DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, No. 31 CHAMBERS STREET, NEW YORK, June 7, 1895. Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to submit herewith a list of streets which I recommend for repavement with asphalt this year from the fund authorized by chapter 475 of the Laws of 1895, together with a copy of the report by the Water Purveyor, setting forth the reasons and plans upon which the streets have been selected for repavement, all of which I indorse.

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to request that your Board authorize me to employ for seven months of the year 1895, in making surveys and measurements, giving lines and grades, and supervising the work of repaving streets and avenues to be designated by your Board, the following engineers, inspectors and assistants, at salaries herein stated, and to be paid from the fund authorized by chapter 475 of the Laws of 1895:

DEAR SIR—As the work of repaving streets, under chapter 35 of the Laws of 1892, will continue until several unfinished repavement contracts, which are charged to the fund authorized by that act, are completed, it has been and is still necessary to perform certain map work in connection therewith.

I, therefore, respectfully ask that your Board will set apart from that fund the sum of \$1,000 to pay the salary of one draughtsman for eight months of the present year, at the rate of \$1,500 per annum.

DEAR SIR—In pursuance of chapter 516 of the Laws of 1894, which directed that Avenue A, from Fifty-ninth street to West Eighty-eighth street, be paved with granite blocks at an expense not to exceed \$200,000, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment made the award of the contract on June 21, 1894. The estimated cost of the work under the awarded contract is \$142,297, or \$57,703 less than the amount authorized by the act. It is, urgently necessary that this work be performed under close and rigid inspection, and its magnitude and character require the constant services of your Inspectors during its progress.

I, therefore, respectfully ask that your Board authorize me to employ four inspectors thereon, at the regular rate for pavement inspectors, \$3.50 per day each, and the payment for their services out of the fund authorized by the act, not to exceed the sum of \$2,400 in the aggregate.
