

SIR-I have the honor herewith to submit my report of the transactions of this Department for the three months ending December 31, 1878, and also a synopsis of the work performed during the

Number of New Buildings commenced during the year, 1,367; completed, 1,247; alterations commenced, 1,102; completed, 1,112.

The number of buildings embraced in the plans submitted for new buildings during the quarter was 409, and during the year 1,672; and the number of buildings proposed to be altered during the quarter was 190, and during the year 1,209.

The number of new buildings in progress on December 31, 1878, was 741, as against 726 at the same date in 1877; and the number of alterations 117, as against 124 the same time last year.

Of the plans submitted for new buildings during the quarter, 116 were approved, 23 amended and approved, and 14 rejected.

of the plans for proposed alterations during the quarter, 157 were approved, 12 amended and approved, and 16 rejected.

During the year 703 plans for new buildings were approved and 50 rejected, and 1,049 plans for alterations were approved and 72 rejected.

UNSAFE BUILDINGS.

The number pending on October 1 was 118, and the number since reported was 158, making a total of 276. Of this number, 12 have been taken down, 192 have been repaired and made safe, and 72 are in process of removal or repair.

During the past year 77 unsafe buildings have been taken down, and 856 made safe and secure. The following table will show the number of unsafe buildings taken down and repaired since 1866:

VIOLATIONS.

The number of violations reported during the quarter was 86, and in 69 of these cases the law has been complied with; and 46 violations reported prior to and pending on October 1, have been removed, making the total number removed during the quarter 115. 100 are now in the hands of

the Attorney of the Department for prosecution.

The total number of violations (exclusive of fire escapes) reported during the year is 994, and

the number removed is 997.

COMPLAINTS.

Received from the public during the quarter 105. In 52 cases no cause for complaint was found; 10 were removed upon verbal notification given by the examining Inspector; 30 proved unsafe buildings; and 13 violations of the various provisions of the law, of which the proper parties

The whole number of such complaints received during the year was 394.

Arch-girders tested during the quarter, 39; iron beams, 79; and iron lintels, I; all of which, having been found capable of sustaining the weight proposed to be imposed thereon, were approved. Since January I, 1878, there have been tested by the Inspector of Iron Work, 369 iron archgirders, 420 iron beams, and 41 iron lintels, all of which were approved, except 4 arch-girders, which, the proposed of the propose upon test, were found to be incapable of sustaining the weight proposed to be imposed thereon.

FIRE ESCAPES.

The number of buildings reported as requiring means of escape in case of fire during the quarter

Of these, 146 were made to conform to the law upon notice, and 63 are now under process. The number of this class reported prior to October 1, and since removed is 97, making a total of 243 cases in which buildings were provided with means of escape in case of fire.

The whole number of buildings thus provided since January 1, 1878, is 1,300.

The number of notices served during the year was 7,159. Of this number 3,342 were issued by the Bureau of Violations and Applications, and 3,817 by the Bureau of Iron Work. 3,187 were for additional means of escape in case of fire, iron shutters, and unprotected hoistways and elevator openings; 1,589 for various other violations of the law; and 1,753 for unsafe buildings.

TRANSACTIONS OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS,

Created under the provisions of section 31, chapter 625, Laws of 1871, as amended by section 8, chapter547, Laws of 1874.)

During the quarter ending December 31, 1878, four meetings of the Board were held.

44 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to the erection of new buildings, of which 41 were granted and 3 denied. 9 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to the alteration of buildings, 6 of which were granted and 3 denied; and 2 petitions were filed to vary the provisions of the law relative to iron shutters, both of which were granted.

Yearly Statement.

17 meetings of the Board were held.
159 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to the erection of new buildings, of which 145 were granted and 14 denied. 42 petitions were filed to modify the law relative to the alteration of buildings, 35 of which were granted and 7 denied; and 15 petitions were filed to vary the provisions of the law relative to iron shutters, all of which were granted.

Twenty-five thousand eight hundred and seventy dollars (\$25,870) were expended by the parties in interest, in securing and repairing the foregoing buildings, and during the year, one hundred and five thousand three hundred and twenty-six dollars (\$105,326) were expended for this purpose by the owners or parties in interest, under the orders of the Department. The number of cases of unsafe buildings sent to the Attorney of the Department for prosecution during the quarter was sixteen (16), and during the year sixty-nine (69).

Three hundred and fifty (350) notices of unsafe buildings, consisting of "cautionary or first notices" and "second notices," etc., were issued and served during the last three months, and one thousand seven hundred and fifty-three (1,753) during the year.

BUREAU OF FIRE ESCAPES AND IRON WORK.

HENRY J. DUDLEY, Esq., Superintendent of Buildings:

SIR—I herewith respectfully submit a report of the operations of this Bureau for the three months ending December 31, 1878.

CHARLES K. HYDE, Chief of Bureau.

The number of buildings reported as requiring additional means of egress in case of fire was two hundred and nine (209). Of these one hundred and forty-six (146) were made to conform to the law upon notice, and sixty-three (63) are now under process. The number of cases of this class reported prior to October 1, 1878, and since removed, is ninety-seven (97).

The number of buildings reported as requiring trap-doors and railings to hoistway openings was one hundred and twenty-one (121), and there were none reported as requiring iron shutters on window

During the quarter ninety-four (94) have been made to conform to the law relating to hoistway openings, one (1) building has been provided with iron shutters, and two (2) buildings have been exempted from the provisions of the law relating to iron shutters upon application to the Board of Examiners, thus leaving twenty-seven (27) cases of this class now under process.

The number of cases of this class reported prior to October 1, 1878, and since removed, is seventy-one (71).

During the quarter thirteen (13) cases were sent to the attorney for prosecution.

There were also six hundred and ninety-eight (698) notices issued. The excess of notices served over the number of cases reported may be accounted for by the fact that the agent or lessee, in many cases, have to be notified in addition to the owner, and when the proper parties can not be found, or are non-residents, notices are mailed to their address, if known, and copies posted on the buildings.

By referring to Exhibit "I," it will be noticed that there are two hundred and sixty-two (262) cases still in process of removal. Many of these are cases for which contracts are out, and the fire-escapes are being made, and also cases which require painting and repairing. Of the cases in process of removal, one hundred and thirty-eight (138) are in the hands of the attorney for prosecution.

During the quarter nine hundred and thirty-two (932) buildings have been examined by the Inspectors of this Bureau, and except those reported have been found provided with fire-escapes, or not requiring any additional means of escape in case of fire.
