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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room 16, City Hall, on Tuesday, December 1, 1903, at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. Seth Low, presided.

CHANGE OF GRADE OF RIVERSIDE DRIVE EXTENSION, MANHATTAN.

The following resolution of the Local Board of Washington Heights and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

In the Local Board of the Washington Heights District.

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the "City Record" that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, By the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, that the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

That the map or plan of The City of New York be changed by altering the grades of Riverside drive extension between West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, and that the grades of the abutting streets be altered to suit the grades of Riverside drive extension in accordance with the accompanying plan and profile; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Adopted by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District on the 30th day of June, 1903, all the members present voting in favor thereof.

REPORT NO. 1532.

October 6, 1903.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—There have been received from the President of the Borough of Manhattan plans providing for changing the grades of the Riverside drive extension, between West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, together with such modification of the grades of the intersecting streets as are necessary in order that they may connect with the Riverside drive. These plans are accompanied by a resolution of the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, adopted on June 30, 1903, and a technical description of the grades for a public hearing.

When the extension of the Riverside drive was laid out, and grades established therefor, no attempt was made to adjust the grades of the intersecting streets, which were left as originally laid down, the result being that no connection was possible between these streets and the new driveway. The old grades were very steep, as there

was a great elevation to be overcome between the river front and Broadway. The grades now submitted provide that West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and West One Hundred and Fifty-first street shall pass under the Riverside drive, while connections are made by means of ramps with the new drive at West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street.

Inasmuch as the space between the driveway and the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company is to be devoted to park purposes and the streets cut off, the new grades are much lighter than the old ones. It is important that the grades be definitely established, so that future improvements may be made to conform with them, and the approval of the plan submitted by the Borough President is recommended; a technical description for a public hearing is herewith submitted.

Beginning at a point in the northerly line of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, distant 630 feet westerly from the westerly line of Broadway; thence in a northerly direction distance 471.51 feet to a point in the southerly line of West One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, distant 525 feet westerly from Broadway; thence northerly and in a curved line to the left, radius 534.90 feet, distance 186.68 feet; thence northerly and tangent to the last curve, distance 506.65 feet; thence northerly and in a curved line to the right, radius 1,218.97 feet, distance 151.66 feet to a point in the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fortieth street distant 588 feet west from Broadway; thence northerly and tangent to the last curve distance 259.83 feet to a point in the northerly line of West One Hundred and Forty-first street produced westerly distant 588 feet westerly from Broadway; thence northeasterly and curving to the right, radius 297.89 feet, distance 216.43 feet to point of reversed curve distant 512.78 feet from Broadway and parallel to West One Hundred and Forty-second street and distant 1.95 feet southerly therefrom; thence northerly and in a reversed curve to the left, radius 484.44 feet, distance 2.61 feet to the southerly line of West One Hundred and Forty-second street distant 511.05 feet westerly from Broadway; thence still northerly and in the same reversed curve to the left distance 328.28 feet, making the total length of curve 330.89 feet; thence northerly and tangent to the last curve distance 481.17 feet to a point in the southerly line of West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street distant 370 feet westerly from Broadway; thence northeasterly and curving to the right, radius 729.71 feet, distance 210.87 feet; thence northerly and in a reversed curve to the left, radius 470 feet, distance 156.25 feet to a point in the northerly line of West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street distant 305 feet westerly from Broadway; thence northerly and tangent to last curve and parallel to Broadway distance 459.66 feet to the southerly line of West One Hundred and Forty-eighth street; thence northerly and curving to the left, radius 1,834.10 feet, distance 503.10 feet; thence northerly and tangent to the last curve distance 528.28 feet; thence northerly and in a curved line to the left, radius 371.61 feet, distance 223.46 feet.

DESCRIPTION OF THE GRADES.

Note—All elevations are above city datum.

Riverside Drive Extension.

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of the Riverside drive extension and the northerly line of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, elevation 75 feet.

First. Thence northerly along said easterly line of the drive to the centre line of West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, distance 763.334 feet, elevation 57 feet.

Second. Thence northerly along said easterly line of the drive to the centre line of West One Hundred and Fortieth street, distance 523.156 feet, elevation 49 feet.

Third. Thence northerly along said easterly line of the drive to the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-second street, distance 547.50 feet, elevation 55 feet.

Fourth. Thence northerly along said easterly line of the drive to the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, distance 820.978 feet, elevation 80 feet.

Fifth. Thence northerly along said easterly line of the drive to the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-first street, distance 1604.559 feet, elevation 73 feet.

Sixth. Thence northerly along said easterly line of the drive to the end of the curve distant 120.53 feet northerly from the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, distance 426.923 feet, elevation 63.76 feet.

West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street and the westerly line of Broadway, elevation 88.81 feet; thence westerly along the centre line of West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street to the easterly line of Riverside drive, distance 577.50 feet, elevation 69.44 feet.

Note—The grade of West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street was fixed and established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 10th day of July, 1902.

West One Hundred and Thirty-seventh Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and the westerly line of Broadway, elevation 92.41 feet; thence westerly along the centre line of West One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street to the easterly line of Riverside drive extension, distance 519.04 feet, elevation 63.16 feet.

West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street.

The grade of West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Broadway to Twelfth avenue, to be as filed by the Board of Commissioners of the Central Park on the 6th day of March, 1868.

Note—The drive crosses by a bridge at an elevation of 57 feet above city datum.

West One Hundred and Thirty-ninth Street.

West One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street does not connect with the drive.

West One Hundred and Fortieth Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Fortieth street distant 375 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 70 feet; thence westerly along the said centre line for new grade, distance 212.63 feet, to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 49 feet.

West One Hundred and Forty-first Street.

West One Hundred and Forty-first street does not connect with the drive.

West One Hundred and Forty-second Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-second street distant 392.12 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 55.78 feet; thence westerly along the said centre line for the new grade, distance 94.61 feet, to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 55 feet.

West One Hundred and Forty-third Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-third street distant 330.97 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 64.06 feet; thence westerly along the said centre line for the new grade, distance 60.42 feet, to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 63.55 feet.

