Acting Chief Engineer George S. Rice reported, in re payment for occupation of Luyties Bros. vault at the Brooklyn Bridge, that the vault was cleared of all obstructions, and recommended the payment of \$500, as agreed upon by the Board. The Auditor was instructed to draw a voucher for the payment of the same.

A letter from Thos. P. Peters, of the Brooklyn Times, was read, as follows, calling attention to the transit future of the Williamsburg Bridge:

EDITORIAL ROOMS, "BROOKLYN DAILY TIMES,"  
July 7, 1904.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—You may recall that I visited you at your office in the Produce Exchange Building, on June 15, and appealed to you as President of the Rapid Transit Commission to call the attention of your commission to the danger that hung over the transit future of the Williamsburg Bridge. I called your attention to one simple fact, namely, that the very evil that had plagued the Brooklyn Bridge was about to be inflicted upon the new bridge. The Bridge Department has but recently received permission from the Board of Estimate to have land condemned, probably to the extent of \$6,000,000 in value, that the terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge may be moved further into Manhattan. The crowding of all the terminal arrangements at the very end of the old bridge is one of its great evils. This is the view of the present Bridge Department. That is a correct view of the situation and should not be disputed.

But while the Bridge Department takes that view of the old bridge, it apparently takes just the opposite view of the new bridge. It is arranging upon the new structure for temporary switches on the level of the bridge, and no tracks will extend beyond the terminal of the bridge itself, and no use will be made of the widened Delancey street. President Ahearn is now about completing the work of tearing down the buildings that will give a broad avenue running to the Bowery. But the Bridge Department, because it does not have jurisdiction over this wide street, ignores it and proposes to erect, after the temporary ground switches have been installed, a temporary (?) building, on the easterly side of Clinton street, and



covering the entire width of the bridge. This is to be a two-story terminal building. The first floor is to be occupied by the surface lines of the B. R. T. and of the C. I. and B. roads, and the second story by the elevated lines of the B. R. T.

I am not now dealing in any way with the arrangements by which one line of the Metropolitan system in Manhattan is to use the bridge. I am but striving to convince you and the Rapid Transit Commission that the Brooklyn roads should cross the bridge, not only as far as Clinton street, but they should proceed up Delancey street to the Bowery.

The Brooklyn railroad magnates hesitate to run cars beyond the bridge terminus, because if they do they must seek franchises from the City. If their lines remain on the bridge they need only contract with a single Department, that of Bridges. The Brooklyn railroads have pretended not to want to cross the bridge, but who doubts that they are eager to put their cars upon this \$200,000,000 structure. It means growth for Brooklyn, and that means growth for them in all directions.

The Bridge Department tells us that this terminal structure is to cost \$200,000, and that it is to be temporary. This same Bridge Department told the Board of Estimate that the proposed temporary extension of the Brooklyn Bridge into City Hall Park would cost \$200,000. Then it asked for \$500,000. It attempted to explain this greater demand, but it was significant. I leave to the city at large to judge just what this two-story railroad building, with which it is proposed to block the new bridge in the same way in which the old bridge has been choked, will cost. But however small or great its cost, every cent put into it will be a waste of money, for it never should be erected to re-establish on the new bridge the great fault of the old bridge.

It remains, Mr. Orr, for you and your Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners to take the Williamsburgh Bridge into consideration. This was my plea made to you when I called. You stated then that as your Board had no bidder for a route over the new bridge, it could lay out no route over it. I made no reply to this statement at that time, as I was not then aware of a certain action taken by you on behalf of a certain locality in The Bronx. But since then I have discovered, by looking over the records of your Honorable Board, that in response to the request made by certain delegations of citizens, you wrote to August Belmont on May 27, 1904, asking him to consider the extension of his elevated lines, as desired by the property-owners in The Bronx. Mr. Belmont replied to your letter on June 4 at some length.

