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## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room 16, City Hall, on Friday, January 19, 1906, at 10.30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens (Acting President Gresser), and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

After considering financial matters, the Board took up the consideration of public improvements.

The minutes of the meeting of January 12, 1906, were approved as printed.

CLOSING SIXTY-FOURTH AND SIXTY-FIFTH STREETS, BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was presented, and the matter was referred to the Bureau of Franchises:

Hon. JOHN H. MOONEY, Assistant Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication, dated September 7, 1905, inclosing a form of agreement between The City of New York and the Long Island Railroad Company, in connection with the proposed closing of Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and informing me that the agreement was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 14, 1905, subject to my approval as to form, and asking me to approve and return the same.

Thereafter I received a communication from the Hon. Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, dated October 27, 1905, referring to the foregoing proposed agreement, and stating that since the said agreement had been forwarded to me for approval as to form, various questions have arisen in regard to the City's title to the bed of Sixty-fourth street, and that it was found necessary to make certain alterations in the form of the agreement heretofore presented, more particularly set forth in the report of the Engineer, inclosed in Mr. Grout's communication. Mr. Grout inclosed at the same time an amended form of agreement.

He asked me to consider these amendments in reporting the matter back to the Board, inasmuch as it appears that the City's interests would be better protected and that the attorneys for the Railroad Company had agreed to the proposed changes.

Since the receipt of the latter communication, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 15, 1905, rescinded the resolution referred to in the foregoing communications, and adopted new resolutions which purport to change the map or plan of The City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn, so as to discontinue those portions of Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets which lie northwesterly of Second avenue, and to change the grade of First avenue, from Sixty-third to Sixty-seventh street, and also the grades of the intersecting streets.

A copy of these resolutions has been forwarded to me, and the Long Island Railroad Company have submitted for my consideration a proposed agreement on the lines approved by the Hon. Edward M. Grout, and modified, however, to meet the changes required by the rescission of the resolution of July 14, 1905, and the adoption of a new resolution on December 15, 1905, in reference to these matters.

I have suggested certain amendments and this matter will have to be again submitted to your Board for its consideration.

## FILING MAPS OF LANDS FOR SEWER EASEMENTS.

Hon. JOHN H. MOONEY, Esq., Assistant Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communications of November 20 and December 7, 1905, referring to mine of October 24, wherein I advised the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that in proceedings taken under section 396 of the Charter, to acquire an easement for sewer purposes, it would be necessary to file maps showing the lands through which the easement would run.

You ask to be informed whether it is necessary for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the map, and, if so, whether it would be necessary to proceed under the provisions of section 442 of the Charter and advertise a hearing in the matter.

I am of the opinion that it would be advisable, not only for the President of the Borough, but also for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve and adopt the aforesaid map. It will not be necessary, however, to advertise for any additional hearings on such maps, as they are principally required in order that those provisions of section 973 of the Charter should be complied with which require on the application for the appointment of Commissioners, a reference to such maps in order to indicate the lands required to be condemned and are evidence of the action already taken by the Local Board of the President of the Borough and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

## REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON BUCKHOUT STREET, THE BRONX.

The following petition and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

NEW YORK SUPREME COURT.

In the Matter  
of

The opening of Buckhout street, from the Grand Concourse and Boulevard to Echo Park.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned, owners of property which has been assessed for benefit in the above proceedings, in amounts which have been incorporated in a report of the Commissioners therein (the motion for confirmation of which is now set for Tuesday, December 5, 1905), do respectfully petition your Honorable Board to direct:

(1) That fifty per cent. (50%) of the cost and expense of such proceeding shall be borne and paid by The City of New York and only fifty per cent. (50%) of such cost and expense assessed upon the other property deemed to be benefited thereby, and  
(2) That the Corporation Counsel be instructed to adjourn the motion for the confirmation of the said report herein, pending the deliberation and determination of your Honorable Board on this petition.