West One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-fourth street distant 271.44 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 72.37 feet; thence westerly along the said centre line for the new grade, distance 108.56 feet, to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 71.47 feet.

West One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street.

The centre line grade for West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from Broadway to Twelfth avenue, to be as filed by the Board of Commissioners of the Central Park on the 6th day of March, 1868. The drive crosses by a bridge at an elevation of 80 feet above City datum. The approaches from West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street to the drive on the north and south sides of the street to be as follows:

Beginning at points on the northerly and southerly sides of the street distant 209.14 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 81.31 feet; thence westerly to the easterly line of the drive. For the northerly line of the street, distance 149.56 feet, elevation 79.78 feet. For southerly line of the street, distance 160.86 feet, elevation 78.47 feet.

West One Hundred and Forty-sixth Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street distant 234.08 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 79.35 feet; thence westerly along the said centre line for the new grade, distance 71.87 feet, to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 78.75 feet.

West One Hundred and Forty-seventh Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-seventh street distant 252.92 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 78.05 feet; thence westerly along said centre line for new grade, distance 52.08 feet, to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 77.61 feet.

West One Hundred and Forty-eighth Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-eighth street distant 225.70 feet from Broadway, elevation 77.14 feet; thence westerly along said centre line for new grade, distance 79.55 feet to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 76.48 feet.

West One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Forty-ninth street distant 270.02 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 75.82 feet; thence westerly along said centre line for new grade, distance 58.03 feet to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 75.34 feet.

West One Hundred and Fiftieth Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Fiftieth street distant 275.49 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 75.11 feet; thence westerly along said centre line for new grade, distance 112.95 feet to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 74.18 feet.

West One Hundred and Fifty-first Street.

The grade of West One Hundred and Fifty-first street, from Broadway to Twelfth avenue, to be as filed by the Board of Commissioners of Central Park on the 6th day of March, 1868.

Note—The drive crosses by a bridge at an elevation of 73.00 feet above City datum.

West One Hundred and Fifty-second Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street distant 527.64 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 67.22 feet; thence westerly along said centre line for new grade, distance 13.60 feet to the easterly line of the drive, elevation 67.11 feet.

The said streets and their grades are found in section 7, Blocks 2002, 2086, 2087, 2088, 2089, 2090, 2091, 2092, 2093, 2094, 2095, 2096, 2097, 2098 and 2099 of the Land Map of the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Manhattan cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established streets, roads, squares, or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

REPORT No. 1533.

October 6, 1903.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The President of the Borough of Manhattan has submitted plans showing a change of grade for the extension of Riverside drive, between West One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Boulevard Lafayette, together with such changes in the grades of the intersecting streets as are necessary in order to permit them to connect directly with the new driveway. The plan is accompanied by a resolution of the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, adopted on June 30, 1903, approving of the said plan.

A report has been submitted on this date on a similar set of plans and resolution providing for the adjustment of the grades between West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and West One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, which, in conjunction with the plan now presented, provides for the entire length of the Riverside drive extension.

As was explained in the report upon the other resolution, when the plans for the extension of Riverside drive were made and approved, no provision was made for connecting the intersecting streets with the new driveway, and the object of the present plans is to correct this oversight. It had been hoped that it would be possible to change the location of the driveway where it crosses Trinity Cemetery, keeping it further up the hill and greatly improving its alignment; it has been found impossible to make the change, however desirable it might be, and the plans adjusting the grades are herewith submitted with the recommendation that they be approved. A technical description accompanies the resolution.

Beginning at a point in the first curve north of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street distant 120.53 feet, as measured along said curve, the location of said point being 90.734 feet north of northerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street and 636.368 feet westerly from Broadway.

1. Thence northerly and still curving to the left on the arc of a circle whose centre is 104.647 feet southerly from the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street and 874.384 feet westerly from Broadway, radius 371.61 feet, distance 72.495 feet.

2. Thence in a reversed curve to the right, radius 300 feet, distance 146.639 feet to the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-third street distant 802.976 feet westerly from Broadway; thence still continuing in the same curve distance 88.980 feet (the total length of curve being 235.619 feet).

3. Thence northerly and tangent to last curve distance 377.08 feet.

4. Thence in a curved line to the right, radius 115.011 feet, distance 101.908 feet to the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street at a point distant 930.874 feet westerly from Broadway; thence still continuing in the same curve distance 111.566 feet (the total length of curve being 213.474 feet) to a point in the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street distance 836 feet westerly from Broadway.

5. Thence easterly along the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street distance 136 feet.

6. Thence northerly and at right angle to West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street distance 49.677 feet to a point in the reversed curve north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

7. Thence northerly and curving to the left and in continuation of the reversed curve from the last curve south of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, whose terminus is a point in the northerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and distant 836 feet westerly from Broadway, radius of said reversed curve is 211 feet, distance 183.646 feet.

8. Thence northerly and tangent to the last curve distance 18.833 feet to centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street; thence still continuing on said tangent distance 101.167 feet, total tangent being 150 feet.

9. Thence in a curved line to the right, radius 53.576 feet, distance 45.312 feet.

10. Thence easterly and tangent to the last curve distance 408.351 feet to the westerly line of Boulevard Lafayette.

11. Thence northerly along said westerly line distance 63.575 feet to the southerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street to a point distant 343.48 feet westerly from Broadway.

Said streets and grades are found in section 7, Blocks 2099-2100 and 2134 of the Land Map of the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

DESCRIPTION OF THE GRADES.

Note—All elevations above City datum.

Riverside Drive Extension.

Beginning at a point in the first curve north of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street distant 120.53 feet as measured along the easterly line of said curve, elevation 63.76 feet.

First—Thence from the easterly line of the radial line to centre of drive, distance 50 feet, elevation 63.76 feet.

Second—Thence northerly along the centre line of drive to a point in the continuation of the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-third street, distance 265.80 feet, elevation 60.00 feet.

Third—Thence northerly along the centre line to the drive to the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, distance 623.25 feet, elevation 60.00 feet.

Fourth—Thence northerly and easterly along the centre line to the easterly line of Boulevard Lafayette, distance 1,030.45 feet, elevation 83.00 feet.

