad companies.

Information and maps were furnished to the Assessor's office, with dates, in relation to establishing grades on the following avenues and streets:

(h) Inspection and Testimony.

During the quarter, the Assistant Engineer in charge of street opening work and the Assistant Engineer in charge of grades were subpoenaed on various street opening proceedings and on claims for damage on account of change of grade and court cases, which occupied considerable of their time.

The President of the Borough directed that all applications for erection of buildings shall be submitted to the Topographical Bureau for examination as to their proper location before the Building Department issues a permit, and all applications were attended to. No record was kept, but there were approximately fifty cases in the month of April.

3. To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports on Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

During the quarter, 265 communications were referred for report to the Topographical Bureau by the Chief Engineer and the Secretary of the President of the

Borough of The Bronx, and 288 reports and letters were written on these subjects. Numbering of Houses in the Borough.

The Board of Aldermen on April 26, 1904, resolved, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$5,000, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188, of the amended Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to be applied to the cost and expense of renumbering and naming the streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 7, 1905, approved and concurred in the above resolution of the Board of Aldermen.

This work was assigned to the Topographical Bureau and a system was established for this purpose. It will enable the President of the Borough of The Bronx to give a resident or owner the number of his house wherever situated, even though there be no houses for a considerable distance.

The system of house numbering in the Borough of The Bronx was determined as delineated in the report of the Topographical Bureau for the quarter ending March 31, 1906, and the sending out of notices for the district west of the Bronx river was practically completed.

Miscellaneous.

During the quarter the correcting and bringing up to date the atlases of the Street System, West of the Bronx River, in the office of the President of the Borough, Chief Engineer, Topographical Bureau, Bureau of Highways and Bureau of Sewers was kept up.

The card index of street improvements in the Borough of The Bronx for the President of the Borough and the Chief Engineer was kept up.

Plotting and drafting of record maps, fixture sheets, maps for adoption, office sets and black prints of the sections east of the Bronx river was continued.

During the quarter work to bring up to date and to reproduce the lithographed sections of the final maps west of the Bronx river, which were printed in 1895, is progressing. Sections 14 and 19 were finished during the quarter, and sections 2, 5, 6 and 9 are in preparation.

Work on the mounted sheets of sections of the final maps was progressed. The topographical map, on a scale of 150 feet to the inch, being a reduction of the original 80-foot sheets, was continued.

One Draughtsman was detailed temporarily to the Bureau of Maintenance to plot sewers and sewer connections in the atlases of the Borough of The Bronx kept by the Permit Clerk in the Bureau of Maintenance.

The ten-sheet map of the Borough of The Bronx, east of the Bronx river, on a scale of 300 feet to the inch, was brought up to date for reprinting.

The copies of tax maps of the Borough of The Bronx and in use in the Topographical Bureau were brought up to date; Volumes 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 of Section 10 were finished during the quarter.

The map for adoption showing the proposed street system in the territory east and south of the Eastern boulevard (Throgg's Neck District), on a scale of 300 feet to the inch, was amended and extended.

Maps showing the proposed fixtures preparatory to computing block dimensions in accordance with the United States triangulation of Sections 29, 30, 31, 32, 47 and 49 were prepared.

The topographical map of Hart's Island, in accordance with a recent plane table survey on a scale of 150 feet to the inch, is completed.

Instruction sheets for the computers of the sections of the final maps, east of the Bronx river, were progressed.

A list of street names and their location and former names was prepared.

Numerous property maps filed in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York were copied for office use.

Sketches and photographs were made in the matter of acquiring title to the triangular strip to be taken for the widening of Third avenue opposite East One Hundred and Fifty Ninth street.

Sketches and photographs were taken in the matter of acquiring title to the widening of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Morris avenue and Sheridan avenue, within the lines of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad yards.

Index maps were made showing the franchises for trolley lines of the Union Railway and Interborough Railway systems in the Borough of The Bronx.

The maps showing inspectors' districts in the Borough of The Bronx were made in the Topographical Bureau.

The following black prints were mounted and colored up, as copies of filed maps, requested by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

1. Map or plan showing the locating, laying out and the grades of the streets, avenues and public parks within the area bounded by Undercliff avenue, West One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, Aqueduct avenue and Washington Bridge.

2. Map or plan showing the laying out of White Plains road, from the existing White Plains road near Unionport road to White Plains road near East One Hundred and Ninety-eighth street (Thwaites place).

Many maps, sketches, tracings, black prints and blue prints were made auxiliary to preparing maps for adoption and in connection with various other works under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also a considerable amount of copying and searching of records in the different City departments and the Register's office of New York City and Westchester County at White Plains.

Queens Lighting Company.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