In view of this action by your Board in behalf of the citizens of The Bronx, it does not seem unreasonable that the property-owners of Williamsburgh in Brooklyn should desire the same spirit of interest in their transit arrangements. We merely ask that your Commission will give our bridge serious study, and that it take upon itself the duty of communicating with the Bridge Department and with the Brooklyn railroads, that it may acquaint itself with what is going on, and that if dissatisfied with the proposed arrangements, as we are sure it will be, it state publicly the impending mistakes and its reasons for believing them mistakes. Your Board should co-operate with the Bridge Department even to the extent of interfering for the sake of the right. We would also urge your Honorable Body to lay out a route running from the Williamsburgh Bridge plaza to the North river, which is the only correct solution for the traffic arrangements of the new bridge. We would respectfully urge that all your influence be used to stop the erection of this proposed terminal building on the river side of Clinton street, which will surely destroy the usefulness of the bridge to a marked extent.

Your Honorable Board is to-day planning for a subway through South Brooklyn and connecting with the Manhattan Bridge, which is at least six years from completion, while it seems to have done nothing for the Williamsburgh Bridge, which is completed, and should have been traversed by the railroads months ago.

This letter is addressed to you as head of the Rapid Transit Commission, and I beg that it will be laid before that body. Believe me to be

A claim of the Radway Corporation relative to occupation of vault under their sidewalk, No. 55 Elm street, which had been referred to counsel, was presented. Mr. Boardman rendered an opinion that claimant was not entitled to compensation, owing to the fact that the possessor of a sidewalk vault privilege has no property right in the street, but merely a revocable license.

This was ordered filed.

Correspondence on the subject of the property of W. Mynderse, No. 94 Joralemon street, Brooklyn, was read, as follows:

No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

MY DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of a communication from the Secretary of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, under date of June 24, 1904, inclosing a copy of a communication from Wilhelmus Mynderse in respect to his premises, No. 94 Joralemon street, in which Mr. Mynderse suggests that the Commission compel the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company to make good damage done to Mr. Mynderse's house by withholding payments under the contract or by some other means. Mr. Mynderse appears to base this suggestion upon the theory that the Construction Company has assumed an obligation under the contract to make good any damage done to foundation walls or other parts of adjacent buildings or structures, irrespective of the question whether such damage was caused by improper methods of construction or by negligence on the part of the contractor or sub-contractor in the performance of the work.

I do not accede to this interpretation of the contract obligations of this company, nor do I understand that it is in accord with the view of the Commission heretofore acted upon, or with the view of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court recently expressed in the case of Haefelin vs. McDonald.

In responding officially to a letter of Mr. Mynderse upon this subject, under date of June 15, 1904, you stated that the conditions of which he complained were "either the necessary result of the great public work of constructing, at the City's expense, what is in fact and in law a great public highway; or else they are due to some negligence on the part of the contractor—the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company—or its sub-contractors. In either case we are advised by counsel The City of New York, for which this Board acts, is not legally liable," and I understand from this statement that it is the view of the Board that unless some actual negligence or improper construction on the part of the contractor or sub-contractor appears there is no liability to property owners along the line of the work, and this view has been sustained by the Court in the Haefelin case.

As a matter of fact, there has not been any negligence or improper construction on the part, either of the contractor or the sub-contractor. The work has been done according to the plans and specifications and the contract with the City, and the requirements of the Chief Engineer have in all respects been complied with. Claims against the contractor or sub-contractor, under the circumstances, are certainly of very doubtful validity. The total amount of such claims cannot be so great that the security already held by the City will not be adequate to cover them.

I beg to respond specifically to your inquiry by saying that the contractor does not intend to make good all injuries sustained by property owners along the line of Joralemon street until it shall have been determined that a legal liability to do so exists. I respectfully urge that it would be unjust to the Contractor, under the circumstances, for the Commission to exercise its discretion to withhold payments certified by the Engineer to be due, and I respectfully request that no such action be taken.

DEAR SIR—We have read a letter dated the 22d ult. from Mr. Belmont to the President of the Board, in re claim of Wilhelmus Mynderse. We concur in the opinion

expressed by Mr. Belmont that it would be unjust to the contractor for the Commission to exercise its discretion to withhold payments certified by the Engineer to be due, in order to force a settlement of the Mynderse claim.

The case of Haefelin vs. McDonald, quoted in Mr. Belmont's letter, was decided very recently by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the First Department. In this case the plaintiff sought to recover against John B. McDonald for damages done to his property at Broadway and One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, by the alleged negligent blasting by Mr. McDonald's sub-contractors. The Court held that the contract made between the Board of Rapid Transit Railway Commissioners and Mr. McDonald was not a contract for the plaintiff's benefit or enforceable by him, and created no liability on the part of Mr. McDonald to the plaintiff; and that since the damage was claimed to have been occasioned by the sub-contractor's negligence, the sub-contractor alone was responsible to the plaintiff.