West One Hundred and Fifty-third Street.

Beginning at a point in the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-third street distant 656.04 feet westerly from Broadway, elevation 61.68 feet.

First—Thence westerly along said centre line, distance 146.93 feet to the easterly line of Riverside drive, elevation 60.45 feet.

West One Hundred and Fifty-sixth Street.

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Boulevard Lafayette and the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, elevation 104.38 feet; thence westerly along said centre line, distance 622.64 feet to the easterly line of Riverside drive extension, elevation 68.69 feet.

West One Hundred and Fifty-seventh Street.

Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Boulevard Lafayette and the centre line of West One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, elevation 93.22 feet; thence westerly along the centre line, distance 367.176 feet to the easterly line of Riverside drive extension, elevation 76.866 feet.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Manhattan cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established streets, roads, squares, or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof;

CLOSING WEST THIRTY-SECOND STREET, MANHATTAN.

In the matter of the proposed closing of West Thirty-second street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues and between Eighth and Ninth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, the report of the Secretary was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed closing, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Article II. of the certificate dated October 9, 1902, granted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York to the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, provides and requires that said company shall obtain or receive in due and lawful form the several consents and approvals in said article specified, embracing (under subdivision 3 of said article) the consent and approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the use by said company for terminal facilities, including its station purposes, of the portion of Thirty-second street, in Manhattan Borough, lying between the westerly line of Seventh avenue and the easterly line of Eighth avenue, and of the portion of Thirty-second street lying between the westerly line of Eighth avenue and the easterly line of Ninth avenue, as stated and set forth in said certificate; and

Whereas, Said certificate contemplates and provides for the occupation by the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, with its terminal facilities, of all or any part of the surface or underground of the two portions of Thirty-second street above mentioned, and for the closing thereof, the said Company owning, or having the consent thereof of the owners, of all the property on both sides of said portions of Thirty-second street between Seventh and Ninth avenues; and

Whereas, The Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company has filed with this Board a petition, duly verified, for a change in the map or plan of The City of New York by the closing of the portion of Thirty-second street between the westerly side of Seventh avenue and the easterly side of Eighth avenue, and also by the closing of the portion of said Thirty-second street between the westerly side of Eighth avenue and the easterly side of Ninth avenue, and has, with its said petition, submitted proof of its ownership of all the property on both sides of said portions of Thirty-second street; and

Whereas, This Board has, as required by law, published notice of its proposed action with respect to the granting of said petition, and has given an opportunity for all persons interested in the change of map or plan of The City of New York, as therein prayed for, to be heard at the time and place specified in said notice, said time being not less than ten days after the first publication of said notice; it is now

Resolved, That the prayer of the said petition be and the same is hereby granted, and that the map or plan of The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, be and the same is hereby changed by closing the portion of Thirty-second street lying between the westerly side of Seventh avenue and the easterly side of Eighth avenue, and by closing the portion of Thirty-second street lying between the westerly side of Eighth avenue and the easterly side of Ninth avenue; and further

Resolved, That the consent and approval of this Board be and the same is hereby given to the use by the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company of the portion of Thirty-second street lying between the westerly side of Seventh avenue and the easterly side of Eighth avenue, and the portion of Thirty-second street lying between the westerly side of Eighth avenue and the easterly side of Ninth avenue (which two portions are authorized to be closed by the preceding resolution) for the terminal facilities of said company, including its station purposes, in conformity with and subject to the provisions of the certificate dated October 9, 1902, granted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York to said Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—12.

CHANGE OF GRADES OF STREETS ALONG THE PORT MORRIS BRANCH OF THE NEW YORK AND HARLEM RAILROAD COMPANY.

In the matter of the proposed change of grades of streets crossed by the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and Whitlock avenue, the report of the Secretary was presented, showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed changes, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board held on the 13th day of November, 1903,

resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to change the grades of avenues and streets affected by the change of line and depression of tracks of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and the East river, Twenty-third Ward, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 1st day of December, 1903, at 11 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered to be published in the "City Record" for ten days prior to the 1st day of December, 1903; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the "City Record" for ten days prior to the 1st day of December, 1903; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed change who have appeared, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades of avenues and streets affected by the change of line and depression of tracks of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and the East river, Twenty-third Ward, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor the same, so as to change the grades of the aforesaid streets as follows:

A. Westchester Avenue.

1. The grade at the intersection of Brook avenue to be 13.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.
2. The grade at the intersection of the Port Morris Branch Railroad to be 24.27 feet above mean high-water datum.
3. The grade at the intersection of St. Ann's avenue to be 22.00 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

B. St. Ann's Avenue.

1. The grade at the intersection of St. Ann's avenue with the new line of the Port Morris Branch Railroad to be 26.75 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.
2. The grade at the intersection of East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to be 25 feet above mean high-water datum.
3. The grade at the intersection of East One Hundred and Forty-eighth street to be 16.7 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

C. East One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street.

1. The grade at the intersection of St. Ann's avenue to be 25.0 feet above mean high-water datum.
2. The grade at the intersection with the new line of the Port Morris Branch Railroad to be 26.5 feet above mean high-water datum.
3. The grade at the intersection of Eagle avenue to be 27.25 feet above mean high-water datum.

D. Concord Avenue.

1. The grade at the intersection of East One Hundred and Forty-second street to be 33.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.
2. The grade at the intersection of St. Mary's street and the Port Morris Branch Railroad to be 31.5 feet above mean high-water datum.
3. The grade at the intersection of St. Joseph's street to be 30.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

E. Wales Avenue.

1. The grade at the intersection of East One Hundred and Forty-second street to be 31.5 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.
2. Thence the grade to be uniform to the intersection of St. Mary's street, the elevation of which is 28.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

F. Southern Boulevard.

1. The grade at the northwestern curb intersection of East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street to be 20.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.
2. The grade at the intersection of East One Hundred and Forty-second street to be 25.5 feet above mean high-water datum.
3. The grade at the intersection of the Port Morris Branch Railroad to be 25.5 feet above mean high-water datum.
4. The grade at the intersection of St. Mary's street to be 21.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

G. Whitlock Avenue.

1. The grade at the intersection of the Port Morris Branch Railroad to be 25.5 feet above mean high-water datum.
2. Thence the grade to be uniform to the intersection of St. Joseph's street, the elevation of which is 20.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—12.

