



### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held October 6, 1875 (present—all the Commissioners), the following action was had :

#### Applications for Lases, etc.

October 6.—Action of the President in arranging with the owners of the steamer "Plymouth Rock" to pay \$5 for each landing made by said steamer at pier foot of Twenty-third street, East river. Approved.

#### Applications for Permits.

October 6.—From Houston street Ferry Association, to drive piles and make repairs from time to time at ferry slip south of foot of Houston street, East river. Granted, provided terms and conditions are accepted.

#### Repairs Ordered, etc.

October 6.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove or break up the barge sunk at foot of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North river, the owner thereof having abandoned the same.

#### Contracts.

October 6.—Specifications for construction of new Pier 42, North river, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, approved and adopted, and the Secretary directed to prepare form of contract and have proposals printed, inviting bids for doing said work, in accordance with resolution adopted September 1st last.

October 6.—Specifications for furnishing the Department with 5,000 barrels of English Portland cement, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, approved and adopted, and Secretary directed to prepare a proper form of contract, and have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed, and advertisement inviting bids for furnishing said material inserted in the papers designated by law.

#### Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

October 6.—Application made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to change the plan and location of proposed new Piers 19, 20, and 21, North river, so that Pier 19 shall be 600 feet by 60 feet; Pier 20, 596 feet by 100 feet, and Pier 21, 589 feet by 100 feet, and the northerly line of proposed Pier 19 to be about 48 feet north of the northerly line of Pier 19 now established, and the southerly line of Pier 20 to be about 160 feet from the northerly line of proposed new Pier 19, and the southerly line of Pier 21 to be about 200 feet from the northerly line of proposed new Pier 20.

#### Miscellaneous.

October 6.—Action of the President in making application to the Police Department for permission to dump ashes, etc., from the Department tugs or scows belonging to the Police Department. Approved.

October 6.—Comptroller informed in reply to his circular letter relative to fees, percentages, etc., received by officers of the city government, that no fees, percentages, or commissions are received by any officer or employee of this Department, and that all moneys received are paid over weekly to the City Chamberlain to the credit of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and his receipt taken therefor.

October 6.—Sixteen communications were received and read, and twenty-one were taken from the table, of which four were referred to the Executive Committee, three to the President, three were laid on the table for consideration and report, and twenty-seven were placed on file, no further action thereon being deemed necessary.

#### Resolutions.

By Commissioner Brennan—

Resolved, That hereafter the titles of Officers of the New York Penitentiary shall be as follows : First Warden ; Second Deputy Warden ; Third Keeper ; Fourth Deputy Keeper ; Fifth Guard. Adopted.

By Commissioner Brennan—

Resolved, That Warden Quinn be directed to have one padded cell placed in each of the District Prisons, under his supervision, for cases of insanity and delerium tremens; also, that he be instructed not to allow more than one prisoner placed in each cell, when there are any vacant cells in the prison. Adopted.

By Commissioner Brennan—

Whereas, This Board having passed a resolution on the 12th March, 1875, requesting the Superintendent of Buildings to examine and report the condition of the Park Reception Hospital; and

Whereas, The Superintendent of Buildings on the 19th March having made a report to the effect, that the building was in an unsafe condition, and this Board having removed at that time all the patients located therein to Bellevue Hospital at other places, and allowed the lower story of said building to remain as a temporary shelter for the reception of sudden cases of sickness and injuries in the lower part of the city ; and

Whereas, The Common Council having by resolution leased the upper part of the building corner of Centre and White streets for a Reception Hospital, which lease has not been executed ; and

Whereas, This Board, on the 2d day of July, having applied to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the use of the building formerly occupied by the Police in Beekman street ; and again, on the 23d day of August, a like application for the same premises ; and

Whereas, The Superintendent of Buildings having again notified the Board this day that the building should be vacated ; therefore,

Resolved, That the building which has been used as a Reception Hospital in City Hall Park be vacated, and the furniture, fixtures, drugs, etc., be removed to Bellevue Hospital until such time as accommodations can be afforded to this Board to care for the needy and afflicted in that locality. Adopted.

term of one year from May 1, 1875, at an annual rent of two and one-half per centum on the gross receipts, subject to fifteen thousand dollars per year rent, as fixed by the Department of Docks, for the use of the pier or wharf property belonging to the city; and that the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare a lease therefor, with the usual covenants, and in accordance with the terms of the advertisement of the Corporation sale of ferry franchises of September 23, 1875.

