Meeting of June 18, 1878.

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held pursuant to the call of the Superintendent of the Department of Buildings, at the office of the Department No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the 18th day of June, 1878, at 3 o'clock P. M., at which meeting there were present—Superintendent Walter W. Adams, Edwin Dobbs, Henry Dudley, John Banta, and James McLean; Superintendent W. W. Adams, presiding.

The minutes of the previous meeting having been read for the information of the Board, the Chairman submitted the hereinafter-named petitions and applications, to wit:

Petition of H. Wilson, on behalf of M. M. Milderberger, for permission, in the alterations pro-

posed to be made to the building No. 222 Varick street, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow of the construction of the walls of the extension but eight inches in thickness above the foundation walls, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications filed for Alterations No. 635, filed June 7, 1878. On motion of H. Dudley, granted.

Petition of R. W. Buckley, architect, on behalf of John Brower, owner, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow him in erecting the brick carriage manufactory proposed to be erected on the northeast corner of Broadway and Thirty-ninth street, to construct the outside wall on line of street to a height of 68 feet, with hard burnt brick laid in sharp sand mortar, the first story to be twenty-four (24) inches in thickness, the second, third, and fourth stories to be twenty (20) inches in thickness, the remaining portion thence to top sixteen (16) inches in thickness, in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 295 of 1878, filed May 3, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Wm. O'Gorman, for permission in the erection of twelve three story and basement brick buildings, with brown stone fronts, on east side of Willis avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, each to be 16 feet 8 inches by 45 feet and 42 feet in height, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow the outside bearing walls on line of streets of the two corner buildings to be constructed but 12 inches in thickness; the two corner buildings will be 17 by 45 feet, the inside ten buildings will be all constructed with 12 inch brick walls, in conformity with Plans and Specifications No. 350, filed May 21, 1878 (New Buildings). Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of D. Wehrenberg, for permission in the erection of a four story brick dwelling and store, on the northwest corner of Third avenue and One Hundred and Eighth street, 25 feet 5 inches by 56 feet, 53 feet in height, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow the outside or bearing wall of said building on line of One Hundred and Eighth street to be constructed on the first story thereof 16 inches in thickness and thence to top but 12 inches in thickness, in conformity with the Specifications and Plans therefor, No. 373 of New Buildings, filed May 27, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Joseph Murray, for permission in the erection of six (6) three story and basement brick dwellings on the southerly side of East One Hundred and Eleventh street, 100 feet west of Third avenue (each to be 17 feet 6 inches front and rear, 47 feet in depth, and 35 feet in height; foundation walls to be constructed of stone 20 inches thick, laid in cement mortar, the upper walls of brick), to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow the party-walls of the same to be constructed on second and third stories thereof but 8 inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications, No. 376, filed May 27, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Charles Mettam, architect, for Mrs. Robinson, owner, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law, in the erection of four four-story brick stores and dwellings 24 feet 8 inches by 60 feet, 50 feet in height, at 706, 708, 710, and 712 Second avenue, northeast corner of Thirty-eighth street, as to allow the foundation wall of the street or bearing wall on line of Thirty-eighth street, to be constructed 16 inches instead of 20 inches in thickness, and the upper wall, from thence to the roof twelve (12) inches instead of sixteen (16) inches in thickness, in conformity with New Building Plans and Specifications, No. 381, filed June 4, 1878, with the exception of the modifications of the law petitioned for. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John F. Hunt, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law in the erection of a brick three story and basement dwelling house, with brown-stone front, on the southeast corner of Willis avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street (Twenty-third Ward), 22 feet by 41 feet, and 40 feet in height, as to allow of the construction of the bearing walls on street front but twelve (12) inches in thickness, in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 398, filed June 10, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Mrs. Ann Monohan, owner, per John McIntyre, architect, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law in the erection of a two-story brick stable on rear of lot No. 347 East Eighty-fifth street (to be 25 feet in width, front and rear, and 15 feet in depth, and 14 feet in height), as to allow the walls thereof to be erected but 8 inches in thickness, in conformity with New Buildings Plans and Specifications No. 402, filed June 10, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.