Under the decision, if the damage incurred by Mr. Mynderse is due to the negligence of a sub-contractor the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company is not liable.

If the damage is caused by the negligence of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company itself, it would, of course, be liable, but it does not appear that this is or is claimed to be the fact.

If the damage is due to defects in the plans and specifications for the construction which rendered the injury inevitable, the contractor is not, under this decision, liable directly to the property-owner, but is, under its contract, only bound to indemnify the City in the event that the City shall have been held liable, and to this end the City already holds security for its indemnification.

DEAR SIR—On Saturday last, the contractors of the Rapid Transit tunnel dug up under the western edge of the western sidewalk of State street, about opposite the southernmost column in the western facade of the new Custom House, a marble stone bearing the following inscription:

"To perpetuate the site of the S. W. Bastion of Fort George in 40 Degrees, 42 Minutes, 2 Seconds, N. L., as Observed by Captain John Montresor and David Rittenhouse in October, 1769, the Corporation of the City of New York, Have Erected this Monument A. D. MDCCCXVIII."

The stone, we are informed, is 29 by 30 by 31 inches in size, rested upon a brown-stone base about 8 inches thick, and was about 32 inches below the street surface.

The Engineers, with commendable foresight, took the necessary measurements to preserve the identity of the spot, and the monument itself has been boxed and carefully stored by the contractor, subject to further instructions.

The statement having been made in this morning's "Times" that the contractor was preparing to present this monument to a historical society, the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society respectfully requests you to direct the re-erection of the marker above ground, on its original site, as soon as the condition of the ground will permit. The location is peculiarly fortunate, as it will in no wise impede traffic.

Fort George was built on the site of old Fort Amsterdam, and is the place where the metropolis was born 278 years ago. To children and adults interested in the history of the City the spot possesses a unique interest, and this landmark, restored to its original site, but above ground, will be of the greatest value to thousands of citizens.

MY DEAR SIR—Last Saturday afternoon, during the progress of the excavation at a point 20 feet west of the centre line of State street and 87 feet north of the centre line of Bridge street, about 2 feet 9 inches below the surface, a stone monument was uncovered, on which was the following inscription:

"To perpetuate the site of the S. W. Bastion of Fort George, in 40 degrees 42 minutes 8 seconds, North Latitude, as observed by Captain John Montresor and David Rittenhouse, in October, 1769, the Corporation of the City of New York have erected this monument, A. D. MDCCCXVIII."

This monument, which is of white sandstone, is about 2 feet 6 inches square by 2 feet 9 inches high.

I suggest that this monument be placed in its original position, and would request that I be authorized to construct a proper pedestal for this monument, and also that a letter be sent to the Park Department asking for authorization to change the railing in the park to properly protect the monument.

GENTLEMEN—We are erecting a building at the southeast corner of Broome and Elm streets, running 117 feet on Elm street. We find the water main runs in the sidewalk within a few inches of our line. We understand from the City authorities that this main has not been accepted by them yet, and is your property or the property of your contractor, and we wish to notify you hereby that it will be in a dangerous position as soon as we start digging up close; we would, therefore, recommend that you take measures to protect it.

DEAR SIR—We have your letter of July 26, 1904, in relation to the Elm street water main, inclosing the report of the Engineer of the First Division, dated July 22, 1904, a copy of the notice, dated July 20, 1904, served on the Board by the Johnson-Kahn Company, and a plan of the premises in question.

It appears by these papers, that in the construction of the Rapid Transit Railroad in Elm street, the position of a 36-inch water main was necessarily altered, and that the main as relocated, with the approval of the Department of Water Supply, now lies within about 3 feet of the building line on the east side of Elm street; that the Johnson-Kahn Company has served notice that the water main will be endangered by the excavating for a building at the corner of Elm and Broome streets, and recommends that the Board or its contractors take measures to protect it.

The law is well settled that any land owner has an easement of lateral support for his land, that is, the right to have it supported in its natural condition by adjoining land, although no such right of support exists as to buildings or structures, which have increased the lateral pressure, and that if any adjoining land owner so excavates as to cause the land of his adjoining owner to fall, he is liable for the damage done to the land.