In support of the said petition we respectfully submit the following considerations:

1. Buckhout street, from the Grand Concourse and Boulevard to Echo Park, consists of two short blocks (one, from the Grand Concourse and Boulevard to Anthony avenue, 625 feet long, and the second, what amounts to an approach to Echo Park, 168 feet long), and had an outlet at the easterly end through Ryer avenue to Burnside avenue on the north, and through Ryer avenue to Tremont avenue on the south, as Ryer avenue was originally laid out and opened. Since, however, and pursuant to a resolution of your Honorable Board on the 3d day of April, 1903, it was determined to discontinue Ryer avenue from the northerly side of Buckhout street to the northerly side of Tremont avenue, incorporating it, together with so much of Ryer avenue as lay between the northerly side of Buckhout street and the southerly side of One Hundred and Seventy-eighth (178th) street and a portion marked "A" on the annexed sketch of the easterly end of Buckhout street (as laid out in this proceeding), into Echo Park. Said resolution also authorized the acquisition of a westerly extension of Echo Park, which is also shown on the annexed sketch, one strip 95.23 feet on One Hundred and Seventy-eighth (178th) street by 88.44 feet on the line of Buckhout street and 200 feet in depth, and a triangular piece at the southwest corner of the junction formed by the lines of Buckhout street and Ryer avenue, 36.78 feet by 95.96 feet by 90 feet. These last-mentioned strips were purchased for and incorporated in the park properties by the City at private sale, which was concluded on the 23d day of January, 1905, for thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), which is at the rate of a little over \$1.74 per square foot.

The only fee acquired in the above proceeding and for which a substantial amount has been awarded is Damage Map No. 4, the said easterly end of Buckhout street, which amounts to practically only an approach to Echo Park, and the greater part of which is the parcel marked "A" aforementioned. This park extension amounts to a practical incorporation of the entire end of Buckhout street unto the park properties. This end leads nowhere, as Ryer avenue is abandoned at this point; the park extends westerly up the street on both sides and the Park Department has under consideration construction of a circuitous parkway in the westerly part of the northerly newly acquired extension, showing the easterly end of Buckhout street for about 50 feet as part of the park and, as has been indicated, the approach to Tremont avenue on the south cut off. The parcel marked "A" contains 3,131.25 square feet, which if allowed for at the rate paid for the aforementioned westerly extension, the City should allow in this proceeding in reduction of the assessment levied \$5,448.37.

Echo Park is one of the most beautiful and picturesque spots of its size in this City and is practical only for park purposes. It is a part of the park system placed under the jurisdiction of the Park Department and devoted entirely to those ends. It was, however, acquired originally through street opening proceedings as a public place, in view of which fact the several different commissions in street opening matters, although Echo Park has fallen within the area of assessment adopted by them, have refrained from imposing an assessment on it (which would have been levied on school house property or parks in general) without instruction from your Honorable Board.

Within the area of assessment laid out by the Commissioners in the above proceeding is a plot of Echo Park, including Ryer avenue, which at that location has been closed and incorporated in the park, measuring 160 by 200 feet. This plot (not assessed, although included in the area of assessment), if it bore the same relative assessment as other plots in the assessed area, or about \$0.04725 per square foot, would be assessed at the rate of 32,000 square feet at \$0.04725 per square foot, or \$1,512. The parcel marked "A" would also be subject to the same rate of assessment and, as it contains 3,131.25 square feet, its portion would be (3,131.25 by \$0.04725) \$147.95.



2. Unless the City assumes its just and equitable proportion of this improvement, property owners in the area of assessment adopted which extends only one hundred (100) feet to the north and one hundred (100) feet to the south of Buckhout street will be subjected to a burden largely disproportionate to the benefits arising from the improvement. And it is but just and equitable that the City, as the owner of such public place, should share with the individual property owners the expense of the opening of this street, giving access to the public place for park purposes, and especially so by reason of the fact that a part of the land taken in this proceeding, for which fee value is allowed, has been as aforementioned, actually incorporated in the park.

3. The total expense of this proceeding amounts to about nine thousand dollars (\$9,000); one-half of this amount, four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500), will be a heavy burden for neighboring property owners.

