

Meat Seizures at Washington Market.

The weekly report of seizure of unwholesome meat at Washington Market was received and ordered on file.

Whereas, The protection of the public health has necessitated an extensive system of disinfection

during the present season; and
Whereas, The appropriation for this purpose is so nearly exhausted that the work must cease at
the end of the present week unless some provision be made to meet the additional expense; and
Whereas, Disinfection during the month of August is as important as during the previous month;

whereas, Disniection during the month of August is as important as during the previous month, therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to transfer from the unexpended balance of the appropriation of 1876 for small-pox, the sum of \$3,000, to be used for disinfection during the month of August.

Resolved, That the report of the Sanitary Committee on the condition of Harlem Fats be and is hereby approved and adopted; and that a copy be forwarded the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, in compliance with resolution of the 19th instant.

Resolved, That the Board of Police be and is hereby respectfully requested to detail a police officer to accompany each of the four parties of Fruit Inspectors now on duty inspecting and condemning fruit unripe or unfit for use.

Resolved, That Jacob D. Conover be and is hereby appointed an Assistant Sanitary Inspector, to fill a vacancy on the Vaccinating Corps, with salary at the rate of \$1,200 per annum.

Resolved, That Order 3035 on premises 21 Pell street be and is hereby extended to August 10,

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,622, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 625 tenement-houses, 186 private dwellings, 43 other dwellings, 5 other buildings, 17 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 30 slaughter-houses, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 3 milk inspections, 1 dumping ground, 16 sunken and vacant lots, 1 coal-yard, 1 public sewer, 2 piggeries, 80 yards, courts, and areas, 63 cellars and basements, 138 waste-pipes and drains, 187 privies and water-closets, 80 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 3 piers and docks, 2 street railroad cars, 1 oil refinery, 9 schools, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 4 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 26 other nuisances, and 20 violations of the Code.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 720.

During the past week 211 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 81 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

173 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 39 premises where contagious and infectious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 39 houses, 39 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bed-

ding, etc.
The Special Corps have disinfected 2,390 privies and water-closets, 117 cellars, 404 yards, courts, and areas, 7 lots, 1 pond, 157 garbage-boxes, and 112½ miles of street gutters.

The Special Corps of Visiting Physicians have visited 7,232 houses, 36,435 families, prescribed for 1,527 children, and distributed 1,797 excursion tickets. They have also revisited all cases previously under treatment that needed such attention, and distributed large numbers of "health circulars," together with appropriate advice.

During the week ending July 28, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 717 burial permits for city deaths, 36 for bodies in transitu, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 717 deaths, 87 marriages, 500 births, 48 still-births, 36 applications for transit permits, and 71 returns from coroners. There were 23 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of marriage record, and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau.

On report of the Committee on Repairs and Supplies, it was
Resolved, That Dr. H. Paine, Superintendent, be granted permission to connect Roosevelt Hospital by telegraph with the Twenty-second Precinct Station-house, under the direction of the Superintendent of Telegraph, provided the expense of the work be borne by said hospital.

Whereas, The Court of Appeals, in deciding the case of one Gibney, has recently defined and explained the law relating to Excise, and the Counsel to the Corporation has rendered an opinion as to the effect of such decision on the powers and duties of the Police concerning the sale of intoxicating liquors; now, on the report of the Counsel to the Board, be it

Resolved, That under the statutes of this State the following acts are misdemeanors, viz.:

To sell any strong or spirituous liquors or wines in quantities less than five gallons at a time, without having a license therefor;

To sell any strong or spirituous liquors or wines, to be drunk on the premises of the seller, without having obtained a license therefor, as an inn, tavern or hotel-keeper;

To expose for sale, or sell, give away or dispose of any strong or spirituous liquors, wines, ale or beer, on any day between the hours of one and five o'clock in the morning;

To sell or give away intoxicating liquors (including malt liquors) or wines on Sundays or election days;

And that it is the duty of every member of the Police Force, immediately, and without warrant, to arrest and take into custody any and all persons committing any of the above-mentioned offenses in the presence of such member of the Police Force.

Resolved, That licenses duly granted by the Commissioners of Excise to other than those who propose to keep an inn, tavern, or hotel for the sale of ale or beer to be drunk on the premises, are valid and to be respected.

Street Cleaning.

They are also requested to present the statement of their claims at the earliest possible day, as the Board of Assessors are engaged in the consideration of all questions of damage now before them, previous to a final adjustment and settlement of the same.
