

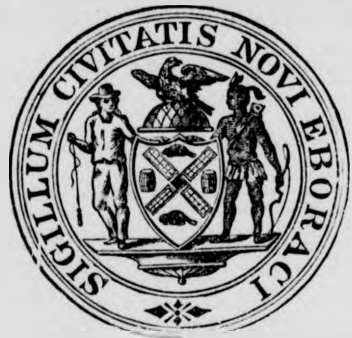

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,
NEW YORK, November 16, 1875.

The Board of Health met this day.

289 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 95 cases.

Resolutions.

That the Sanitary Superintendent report to the Attorney and Counsel, all manufacturing establishments, the chimneys of which are not so arranged as to prevent the smoke therefrom being a nuisance to their neighborhood.

That notice is hereby given of an amendment to section 100 of the Sanitary Code, to the effect that, manure shall not be carried across the sidewalks between the hours of 10 A. M. to 6 P. M., at any season of the year.

That the Registrar of Records be authorized and directed to issue a permit to the Congregation Schar Hashomaine to remove bodies from burying grounds in Eighty-ninth street, between Fifth and Madison avenues, to Cyprus Hill Cemetery.

That the communication of the Inspector of Vaccination to the Sanitary Superintendent, on vaccination of children attending public schools, be approved by this Board, and a copy thereof be forwarded to the Board of Education.

That the suit against Dr. G. R. Morse be discontinued, the Sanitary Committee having exonerated him from all blame, and justified his action in the case of Mrs. Connolly.

That the Secretary be directed to request the presidents of city railroad and stage companies to meet the Board of Health at No. 301 Mott street, on November 23, at 1 o'clock P. M., as the Board will then consider an ordinance in respect to the removal and disposal of manure.

That Dr. Guy Day be retained as Assistant Resident Physician at the Riverside Hospital, without pay.

That the hearing of scavengers be adjourned to November 30, 1875, at 1 o'clock P. M.
That the Sanitary Superintendent cause an investigation as to the cases of malaria referred to by the Register of Records in his communication of this date.

That after the 30th day of November, 1875, no permits shall be granted to empty privies in the city, except in strict accordance with the provisions of the Sanitary Code.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 13, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,478, as follows: 704 tenement houses, 141 private dwellings, 48 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 59 stables, 42 slaughter-houses, 1 market, 1 cemetery, 7 fat-rendering establishments, 1 stock yard, 1 dangerous building, 10 sunken and vacant lots, 39 yards, courts, and areas, 76 cellars and basements, 52 waste-pipes and drains, 120 privies and water-closets, 71 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 3 cisterns and cess-pools, 4 piggeries, 3 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 8 other nuisances, together with 65 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious and infectious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 504. During the past week 59 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

38 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

104 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 31 dwellings where contagious diseases were found.

Have disinfected and fumigated 39 houses, 39 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

32 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending November 13, 1875: Typhoid fever, 13; scarlet fever, 18; cerebro-spinal meningitis 4; measles, 5; diphtheria, 8; and small-pox, 34.

1,804 cans and 16 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending November 13, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending November 13, 1875: Calves (bob), 8 carcasses; calves (case), 2 carcasses; sheep, 6 carcasses; lambs, 1 carcass; poultry, 120 pounds; and fish, 150 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending November 13, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 486 burial permits for city deaths, 28 for bodies in transit, and 34 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 486 deaths, 167 marriages, 478 births, 34 still-births, 28 applications for transit permits, and 48 returns from Coroners. There were 19 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage and 14 of death were issued from this Bureau. One case of death was referred to Coroners.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution and adopt the said Estimate.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, requiring a concurrent vote to make a Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment herewith transmit to your Honorable Body the Provisional Estimate made by the said Board for the year 1876, with the following reasons for it in detail:

1. THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The Departmental Estimate for 1876 is \$114,500, upon which amount a reduction has been made in the Provisional Estimate of \$5,000 in the item of "Salaries—Clerks and Officers of the Board of Aldermen," from \$20,000 to \$15,000.

The Departmental Estimate has been reduced in this item for the reason that the amount of \$15,000 is considered by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be fully sufficient for the purpose.

2. THE MAYORALTY.

The Departmental Estimate for 1876 is \$42,000 for the Mayor's office proper, and \$17,000 for the Bureau of Permits, upon which amounts a total reduction of \$9,500 has been made upon the following items:

These reductions in the amounts called for by the Departmental Estimate have been made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the concurrence of the Mayor, one of the members of the Board, for the reason that the amounts of the appropriations made in the Provisional Estimate are considered sufficient for the several purposes.

3. THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

The total amount of appropriations allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the Provisional Estimate for 1876, is \$255,000, or \$25,000 less than was appropriated for the Finance Department for 1875.

4. THE LAW DEPARTMENT.

The Departmental Estimate is reduced \$32,850, upon the following items:

This addition makes the total amount of appropriations to the Law Department in the Provisional Estimate \$22,850 less than that of the Departmental Estimate.