The figures above set forth show that if the properties owned by the City bore their just and equitable proportion of the said improvement, the expense of the City would amount in the neighborhood of \$7,208.32. The property owners, however, feel that if fifty per cent. (50%) of the improvement is borne by the City, they will be relieved, in a great measure, from the burden which should be assessed against the City at large.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying petition addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by D. W. Moran and eight others, and dated November 23, 1905, asks the Board to assume for the City 50 per cent. of the cost of acquiring title to Buckhout street, from the Grand Boulevard and Concourse to Echo Park. The grounds for this petition are given at length and in considerable detail in the petition. They are briefly as follows:

Buckhout street, when these opening proceedings were commenced, extended to Ryer avenue, through which an outlet was obtained to Tremont avenue on the south, and to East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street on the north. After title to the street had been vested in the City, and on July 8, 1905, the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a plan providing for an extension of Echo Park, and the discontinuing and closing of that portion of Ryer avenue, between Tremont avenue and East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street. This action was taken for the reason that the topography was such that streets could be cut through the hill only at very great expense, that it was of the same nature as Echo Park, already laid out and acquired, and that it should be properly made a part of that park. The result of this change in the map is that a portion of the street which has been acquired, and title to which has been vested in the City is now within the limits of the enlarged Echo Park. The petitioners argue that the value of this area, estimated upon the basis of the prices which the City has already paid for the purchase by private agreement of this extension to the park, should be credited to the property owners, and that the City should assume at least such percentage of the cost as would be represented by the relation between this value estimated as above stated to the total cost.

It happens that this portion of Buckhout street immediately adjacent to Echo Park, or now included in it, was the only area for which substantial awards were made, the remainder of the street having been considered as dedicated. The result is that the original owners of this undedicated portion have received their awards as of the date of the vesting of title, which was two years before the map was changed, enlarging Echo Park, while the assessments not yet having been confirmed, they will escape all expense, the City being liable for such assessments as the present owner of the addition to the park. I find, further than this, that while the total expense of this proceeding was \$12,466.90, the awards for land taken were some \$1,300, while there were awards for damage which would result from a proposed regulating and grading of the street amounting to \$4,675, and of these awards for damage, D. W. Moran, whose name heads the petition, is to receive \$2,000, while five of the remaining eight petitioners received awards ranging from \$150 to \$800. Inasmuch as this damage for a proposed regulating and grading will not be imposed, owing to the fact that Buckhout street will lead directly to Echo Park, and will not have to be cut down to meet Ryer avenue, it would seem as though abundant relief had already been given to the petitioners, and I can see no reason for any action, unless it be to recommend to the Corporation Counsel that, as owing to the extension of Echo Park the damage from the proposed regulating and grading will not be imposed, this allowance be deducted before the proceedings are confirmed.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on January 28, 1904, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to Elm Avenue, between Myrtle avenue and lands occupied by the Montauk Division of the Long Island Railroad.

This resolution affects the entire length of Elm avenue, which was laid out upon the map of the City on November 13, 1903, the same comprising eighteen blocks, or about 6,000 feet. The street has a width of 60 feet and is in use through the entire length, excepting the four easterly blocks between the Manhattan Beach and Montauk Divisions of the Long Island Railroad. The roadway between Myrtle avenue and Fresh Pond road has been macadamized. There are very few buildings along the line of the street and none of them encroaches upon the land to be acquired.

Approval of the resolution is recommended after a public hearing has been given the railroad company. The cost of this proceeding should be assessed upon the property benefited.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on January 28, 1904, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to Edison place, between Cooper avenue and the Long Island Railroad, in the Second Ward.

This resolution affects the entire length of Edison place as laid out, the same being two blocks, or about 1,400 feet. The street has a width of 50 feet, and is in use for almost the entire length. The abutting property has been improved by the erection of a number of detached dwellings. This street can never attain any importance by reason of its limitation on the north by the Lutheran Cemetery, which adjoins the Long Island Railroad, while on the south Cypress Hills Cemetery will prevent other than a short extension of its length. The depth of the blocks at the present time is only 200 feet, and I believe that a width of 50 feet will be sufficient for the needs of this locality.