Resolved, That the bids received for the following-named ferries, viz.:

First—From the foot of Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, L. I.;

Second—From the foot of Grand street, East river, to Grand street, Brooklyn, E. D.;

Third—From the foot of Twenty-third street, East river, to Greenpoint, L. I.; and

Fourth—From the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, to Jersey City, New Jersey;

—not being in accordance with the terms of the advertisement made by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of September 7, 1875, be and the same are hereby rejected, and that the Comptroller is hereby authorized to re-advertise and to take all other necessary measures to lease the franchise of the said ferries, such measures to be taken in accordance with the conditions approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at their meeting held April 1, 1874.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the application of the Board of Education, for site for Grammar School, east side of Lexington avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth street, submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the premises commencing at the northeast corner of Lexington avenue and Sixty-seventh street; running thence north along the easterly side of Lexington avenue 100 feet 5 inches to the line of the centre of the block between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets; thence east along such centre line 125 feet; thence south, parallel to Lexington avenue, 100 feet 5 inches to the northerly line or side of Sixty-seventh street; and thence west along the northerly side of Sixty-seventh street, 125 feet to the point of beginning, be and the same are hereby assigned to the Board of Education of the City of New York, for the erection of an edifice for a grammar or primary school, and for the use of said Board during the time that such premises are occupied and used for common school purposes.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to advise that at a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this day, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

Whereas, This Department having decided to proceed with the work of building new Pier No. 42, North river, with adjoining bulkhead, it is deemed advisable that an alteration be made in the width of said pier, as laid down on the plans adopted by this Department; be it, therefore,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the act, passed May 16, 1872, entitled An act to amend certain provisions of law relating to wharves, piers, and bulkheads in the City of New York, application be and the same is hereby made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to change the plans as adopted by said Commissioners and the Commissioners of Docks, so that two (2) feet may be taken from the southerly side of new Pier No. 42, North river, and 13 feet taken away from the northerly side of said pier, making the width thereof 75 feet, instead of 90 feet, as at present laid down; and that tracings of the pier referred to be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Pursuant to said resolution enclosed herewith please find tracings in duplicate.

Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM,

Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I have the honor to advise, that at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Board governing this Department, held this day, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

Whereas, This Department, on or about the 1st of June, 1875, entered into an agreement with the Erie Railway Company, as per resolution adopted by this Board on the 14th of July, to lease for a term of years certain wharf property to be constructed on the new plans, as adopted by this Department, on the North river, located in the vicinity of the premises at the foot of Chambers street, North river, now occupied by said company for ferry and terminal purposes; and

Whereas, It is the intention of this Department to erect in front of the 560 feet of bulkhead included in said lease, three new piers of the dimensions hereinafter stated, and to be located upon the lines not laid down on the plans for that district of the water-front heretofore adopted by this Board and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby respectfully requested, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 738 of the Laws of 1872, to consent to and approve of the following changes in the width and location of the proposed piers, as shown on the accompanying diagram, to wit: That the lines of new piers, Nos. 19, 20, and 21, as laid down on the map prepared by this Department, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 27th April, 1871, be changed and annulled, and that in place thereof be substituted the lines for three new piers, to be also designated as Piers 19, 20, and 21, and to be of the following dimensions, to wit: Pier 19, 600 feet by 60 feet; Pier 20, 596 feet by 100 feet; Pier 21, 589 feet by 100 feet; the northerly line of proposed Pier 19 to be about 48 feet north of the northerly line of Pier 19 now established; the southerly line of Pier 20 to be distant about 100 feet from the northerly line of new Pier 19, as proposed to be established; and the southerly line of Pier 21 to be distant about 200 feet from the northerly line of Pier 20, as proposed to be established.

A communication, with annexed papers, in relation to purchase of Pier No. 44, North river, of the Inman Steamship Company, John G. Dale, agent, for the sum of \$250,000, was received from the Commissioners of Docks, and, on motion, laid over to the next meeting.

## APPROVED PAPERS.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and street-lamps lighted in One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 23, 1875.

Approved by the Mayor, October 4, 1875.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend an ordinance to regulate permits for street-stands, show-cases, signs, stairways, hoistways, and deliveries," approved February 24, 1866, which became adopted July 27, 1874.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of the ordinance of 1874, amending section 5 of the ordinance of 1866, is hereby amended by striking from the last clause in the said section 5 the words, "use the street or beyond the stoop line," and inserting in lieu thereof the following, "place any sign upon the top, or from on front, above the second floor, of any building that shall project into the street, or over the sidewalk from any such building, in any street or avenue in the City of New York," so that said section 5, when so amended, shall read as follows:

§ 5. Every grantee of a privilege under this ordinance for a show-case, signs, stairways, or hoistways, shall pay a sum of one dollar for each, and grantees of all other privileges the sum of one dollar, towards the expense of executing this ordinance, to be accounted for among other fees of the Mayor's office. It is hereby understood and expressed that for the receiving and delivering of goods no fee shall be charged, and the Corporation Attorney shall not hereafter institute suits for alleged obstructions occasioned by the receipt or delivery of merchandise in the ordinary course of business, but no person shall deposit any article or articles upon any street or sidewalk in the city in such manner as to obstruct the free use thereof by the public. The aggregate sum for any one permit containing all or any portion of the privileges expressed in this section shall not exceed the sum of three dollars, and all may be granted for that fee; but in no case is permission to be given to place any sign upon the top or from in front, above the second floor of any building that shall project into the street or over the sidewalk from any such building in any street or avenue in the City of New York.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 30, 1875.

