WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter Ending March 31, 1904.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 364,604, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspections.....	193,143
By the Division of Contagious Diseases.....	151,368
By the Division of Bacteriology.....	12,981
By the Division of Chemistry.....	7,112

The number of complaints forwarded for Board's orders was 7,806, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspections.....	7,430

The number of complaints received from citizens was 6,904, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 635 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 3,339 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in Joint Session, at Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Tuesday, January 31, 1905.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen, and John T. McCall, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen; Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President, Borough of Manhattan; Martin W. Littleton, President, Borough of Brooklyn; George Cromwell, President, Borough of Richmond; members, Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Mayor announced that the object of the joint meeting was the consideration of the Staten Island Ferry matter.

The following communication was received from Mr. George F. Randolph, representing the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company:

NEW YORK, January 19, 1905.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller of The City of New York:

SIR—The City of New York, by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on April 17, 1903, adopted a plan for streets in the vicinity of St. George, Borough of Richmond, and thereafter, on May 29, 1903, authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition thereof.

The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, owner of part of the land included in these said proceedings, made objection to the appointment of Commissioners, and the matter is still in abeyance.

The City of New York, by its Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, later approved of a plan for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of St. George, Borough of Richmond, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks, and thereafter the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings to acquire the property and improvements shown on said map.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on June 21, 1904, adopted a resolution, pursuant to the provisions of law, vesting title in The City of New York to said property and improvements on the day of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners to be appointed. These Commissioners were appointed December 27, 1904.

The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company is now willing to withdraw its opposition to the first proceedings if a cash purchase shall be made by The City of New York of the following property:

A strip of land fifty (50) feet wide on the water side of Jay street, west of DeKalb street, which was included in the proceeding for the acquisition of land for the widening of Jay street; also the property covered by the map approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the dock improvement, which likewise includes a portion of the land desired by the City for the widening of Jay street, marked as Parcel B in the proceeding above mentioned, said two parcels of land being the two parcels referred to in conferences between us prior to your departure for Europe.

The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company is willing to sell the property herein described to you as Comptroller of The City of New York, for the sum of five hundred and forty thousand dollars (\$540,000).

It must, however, be understood that this offer is made with reference to a prompt settlement, and it must not be used against the railway company in case of any litigation.

The Mayor presented the following opinion of the Corporation Counsel:

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—I have your favor of January 30, 1905, in which you call my attention to an offer made on behalf of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company to sell to The City of New York all of its lands and improvements covered by the plan for improving the water front and harbor of The City of New York in the vicinity of South street, St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, approved by the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners on the 16th day of October, 1903, as well as that part of its property not covered by the plan but included within the lines of Jay street, west of DeKalb street, in the Borough of Richmond, proceedings for the condemnation of which were authorized under a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted May 29, 1903, for the lump sum of \$540,000.

You desire to be informed whether this offer can be accepted, by whom, and in what manner this purchase should be ratified, and specifically request an answer to the following inquiries:

First—Whether or not this property can be purchased at private sale by The City of New York notwithstanding the pending condemnation proceedings.

Second—In what manner the purchase of this property should be approved and by what officer or board.

Third—Whether this property must be purchased as a whole, or whether the offer to sell this property should be separated into two portions, namely, that relating to the land required for the proposed ferry terminal and improvement of the water front, and that required for the widening of Jay street.

In answer I desire to say that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York approved, and on the 16th day of October, 1903, certified to an amended plan for the improvement of the water front and harbor of The City of New York, in the vicinity of South street, St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks and dated September 28, 1903. This map or plan for the improvement of the water front did not include as part of the improvement of the water front that part of Jay street west of DeKalb street proposed to be taken for the widening of Jay street in proceedings which were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, and the map or plan of which had been adopted by the same Board on April 17, 1903. These proceedings although authorized had never been carried forward to the appointment of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for the reason that certain objections had been made to the appointment of Commissioners by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, for the removal of which negotiations have been pending between that company and The City of New York ever since.

Negotiations also had been entered into between the Commissioner of the Dock Department and the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company for the purchase of the property and improvements embraced within the lines of the map or plan for the improvement of the water front above mentioned. These negotiations, however, fell through, and thereupon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution on the 20th day of November, 1903, authorizing the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings to acquire the property and improvements shown on this amended plan for improving the water front aforesaid, and thereafter, on June 21, 1904, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution directing that title should vest in The City of New York to the property above mentioned on the day of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners who were thereafter to be appointed.

These Commissioners were actually appointed on December 27, 1904, and their oaths were filed on January 18, 1905.

At the present time, there are, therefore, proceedings pending for the acquisition of all the property embraced within the map or plan for improving the water front or harbor of The City of New York in the vicinity of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond, and that part of Jay street not included in the plan of the improvement of the water front for which an offer has been made on behalf of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company to sell the same to The City of New York for the lump sum of \$540,000.

Title was authorized to vest in all of the property covered by the above-mentioned map or plan for the improvement of the water front upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners appointed in proceedings for that purpose.

Notwithstanding the pendency of these proceedings, The City of New York, through its proper board of officers, undoubtedly has still the power to purchase this property. By section 822 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Docks, with the approval of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners, is authorized to purchase the property required for the improvement of the water front, and the amendment (section 823A, contained in chapter 624 of the Laws of 1903) does not take away from them the power to make such a purchase, even though condemnation proceedings have been authorized and the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been appointed.

Section 822 of the Charter makes applicable all of the provisions of the Street Opening Law to the condemnation of this property and by section 994 of title 4 of the Greater New York Charter revised, it is provided that The City of New York may at any time or times, either before or after the appointment of Commissioners, agree with the owners as to the compensation to be made for the land proposed to be taken by virtue of such proceeding.

Consequently the commencement or pendency of proceedings for the condemnation of this land does not prevent the Dock Commissioner and the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners from purchasing all the property covered by the proposed plan for improving the water front and harbor of The City of New York in the vicinity of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond.

Although title may have become vested in the City pursuant to the resolution of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted on June 21, 1904, directing that title vest on the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the proceedings authorized to be taken for the condemnation of the property covered by the amended map or plan aforesaid, which vesting would have taken place on January 18, 1905, the date on which the oaths of Commissioners were filed, I am in doubt as to whether this vesting has as a matter of fact taken place.

The provisions of law relating to the condemnation of private property for public use are strictly construed and the letter of the statute must be followed, especially where property is taken summarily from a private individual by force of the provisions of statute, which taking is not immediately accompanied by compensation.

The provisions of chapter 624, of the Laws of 1903, amending section 823A of the Charter, relating to the vesting of title, contain the following:

"* * * In a proceeding hereafter brought for the acquirement of any such wharf property, rights, terms, easements or privileges, or uplands, or lands under water, situate, as in this section sets forth, if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall, by resolution, so direct the title to the said wharf property, uplands and lands under water, rights, terms, easements and privileges shall vest in The City of New York at such time as said resolution shall direct after the filing in the office of the Clerk of the County where the proceedings are pending of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in said proceedings appointed, and all of the rights, title and interest of any and all of the owners or persons interested in the said wharf property, rights, terms, easements and privileges, or lands under water, or uplands shall cease and determine and be extinguished at such time. All the awards made in such proceedings for the value of property acquired or interests extinguished shall draw interest from the time of vesting of title in The City of New York."

The above language apparently authorizes the adoption of a resolution vesting title only after the oaths of the Commissioners have been filed, and in view of such a limitation it may be doubtful whether or not a direction of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners, that title should vest upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners to be thereafter appointed, is sufficient, and whether or not the language above quoted does not require that direction to be given only after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners.

But this does not seem to be material in view of the fact that whether the City has title or not to this property under condemnation proceedings, the Commissioner of Docks and the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners have still power to purchase it notwithstanding the fact that the proceedings are pending. The proposal of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, to sell all of this property, including that portion of Jay street not covered by the water front improvement plan, for a lump sum of \$540,000, in my opinion requires to be approved by the Dock Commissioner and Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners, under section 822 of the Charter, and also by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under sections 970 and 994 of the Charter. The question, how much of this lump sum of \$540,000 should be apportioned to that portion of Jay street which is not included in the water front improvement plan and what portion of it should be apportioned to the property covered by the proposed plan for improving the water front and harbor of The City of New York is not free from difficulty because it may be that the Staten Island Railroad Company, in view of its objection to the condemnation of Jay street, would not sell for any price that portion of its property which is included in the street opening proceeding, separate and apart from the property covered by the amended plan for improving the water front and harbor of The City of New York. They possibly would not offer to sell separately the two pieces of property above mentioned for a sum which would aggregate \$540,000, and apparently the sale of the part of its property embraced within the lines of Jay street is conditioned on the sale of the property required for the improvement of the water front as a terminus. As the compensation for all of this property comes out of the City Treasury, and the City is not to be reimbursed for any part of it by assessment for benefit, it makes little difference whether the whole property is purchased at one time for a lump sum. In order that a proper charge may be made against the Fund for Street and Park Openings for that portion of the property which is to be used for street purposes, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Dock Commissioner and the Sinking Fund Commissioners can readily agree as to what part of the lump sum should represent the value of the property taken for that purpose and the remainder should be charged against the fund out of which dock property is to be purchased. The apportionment of this sum is a mere matter of bookkeeping under the circumstances.

In view of the fact, however, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has jurisdiction over that portion of the property which is to be used for street purposes

and the Dock Commissioner and the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners over the rest of the property required for the improvement of the water front, I would suggest that the Sinking Fund Commissioners, before acting upon this matter, invite the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to sit with them in joint session, and that resolutions be adopted by both Boards at such session approving of the purchase of this property as a whole. Such a course would obviate any conflict or jurisdiction and would effectually ratify and bind the City to the purchase of the property as a whole.

In accordance with said opinion the Comptroller offered the following resolution for adoption by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Whereas, On the 21st day of June, 1904, this Board authorized the Commissioner of Docks to enter into an agreement with the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company for the purchase of the land and improvements owned by said railway company, and shown on a map adopted by the Commissioner of Docks on September 28, 1903, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund October 16, 1903, at a sum not exceeding \$500,000; and

Whereas, The said railway company declined to accept such terms, and condemnation proceedings were thereafter duly authorized; and

Whereas, The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company has now offered to sell to The City of New York all the land and improvements aforesaid, together with a strip of land for the widening of Jay street, for a total sum of \$540,000; and

Whereas, An appraised value of said additional strip of land is \$48,800; and

Whereas, It would appear to be in the interest of the City to accept said offer and thereby avoid the attendant expense of condemnation proceedings; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the acceptance of the said offer in so far as the same relates to the purchase of the property required for the water-front improvement, and recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the acceptance of the said offer in its entirety.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Chamberlain, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller then offered the following resolution for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the widening of certain streets in the vicinity of St. George, Borough of Richmond, and more particularly for the widening of Jay street, between South street and Richmond terrace; and

Whereas, The said Board did provide that the entire cost and expense of such proceeding should be assessed upon the City; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1903, authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of St. George, Borough of Richmond, upon the plan adopted by the Department of Docks and Ferries on September 28, 1903, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on October 16, 1903; and

Whereas, This latter proceeding included a portion of the land required for the widening of Jay street, and contained in the first proceeding above mentioned; and

Whereas, The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, as owners, have made objection to the appointment of Commissioners in the first proceeding above recited; and

Whereas, It seems desirable that this improvement should be commenced at the earliest possible date, and that it would be in the interests of the City to acquire all of the property before mentioned at private sale, rather than by two condemnation proceedings; and

Whereas, The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, by George F. Randolph, has, under date of January 19, 1905, offered to sell to the City all the above-mentioned property at private sale for the sum of \$540,000; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have this day adopted a resolution as follows:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the acceptance of the said offer in so far as the same relates to the purchase of the property required for the water-front improvement, and recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the acceptance of the said offer in its entirety,"—now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby concurs in the said resolution and approves of such purchase, and hereby authorizes the Comptroller of The City of New York to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the same, at a price not exceeding \$540,000, said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the President of the Borough of Richmond—14.

On motion, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adjourned, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund continued in session.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to the Staten Island Ferry matter:

NEW YORK, January 7, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—The matter of the acquisition of the land, structures and boats now used and to be used on the ferry between the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond has now occupied the attention of this Department and of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for some time past. After a careful and thorough consideration of all the questions involved, I submitted propositions for the purchase of the said land, structures and boats and for the continued operation of the ferry until such time as the City may be in a position to commence the operation of the Municipal ferry. In view of the objections raised by the Comptroller, however, the matter has not yet been settled, and the present status is that the City is proceeding with the acquisition of the St. George land and improvements by condemnation, leaving still open the purchase of the five ferryboats now in use, the purchase of the terminal structures and the question of compensation to be paid to the City by the ferry company for the privilege of operating the ferry since June 1, 1904, the date of expiration of the former lease.

The St. George land proposition having been settled by the determination of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to have the same acquired by condemnation, it is now important that some action should be taken toward the settlement of the other questions. The five new ferryboats required for service on the Municipal ferry are now under construction, and it is hoped that the same will be completed and ready for use on June 1, 1905; in order, however, that they may be of some benefit at that

time it is necessary that certain changes be made in the terminal structures both at the foot of Whitehall street and at St. George. The ferry company recently notified this Department that it would not pay rental for the operation of the ferry after June 1, 1904, and that it would take steps to prevent the City from entering into possession of any portion of the terminals for improvement purposes.

It is my desire to have the operation of the Municipal ferry commence at the earliest possible date, in order that the residents of the Borough of Richmond and those using the ferry may have the accommodations which are urgently required, and in order to avoid all possible delay it is, of course, desired that some amicable arrangement should be arrived at so that the City may be in a position to commence work.

After a number of interviews with the representatives of the ferry interests in the present ferry, I am in receipt of a communication from Mr. Edward Lauterbach, the attorney for such interests, suggesting the following adjustment:

1st. The City to pay for the improvements at the foot of Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, the sum of \$125,000, and for those at St. George the sum of \$75,000. These payments to be made at the time of the execution of a lease for the continued operation of the ferry.

2d. The City to grant to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company a lease, to begin as of June 1, 1904, and to terminate on the 1st day of June, 1906, or sooner, on thirty days' notice, at the option of the City. The annual rental to be the gross sum of \$12,500, the lease to provide for the right of the City to enter upon both terminals, so far as same may be necessary, in order to make the alterations for the operation of the Municipal ferry.

3d. The City to pay for the ferryboats "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton" the sum of \$245,000; for the "Southfield" the sum of \$30,000; for the "Westfield" the sum of \$23,000, and for the "Middletown" the sum of \$22,000. These sums to be paid as soon as the new lease shall have been terminated.

The proposition submitted by me, under date of May 10, 1904, is, in my opinion, far more advantageous than any since made; the one now submitted by Mr. Lauterbach differs from the one contained in the report of the Comptroller to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of July 26, 1904, and to which I replied on September 2, 1904, in that it does not compel the City to purchase the boats at once, but leaves the purchase of same in abeyance until the expiration or termination of the extended lease.

I desire to again call your attention to the immediate necessity of entering into possession of a portion of the terminal property, in order to make the required changes, and I transmit herewith a copy of the communication received from Mr. Lauterbach, for such suggestions as you may desire to make.

DEAR SIR—Conferences with the parties interested in the Staten Island ferries enable me to make the following suggestions of adjustment, which, if immediately carried out, will, in my opinion, based upon those conferences, be formally adopted by the Boards of Directors of the companies interested:

First—For the improvements of the Whitehall slip the City is to pay one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars; for those at St. George, seventy-five thousand dollars. These payments are to be made at the time of the execution of the lease herein-after mentioned.

Second—The City is to pay for the "Garrett" and "Castleton" the sum of two hundred and forty-five thousand dollars; for the "Southfield," thirty thousand dollars; for the "Westfield," twenty-three thousand dollars; for the "Middletown," twenty-two thousand dollars. These sums are to be paid at the expiration of the said lease, or at the time of the termination of the lease if it be sooner terminated.

Third—A lease, with provisions similar in form as far as such form may be applicable to leases heretofore made, to be forthwith executed by the City to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company, to begin forthwith and to terminate on the first day of June, 1906, or sooner, at the option of the City, on giving thirty days' notice; the annual rental to be the fixed gross sum of twelve thousand five hundred dollars; rental for the term intervening between the last payment of rent and the date of the new lease to be at the same rate. The lease shall provide for the right of the City to enter upon the terminals at Whitehall slip and at St. George, in order to make alterations necessary for the operation of the ferry by the City, but with as little inconvenience to the lessee company as possible.

The following are the communications referred to by the Dock Commissioner in his communication of January 7, 1905:

JULY 26, 1904.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—At the last meeting of this Board held on July 20, 1904, the matter of the acquisition of the Staten Island Ferry properties was again referred to me for further negotiations, and after several conferences with the parties in interest, they have presented propositions which seem to me satisfactory to the City, and which may be properly approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

I shall present them separately, but they must be considered as one in dealing with the question.

1. Rapid Transit Ferry Company.

The offer made to the Dock Commissioner by this company on April 26, 1904, to continue the service until the City could operate same, paying the same rentals as at present, carried with it conditions that the City should at the end of the term purchase the two boats owned by the company, and the buildings at both terminals for the sum of \$506,000, and also the three chartered boats from the Staten Island Railway Company for \$75,000.

My own appraisals of these buildings, etc., were so much lower than that asked by the company, that I declined to accept the terms demanded.

