Final map sections 8, 18 and 22 are almost completed.

Final map sections 4, 5, 6 and 318 are in various stages of completion.

Additions were made on Monument Sheets Nos. 10, 36, 140, 55, 154 and 169.

The following monument sheets have been corrected: Nos. 11, 12, 19, 22, 27, 29, 30, 32, 34, 35, 40, 42, 45, 56, 83, 96, 131, 132, 141, 145, 152, 155 and 167.

A tentative map for a portion of the 3d Ward (Flushing, College Point, Whitestone and part of Bayside), generally known as "Flushing tentative map," covering an area of 5,690 acres, was completed, and one print sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

Tentative maps for Rockaway Beach and for Far Rockaway were started.

The Jamaica tentative map was recalled, a portion of the street system altered, and the map transmitted.

The house-numbering map of Richmond Hill was corrected.

A profile of the North Shore Division and one of the Whitestone Branch of the Long Island R. R. were prepared to accompany the Flushing tentative map.

A profile of Thomson ave., from the Long Island R. R. to Van Dam st., was prepared, and also one of Howard st., from Starr st. to Bradley ave.

An index for final sections of the Aqueduct map was made.

Two progress maps for the President's office were prepared and have been kept up to date.

Final Sections Nos. 10, 14, 39, 40 and 67 were made ready for photolithographing, and two proofs of each inspected and corrected.

Final Section No. 35 was corrected and made ready for photolithographing.

The newly established pier and bulkhead lines of Jamaica Bay were plotted on the proper topographical sheets (200 feet to an inch).

A copy of the tentative map of Ridgewood was corrected and sent out for photolithographing.

Computations were made of the street area of Forest Hill Gardens.

Sewer maps for Districts 33A and 40E were compared, to conform to the adopted maps.

The indexing of street names was started and nearly completed for the Flushing tentative map.

A sketch was made of the basins in Rockaway Beach.

Four atlases were corrected and have been kept up to date.

The preparation of reports upon petitions to legally open and improve various streets, avenues and roads, as well as reports containing histories of old improvements. Examining deeds, ceding streets to the City.

Repairing and mounting old filed maps, for refiling.

The following is a summary of the work done by the office force:

The making of blueprints for various layouts, alteration maps, profiles, damage maps, etc., 1,496; tracing, indexing and filing copies of filed maps traced at the County Clerk's office in Jamaica (area, 1,520 acres), 23; reports on legal openings and legal status of streets, 194; miscellaneous reports, 60; examination of deeds of cession, 80; physical inspections made, 52; area of monument traverses adjusted (acres), 280; area of block dimensions computed (acres), 520; linear feet of monument traverses adjusted, 40,000; linear feet of street locations computed, 119,300; linear feet of general traverses adjusted, 273,600; linear feet involved in alterations, 101,900.

Lines of following streets established: South st., linear feet, 10,100; Pacific st., linear feet, 11,200; Beaver st., linear feet, 2,750; compared final maps Nos. 16 and 18, 2; compared 80-foot monument sheets, 4.

Map of bulkhead line in East River and Newtown Creek well under way.

Plotting center line elevations on 80-foot sheets and 200 foot tracings, 125 miles; the street layouts compiled from filed maps and location surveys on 80-foot and 200-foot sheets and 200-foot tracings, 1,957 acres; topography from the plane table sheets transferred to the 80-foot and 200-foot sheets and 200-foot tracings, 3,186.

Work upon the map of Queens Borough, 800 feet to the inch (unfinished as

yet): topography traced, 46,550 acres; street systems transferred from tentative and filed maps, 30,000 acres.

A general plan of a contemplated connection by open-cut and tunnel (canal), between Flushing and Jamaica Bays, was designed, and approximate quantities and cost figured.

The office work included preparation of payrolls and all work in connection with financial and clerical matters of the Bureau.

In conclusion, I would call your attention to the following extract from the report of this bureau for the third quarter, to wit:

"This Bureau has in previous years and up to the present time conducted an investigation of old town and village records, and has found much information in these records of considerable value to the taxpayers in the way of proving title and dedication to old streets, avenues and roads. It is at present engaged in a search of the records of Long Island City.

"It is important to a property-holder bordering upon an old street to ascertain its status. If the public has title or easement he is enabled to escape expensive street opening proceedings, and we have been able to show unquestionably that many streets of the Borough have been on the ground as public highways, and have been improved as such by the municipal authorities, prior to consolidation.

"The records of the Town Clerks of Newtown, Flushing and Jamaica have all been searched, and everything to do with the acquirement of the roads or their improvement has been ascertained, as far as noted in these records. The same is true in regard to the Villages of Rockaway Beach and Arverne-by-the-Sea, which had to be searched for special reports; but in the cases of the Villages of Far Rockaway, Jamaica, Richmond Hill, Flushing, College Point and Whitestone, which are more voluminous and very important, very little has been done, and questions in regard to the improvement of highways, or their legal status, are constantly arising. It would greatly facilitate the improvement of old streets in these old villages if this information were at hand. Within the past three months many reports have been made for submission to the Corporation Counsel, and facts contained therein have gone far towards establishing dedication, and thus relieving property-owners from a street opening assessment. One instance is that of 51st street (Central avenue), between Shell road and Corona avenue. This proceeding would have cost the property-owners abutting thereon a large sum of money, which they have been saved by the initiative of this Bureau.

"In our last application for a 'Schedule of Employe' it was stated that a number of additional men were required to prosecute this work; the application was denied, and in consequence the work referred to is almost at a standstill."

The urgent needs of this Bureau for a further investigation of these old records and compilation of data therefrom, relevant and important to this division of the work, has in nowise decreased, and requests for reports on dedication of streets in various parts of the Borough continue to reach us. This work, however, remains at a standstill for the reasons above noted.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in

the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furtings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

##### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
