195 promenade floor beams have been erected, and 158 put in place for erection; 42 posts have been erected, and 24 put in place ready for erection; 54 intermediate chords have been erected, and 27 have been put ready for erection: 26 and 37 have been put ready for erection; 26 promenade diagonals have been erected; 22 top chords have been placed ready for erection; 12 intermediate floor beams, and 2 under-floor diagonals, and 16 over-floor stays, have been erected

and put in place. Work on the Brooklyn Approach has been conwork on the Brooklyn Approach has been con-fined mostly to the foundations for the station building; and on the New York Approach, to the paving, which is proceeding satisfactorily, and to the foundations of the station building.

R for the government and proper care of piers, bulk-heads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.
The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regula-tion, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalues thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both

by both.

No. 1—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant, No. 2—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or