The company's representatives have now conceded that the prices asked for these buildings were high, but that the risk they assumed in operating a ferry for so short a period was much greater than any profit which could be derived from the service, and that in consequence they expected to be compensated for such risk.

As the matter was not closed at the time of the "Slocum" disaster on June 15, the company became more and more insistent upon its own terms, feeling, in view of that occurrence, it had not fully protected itself by its former offer, and as I am now informed, it has recently gone to extra expense in re-equipping the boats in certain particulars.

It does not seem to me that the City should enter into an agreement to purchase property at a price far above its value in order to furnish indemnity to the company on account of the risk it would assume in operating the ferry, but rather that the rental paid by the company should be reduced commensurate with such risk, and the City pay fair values for the property taken.

Upon this view of the matter the company has submitted the following offer:

1st. To enter into an agreement to operate the service for a term of two years from June 1, 1904, but terminable at the pleasure of the City after June 1, 1905, at an annual rental of \$12,500 for dock property and franchise.

The agreement to contain provisions that the City may enter into possession of part of the terminal at the foot of Whitehall street, Manhattan, at any time after December 1, 1904, and of the terminal at St. George, at once, for the purpose of reconstructing the same without unduly hampering the operation of the said ferry; and likewise that the City will charter to the Rapid Transit Ferry Company the three boats "Southfield," "Westfield" and "Middletown," when it shall acquire them, under the same terms and conditions as contained in the present charter or lease from the Staten Island Railway Company to the Rapid Transit Ferry Company.

Upon the termination of the agreement the City to pay to the company the following sums of money:

(a) Boats "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton" \$245,000 00
Said sum being the appraised value on May 1, 1903, and to be subject to such change of value as may be found to have taken place in the boats at the time when the City takes possession.

(b) Ferry-house and appurtenances at the foot of Whitehall street, Manhattan 125,000 00
(c) Terminal structures at St. George, Richmond 75,500 00

Total \$445,500 00

II.—Staten Island Railway Company—

The City to enter into an agreement with the Staten Island Railway Company to purchase, on or before October 1, 1904, the three ferry-boats known as the "Westfield," "Southfield" and "Middletown," now used in the ferry service at their appraised value of May 1, 1903, to wit:

For the "Southfield" \$30,000 00
For the "Westfield" 23,000 00
For the "Middletown" 22,000 00

Total \$75,000 00

III.—Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway—

The map approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on October 16, 1903, for the improvement of the water-front at St. George, Borough of Richmond, providing for a proper ferry terminal, includes a strip of land fifty feet in width for the widening of Jay street, between South street and DeKalb street.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment has adopted a map showing a widened Jay street, between DeKalb street and Richmond terrace, and proceedings were instituted to acquire such widened street by condemnation.

The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company has made objections to the appointment of Commissioners upon the grounds that the City has no right to acquire property of the railroad company previously acquired by it for railroad purposes, and the matter is at a standstill pending a decision of the Court.

Mr. George F. Randolph has now submitted a tentative offer, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, to sell to the City this piece of land, in connection with the terminal property heretofore offered to the City for \$525,000, for the sum of \$540,000.

The plot in question contains about 21.7 City lots, and the difference between the price which I originally offered for the property, to wit, \$500,000, and the present offer, \$540,000, is, in my opinion, a fair value for the additional land to be acquired.

This strip of land is necessary for the improvement taken as a whole, and as there is some doubt as to the City's ability to acquire it otherwise than by purchase, it seems to me desirable that this tentative offer should be favorably considered.

At the present writing it has been impossible to secure the approval of all the members of the board of directors of the company to such an offer, but I believe that there is a desire on the part of all parties interested to settle the matter without resorting to condemnation proceedings, and I am led to believe that if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will pass a resolution offering such sum for the property it will be accepted.

I would therefore recommend that the Dock Commissioner be requested to amend the map for the improvement of the water front, as adopted by the former Dock Commissioner on September 28, 1903, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on October 16, 1903, by including within the lines of such map the strip of land for the widening of Jay street, from DeKalb street to Richmond terrace above referred to, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall then approve of the purchase of the entire property with the improvements thereon, exclusive of those affected by the lease from the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company to the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, in the total sum of \$540,000, to be paid within 30 days after the tender to the City of a good and sufficient deed of the property.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York, and Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of the 27th ult., relative to a report made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by the Department of Finance in the matter of the proposed acquisition of property and boats for the Staten Island Municipal Ferry service, and as to the continued operation of the ferry by the ferry company until such time as the City desires to enter into actual operation.