In the communication of the Department of Public Works accompanying the Departmental Estimate, it was also proposed that the sum of \$500,000, the whole amount authorized by law to be expended for the repaving of streets, avenues, and public places in one year, should be appropriated for that purpose in 1876, but the appropriation is fixed at \$100,000.

6. THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

The reductions on the Departmental Estimate amount to \$415,160, upon the following items:

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered it advisable to limit the appropriations to be provided for from taxes to an amount deemed sufficient for the ordinary expenses of the Department of Public Parks, without detriment to the public interest, omitting appropriations for such expenditures as may be dispensed with at the present time. For these reasons the reductions have been made upon the estimate of this Department.

7. THE DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

Under this head the Departmental Estimate is reduced \$10,000, upon the following items:

The efficiency of the Public Schools is in no respect impaired by the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as the amounts appropriated for salaries of Professors and Teachers, and for supplies and incidental expenses, agree with those of the Departmental Estimate for the same purposes, while reductions are made only in such items as are deemed adequately provided for by the appropriations made for them.

14. THE COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The sum of \$150,000 is appropriated for this purpose in conformity with the provisions of the law.

15. ADVERTISING, PRINTING, STATIONERY, AND BLANK BOOKS.

The Departmental Estimate is reduced \$4,300 upon the following items:

These reductions on the CITY RECORD are made for the reason that the amounts appropriated are deemed ample and sufficient. The appropriations are the same for 1876 as for 1875 for "Advertising," and "Printing, Stationery, and Blank Books—For all printing, stationery, and blank books required by the Common Council, the Departments and offices of the City Government, except printing the CITY RECORD." For the latter purpose the sum of \$150,000 was asked for by the Department of Public Works, but the amount appropriate, \$137,500, is deemed sufficient by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

16. THE JUDICIARY.

The expenses of the Police and District Courts are considered excessive, but in view of decisions made under existing laws, authorizing their organization and salaries, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have been limited in their action by reductions amounting to \$6,500, only, on the Estimates for the Police Courts.

The total amount of the Departmental Estimates for the several Courts, exclusive of the Police and District Courts, including \$12,000 for an additional City Judge, and \$5,000 for Judges from other Districts, is \$929,945, upon which sum reductions have been made, amounting in all to \$80,370, as follows, to wit:

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment consider the amounts appropriated for the several courts and offices of the Judiciary fully sufficient for their several purposes, and that the reductions above named are just and reasonable.

17. MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES.

The amount asked for by the Board of Coroners is \$80,000, upon which a reduction is made of \$5,000, the amount appropriated being deemed ample for the purpose.

The District Attorney in his estimate asks for the sum of \$12,750 for contingencies, which amount is reduced to \$7,750, as adequate for the purpose.

The amount of \$12,000 is appropriated for the Commissioners of Accounts, as sufficient for the purpose, being a reduction of \$4,000 for clerk hire on the amount asked for.

The amount asked for the Support and Maintenance of Prisoners in the County Jail is \$17,500; the amount appropriated for this purpose, which is considered sufficient, is \$12,500.

The amount asked for by the Sheriff for Fees, is \$75,000; the amount appropriated for this purpose is \$25,000, which is deemed sufficient.

18. STATE TAXES, INTEREST AND REDEMPTION OF CITY DEBT.

The appropriations for State Taxes, Interest on City Debt, and Redemption of the Debt maturing in the year 1876, including debt of the annexed territory of Westchester County, have been fixed according to the requirements of law. The amount of \$1,436,525, Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments, payable July 1, 1876, were stricken out of the Departmental Estimate.

19. ASYLUMS, REFORMATORIES AND CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

The amounts appropriated for the various Asylums, Reformatories and Charitable Institutions are fixed in accordance with the requirements of law, which in some cases are for specific amounts, and in others a *per capita* allowance upon the estimated numbers in these institutions during the ensuing year.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending November 13, 1875.

The following reduction was made in the maintenance force:

Three painters and one skilled laborer in painters' gang; two watchmen on Morningside Park; four watchmen on Riverside Park.

It was directed that two coils of steam pipe be put up in the large room at Mount St. Vincent, to keep the plants which are to remain there during the winter from freezing.

Permission was given to Mr. Edward Gustavson on behalf of the owners of property on One Hundred and Forty-third street, between Third avenue and College avenue, to lay at their own expense a 12-inch cement sewer in One Hundred and Forty-third street, from a point 75 feet distant from Third avenue to the sewer in College avenue, the plans for the same to be first approved by the Department.

A communication was received from the Directors of the New York Elevated Railroad Company, intimating their purpose of continuing their railroad through the Battery Park to connect with the ferries, and as requested by Directors, the Commissioners had an interview with them in reference to the subject.

Under the authority of ordinances of the Common Council, the work of flagging the sidewalks on the following avenues was directed to be proceeded with, and as a preliminary step, the Engineer was ordered to prepare the specifications:

1. West side of Marion avenue, from Kingsbridge road to Ridge street.

2. West side of Berrian avenue, from Kingsbridge road to Isaac street.

The under-mentioned persons were appointed inspectors, at \$3.50 per day, on the work of paving Third avenue, from Westchester avenue to the northern boundary of Twenty-third Ward:
