PUBLIC HEARINGS BY COMMISSION ON BUILDING DISTRICTS AND RESTRICTIONS.

Districting the City of New York for the Purpose of Regulating the Height of Buildings, the Area of Courts and Yards, the Location of Trades and Industries and the Location of Buildings Designed for Specified Uses.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Commission on Building Districts and Restrictions will hold public hearings at 10.30 A. 3. By including therein the following: Without Maintenance: Laundryman, \$1,080 per annum; Tailor or Cutter, \$960 per annum; Senior Hospital Helper, \$720 per annum; Junior Institutional Clerk, \$720 per annum; Hospital Artisan, \$600 per annum; Senior Hospital Artisan, \$780 per annum; Butcher, \$840 per annum; Baker, \$960 per annum; Head Baker, \$1,320 per annum. 