In the report in question the Comptroller states that in his opinion the prices which would have been paid for the terminal improvements, as outlined in my recommendation of May 10, 1904, were high; that the company had insisted on these high prices to compensate for the risk assumed in operating the ferry for the extended period from June 1, 1904, and that he believes it better to enter into an agreement whereby the company would sell the property to the City at a lower figure and be compensated for any risk assumed by a reduction in the rental to be charged for the land and franchise for the period of continued operation.

When I assumed the office of Commissioner of Docks on January 1, 1904, and took up the Staten Island ferry matter I found that considerable time had been expended in negotiations looking toward the purchase of the necessary property; that on September 28, 1903, a plan for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of the ferry terminal at St. George had been adopted by the former Commissioner of Docks, which plan provided not only for a ferry terminal, but also for the widening of South street to Jay street, and for the widening of Jay street, from South street to DeKalb street, and that this plan was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on October 16, 1903. While I recognized that in order to provide a proper approach to the ferry the widening of South street was desirable, I was unable to see wherein the widening of Jay street was at all necessary in so far as the ferry proposition was concerned. I have been informed that this was included to conform to the architectural layout of the borough building approach from the water front.

This area of land for street opening had been included within the plan adopted as above, and had been taken into consideration in all the negotiations, and, while believing it to be absolutely unnecessary and useless so far as the ferry matter was concerned, still, in order to avoid any delay or further complications, I decided to continue the proposition to include the strip of land for the widening of Jay street, from South street to DeKalb street.

After considerable negotiation between this Department and the ferry and railway companies propositions were submitted to me by the railway company to sell its land and its improvements at St. George required for the new ferry for the sum of \$525,000, and the ferry company, among other things, agreed to continue the operation of the ferry for a period of not exceeding two years from June 1, 1904, upon terms similar to those on which they operated the ferry up to June 1, 1904, provided the City would pay for the terminal improvements at Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, the sum of \$175,000, and for the terminal improvements at St. George the sum of \$86,000.

On May 10, 1904, I addressed a communication to you as Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund recommending that the City acquire the railway company's lands and improvements at St. George for the sum of \$525,000, that the City purchase the three boats, "Middletown," "Southfield" and "Westfield," for the sum of \$75,000, subject to such change in value or deterioration as may be found to have taken place up to the time the City takes title; that the City purchase the terminal improvements at the foot of Whitehall street for the sum of \$175,000, that the City purchase the ferryboats "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton" for the sum of \$245,000, subject to such change in value or deterioration as may be found to have taken place up to the time the City takes title; that the City purchase the ferry company's St. George improvements for the sum of \$86,000, and that an agreement be entered into with the ferry company for the continued operation of the ferry until such time as the City would be ready to commence the operation of the municipal ferry. It was my intention that the City should acquire the railway company's lands and improvements at St. George on June 1, 1904, and that the remaining property should be purchased upon the termination of the agreement for the continued operation of the ferry. Under the above proposition the City would have received a revenue for the land at the foot of Whitehall street and for the franchise, basing the franchise revenue upon the returns for the year 1903, amounting to at least \$47,125 per annum, and the City would, of course, also receive the rental heretofore paid by

the ferry company for the use of the terminal property at St. George, which, I am informed, is \$15,000 per annum. The total expenditure would have amounted to \$1,106,000 for the lands, boats and improvements, but, deducting the revenue therefrom, would leave the net expenditure of \$1,043,875 if the agreement were to terminate at the end of the first year, or \$981,750 if the agreement were to continue for the full period of two years.

The Comptroller, however, in his present communication makes a very radical change in the proposition, in that he does not confine himself to the area of land which it was originally intended to acquire, but injects into the new proposition a strip of land for a continuation of the widening of Jay street, from DeKalb street to Richmond terrace, stating that this strip of land is necessary for the improvement, taken as a whole, and he suggests that I amend the plan for the improvement of the water front at St. George so as to include that additional area, and to that I am opposed. I see no necessity for it as a part of the ferry improvement.

The funds of this Department are obtained from the sale of Corporate Stock of the City, and if the street widening improvements were carried on as part of the water front improvement the City would receive no return through assessment from the properties benefited by such street widening. If the proper Department of the City considers it necessary to acquire this additional area for street purposes it should be acquired by such means as would make it possible to assess the cost on the property benefited. This applies not only to the additional area which the Comptroller now desires to acquire, but also to the area heretofore intended to be acquired for the widening of Jay street, from South street to DeKalb street.