In accordance with the proposed changes, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board on the 26th day of June, 1903, approving the maps and profiles of that part of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad lying between the northerly side of Westchester avenue and the terminus of said branch railroad on East river, which were submitted in duplicate to this Board by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company on the 26th day of June, 1903, pursuant to chapter 424 of the Laws of 1903, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—12.

Resolved, That the maps and profiles of that part of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad lying between the northerly side of Westchester avenue and the terminus of said branch railroad on East river, and exhibiting the proposed new route of said branch railroad and the depths at which it will pass under the present and proposed surface of St. Mary's Park, and under Westchester avenue, St. Ann's avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Southern Boulevard, and under all streets and avenues at the grades at which such streets and avenues are now established by law, submitted in duplicate to this Board by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company on the 1st day of Decem-

ber, 1903, pursuant to chapter 424 of the Laws of 1903, which took effect on the 7th day of May, 1903, be and the same hereby are approved.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—12.

OPENING OF WEST ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIFTH STREET, MANHATTAN.

The following report from the Engineer of the Finance Department and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
October 30, 1903.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—I beg to call your attention to the fact that the City has no right of way or access from the land side to certain water-front property owned by it in the neighborhood of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

The City has constructed a crib bulkhead at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and for about 360 feet northerly thereof, and has leased the same, together with the land in the rear to the westerly line of the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for a term of ten years from November 1, 1903.

The lease, however, contains covenants that the lessee shall provide his own right of way to the premises until January 1, 1906, after which the City must do so, or the lessee will have the privilege of canceling the lease, but it was the understanding at the time that the City would take steps necessary to acquire a right of way at once.

I have examined the situation and present herewith a map showing the existing status of streets in the vicinity.

Twelfth avenue was legally opened as far north as West One Hundred and Fifty-third street on July 2, 1869, and has been paved up to the southerly line of West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, but is practically at grade between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets.

The title to West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street as far west as the easterly side of Twelfth avenue is in the City, and if this street be opened to the west of Twelfth avenue a direct communication can be had with the bulkhead.

The opening of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, as will be seen from the map, requires:

First—The acquisition of a triangular-shaped piece of land, 1 foot 4 inches on the south side of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and 12 feet 3 inches along the westerly line of Twelfth avenue, containing an area of only 8.15 square feet.

The owners of this parcel are Messrs. Wright Gillies and Homer R. Gillies, who inform me that they will cede the same to the City, provided no cost of the legal opening is assessed upon their adjoining property.

Second—The right to construct the street across the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad. Action in this case should be taken by the City through the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and application made on behalf of the City to the State Board of Railroad Commissioners for permission to construct the street across the railroad at grade, pursuant to section 62 of the Railroad Law.

To the west of the right of way of the railroad, the title to the land in the bed of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, is vested in the City, the southerly half being reserved out of the grant made by the City to Cornelius W. Lawrence on March 1, 1852, and recorded in the Comptroller's office in Liber H, page 593.

In consequence, I believe that there will be no expense attending the opening of West One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and I would therefore recommend to you that this report be referred to the Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that prompt action may be taken by the Board.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying communication from the Engineer of the Finance Department to the Comptroller, bearing date of October 30, 1903, has been referred to me by the Comptroller for report.

This communication sets forth that The City of New York is the owner of water front property north of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, where a crib bulkhead has been constructed, which has been leased for a term of ten years, from November 1, 1903, with the understanding that the lessee shall provide his own right of way to the premises until January 1, 1906, and that in case the City fails on or before that date to provide access to the land, the lessee shall have the privilege of canceling the lease.

The City has already secured title to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street east of Twelfth avenue and to Twelfth avenue. The land lying within the limits of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street west of Twelfth avenue is now occupied by a crossing of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad. The communication also states that aside from the piece of land so occupied, and a small triangular parcel having an area of less than nine square feet, the remainder is already owned by the City, being a portion of the land under water. The land under water and lying to the south of the centre line of the street was deeded in 1852, with the understanding that the street rights were reserved by the City, and that three months after date of notice to the grantees they would construct a bulkhead or a street, and in case the latter were required that they would improve it at their own expense.

Twelfth avenue has been paved south of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and has been graded to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street. To give access to the City property now placed under lease it is only necessary to secure title to the small triangular parcel already referred to, and to establish a crossing of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad tracks.

I understand that the owners of the triangular parcel are Messrs. Wright Gillies and Homer R. Gillies, who are willing to deed the same to the City, so that opening proceedings may be avoided.

I would therefore recommend that a notice be sent to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, advising them that it is the intention of the City to place One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street in use across their tracks, and that they be given a hearing in the matter at a date to be fixed by your Board.

An inspection of the ground shows that grade crossings are in existence at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth, Manhattan, One Hundred and Thirty-first, One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, and that flagmen are located at the first and last named crossings, while the other three are protected by gates.

resolutions were adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to widen Fifty-ninth street 40 feet on the north side, between Second avenue and Fifth avenue, and between the Circle at Eighth avenue and Columbus avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board, to be held on the 30th day of September 1903, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the "City Record" for ten days prior to the 30th day of September, 1903; and

On the roll-call the vote resulted as follows:

Affirmative—The President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of The Bronx and the President of the Borough of Manhattan—6.

Negative—The Mayor and the Comptroller—6.

The resolution not having received the necessary number of votes was declared to be lost.

The Comptroller then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board recommends to the Board of Aldermen that the court-yard privileges in Fifty-ninth street, under the ordinances, between Second and Fifth avenues, and between Eighth avenue and Columbus avenue, be rescinded and repealed.

The vote resulted as follows:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the Comptroller—6.

Negative—The President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Manhattan—5.

Not having received the necessary number of votes the resolution was declared to be lost.

PURCHASE OF THE PROPERTY OF THE CITIZENS' WATER SUPPLY COMPANY, QUEENS.

