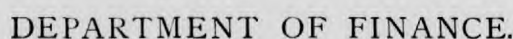

The Hons. Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; M. T. Daly, Deputy and Acting Comptroller, and Theodore Connolly, Acting Corporation Counsel, the officers designated by section 1526, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, met this day.

By concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the following resolutions was adopted: Resolved, That John J. Strube of No. 56 Butler street, Brooklyn, who has been duly certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for such appointment, be and he hereby is appointed Bookbinder in the office of the City Record, to be detailed as such Bookbinder by the Supervisor of the City Record, the rate of compensation for such services to be one thousand two hundred dollars per annum; said appointment to take effect on and after July 30, 1900.

Resolved, That Frank L.