Under the Comptroller's proposition, assuming that the date of the purchase of the St. George land would be October 1, 1904, the City would be compelled to make an expenditure of \$615,000 for the railway company's property on or before October 1, 1904, paying the flat sum of \$75,000 for the three old boats, subject to such change in value or deterioration as may be found to have taken place from May 1, 1903, to the date of purchase, but would not receive the advantage of any deterioration or change in value that may be found to have taken place up to the date on which any agreement for the continued operation of the ferry is terminated. The revenue from the dock property and franchise used in connection with the ferry would be \$12,500 per annum, and apparently the City could not collect any additional revenue for the use of the St. George land after it would have acquired the same.

The total expenditure proposed under the new proposition is \$1,060,500, with a revenue of but \$12,500 per annum for the land and franchise and an additional revenue of \$6,633 for the use of the three old boats to June 1, 1905, assuming that the City would purchase these boats and charter them to the ferry company on October 1, 1904; the rental for the boats for another year, to June 1, 1906, if the agreement continued to that date, would be \$9,500, thus making the expenditure \$1,041,367 if the agreement were to continue for a period of one year, or \$1,019,367 if the agreement were to continue for the full period of two years.

The following is a comparative table of the two propositions:

It is true that, in addition to the property that would have been acquired under my recommendations, the City would under the Comptroller's proposition acquire title to land for the continuation of the widening of Jay street, from DeKalb street to Richmond terrace, but the effect of such acquisition must at the same time be taken into consideration. The acquisition of this additional land by the City, as estimated roughly by this Department, means that an additional expenditure of about \$100,000 would have to be made in constructing a suitable retaining wall and in completing the roadway by paving, etc., and if this additional area were acquired as a ferry proposition in connection with water front work thereat all the expenditures for the improvements would be made to the benefit of the adjoining private owners, without the City receiving any return from assessment.

Another, and to my mind a most important, difference between the two recommendations is that under the recommendations now presented by the Comptroller the City is to enter into an agreement to purchase the three old boats from the railway company on or before October 1, 1904, and charter them to the ferry company until such time as the City terminates the agreement with the ferry company. To this I am very much opposed, as I do not believe the City should be the owner of these ferryboats while they are to be used for passenger traffic. They should be left in the hands of the present owners until such time as the City is ready to operate the new municipal ferry with the new boats now building, when the City will be ready to take the old boats in question and remodel them for the purpose of freight traffic between the Borough of Manhattan and Stapleton, in the Borough of Richmond, which has all along been their intended use.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Dock Commissioner in communication of September 2, 1904, has addressed a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in reply to your proposition of July 26, submitting compromise offers from the Rapid Transit Ferry Company to continue the operation of the ferry, the Staten Island Railway Company to sell the three ferry boats, "Westfield," "Southfield" and "Middletown," and the Staten Island Rapid Transit Ferry Company to sell land for terminal and street approaches at St. George, Staten Island.

The Dock Commissioner objects to the compromise for the following reasons:

I.—That the land for the widening of Jay street, from DeKalb street to Richmond terrace, is, in his opinion, no part of the ferry improvement and should not be paid for by an issue of Dock Bonds.

II.—That he is opposed to the City's ownership of the three boats named on October 1, 1904, at a date eight months prior to that proposed by him.

III.—That from a money point of view, his proposition as compared with the Comptroller's, will be advantageous to the City, if the revenue to be derived for two years under the respective plans, be taken to offset the issue of bonds, and will, from a purely Dock Department point of view, show a saving to that department of about \$38,000. The additional cost to the Dock Department of constructing the widened Jay street is estimated at \$100,000.

I will discuss the objections in order:

I.—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 17, 1903, approved of a map showing changes in the street system at St. George, Borough of Richmond, which changes provided for the widening and extending of streets approaching the ferry. This action was ratified by the Board of Aldermen by ordinance on April 28, 1903, and approved by the Mayor May 4, 1903.

Under date of May 29, 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of all of the streets except one shown on the map, and provided that the entire cost and expense should be borne by the City.

Application was made to the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal, but the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company has raised objections sufficient to prevent the appointment of the Commissioners, and in consequence the entire improvement is in statu quo.

On October 16, 1903, the Dock Department presented a map to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval covering the ferry terminal at St. George and part of South street and Jay street as proposed to be widened, and this map was approved.

In the compromise offer made to the Comptroller by the railroad company, an additional strip for the widening of Jay street, extending from DeKalb street to Richmond terrace, and containing 21.7 city lots, was to be included for the sum of \$15,000, in excess of what the company had agreed to accept, to wit, \$25,000, making a total of \$540,000.