The matter of the proposed purchase of the property of the Citizens' Water Supply Company of Newtown, which was laid over on November 13, was laid over waiting a report from the Comptroller.

EXTENDING THE GRAVESEND PUMPING STATION, BROOKLYN.

The matter of the acquisition of additional land for the Gravesend Pumping Station in the Borough of Brooklyn, which was laid over on November 13, was laid over waiting a report from the Comptroller.

WIDENING ROEBLING STREET, BROOKLYN.

The matter of widening Roebbling street, between South Fourth street and Union avenue, etc., Borough of Brooklyn, which was laid over on November 13, was taken up for consideration.

The Comptroller moved that the matter be laid over, which motion was adopted by the following vote:

The matter of the proposed acquisition of land in the Towns of Hempstead and Oyster Bay, lying south of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad, between Seaman's Neck road and the line between Nassau and Suffolk counties, which was laid over on November 13, was taken up and the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of The City of New York, acting for and on behalf and in the name of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, as amended, deems it necessary to take and acquire all the rights, titles and interests in and to certain real estate (as the term "real estate" is defined in the said act) in the towns of Hempstead

and Oyster Bay, County of Nassau and State of New York, lying south of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company, between Seaman's Neck road and the line dividing Nassau and Suffolk counties, and deems it necessary to take and acquire the same and all the rights, titles and interests therein except as noted on the map hereinafter mentioned, and to extinguish all claims for damages on account of such rights, titles and interests except as aforesaid, or growing out of such taking, for the purpose of maintaining, preserving and increasing the supply of pure and wholesome water for The City of New York, and for the purpose of preventing the contamination or pollution of the same; and

Whereas, The said Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has heretofore prepared and submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval and adoption a map showing the said real estate so to be taken and acquired, as aforesaid, as provided by the said act, above mentioned; and

Whereas, In pursuance of a resolution of this Board, adopted July 28, 1903, public notice has been given in pursuance of the said act above mentioned, that an opportunity would be afforded to any and all persons interested to be heard respecting such map, and the taking and acquisition of the said real estate, as shown thereon (as the term "real estate" is defined in said act), and the extinguishment of all the claims or damages on account of such rights, titles or interests, or growing out of such taking, at a meeting to be held at the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 14th day of October, 1903, at 10.30 in the forenoon of that day, and such public notice having been duly published, as provided by the said act, in the "City Record" and in the corporation newspapers and in two papers published in the County of Nassau, in which county the real estate to be taken and acquired is situated, and in two daily papers published in The City of New York, being the newspapers designated by the Board of City Record, in which such notice should be published, once in each week for three successive weeks, and due proof of the publication of such notice by the said several newspapers having been duly filed, and the said hearing having been had at the time and place in said notice stated; therefore be it

Resolved, That the said map so prepared and submitted by the said Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be hereby approved and adopted as the map of the real estate (as the term "real estate" is defined in the said act) to be so taken and acquired for the purposes hereinbefore set forth.

WIDENING GRAND STREET, BROOKLYN.

The matter of the proposed widening and extending of Grand street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as an approach to the Williamsburg Bridge, which was laid over on November 13, was taken up.

The Comptroller moved that the matter be laid over, which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx—12.

LAND FOR WATER SUPPLY, QUEENS (COLLEGE POINT).

The matter of the acquisition of a plot of land on the southerly side of Mitchell avenue, between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, in the Third Ward, Borough of Queens, which was laid over on November 13, was taken up, and the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, In pursuance of a resolution of this Board adopted on the 28th day of July, 1903, public notice has been given, in pursuance of the said act above mentioned, that an opportunity would be afforded to any and all persons interested to be heard respecting such map, and the taking and acquisition of the said real estate, as shown thereon (as the term "real estate" is defined in the said act), and the extinguishment of all the claims or damages on account of such rights, titles or interests, or growing out of such taking, at a meeting to be held at the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 30th day of September, 1903, at 10.30 in the forenoon of that day, and such public notice having been duly published, as provided by the said act, in the "City Record" and in the corporation newspapers and in two papers published in the County of Queens, in which county the real estate to be taken and acquired is situated, and in two daily papers published in The City of New York, being the newspapers designated by the Board of City Record in which such notice should be published, once in each week for three successive weeks, and due proof of the publication of such notice by the said several newspapers having been duly filed, and the said hearing having been had at the time and place in said notice stated; therefore be it

PARK AT HAMILTON, CATHARINE, CHERRY AND MARKET STREETS, MANHATTAN.

The matter of laying out a park bounded by Hamilton street, Catharine street, Cherry street and Market street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and the alternative proposition, which were laid over on November 13, were taken up, and on motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the matters were laid over until December 4.

PARK AT ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-THIRD STREET AND EAST RIVER, MANHATTAN.

The matter of the proposed laying out as a public park the territory bounded by East One Hundred and Twenty-third street, East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth

street, First avenue and the East river, which was laid over on November 13, was taken up.

The following communication was read and filed:

To His Honor SETH LOW, Mayor:

MY DEAR SIR—By mistake of my informant at the Clerk's office, I was advised that there was to be no further hearing in the matter of application for a park at East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and so, most unfortunately, I missed the opportunity to oppose this application at the hearing of a week ago.

I therefore beg to call attention to the written protest which I filed with the Board of Estimate at the July hearing on behalf of owners of upwards of forty city lots in the block between One Hundred and Twenty-fifth and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets, First avenue and the Harlem river. That protest is now most respectfully renewed.

We beg to urge particularly that our property with its water-front running from street to street, and with the large area of upland belonging to it by common consent, constitutes the most valuable water front in Harlem for commercial purposes. There is no other water-front like it. Avenue A stops at One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street and so does not separate the water-front from the upland.

If, however, the upland be taken for park purposes, and so withdrawn from commercial use, this water-front at once loses its great value.

Negotiations are now in progress for the commercial development of this property which will instantly be broken off if the pending application is granted.

We earnestly hope that the application will be rejected when the matter comes before the Board on December 1.

The matter of the proposed reduction of the width of Exterior street, between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, was taken up, and, on motion of the Mayor, the following resolution was adopted:

EXTENSION OF ST. JAMES PARK, THE BRONX.

The matter of the proposed extension to St. James Park, in the Borough of The Bronx, which was held over on November 13, was taken up.

The following communication was read and placed on file:

To the Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor of New York:

In the matter of extending St. James Park southwardly to St. James (One Hundred and Ninetieth) street, and the closing of Morris avenue, between East One Hundred and Ninetieth street and East One Hundred and Ninety-first street and of East One Hundred and Ninety-first street, from Morris avenue to Creston avenue.

The extension of this park seems to be desirable and proper for many reasons, a few of which are recited below:

Small parks of this character ought to be approachable from all sides, and if possible have streets for their boundaries. This park as at present has a newly adopted street (One Hundred and Ninety-third street) on its northern boundary. Creston avenue on its eastern boundary, on the south, for one-half the distance, East One Hundred and Ninety-first street, and for the remainder the property of St. James' Church, while on the west it is bounded by Jerome avenue.

St. James street is an old street, and has two rows of large and handsome maples; it will therefore make a very desirable southern boundary and much better than the present proposed One Hundred and Ninety-first street, which is only about 250 feet long, and not connecting with Jerome avenue.

The natural drainage of the valley in which the park lies is toward St. James street, and when heavy storms prevail the water which cannot find its way into the drains accumulates in the park and flows over the surface of private property to St. James street, where it has always found an outlet. The outlet for drainage into sewer at the corner of St. James street and Creston avenue is much lower than the sewer is in Creston avenue at the present south line of the park; and in view of the fact that the park area is so much lower than most of the street surrounding it, the benefit of a lower outlet for the drainage ought to be apparent.

If in the improvement of the present park the low lying land, which is always damp, had been filled in to a depth of several feet, there would be no difficulty of drainage, and it is a question whether it is not a more economical solution of the matter to extend the park south, where the lower outlet for the drainage is, than to go to the expense of filling the park to a higher level so as to secure rapid and thorough drainage during storms.

This matter of drainage is very important, for it is well known that during one of the recent storms a large part of the park area was flooded to a considerable depth for some time.

Such a condition should not exist in a public park, and a system of drains which will relieve the situation should be planned and built, so that the sub-drainage as well as the surface drainage can be taken off at the lowest possible level. The extension to St. James street will make this possible.

This extension, together with the lands of the St. James' Church, which will be left open to the public, will give the people an open park or place with good streets surrounding it, and in view of all the circumstances it seems to be a very desirable improvement from the standpoint of the City's interest.

So far as the benefit to the church, as such, is concerned, it is an open question whether the church would not be more benefited by the leaving of the land proposed to be taken for this extension, open to building improvement, thereby increasing the population from which the church expects its support.

3. Thence westerly along the northern line of Lefferts avenue 107.21 feet to the eastern line of Flatbush avenue;
4. Thence northerly along the eastern line of Flatbush avenue 510.70 feet to the point of beginning.

CHANGE OF GRADES OF MERRIAM AVENUE, THE BRONX.

The Mayor returned to the Board, with his disapproval, the resolution adopted by the Board on July 31, authorizing a change in the grade of Merriam avenue, between Ogden avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, Borough of The Bronx.

The following report and accompanying communication, on which he based his action, were ordered placed on file:

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor:

SIR—Referring to the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 8, 1903, providing for changing the grade of Merriam avenue, between Ogden avenue and East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, and my report to you of September 14, 1903, I beg to say that immediately upon your verbal instructions to ascertain, if possible, the ownership of the lots which would be affected, and the sentiment of such owners toward the proposed change of grade, I examined the tax records and found that the principal owner is the estate of W. B. Ogden. I at once communicated with Mr. Andrew H. Green, trustee of this estate, and asked for his views upon the proposed change of grade. Mr. Green was out of the City at the time, and I have just received a letter from him, which is hereto attached, in which he expresses his "most emphatic objections to the change."

Inasmuch as Mr. Green represents the owner of nearly all the abutting property, except that owned by the City, I imagine that an expression of opinion on his part is all that you will require to enable you to decide upon the approval or disapproval of the resolution.

REPORT No. 1658.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, on September 17, 1903, providing for the laying out of a public park along the shore of the East river, between Hoyt avenue and Ditmars avenue, and extending from the water front back to Barclay street.

This action of the Local Board was the result of a petition signed by Sackett M. Barclay, A. D. Julliard and others. The proposed park will include six blocks, three of which are very shallow, while the other three have a length of 950 feet and a width of from 600 to 800 feet. The total area is about 52 acres.

The ground may be described as advantageously located for park purposes. It slopes upward from the river to a considerable elevation at Barclay street. The southerly and easterly sides are slightly wooded, but the most of the tract is open. There are three or four houses within the limits of the proposed park, but they are old and of little value. The Boulevard, Woolsey avenue and Potter avenue pass through the plot which it is proposed to take. Of these the two first named are in use, and there are evidences that Potter avenue has been at some time roughly graded, but it is now practically impassable. Ditmars avenue and Barclay street, which would bound the park on the north and east, are not marked in any way upon the ground.

The proposed railroad bridge touching on Ward's Island and on Randall's Island would be located one block north of the northerly limit of the park, which is also about one mile distant from the water front park recently laid out, between Pierce and Sanford avenues; that park is directly opposite Blackwell's Island; the one now proposed is opposite Ward's Island.

The assessed value of the land which is included, according to the tax books for the present year, is \$283,825, and these books indicate that nearly all of the property is owned by Henry S. Bartow and A. D. Julliard, the latter appearing as one of the petitioners.

There is no report accompanying the papers from the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens indicating whether or not he approves the project; he has, however, been advised that the matter is pending before the Board, and has been requested to communicate with the Secretary before final action is taken. It is recommended that a public hearing be given.

