AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 78 Tribune Building, Friday, August 22, 1884, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioners James C. Spencer and William Dowd.

Also, E. Henry Lacombe, Esq., Counsel to the Corporation, and Chief Engineer Church.

The meeting was opened for public hearing in relation to the proposed modification of the grade line of the Aqueduct from its mouth near the Croton Dam to the boundary line between the County of Westchester and the City and County of New York; pursuant to the notice of the 14th inst., and the adjournment from the 20th.

No person appeared who desired to be heard in relation to the proposed modification; and after waiting one hour, the said hearing was, on motion of Commissioner Spencer, finally "closed."

The regular order of business was then taken up, and the minutes of the stated meeting of Wednesday, July 30, of the special meeting of Monday, August 18, and of the stated meeting of Wednesday, August 20, 1884, were read and approved.

Commissioner Dowd then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That for the more efficient carrying out of the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, of the State of New York, the plans heretofore adopted on the 9th day of June, 1884, on the 7th day of May, 1884, and on the 11th day of April, 1884; for the construction of the new Aqueduct, be and the same are hereby modified in the following manner, to wit: that the grade of the centre of the invert of the said Aqueduct, at its upper end or mouth near the Croton Dam, be raised ten (10) feet above the elevation shown upon the plans heretofore adopted; and that the grade line of said Aqueduct be continued from said upper end or mouth to the boundary line between the County of Westchester and the City and County of New York, at an elevation of ten (10) feet above and parallel with the grade line shown upon the plans heretofore adopted as aforesaid.

The said resolution was adopted by the affirmative vote of all the Commissioners present, to wit: The Mayor, the Comptroller, and Commissioners Spencer and Dowd.

Commissioner Dowd then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That a final plan sheet, to be designated "Final Plan Sheet No. 11," be prepared under direction of the Chief Engineer, showing the above-described modification, and that the Secretary immediately transmit a copy of said final plan sheet, duly certified, to the Commissioner of Public Works, for filing in his office; and that the said Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested forthwith to place the said modification upon the property maps heretofore submitted by him, and approved by the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The above resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Secretary then stated that in obedience to the directions of the Commissioners on the 18th of August, 1884, he had transmitted by cable the following dispatch addressed to Commissioner Baldwin:

"NEW YORK, August 18, 1884.

"C. C. BALDWIN, care of Rothschilds & Co., Paris.

"Commissioners propose to elevate grade line of Aqueduct ten (10) feet. Corporation Counsel advises that your concurrence be obtained by cable."

In answer to which dispatch the Secretary submitted the following reply:

"BADEN-BADEN, August 22, 1884.

"To McCULLOH, Secretary Aqueduct Commission."

"BALDWIN."

"I concur."

On motion of the Comptroller, the Secretary was directed to enter both of the above despatches in full upon the minutes of this meeting, and to file the originals in this office.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the Commissioners then went into Executive Session, and upon resuming the open session, Adjourned.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 209. Water from wells in the City of New York shall not be used for drinking in any tenement or lodging house, hotel, manufactory or building in which persons are living or employed, or in which there are offices, restaurant or saloon, except under and pursuant to the conditions of a permit, in writing, from the Health Department.