#### WIDENING LIVINGSTON STREET, BROOKLYN.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—We represent a large number of persons who own property, a portion of which has been taken for the widening of Livingston street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Title to the property taken vested in the City on November 11, 1905. The Commissioners' report was filed some time in September, 1905, and it has been up for confirmation before the Court ever since September and hearings have been from time to time adjourned.

Certain bills for experts have been submitted and rejected by the Corporation Counsel. We believe that the rejection was wise, as they appeared to be greatly in excess of the services rendered.

When the matter came up for hearing before Judge Dickey in November, these contested claims were referred to a referee for hearing, who, as yet, has not made his report and the matter is still pending before him.

The interest on the awards costs the City \$10,000 per month. Some of the property owners whose property has been taken are persons of small means, and being deprived of their property or the income from the same, are in dire distress.

When the matter came up before Judge Kelly this morning, he directed that the Corporation Counsel and the property owners join in an application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a direction that the Commissioners make a preliminary partial report and file the same at once; the preliminary partial report being for the awards made only. The question as to the assessments and the question as to the validity of the claims presented by the experts to be deferred until the matter can be finally adjusted.

The hearing was adjourned until Thursday in order to have this application made to your Board.

We respectfully petition your Board, at its meeting to be held on Tuesday next, to authorize the Commissioners appointed for the widening of Livingston street to make a preliminary partial report of awards and file the same at once. Irrespective of the direction of Mr. Justice Kelly, we think in justice to the property owners this should be done.

SIR—In the accompanying communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by Messrs. Wingate & Cullen on January 13, 1906, the Board is requested to authorize the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed for the widening of Livingston street, between Court street and Flatbush avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, to make a preliminary partial report of the awards and file the same at once. The reasons given for this request are that the Commissioners have practically completed their work, that they have determined upon the awards and have levied the assessment, and that the report has been up for confirmation before the Court since September last. Objection has been made by the Corporation Counsel to the bills of certain experts, and these claims have been referred to a referee, who has not yet made his report. Meanwhile, interest amounting to approximately \$10,000 per month is running on



the awards, and Justice Kelly, to whom has been presented the report of the Commissioners for confirmation, has recommended that the Commissioners be authorized to make a preliminary partial report for the awards only, in order that the heavy interest charges may be stopped.

I find upon inquiry at the Bureau of Street Openings that the total amount of the awards is about \$1,940,000, and that the expenses of the Commissioners are about \$40,000 additional, exclusive of interest from November 11, 1905, which is about \$20,000 more. The Board has always been somewhat reluctant to authorize the filing of separate reports, feeling that to do so tended to remove an incentive for the Commissioners to complete their work. In this case, however, the labors of the Commissioners have been finished, and the assessments, as well as the awards, can be confirmed as soon as the question of the value of the expert testimony can be determined. Meanwhile, the City has taken possession of the property; buildings are being removed, and the owners of the property, although dispossessed, cannot secure their awards, and this would appear to be one of the cases where the filing of a partial report covering the awards is justifiable and desirable, and it is recommended that such action be taken.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, Borough of Manhattan, adopted on November 21, 1905, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to West One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Amsterdam and St. Nicholas avenues.

West One Hundred and Sixty-third street through the block named in the resolution was placed upon the map of the City on June 9 last to have a width of 60 feet. The adjoining sections of the street have already been improved. In reporting upon the resolution providing for placing the street upon the map attention was called to the fact that the proceedings for the acquisition of title would be very expensive, for the reason that there were two two-story brick houses and three or four frame houses within the lines of the street, the land being very largely occupied by these buildings, as the street has an average length of but 150 feet. Attention was also called to the fact that the petitioners for the street did not indicate that any of them lived near or owned property in the vicinity, and for these reasons some doubt was expressed as to the wisdom of placing the street upon the map. The Local Board resolution now presented is accompanied by a petition signed by seven owners of property near the street, and the action proposed forms a logical sequence to the change in the map already made.

Approval of the resolution is therefore recommended, the cost of the proceeding to be assessed upon the property benefited.