REPORT No. 1688.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Red Hook District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on November 19, 1903, providing for closing and discontinuing Bowne street, between Richards and Columbia streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

This action is the result of a petition presented by J. H. Williams & Co., who are the owners of all of the property on both sides of Bowne street for the block which it is proposed to close. In the petition they state that the proper development of their plant makes it imperatively necessary that they should be permitted to use the land now lying within this street, and they call attention to the fact that inability to secure additional facilities has resulted in the removal from this immediate neighborhood of several manufacturing plants employing a great number of men and representing a vast amount of invested capital. They refer probably to the Henry R. Worthington Company, which has recently removed to New Jersey, and which occupied both sides of Bowne street, between Richards and Van Brunt streets.

Bowne street was opened in 1850, but, as was the custom in Brooklyn street openings, an easement only was acquired, and it is said in the report of the Chief Engineer of Highways, that the total cost of the opening was \$135. The street has never been improved, and has no water, sewer or gas pipes. It is four blocks in length, and the only objection to the proposed closing of this one block is that property owners between Richards street and Commercial wharf will be cut off from access to Columbia street.

The petitioners express their willingness to pay to the City such proper compensation as shall be determined by competent legal authority. It would seem as though if the action requested were taken, the petitioners should guarantee the City from any expense for damages which might be proven to be due to property owners along the other part of the street.

The Corporation Counsel having advised the Board that the proper course to pursue in matters of this kind is to first change the map by discontinuing and closing the street, it is recommended that a public hearing be given. A map and technical description for this purpose accompany the resolution.

LAND FOR MANHATTAN BRIDGE ANCHORAGE, MANHATTAN.

The following communication from the Commissioner of Bridges, and reports from the Finance Department and Chief Engineer, were presented:

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES, CITY OF NEW YORK,
October 7, 1903.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I send you a print of Drawing No. 3148, showing the lands required for the site of the anchorage of the Manhattan Bridge, in the Borough of Manhattan, and I desire to call your attention to property on the north side of Cherry street, hereinafter described:

Bounded on the east by a curved line of the property already designated for the anchorage site, on the south by Cherry street and on the west by the proposed property line drawn in red ink on the print.

The title to the property east of the curved line is now vested in The City of New York, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and proceedings for its condemnation are pending. I am advised by the Comptroller that it would be for the advantage of the City to have a straight line instead of a curved line, inasmuch as it is the intention of the City to use the property adjoining the anchorage as a plaza or open street. The Comptroller informs me that contracts have been made to purchase all of the property at No. 186 Cherry street, and that an offer has been made to the City by the owners of the Goodspeed property to sell that part of their lot lying east of the red line, together with the part already in condemnation, at a price which will be not much greater, if any, than the amount likely to be awarded in condemnation proceedings for the part colored red, east of the curved line.

I therefore respectfully recommend and request your honorable Board, under section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1903, to authorize the laying out of a street, bounded and described as follows:

All that certain piece or parcel of property lying on the north side of Cherry street, in the Seventh Ward of Manhattan:

Beginning at a point on the north side of Cherry street distant easterly from the northeast corner of Market and Cherry streets two hundred and forty-three and thirty-three hundredths feet (243.33), and running thence partly through a party wall north five degrees thirty-seven minutes forty-six seconds west (north 5 degrees 37 minutes 46 seconds west) two hundred and six and twenty-nine hundredths feet (206.29); thence north eighty-three degrees forty-five minutes forty-six seconds east (north 83 degrees 45 minutes 46 seconds east) one and fifty-three hundredths feet (1.53) to the line of property, title vested September 15, 1903; thence along said line south twenty-three degrees east (south 23 degrees east) forty-two and eighty-eight hundredths feet (42.88); thence westerly along a curve of sixty-nine and eighty-three hundredths feet (69.83) radius forty-eight and two hundredths feet (48.02); thence south sixteen degrees twenty-four minutes fourteen seconds west (south 16 degrees 24 minutes 14 seconds west) thirteen and one hundredths feet (13.01); thence easterly along a curve of sixty-nine and eighty-three hundredths feet (69.83) radius forty-eight and two hundredths feet (48.02); thence south twenty-three degrees east (south 23 degrees east) fifty-nine and fifty-seven hundredths feet (59.57); thence south seventy-eight degrees thirty-one minutes forty-one seconds west (south 78 degrees 31 minutes 41 seconds west) twenty-three and forty-six hundredths feet (23.46) to place of beginning.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—In the matter of the anchorage site of the Manhattan Bridge, in the Borough of Manhattan, and the plaza surrounding the same, I desire to call the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the line which is intended to be a street or plaza line, commencing on the north side of Cherry street and extending back a distance of about 206 feet, and makes what is known as an O. G. curve. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution vesting the title in the City to all of the land lying east of this line. Title vested on the 15th day of September.

In purchasing property for the bridge anchorage, I find that the line, as adopted, cut off one-half of No. 186 Cherry street, belonging to Katherine O'Brien, and in a curved line all of a three-story brick building on the rear end of the lot belonging to the Goodspeeds.

We are under contract to purchase No. 186 Cherry street, and the Goodspeed property has been offered to the City at \$20,000, which price has been approved by the Corporation Counsel and the Bridge Department, provided the O. G. line is changed to a straight line commencing at the party wall at No. 186 Cherry street, which will be owned by the City. If accepted the City will have to purchase only a few more square feet of property if the street is widened to that extent than it has to purchase under the present line, and will pay less money than it would be compelled to pay in condemnation proceedings, provided the present line is maintained.

The straightening of this street or plaza line has the approval of the Corporation Counsel and of the Bridge Department, and the Commissioner of Bridges in a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which was referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, has requested that under the provisions of section 442 of the amended Greater New York Charter, as amended by acts of the Legislature of 1903, that the line be straightened and that the property—the part already purchased and the part that will be taken—be thrown into the street.

I would respectfully request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt the necessary resolutions authorizing this to be done, and have attached hereto a diagram showing the present line, the proposed new line, the property already under contract to be purchased by the City and the property proposed to be taken in addition,

which, as I said before, will not involve the City in one dollar more expense, but rather would cost less money.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a communication from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated October 7, 1903, recommending the laying out of an addition to the public place or plaza adjacent to the Manhattan anchorage of the Manhattan Bridge, said addition lying on the northerly side of Cherry street and immediately adjacent to the proposed anchorage.

