GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held December 23, 1897, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Comptroller to issue bonds, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 194 of the Laws of 1896, to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars, for the purpose of defraying the expense of constructing driveways and paths in the Botanical Garden grounds, north and east of the Boulevard in Bronx park, as determined upon by the Board of Parks at its meeting held December 13, 1897.

On account of the late date when this resolution was adopted, no contract for this purpose was entered into by the Board of Parks before the expiration of the year 1897.

For this reason, when the resolution of this Board was adopted reauthorizing the issue of bonds previously authorized for the purpose of meeting obligations entered into by the former City of New York, this item of fifteen thousand dollars was not included. All the bonds authorized to be issued by chapter 194 of the Laws of 1896 were actually issued prior to January 1, 1898, and this Board might authorize the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars for this purpose without the concurrence of the Municipal Assembly, since there would be less than one hundred thousand dollars issued under the authority of this law in any one year.

In view of the fact that contracts have been entered into by the city for the construction of new buildings for the Botanical Museum, which buildings will be completed before long, it is very desirable that the grounds surrounding these buildings should be put in such shape as to afford ready access thereto by the public. This improvement is greatly desired by the Board of Parks and by the Trustees of the Botanical Garden, and I therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution.

NEW YORK, December 28, 1898.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—We herewith present to you for your consideration the following matters concerning the clerical force in the office of the Coroners for the Borough of The Bronx, for 1899: We are advised that we have been allowed for the year 1899 two clerks, to be known as "Special Clerks." In our opinion, we think that one of said clerks should be known as "Property Clerk," and the other as "Replevin Clerk," both of which clerks should be required to give bonds for the faithful discharge of their duties. This would enable us to select the proper men, residing in this borough who, in our opinion, are fully qualified to perform these services. In addition to this personal privilege, which would thus be afforded us, of selecting the proper men ourselves, our office and the city would at the same time be protected by bonds to be given by said clerks as aforesaid.

To illustrate this point, we desire to call your attention to the fact that during the year 1898 we were allowed the sum of \$1,200 by your Honorable Board for a Night Clerk. No bond was given by this clerk, and none was required, nor have we been able to secure the proper man, possessing the necessary qualifications, through the Civil Service Board. After we had been in office a few months we discovered that a great deal of personal property in the way of jewelry, money, papers and other valuables, were turned into this office day and night, for safe keeping, the same having been found upon deceased persons, concerning whose deaths the machinery of this office was put in operation. So unsatisfactory was this night service performed that, out of the amount of \$1,200 allowed as aforesaid for a Night Clerk for 1898, we have expended for such service only \$172.96, leaving to the credit of Night Clerk service the unexpended balance of \$1,027.04, and this office is now and has been for many months minus any separate Night Clerk.

We do not desire you to infer that night service at this office has been neglected, but, on the contrary, such service has been performed by ourselves and by our day clerk, without any extra compensation, much to our serious inconvenience, solely in order that this part of the service should be faithfully performed. We therefore repeat that the two "Special Clerks," so-called, which your Board has considerably agreed to allow us for 1899 be, under the circumstances, designated as "Property Clerk" and "Replevin Clerk," with bonds as above indicated, which clerks, in addition to their regular duties, shall, between them, by assignment by us, properly perform night service at this office without any added compensation beyond that fixed by your Honorable Board.

Mumm and others, as set forth in the communication from the President of the Borough under date of November 28, 1898.

I respectfully report that during rain storms the surface water which comes down Fifty-fifth, Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh streets from Third avenue in considerable volume, ponds at Fifty-fifth street and First avenue on the westerly side of intersection; that a gully has been cut through below First avenue and the buildings shown on sketch are being undermined.

In order to relieve this condition, five street basins should be built to connect with existing sewers and at the places designated upon the plan. The estimated cost of the improvement, and the assessed valuation of the property benefited, is as follows:
