"This Commission derives its existence and powers from chapter 537 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by chapter 567 of the Laws of 1894, which was amended by chapter 205 of the Laws of 1898. Jurisdiction is conferred upon this Commission to determine certain claims for damages suffered by reason of changes of certain street grades in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, Borough of The Bronx.

"Nine hundred and ninety claims have been presented to the Commission, in which the aggregate amount claimed exceeds \$4,000,000.

"During the year ending December 31, 1898, this Commission made awards in forty-three cases, amounting in all to the sum of \$122,125.



"In addition to these forty-three cases, judgments of dismissal were entered in four claims, making a total of forty-seven claims determined during the year.

"A number of other claims were tried during the year, but were not decided.

"On January 12, 1898, Commissioner George W. Stephens was removed from office by Hon. Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor of The City of New York, and Commissioner William E. Stillings was appointed as a Commissioner of Appraisal in place and stead of Commissioner Stephens, by his Honor the Mayor.