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Flatbush District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, this 1st day of June, 1905, hereby initiates proceedings to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by locating and laying out a public park along the Paerdegat Basin, between Jamaica Bay and the land of the Flatbush water works, in the Twenty-ninth and Thirty-second Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, as shown on the accompanying map and more particularly described as follows:

##### *a—The Northeastern Line of Park.*

1. From the bulkhead line of Jamaica Bay to a point near East Fifty-eighth street, the northeastern line of the park to be parallel to and 500 feet northeasterly of the centre line of Paerdegat Basin, as the same is laid down on the map of the City;

2. Thence to extend westerly curving to the left to the southern line of Farragut road, as laid down on the map of the City at East Fifty-sixth street;

3. Thence to extend westerly along the southern line of Farragut road to a point where a line drawn parallel with the centre line of Paerdegat Basin and 500 feet northeasterly therefrom would intersect the southern line of Farragut road, between East Forty-fifth street and East Forty-sixth street;

4. Thence to extend northwesterly parallel to and 500 feet northeasterly of the centre line of Paerdegat Basin to the eastern line of East Thirty-seventh street.

##### *b—The Southwestern Line of Park.*

1. From the bulkhead line of Jamaica Bay to a point near East Fifty-fifth street, the southwestern line of the park to be parallel to and 500 feet southwesterly of the centre line of Paerdegat Basin, as the same is laid down on the map of the City;

2. Thence to extend westerly curving to the left to a line 500 feet southerly of and parallel with the centre line of Paerdegat Basin;

3. Thence to extend westerly parallel to and 500 feet southerly of the centre line of Paerdegat Basin to the centre line of Farragut road near East Thirty-eighth street;

4. Thence westerly along the centre line of Farragut road to the eastern line of East Thirty-seventh street;

5. Thence northerly along the eastern line of East Thirty-seventh street, to the northeastern line of park as described above.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, on June 1, 1905, proposing a change in the map of the City by locating and laying out a public park along the Paerdegat Basin, between Jamaica Bay and the land of the Flatbush Water Works.

The laying out of a park following what is known as the Paerdegat Basin has been discussed for some years, and in my judgment the project has much merit. When the former towns of Flatlands and Flatbush were mapped there was included in them the Paerdegat Basin, running from Jamaica Bay to a point near Flatlands avenue with a width of 300 feet, from Flatlands avenue to about East Sixty-fifth street at a width of 200 feet, where it was contracted to a width of 100 feet, and carried at this width to a point between East Thirty-first and East Thirty-second streets within the lands owned by the Flatbush Water Works. The total length of this basin is over 13,000 feet, and it was undoubtedly thought that it would at some future time become a commercial waterway connecting with the tidal waters of Jamaica Bay. With the sluggish currents of Jamaica Bay there is little doubt that a commercial canal with manufacturing plants on its borders would become more vile and objectionable than Gowanus canal, to improve the conditions of which the Board has within the past year authorized a very large expenditure. The section adjacent to the head of this proposed basin has become one of the choicest residential portions of the outlying wards. The possibilities for the commercial development of the water front of Jamaica Bay are immense, and it is in my judgment doubtful if such a canal would ever be needed. The land is of little value, and the City has already taken title to that portion of the basin lying between Flatlands avenue and Jamaica Bay, a distance of about 4,500 feet. It could undoubtedly be most successfully treated as a part of the park system of the Greater City. The plan which has been submitted, however, provides for the taking of a strip having a uniform width of 1,000 feet, or 500 feet on each side of the centre line of Paerdegat Basin. These lines have been arbitrarily determined without the slightest regard to the topography or to the existing street system. No marginal street has been provided by which access to the park could be secured. The Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad will cross it obliquely between Troy avenue and East Fifty-first street, the crossing being over 2,000 feet in length. Several important streets, such as Albany avenue, Troy avenue, Utica avenue, Ralph avenue and Flatlands avenue would be entirely cut off, or if carried across the park on their present lines would have crossings varying from 1,000 to 1,500 feet in length. It would be possible to vary the boundaries of this park, contracting them where important streets or the Long Island Railroad are to cross, or where the adjacent land has a good elevation, and expanding where the bordering lands are low and of little value, and by the laying out of a bounding street on both sides and at the same time increasing greatly the attractiveness of the proposed park and reducing its cost. The laying out of a park in this manner illustrates the weakness of the policy which The City of New York has frequently followed in the selection of its park lands. The park areas have been selected with little regard to system. Their boundaries have been in great measure determined by those whose interests were entirely local, if not selfish, and the services of the expert landscape architect have been secured only for the development of the park when laid out and acquired, while his advice has not been sought before determining the location of the boundaries and the property to be taken for park purposes.

As the area of park lands in the Borough of Brooklyn is but 2.1 per cent. of the area of the Borough, it is important that additional park reservations be secured before the land increases in value. In my judgment such reservations should not only be selected but purchased without further delay. An admirable opportunity to add to the park system is here presented, but I believe it would be a serious mistake to lay out the park on the lines suggested in the accompanying plan. I would therefore recommend that this matter be referred to the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, with a request for a report as to the merits of the project and as to the proper boundaries for such a park; also as to the possibility of establishing a connection between this park and others in the Borough of Brooklyn.

It will be noticed that the proposed park approaches very nearly the plant of the Flatbush Water Works Company. I see no reason why it should not include this plant, as it is not unlikely that it will be acquired by the City at some time in the future, and the supply could be no more effectually protected than by including it in a park reservation.

Olmsted Brothers, landscape architects, have recently prepared for the New York City Improvement Commission a report upon a park system for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. They have made a careful study of the topography of both boroughs, and I believe they could make some very valuable suggestions in connection with the plan under discussion.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted an undated petition, signed by two property owners, requesting the discontinuance of the proceedings for opening Butler street, between Flatbush avenue and Bedford avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn.



Proceedings to acquire title to Butler street, between Flatbush and Nostrand avenues, were authorized by the Board of Public Improvements on June 14, 1899, and the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on April 10, 1900. The original Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment presented their report to the Court, but it was returned for revision, and new Commissioners were appointed, filing their oaths on April 28, 1904. Title to that portion of the street between Bedford and Rogers avenues was vested in the City on October 28, 1904, for the purpose of constructing a sewer. In the new report which has been prepared, substantial awards are made for every parcel taken in the block between Bedford and Flatbush avenues, the same including \$2,000 for a barn and some chicken houses. Under a recent opinion of the Corporation Counsel, the limits named in the opening proceeding cannot be changed unless such amendment has first been approved by the Local Board, and since title to a portion of the street has been vested in the City, the entire proceeding cannot be discontinued.

I see no reason why the proceeding should be discontinued through the block named by the petitioners, unless it is proposed to remove the street from the map of the City, and such removal does not appear possible, since the street is the northerly terminal of East Twenty-second street.

I would recommend that the petition be denied.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Under date of September 15, 1905, the President of the Borough of The Bronx has advised the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that at a joint meeting of the Local Boards of the Morrisania and Chester Districts held on September 7, 1905, recommendation was made that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment amend the proceedings for acquiring title to East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street, from the Bronx river to Seventh avenue, so as to place upon the City at large the cost of acquiring title to that portion of the street which would form part of the approach to the bridge which it is proposed to build across the Bronx river and the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad.

The proceedings to open this part of East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street were authorized by the Board of Public Improvements on May 15, 1901, while the easterly portion of the street between Seventh avenue and the Hutchinson river is covered by opening proceedings instituted by the present Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 22 last. The resolution of the Board of Public Improvements provided that the entire expense of the proceeding should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited, while the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment applying to the easterly end of the street provided that 13 per cent. of the expense should be borne by the City at large, the street being 100 feet in width. On December 23, 1904, the Board adopted a plan laying out as a bridge approach that part of East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street, between the easterly side of Second street and Webster avenue, and changing the grade of Webster avenue in order that an easy connection might be made between the latter street and the bridge across the New York and Harlem Railroad tracks and the Bronx river. The designation of this part of East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street as a bridge approach is the excuse for requesting the Board to assume the entire expense of acquiring this portion of the street. In another communication addressed to the Board at the same time it is recommended that proceedings be instituted for acquiring the land necessary for this bridge and its approaches between the Bronx river and Webster avenue, this part of the street lying in the Morrisania District, while the remainder of the street is in the Chester District. I know of no way in which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can exempt from assessment several blocks of a street, proceedings to acquire which are in progress, and allow the cost of acquiring the remainder of the street to be assessed in the manner provided in the original resolution. Under the enabling Act passed last year, the Board may amend the resolution of the Board of Public Improvements by assuming for the City at large a certain portion of the expense of the proceeding, but I am uncertain as to its authority to direct the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to relieve the property owners on two or more blocks of this proceeding from any assessment, placing the cost of acquiring that part of the street upon the City at large, while for the remainder of the distance the entire cost is to be assessed.