We think that the water-main in question would not be considered such a structure as increases the lateral pressure upon the land, and that, therefore, under the proposition above stated, the Johnson-Kahn Company must at its peril protect the soil of the street, the property of the City, from injury.

There is also a further consideration which leads to the same conclusion. The Building Code of this City, section 22, provides that when an excavation for building is carried more than ten feet below the curb, the person causing such excavation to be made shall at all times at his own expense preserve any adjoining wall or structure from injury; and the same section further provides that when an excavation is made on any lot, the person causing such excavation to be made shall build at his own expense a retaining wall of specified proportions to support the adjoining earth.

We have no doubt that a compliance with these provisions of the Building Code will fully protect the water-main. A non-compliance with these provisions will constitute negligence, and for any negligence the excavators will be liable for all the damage caused.

For these reasons we are of the opinion that the property-owners and not the Rapid Transit Board or the City must protect the water-main.

We inclose a form of letter, in accordance with your request, which should, we think, be delivered to the Johnson-Kahn Company.

Whereas, The said New York Dock Company is the owner of certain real property located in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City, and situated along the East river and adjacent thereto, including certain property lying westerly of Furman street, on the north side of Joralemon street, and on the south side of Joralemon street, between said Furman street and the said East river, and claims to be the owner of the bed of the said Joralemon street from the westerly side of said Furman street to the said East river; and

Whereas, The said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners desire to acquire, on behalf of The City of New York, any and all real estate, or interest or easements therein, necessary for the proper construction of a shaft or shafts for the work of excavating a tunnel to be built by said Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

It is hereby stipulated and agreed, that the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, its successors and assigns, are hereby authorized and empowered to enter into and upon the bed of said Joralemon street, between the westerly line of Furman street and a line drawn parallel thereto and distant two hundred and twenty-five feet westerly therefrom for the purpose of constructing the said shaft or shafts, and for the purpose of doing and performing all other and proper things necessary to the construction of the said shaft or shafts, until the tunnel now being constructed by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, shall be completed: upon condition, however, that the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, or their successors or assigns, shall construct and maintain, and keep in repair, a passageway or passageways through said Joralemon street, contiguous to such shaft or shafts, of sufficient width to allow two loaded double-trucks to pass each other, and shall keep said passageway or passageways open and unobstructed by any material or appliances used in and about the construction of said tunnel, and upon breach of the foregoing condition the permission hereby given shall be void and of no effect, at the option of the New York Dock Company. If, in order to construct said passageway or passageways, it be necessary to remove the sidewalk on either side of Joralemon street, lying west of Furman street, the cost of removing and replacing said sidewalk shall be borne by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners.

This stipulation shall not be deemed a waiver by the New York Dock Company of any right to compensation for the use of its property, which it now has, or shall have hereafter, in law, equity or otherwise, against The City of New York, its servants, agents and employees, or the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, but the New York Dock Company shall be entitled to receive such sum or sums as may be agreed upon as such compensation, or as may be awarded to it by any court of competent jurisdiction, with the interest at the rate of (6) six per centum per annum, from the time of entry upon any of the said property.

In consideration of the permission hereby given, the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners agrees, for and on behalf of The City of New York, that the said City will save and hold harmless the New York Dock Company from any damages or injuries, of any kind whatsoever, incurred by the said New York Dock Company through the negligence or mismanagement of any party or parties constructing or using said shaft or shafts under the permission hereby granted; and also, that the said City of New York shall place that part of Joralemon street, and the sidewalks contiguous thereto, after the said tunnel shall have been constructed, in as good condition as they were at the time of their entry upon said property.

THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS FOR STANDPIPE (FIRE LINE) WORK IN BUILDINGS OF CERTAIN CLASSES, REQUIRED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 762, CHAPTER 378, OF THE LAWS OF 1897, AS AMENDED BY CHAPTER 466 OF THE LAWS OF 1901; AND SECTIONS 102 AND 109 OF THE BUILDING CODE, ARE HEREBY APPROVED AND ESTABLISHED, TO TAKE EFFECT IMMEDIATELY.

