BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, THURSDAY, 10 A. M., July 26, 1900.

The Hons. Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller, and Theodore Connoly, Acting Corporation Counsel, the officers designated by section 1526, chapter 378, Laws

of 1897, met this day.

The minutes of the meeting of July 10, 1900, were approved as printed.

By concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the following resolution was adopted:
Resolved, That the Commissioner of the Department of Sewers be and he hereby is authorized to advertise for proposals, to be opened August 8, 1900, for the reconstruction of a sewer in Flushing avenue, from Van Alst avenue to Cabinet street, First Ward, Borough of Queens, in the following newspapers:
"Long Island Farmer," "Long Island Daily Star," "Newtown Register."

By concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That, in pursuance with a communication from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the appointments of James H. Ross and Frank L. Gilon, Bookbinders, be and hereby are rescinded.

By concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That Richard J. Burke, of No. 175 Luquer street, Brooklyn, who has been duly certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for such appointment, be and he hereby is appointed Examiner in the office of the City Record, at the rate of nine hundred dollars per annum, said appointment to take effect from July 27, 1900.

By the concurrent action of all the members of the Board the following resolution was

Resolved, That the Supervisor of the City Record be and he hereby is authorized to procure by direct order, that is, without contract let after advertisement, the articles called for by the following requisitions allowed at this meeting, not exceeding the estimates this day submitted by the Supervisor, as shown by schedule this day signed by the members of the Board of City Record, that course being deemed to be for the best interests of the City.
