BROOKLYN GARAGES NAMED AFTER FALLEN SANITATION WORKERS

Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg and Commissioner John J. Doherty presided over the renaming of the Department's new Brooklyn North 4 District Garage in Bushwick in honor of Sanitation Worker Eva Barrientos, who died in the line of duty in 2004. It was the first time in the City's history that a city-owned building was named in honor of a female member of one of the uniformed forces. (Photo Left)

"Our Sanitation Workers are entrusted with keeping our City shining each and every day. Whether it's cleaning our 6,300 miles of streets, picking up our garbage and recycling, or clearing our streets of snow and ice, the commitment of Sanitation Department is unflinching," said Mayor Bloomberg. "This necessary and admirable mission, however, is both dangerous and physically challenging. Sanitation Worker Eva Barrientos, the first uniformed female Sanitation Worker to die while on duty, was serving her city when she tragically died four years ago. Eva's name on this new building will be a reminder to all of her colleagues and future Sanitation Workers of her unwavering dedication to duty, as well as her love and service to our city. We will never forget her."

"Eva was truly one of New York's Strongest, and we are honored to rename this brand new garage in remembrance of her," said Commissioner Doherty. "Sanitation Worker Barrientos' memory will live on forever and this plaque will let anyone who passes through the garage's doors know that she served New York City with love, honor, and distinction. We are grateful to the Barrientos family - especially Eva's children - - for allowing the Department to honor her for all that she gave to us."

Sanitation Worker Barrientos began her career with the Department on September 11, 1995 and was assigned to the Brooklyn North 4 District Garage. On January 26, 2004, Sanitation Worker Barrientos was pinned by the mechanical arms of an EZ Pak collection truck and suffered massive chest injuries as she attempted to dislodge a refuse bag that was preventing the hopper door from closing. She is survived by her son Melvin, 26, and her two daughters Mayonna, 18, and Raisa, 17.

On June 26th, the Department renamed the Brooklyn South District 13 Garage in Coney Island the "Allen Gormely Garage" after Sanitation Worker Allen Gormely, who died in the line of duty on September 11, 2006. The Department was joined at the ceremony by the Gormely family, including his son, Justin, and son-in-law, Anthony, who are both Sanitation Workers. (Photo Right)

On September 11, 2006, Sanitation Worker Gormely was assigned to collection duty on the 6 AM to 2 PM shift, along with his rookie partner Sanitation Worker Christopher Malafronte, who was working his first day on the job. While Sanitation Worker Malafronte was loading the collection truck, the truck started to lurch forward. Sanitation Worker Malafronte found his partner collapsed on the street. Sanitation Worker Gormely was later pronounced dead at Coney Island Hospital of an apparent heart attack.



SANITATION WORKER DIED IN THE LINE OF DUTY IN AUGUST

At funeral services held on August 14th, Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg and Commissioner John J. Doherty mourned the passing of Sanitation Worker Nelson Diaz, 60, who collapsed Monday, August 11th, while on collection duty in the Bronx.

"The pride he took in the neighborhoods along his route, in making the streets safe after a snow storm, and in keeping his truck absolutely spotless – not everyone appreciates how much work goes into that – but I do, and I have tremendous respect for the job that Nelson Diaz did every single day," said Mayor Bloomberg.

"Sanitation Worker Diaz will be missed by his colleagues and friends at Bronx District 4. He was a hard-working and well-liked employee who cared for his city, for the neighborhood he served and for his loving family. His loss was a blow to New York's Strongest," said Commissioner Doherty.

Assigned to Sanitation's Bronx District 4, which covers the Highbridge, Concourse, Mount Eden and Concourse Village sections of the borough, Sanitation Worker Diaz leaves behind his wife, Aida; their two sons, Nelson Jr. and Omar; a grandchild and another on the way. He joined the DSNY in July 1985. He was a Vietnam veteran and was awarded a Purple Heart for injuries received while serving as a tank operator in the 1st Cavalry Division of the US Army.





SANITATION ADOPTS ITS 2ND U.S. NAVY SHIP

Once again, showing the heart and respect we have for our armed forces, the Department recently adopted its second U.S. Navy ship and crew, the USS Ramage, a guided missle destroyer serving in the Persian Gulf expeditionary force led by the aircraft carrier, Iwo Jima. This 'adoption' means that New York's Strongest will be sending goodies and gift packages in time for the upcoming holidays to our men and women fighting overseas to preserve our freedoms.

The drive is being coordinated by DSNY's own 'Navy Mom', Gloria Colletti at Fresh Kills, whose son John, is assigned to the ship, which has a crew of 300.

Anyone interested in donating or participating will also have a chance to meet the crew of the Ramage at next year's Fleet Week in New York Harbor.

Several years ago, the Department had the privilege of adopting the USS Austin, an amphibious transport dock ship with 900 sailors and Marines on board. The Austin was de-commissioned last year.





STATEN ISLAND TRANSFER STATION WINS NATIONAL EXCELLENCE AWARD

The Solid Waste Association of North America awarded the Department its 2008 Gold Excellence in Solid Waste Management Award in the 'Transfer Station' category. The award will be presented at WASTECON, SWANA's annual solid waste exposition in Tampa, Florida. SWANA's Excellence Awards Program recognizes outstanding solid waste programs and facilities that promote socially, environmentally and economically sound management of solid waste. Award winners demonstrate their commitment to environmental regulation compliance, program efficiency, safety and progress.

DSNY was selected to receive SWANA's Gold Excellence Award for the success of the Staten Island Transfer Station (SITS). The SITS is an integral part of Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg's Solid Waste Management Plan, which will transform the way garbage and recycling is exported out of the city by eliminating a large amount of solid waste-generated truck traffic. The SITS began full scale operations and rail service in April 2007.

"The Department is honored and proud to receive this distinguished award for our state-of-the-art Staten Island Transfer Station," commented John J. Doherty, Commissioner, of DSNY.