The Commissioners appointed in such proceedings appear to have absolute and exclusive jurisdiction in determining what property is benefited by any specific improvement, and I can only recommend that the request of the Local Board be referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to whether the Board of Estimate has power to take the action recommended.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On September 7, 1905, the Local Boards of the Morrisania and Chester Districts, Borough of The Bronx, recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that proceedings be initiated for acquiring the land necessary for the bridge and its approaches across the Bronx river and the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad on the line of East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street. The intent of the resolution was that the Board should authorize the acquisition of this land for bridge purposes and without any assessment for benefit.

As explained in a report submitted on this date on a resolution of the Local Boards, also adopted on September 7, it is desired to treat the acquisition of all that part of East Two Hundred and Twenty-second street lying between Webster avenue and the easterly side of Second street as a bridge approach, it having been so laid out on a map approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 23, 1904. I am under the impression that all of the land lying between Webster avenue and the Bronx river is the property of the New York and Harlem Railroad.

In fixing this bridge approach, the grades on Webster avenue were raised so that the bridge might be constructed without interference with the tracks of the said railroad company, both main tracks and side tracks recently laid. The change in the grade of Webster avenue in order to carry out this plan will involve considerable expense, which is assumed to avoid interference with the property of the railroad company, and it would seem equitable that the company should grant the necessary easement to construct a bridge across its property, and that further than this, it should pay half the cost of the structure as was done at East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street.

To institute opening proceedings and take action under the present Railroad Law would be tedious and would involve application to the State Railroad Commission. In an opinion of Acting Corporation Counsel Sterling, which is attached to the resolution, it is pointed out that there is doubt whether or not this crossing is covered by the agreement made between the railroad company and the Park Department in 1888, and he advises that the railroad company be requested to pay a substantial portion of the expense of building this bridge. If they will not agree to do so, he advises that the street be opened in accordance with the regular Charter provisions.

It would seem simpler and more economical to adjust this matter with the railroad company by agreement, if possible. So far as appears in the papers presented, no effort has been made to do so, and it is recommended that the matter be referred to the Comptroller in order that he may confer with the railroad company and see if they will not agree to pay one-half the cost of the structure and to grant the necessary easement to build the same across their property. In the case of their refusal to do so, opening proceedings could then be instituted.

#### WIDENING JEROME AVENUE, THE BRONX.

The following report of the Chief Engineer was presented, and, on motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the matter was referred to him:

SIR—at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on December 15, 1905, a public hearing was given upon a plan changing the map of the City by widening Jerome avenue on its easterly side between Cameron place and East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, Borough of The Bronx.