Approved by the Mayor, October 4, 1875.

Whereas, From the result of the deliberations of the State Board of Equalization, based on the estimates of the valuation of the State Assessors, it is evident, that under the present system no relief will be afforded the City and County of New York, but the unequal ratio of State taxes, burdened upon it for years, continued; and

Whereas, It is well known that the value of real estate in the City of New York, as estimated for the years 1873 and 1874, and on which the State Assessors have based their ratios of assessment, has depreciated full twenty-five per cent., if not more, in the city, while the same cannot be said of the counties, and the State Assessors, as far as it concerns the City of New York, have wholly disregarded this fact, and its enunciation as expressed in the estimates of our local assessors, showing the full value of the city property to be one billion three hundred and ninety-four million four hundred and eighty-eight thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars, against one billion nine hundred and thirty-five million twenty-one thousand five hundred and forty dollars, as in the table of the State Assessors; and

Whereas, The exhibit of the State Assessors, made before the State Board of Equalization, shows that, while they have added to the full valuation of property as presented by our local assessors not less than five hundred and forty million five hundred and thirty-two thousand five hundred and seventy-four dollars, they at the same time have diminished the valuation of local assessors in other cases, as, for instance, in Cayuga County, the home of State Assessor Fowler, from forty-six million two hundred and twenty-five thousand seven hundred and nine dollars to thirty-eight million seven hundred and forty-two thousand and ninety-three dollars; in Seneca County, the home of State Assessor Hadley, from twenty-two million eight hundred and forty-four thousand and twenty-five dollars to nineteen million six hundred and seventy-seven thousand five hundred and ten dollars; and in Albany, Erie, Onondaga, Steuben, Washington, and other counties, the homes of one or another member of the State Board of Equalization, reductions from the valuation of the local assessors have been made by the State Assessors amounting to from seven to ten and seventeen millions of dollars in several single cases; and

Whereas, By this arbitrary, unjust, and self-interested proceeding of the State Assessors, and a majority of the State Board of Equalization—Lieutenant-Governor Dorsheimer, State Treasurer Raines, and State Assessor Briggs, from Kings County, only voting in favor of justice and fairness—one million two hundred and fifty-four thousand four hundred and seventy-six dollars more taxes have been put upon this city than could be justly claimed by the State, while the rest of the State has been unduly relieved from the same amount of taxation, burdening on the city for the value of its assessed property eight million twelve thousand three hundred and eighty-six dollars, where it should have been six million seven hundred and fifty-seven thousand nine hundred and ten dollars, and telling off the balance of the State with seven million seven hundred and fifteen thousand and ninety-six dollars, instead of imposing upon it eight million nine hundred and sixty-nine thousand five hundred and seventy-two dollars; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board, as the representative of the citizens and taxpayers of the City and County of New York, do earnestly protest against the continued unjust treatment this overburdened community, in spite of all protestations, is receiving at the hands of the State Assessors and the State Board of Equalization;

Resolved, That the Committee on Finance be and is herewith instructed to give this matter of State taxation their due consideration, in order to suggest to this Board such remedies as in their opinion may tend to relieve this city from a continuance of such unwarranted extortion;

Resolved, That the thanks of this Board, and of the citizens at large, are due to the Commissioners, George H. Andrews, Wilson G. Hunt, and Isaac Sherman, appointed agreeably to a resolution of this Board by his Honor the Mayor, and with a view of convincing the State Assessors and the State Board of Equalization of the wrongful burdens imposed upon this city for a number of years, and of impressing them with the justice of final relief, said Commissioners having spared no efforts, by means of facts and arguments submitted to the aforesaid State Boards, to attain such end;

Resolved, That the Commissioners aforesaid are herewith requested to submit to this Board, directly or through his Honor the Mayor, a full report of all such matter and facts as in their opinion may aid this Board in continuing its exertions in the same direction.

SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

THE COMMISSIONERS OF PUBLIC CHARITIES  
and Correction purpose opening a School for Nurses,  
at Charity Hospital, on the first day of August next. It is  
their design to offer to worthy young women, between the  
ages of twenty and thirty-five, the opportunity to acquire  
proficiency in a pursuit, which is at once honorable, useful,  
and remunerative, by educating them in the profession of  
Nursing. Every effort will be made to elevate the occupa-  
tion, by a course of careful instruction from competent  
teachers, and by considerate and generous treatment of the  
pupils. The course of training will occupy two years, and  
will embrace lectures upon nursing, food, ventilation, mid-  
wifery, and all subjects connected with nursing.