When plans were prepared showing the land to be acquired for bridge purposes, the area was made as small as possible, and to accomplish this a reverse curve was introduced where it was necessary to increase the width of land taken to provide for the masonry. This has resulted in cutting through improved property in such a manner that it will be necessary to destroy it and to pay its full value, so that it would be advantageous for the City to amend the line so as to include more of the property affected and increase the open space around the bridge without adding to the purchase price.

The area which it is proposed to add to the plaza is a strip about 206 feet in length, with an irregular but maximum width of about 23.5 feet, and it seems so clearly to the advantage of the City to secure this additional area that it is recommended that the map of the City be changed by laying out this addition to the bridge plaza.

The Commissioner's communication contains the necessary technical description for the public hearing which is required by the Charter.

DISCONTINUING ARRIETTA STREET SEWER EASEMENT, RICHMOND.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

J. W. STEVENSON, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—On December 12, 1900, the Board of Public Improvements requested me to institute proceedings for the purpose of acquiring title to an easement twenty feet wide for the Arrietta street outlet sewer, from the foot of Arrietta street to the United States pierhead line in the Borough of Richmond.

On June 6, 1902, your Board adopted resolutions requesting me to institute proceedings for the purpose of acquiring an additional easement ten feet in width for the same purpose. These easements would lie through lands owned by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company. This company offers to cede for the outlet sewer an easement twenty feet in width described in the resolution of December 12, 1900, provided your Board adopts a resolution discontinuing the above proceedings without costs or disbursements against the railway company.

I am informed that this latter easement will be sufficient for present requirements, and I therefore recommend that the cession be accepted, that a resolution be adopted by your Board discontinuing the proceedings to acquire title to the above easements without costs and disbursements against the Staten Island Railway Company, and that I be authorized to accept the grant of the easement from the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—In the accompanying communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated September 28, 1903, the Board is advised that the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway

Company has offered to cede to the City an easement 20 feet in width at the foot of Arrietta street, extending to the United States pierhead line, for the purpose of building an outlet sewer, and he recommends that the two proceedings which have been instituted to acquire such easement or easements, namely, one by the Board of Public Improvement on December 12, 1900, to acquire an easement 20 feet in width, and another by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 6, 1902, to acquire an additional easement of 10 feet in width, be discontinued. He further says that he is "informed that this latter easement will be sufficient for present requirements."

The "latter" in the quotation refers to the earlier proceeding for the 20-foot easement. I have consulted the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Richmond, and am advised by him that while 20 feet will be sufficient for the construction of the sewer, it was thought that it would make the work rather difficult, and an increase in the width of the easement to 30 feet was asked for to simplify the problem of construction. He further advises me that it is important that the voluntary granting of this easement be positively assured before the proceedings are discontinued. It is to be presumed, however, that the Corporation Counsel has had ample assurance that this cession will be given before recommending discontinuance of proceedings.

With this understanding it is recommended that the proceedings instituted by the Board of Public Improvements on December 12, 1900, to acquire an easement 20 feet in width, and the proceedings instituted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 6, 1902, to acquire an easement 10 feet in width, be discontinued.

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Morrisania District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on November 5, 1903, provides for changing the grades in the following streets:

Longfellow street, from Bancroft street to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad.

Whittier street, from Whitlock avenue to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad.

Whitlock avenue, from Bryant street to Bancroft street.

Aldus street, from Bryant street to Whitlock avenue.

The changes proposed are requested by the American Real Estate Company, which owns the greater portion of the adjoining property, and their representative further informs me that the remaining owners favor the grades now proposed.

The change consists of raising the grade at the intersection of Whitlock avenue with Longfellow street 5.5 feet, and at its intersection with Whittier street 8 feet; it also includes the raising of the grade of Longfellow street 6 feet at its intersection with Aldus street, and for the insertion of a crown in the centre of the block between Aldus and Bancroft streets.

The object of this change seems to be the elimination of a counter grade at Whitlock avenue, which, under the grades as heretofore established, will be the low point between the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and the adjoining territory to the west of the aforesaid avenue. The change also eliminates the steep grade which would otherwise exist along the line of Aldus street. None of the streets have yet been shaped upon the ground.

I see no reason why the changes proposed should not be adopted, and would recommend the approval of the resolution.

SIR—On May 1, 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the construction of a sewer in Palmer avenue, between Heberton and Richmond avenues, in the Borough of Richmond. With the report submitted upon the resolution providing for this sewer, there was presented a plan for the sewer, with the recommendation that this plan be formally approved by the Board, as required by the Charter.

SIR—The only public record of the work of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment relating to public improvements, is contained in the printed minutes, and, while these are full and explicit, it is difficult to obtain from them any idea of the amount of work actually accomplished by the Board.

It was the custom of the Board of Public Improvements to prepare an annual report in addition to its printed minutes, but the Charter does not require the preparation of such a report by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I believe that a general summary of the work done, accompanied by tables classifying it under different heads and indicating the estimated cost of the improvements authorized, together with a general description of the work, would be of considerable value. I beg to ask, therefore, if it is the pleasure of the Board that your Engineer should prepare a report along the lines suggested, and which would cover the two years which have elapsed since the creation by the revised Charter of this Board as now constituted, with its present powers.

If the Board deems this advisable, I will proceed at once with the preparation of such report in order that it may be completed by the end of the year.

In regard to outlet sewers, information of which is requested, I beg to state that such will be required in Condit street, between Lincoln avenue and Nichols avenue, the estimated cost of which is \$1,300, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment, including both sewers petitioned for and its outlet, is \$83,640.

The items of work required are:

230 feet 12-inch vitrified pipe sewer.

3 manholes.

1 receiving basin and appurtenances.

In regard to the legal opening of the streets, information of which is requested, I beg to advise that in the above, Lincoln avenue, between Atlantic avenue and Ridgewood avenue, is not covered by filed plans or map. An ordinance to lay out Lincoln avenue, between Jamaica avenue and Atlantic avenue, passed the Board of Local Improvements August 28, 1901, was referred to the Committee on Highways in the Board of Aldermen, October 15, 1901 ("City Record," page 6357, October 17, 1901). GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