In the report submitted to the Board on this proposed change, attention was called to the fact that its object was to make the lines of Jerome avenue coincide with the lines of an old street known as Lexington avenue by setting them back from one foot to 1.41 feet. This former Lexington avenue was shown on a map of building lots at Fordham comprising part of the farm of Mr. Charles Berrian, and was filed in Westchester County in 1853. The report called attention to the frequency of requests for changes of this kind in the City map, which, while so trivial as not to be noticeable on the ground, result in destroying the symmetry of the plan, while the only reason for such action is to enable the owners of the abutting property to secure a technical frontage on the street without trouble or expense to themselves. It was suggested that under chapter 1006 of the Laws of 1895, or chapter 379 of the Laws of 1903, the abutting property owner might acquire title to the intervening strip without changing the map, and your Engineer was instructed to confer informally with the Corporation Counsel's office as to the necessity of a change in the map to accomplish what the property owners desire. I have accordingly shown the plan to a member of the staff of the Corporation Counsel's office and explained what it was desired to accomplish, and while I did not secure a formal opinion as to the applicability of the statutes above referred to to meet such a case, I was assured that the owners of the abutting property could undoubtedly accomplish their object without such changes of the City map, and that it was unfair and unreasonable to ask for such a change simply because it might be the easiest and least expensive way for a property owner to secure a technical frontage upon a street when he already had free and unobstructed use of the intervening strip which he might build upon if he pleased at his own risk, or in case he confined his building to the limits of the land actually acquired by him, he would be obliged to keep his building back only a few inches from the street line as laid down on the City map. My attention was further called to the fact that Jerome avenue was laid out as Central avenue, in accordance with chapter 408 of the Laws of 1865 as amended by chapter 568 of the Laws of 1868, by a commission which was given special authority to include so much of the existing roads as they thought best, or to exclude from the street any portions of these old roads. The opinion expressed to me was that such action as was proposed was unnecessary and as a general rule unwise.

In view of these facts it would seem wiser not to approve of the plan which has been submitted.

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on January 28, 1904, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to Norman street, between Wyckoff and Myrtle avenues, in the Second Ward.

This resolution affects the entire length of Norman street as laid out upon the map of the City on November 13, 1903, the same being five blocks, or about 2,400 feet. These streets are included in the tentative map of the Chester District adopted on May 29, 1903, which map fixes their width at 60 feet. The resolution is accompanied by four affidavits, two of which certify that Kinsella avenue, between the limits named, has been in public use for more than nine years for a width of about 50 feet, and that the roadway has been traveled with the full knowledge and consent of the owners of the land. Similar affidavits are presented to show the dedication of Rose street for a width of about 50 feet, the street having been in public use for more than ten years. An examination of the ground shows that the highway in use along the line of Kinsella avenue in the block covered by the resolution is little more than a wagon path, and that in the middle of the block the road is grass grown and practically unused. Three houses have been erected upon the abutting property on one side of the street and four houses on the other. There is no footpath on the westerly side nor on the easterly side through nearly two-thirds of the length.

A narrow wagon path is in use along the line of Rose street, but the abutting property is open and unimproved.

In my judgment, there is an absence of evidence of dedication, and would recommend that the resolution be returned to the President of the Borough so that opening proceedings may be first begun.

The President of the Borough, in reporting back to the Board, has transmitted a copy of the report of the Chief Engineer of the Borough, in which he holds that the limits as described are proper and that the bounds can readily be understood, although he suggests that it might be wise to make the resolution read as follows:

"Johnson avenue, from its most westerly terminus at the land acquired for Spuyten Duyvil parkway to Spuyten Duyvil road near West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street; and the Spuyten Duyvil road, from Johnson avenue near West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street to West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street."

I still believe that the description in the original resolution is vague and indeterminate, and that if such description were literally followed the northerly end of the improvement would be at the intersection of Johnson avenue and West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, while it is evidently intended to fix the northerly end of the improvement at Spuyten Duyvil road and West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street.

Accompanying the resolution was an estimate of the amount of work and the cost, the latter being \$58,000, while the assessed valuation of the property is given at \$245,345.

The Borough President is anxious to have the matter again submitted to the Board, and this is herewith done, although I have had no reason to modify the opinion expressed in the previous report.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on August 3, 1905, initiating proceedings for laying an asphalt block pavement on Morris avenue, between East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth and East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth streets.

Title to Morris avenue has been legally acquired. The street through the block affected by the resolution has been graded, curbed and flagged; water and gas mains have been laid, and the sewer has been authorized. The abutting property is partially improved.

There seems to be no reason why this resolution should not be approved, and such action is recommended, the work to be done comprising the following:

- 1,675 square yards asphalt block pavement.
- 710 linear feet new and old curbing.

The estimated cost of construction is \$4,800, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$81,950.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
