Whereas, The efforts of this Board to reduce the amount of small-pox, by sending a large force of Vaccinators into the districts in which the disease prevails, has been successful in preventing such a marked increase of the disease as was dreaded, but has not as yet controlled the epidemic force of

Resolved, That this Board hereby respectfully requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for \$2,500, in order to continue the same number of Vaccinators for another month as an absolute necessity for the preservation of the public health.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to transmit to you a copy of a resolution adopted by this Board the ninth instant, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the act of the Legislature organizing

this Board.

As the greater portion of the sum called for will be necessary to repay moneys borrowed on the resumption of the work on the bridge this spring, and to meet the certificates of indebtedness given to private stockholders on the retirement of their stock, the whole amount is desirable at once, and a considerable portion is absolutely required at least by the first of July next.

The Comptroller made the statement that the Department of Parks had incurred liabilities in 1873 and 1874, in excess of their appropriations, for which judgments have been obtained, and presented to him for payment.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following preamble and resolutions:

Whereas, chapter 146 of the Laws of 1875, passed April 22, authorizes and directs the Board ot Estimate and Apportionment to fix the salaries or compensation of the three Commissioners for the erection of the Court-house in the Third Judicial District of the City of New York, appointed under the provisions of chapter 806 of the Laws of \$673:

Resolved, That the salary of the Commissioner, who shall from time to time be appointed President of the said Commissioners of the Court-house of the Third Judicial District, be and hereby is fixed at the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars per annum, and that the salaries of the other two of said Commissioners be and hereby are fixed at the sum of two thousand dollars each per annum, to take effect from April 22, 1875;

Resolved, That the sum of \$4,477.77 is transferred from the appropriation "Public Instruction," 1874, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to an appropriation for "Salaries, Third District Court-house Commissioners," 1875, for which it is required.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolutions.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes

The Chairman presented the following communication from the Police Department:

Whereas, It is provided by a law, passed during the last session of the Legislature, that—

"§ 3. The various scows employed by the Cities of New York and Brooklyn, or by the contractors for removing the ashes, garbage, and refuse of said cities, while moored at the various dumping-boards of said cities, are hereby designated and required to receive directly any and all ashes and garbage or rubbish from any steam-tug or steam-vessel in the Harbor of New York; and in addition to the foregoing provisions, two or more scows shall be located at one or more of the said dumping-boards, on the East and North rivers, respectively, or at such other points as the Commissioners of Pilots may direct, for the special use of boats and vessels wishing to discharge ashes, garbage, or rubbish; and the ashes, garbage, or rubbish received by all of the said scows shall be disposed of as part of the refuse of and at the expense of said cities;" and

Whereas, Requisition has been made on the Police Department by the Commissioners of Pilots to place two scows in the Harbor of New York, one at the Sand-spit Shoal, off Governor's Island, on the East river, the other in the North river, on the Communipaw Flats, each scow to be provided with night signals, and lanterns, and a watchman; and

Whereas, The Police Department has no funds appropriated which can be lawfully expended to defray the expense of keeping and maintaining scows, in conformity to the above requisition; therefore

Resolved, That in view of the said requisition made on the Police Department by the Commissioners of Pilots, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and they are hereby respectfully requested to appropriate and set apart from the unexpended balance of the appropriation for "Cleaning the Streets" for the year 1874, the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), to be used and expended for the purpose set forth in section 3 of chapter 148 of the Laws of 1875.

Resolved, That the Police Department is hereby directed to pay over said amount of one hundred thousand dollars of unexpended appropriation for the year 1874, to the Comptroller, who is hereby authorized to transfer the same, with the approval of this Board, to the "General Fund of the City,' and apply the said amount to the reduction of taxation.
