## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending April 7, 1888.

THURSDAY, APRIL 5, 1888.—ADJOURNED MEETING—12 M.

Present—Commissioners Borden (President), Hutchins and Robb.

Mr. William Burnet appeared before the Board, and presented a complaint relative to damage to his property on east side of Vanderbilt avenue, north of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, caused by defective drainage.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting copy of ordinance for fencing vacant lots on north side of Washington avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-ninth and One Hundred and Seventieth streets. Referred to the Engineer of Construction in Charge of Streets and Sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

From the Secretary of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, enclosing memorandum containing suggestions of the Trustees respecting the construction of exhibition cases for the enlargement of the Museum building. Laid over.

The Secretary was directed to request the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to the power of this Board to delegate to the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art authority to appoint mechanics and workmen for the construction of cases.

From the American Automatic Weighing Machine Company, asking permission to place several of their weighing machines in Central Park. Denied.

From J. Clarence Dick, offering to pay the sum of \$750, for the privilege of conducting the boat service on Central Park Lake during present year. License granted.

From William Keeler, offering to pay the sum of \$200 for the privilege of conducting the boat service on Harlem Meer, in Central Park, during present year. License granted.

From J. C. Cornet, offering to pay the sum of \$100 for the privilege of mooring a float and letting boats at Third Avenue Bridge over Harlem river. License granted.

From the Landscape Architect and Superintendent of Parks, reporting in relation to the permanent landscape improvement of the section of Central Park lying between One Hundred and Second and One Hundred and Tenth streets, west of Fifth avenue, in accordance with plans submitted. The plans, report and estimate presented were approved, and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for their approval, with the request that they set apart the sum of \$45,000 for the use of this Department in carrying out the work.

From the Topographical Engineer:

1st. Submitting plan of drainage for Sewerage District No. 33 F and a portion of No. 33 A, in Twenty-third Ward. Adopted, and ordered filed.

2d. Submitting map showing proposed changes in classification of avenues, streets, etc., in that part of the "Fordham Heights District" bounded on the north by Berrian Landing road, on the east by Aqueduct avenue, on the south by Burnside avenue, and on the west by Sedgwick avenue, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, as petitioned for.

On motion, said map was ordered placed on exhibition and advertised, in accordance with chapter 721, Laws of 1888.

From the Engineer of Construction:

1st. Submitting plans and specifications for a sewer in Morningside Park. Approved.

2d. Submitting plans and specifications for earth and rock filling and building foundation walls on Morningside Park, along One Hundred and Tenth street and Manhattan avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Fourteenth street. Approved.

3d. Submitting design for a stone wall, surmounted by an iron railing, for Mt. Morris Park, together with estimates of the cost. Referred to the Landscape Architect.

4th. Submitting plan for coping and railing for East River Park sea-wall, with estimate of cost. Referred to the Landscape Architect.

5th. Submitting estimates of cost of completing the side walls of Transverse Road No. 2, in accordance with plans submitted on 2d July, 1887, and of cost of constructing enclosing wall on north side of Central Park, in accordance with plans submitted on 30th July last. Referred to the Landscape Architect.

6th. Submitting plan for foundation for statue of Garibaldi, with estimate of cost. Referred to the Landscape Architect.

7th. Submitting plans and specifications for renewal of superstructure of easterly approach to Central Bridge, with estimate of cost. Approved.

From the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards:

1st. Recommending that work of regulating, grading, etc., East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, be resumed. Approved.

2d. Recommending that lines of Brook avenue, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and Third avenue and German place, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth and John streets, be changed in order to obviate the necessity for carrying Brook avenue over the Port Morris branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad by the construction of a bridge.

On motion, the recommendation of the Engineer was approved and referred to the President for report.

3d. Reporting in explanation of increase in quantities of work on contract for constructing a sewer in Rider avenue between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-fourth streets. Filed.

The matter of the insurance on the principal Park buildings was referred to the Treasurer, with power.

The President, to whom was referred the subject of music for the Parks during the coming season, made a verbal report, and recommended the following arrangement of concerts:

Central Park—Cappia's Seventh Regiment band of forty-two pieces, Saturday and Sunday afternoons, at \$230 per concert.

Battery Park—Bayne's Sixty-ninth Regiment band of thirty-two pieces, Friday evenings, at \$170 per concert.

Tompkins Square—Eben's military band of thirty-two pieces, Tuesday afternoons, at \$170 per concert.

That occasional concerts be given at Paradise Park on Monday evenings, by Bayne's Sixty-ninth Regiment band of twenty-one pieces, at \$110 per concert. Also that concerts be given at Mount Morris Park, details as to band and days to be determined later. Adopted.

From the Captain of Police, reporting favorably upon the probationary service of Isaac Dobson and William Schneider as Park Policemen. Appointed.

From the Carpenters in the employ of the Department, applying for an increase of pay. Laid over.

From the Superintendent of Parks:

1st. Recommending employment of an Inspectress of Ladies' Cottages. Referred to the President.

2d. Recommending employment of twenty Laborers, two Drivers and one Cottage Laborer for work on the Parks.

On motion, the employment was authorized.

3d. Recommending employment of one team for work on Riverside Drive, and one for work on Morningside Park.

On motion, the employment was authorized.

From the Engineer of Construction in Charge of Streets and Sewers in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, recommending that pay of persons employed as Inspectors of Regulating and Grading be fixed at \$3.50 per day. Laid over.

The Secretary was directed to request the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to the authority of this Department to macadamize streets in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards not legally opened, but which have been in use as highways; and also whether the Department has authority to repair macadam pavement now laid in any of such streets.

The Treasurer was authorized to purchase from Cincinnati Zoological Garden one hippopotamus for the Central Park Menagerie, at a cost not exceeding five thousand dollars, delivered to the satisfaction of this Board.

Bills of Truxton Taylor and Francis Birdslay, amounting to \$62 each, for night services on Central Bridge from March 1, 1888, to April 1, 1888, were audited, approved and ordered transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

The President reported that he had appointed Patrick Mix, as Gardener, at \$2 per day, and Antonio Russo, as Laborer, at \$2 per day, for duty under the Superintendent of Parks. Approved.

The employment of one Foreman, fifteen double teams and thirty Laborers, was authorized for work in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The Board then proceeded to consider the evidence taken in the trials of Park Policemen.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott Street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease, or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said building or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or basements less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

#### REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

#### UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, AND AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 559, LAWS 1887, AS FOLLOWS:

The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, value, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scales from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Such rents, including the extra charges of croton, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed, as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters.

The said Commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may from time to time prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows to wit:

**BAKERIES.**—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

**BARBER SHOPS** shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath-tub therein.

**BATHING TUBS** in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

**BUILDING PURPOSES.**—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured at brick-tens cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

**COWS.**—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

**DINING SALOONS** shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**FISH STRAITS** (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

**HORSES, PRIVATE.**—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

**HORSES, LIVERY.**—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

**HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.**—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

**HORSE TROUGHS.**—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk street, five dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

**HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES** shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**LAUNDRIES** shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS** shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

**PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES** shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

**PRIVATE OFFICES**, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

**SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS** shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

**STEAM ENGINES**, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

**WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.**—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All close water-closets, in any manner connected with sewer, shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each, or a valve or cock of any description attached to the close water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any pan, closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

#### METERS

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufacturing, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings, which are so connected that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

**HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.**

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own water-pipes, street, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overflowing the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-salons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

**PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT** in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year meter shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