## REGULATIONS FOR INSTALLATION OF STANDPIPES (FIRE LINES).

STANDPIPES WILL BE REQUIRED IN all buildings exceeding 100 feet in height, erected prior to December 25, 1899, and in all buildings exceeding 85 feet in height erected since same date.

Such buildings as come within above classification, and which do not exceed 150 feet in height, in which standpipes (fire lines) now installed are less than three inches in diameter, must be provided with lines four inches in diameter, and in such buildings as exceed 150 feet in height the fire line must be six inches in diameter, unless the lines already installed are considered satisfactory and approved by the Fire Department.

These standpipes must be of wrought iron or steel of sufficient strength to withstand the necessary pressure (in no case less than 300 pounds to the square inch) to force adequate streams of water to any of the floors of the building, or to the roof, and must extend from cellar to roof and be connected with outside two-way three-inch standard Fire Department connections, with clapper valves and proper caps, placed on street front of buildings, above curb level, in a position accessible for use of Fire Department and arranged so that the clapper valves will hang properly. These standpipes must be provided with proper valves (gate valves preferred) and 2½-inch outlets of the regular Fire Department pattern and thread on each floor level, with sufficient standard 2½-inch hose and nozzles attached thereto to properly cover entire floor area, arranged on proper and approved racks or reels, with approved open or controlling nozzles. Proper check valves shall be placed in top and bottom of such lines as are required to use tank or pump supply, or both. The hose outlets and hose must be located within stairway inclosures, except where impracticable to do so for reasons satisfactory to the department.

Where more than one standpipe is installed, cross connections, preferably in basement, of same size as main risers, with proper gate and check valves, must be provided.

In all buildings over 150 feet in height and in such buildings as come within these regulations as to height and are occupied for living purposes, such as hotels, hospitals, asylums, etc., also in theatres, the standpipe line must have approved tank or pump supply, or both.

Tanks—Bottom of gravity tanks must be elevated at least 20 feet above highest hose outlet, provided with separate feed supply, and such tanks shall be of not less than 3,500 gallons capacity. If used for domestic purposes, feed lines must be properly arranged to insure constant supply.

Pressure tank supply system or direct supply from street mains will be permitted in some cases if circumstances warrant and pressures are adequate.

All wrought iron and steel pipes must be equal in quality to standard.

All joints must be screwed joints, made up with red lead, and be thoroughly water tight.

All standpipes must rest on brick pier foundations or on heavy iron hangers suspended from floor beams at the discretion of officer in charge of bureau.

Horizontal supply lines must be supported by heavy iron hangers from floor beams at intervals of not more than ten feet, and vertical main lines, properly stayed, at each floor level; all to be securely braced to withstand vibration.

The arrangement of lines must be straight and as direct as possible. Offsets will be permitted only when unavoidable and bends must be of a radius not less than five diameters of pipe.

All pipes and connections must be readily accessible for inspection and repairing.

Drawings, showing location, sizes and connections, with duplicate descriptions, must be furnished to the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire appliances for all fire line, or standpipe work.

These drawings must be to scale, and shall consist of such floor plans and sections as may be necessary to show clearly all such work to be done, and must show all partitions, stairway inclosures and elevator shafts.

Prints will be accepted.

The said fire line, or standpipe work, shall not be commenced, or proceeded with, until said drawings and descriptions, in detail, shall have been filed and approved by the officer in charge of the Bureau. No modifications of the approved drawings and descriptions will be permitted unless amended drawings and duplicate descriptions covering the proposed change or changes are filed, and approved by the officer in charge of the Bureau.

Written notice must be given the officer in charge of said Bureau by the contractor when any new work is begun, or when any change or alteration is proposed, and from time to time when any work is ready for inspection.

When conditions exist making it impracticable to follow these regulations, the same may be modified to meet such existing conditions only by the Fire Commissioner on recommendation of the officer in charge of the Bureau.

Any doubt as to the meaning of these regulations, or any obscurity as to the wording of them, will be explained by the officer in charge of the Bureau, on application in writing, and all directions and explanations requisite, proper or necessary to complete or make more definite any of the provisions of said regulations and give them due effect will be given by the officer in charge of the Bureau, and his decision, unless modified, changed or disapproved by the Fire Commissioner, in writing, will be considered final in any dispute that may arise concerning the meaning of any clause of these regulations, or the detail of any plan.

## PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