As the company had previously valued this same strip at \$45,000, and as up to date the City had been estopped from obtaining it by condemnation proceedings, by the action of the owner, the railroad company, it seemed extremely advantageous to the City to acquire it at the present time at such a price in connection with the Dock improvement, thereby making quite a saving to the City at large, it being immaterial whether the bonds to pay the additional \$15,000 were to be Corporate Stock of the Dock Fund or Street and Park Opening Fund.

Under the present plan of the Dock Commissioner he is bound to construct and maintain the parts of South and Jay streets shown on the terminal map, and he objects to this area being increased.

This objection is entirely removed by the action of the President of the Borough of Richmond, who informs me that he has written the Mayor stating that if the additional strip for Jay street is included in an amended water-front map, and acquired by purchase under an agreement between the Dock Department and the railroad company pursuant to its latest offer, then upon the day when the City takes title, the Dock Commissioner may turn over not only the additional strip of Jay street, but also all of Jay street and South street as now shown on the water front map, and that the Borough President will assume jurisdiction over, construct and maintain the said streets, without charge upon the Dock Fund.

Instead, therefore, of the Dock Department being burdened with an increased cost of \$100,000, as estimated by the Commissioner in his money statement, the Department will be saved at least an equal sum for the construction of the streets now shown on its map.

This, however, is a mere detail of bookkeeping, for the improvement is to be made at the cost of the City, but I merely cite this incidentally to show that the Dock Fund is benefited rather than burdened by the proposed plan, and again it may be stated that the whole improvement may be delayed indefinitely if a compromise in some form is not reached, and the railroad company should continue its objections to the condemnation proceedings.

II.—In regard to the three boats proposed to be purchased by the City on October 1, and then leased to the operating company, I would state that I have advised you from the commencement of these negotiations that, in my opinion, they should not become the property of the City. The Dock Commissioner, however, in communication of May 19, 1904, to the Special Committee of the Sinking Fund Commissioners, stated that it was "necessary for the City to secure these boats," and as the Dock Commissioner will be responsible for the operation of the ferry when the present operating company ceases, I withdrew my objections in order to avoid hampering the Commissioner's plans. In consequence, these boats have been a factor in all negotiations since that time, and I fail to see why their purchase eight months prior to the time when the Dock Commissioner proposed to take them should act as a bar to an otherwise advantageous settlement.

III.—In the financial statement, the Commissioner does not credit the Comptroller's proposition with the \$15,000 per annum for the lease of the St. George terminal, nor does he debit his own proposition for the reduced rental which the City will obtain when the ferry company gives up half of its Whitehall street terminal on December 1, 1904, to permit of the alterations. Nor is credit given for the value of the additional land, 21.7 city lots, which will be acquired under the Comptroller's proposition.

Making these corrections in the comparative statement, it will be found that the City will be the gainer by accepting the present compromise, as follows:

Showing direct saving of \$50,000, and the cost of constructing and maintaining the streets now shown on the water-front map instead of being an additional charge of \$100,000 on the Dock Fund, will be borne by the President of the Borough and, in consequence, effect a saving to the said fund of an amount nearly equal.

I believe, therefore, that there can be no doubt that the acceptance of the present offer is in the interest of the City, and at the same time will decrease the amount of bonds to be issued on account of the Dock Fund from the amount required under the Dock Commissioner's offer.

1. The Commissioner of Docks to enter into an agreement with the Rapid Transit Ferry Company for the continuation of the ferry service between the foot of Whitehall street, Borough of Manhattan, and St. George, Borough of Richmond, to begin as of June 1, 1904, and to terminate the first day of June, 1906, or sooner, at the option of the City, on giving 30 days' notice; the annual rental to be fixed at the gross sum of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500); the agreement to provide for the right of the City to enter upon the terminals at the foot of Whitehall street and at St. George, in order to make alterations necessary for the operation of the ferry by the City, but with as little inconvenience to the Rapid Transit Ferry Company as possible.

2. For the improvements at the foot of Whitehall street, in the Borough of Manhattan, the City is to pay one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000), and for those at St. George, seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000). These payments to be made at the time of the execution of the foregoing agreement.

3. The City to pay for the ferry-boats, "Garrett" and "Castleton," the sum of two hundred and forty-five thousand dollars (\$245,000); for the "Southfield," thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000); for the "Westfield," twenty-three thousand dollars (\$23,000); for the "Middletown," twenty-two thousand dollars (\$22,000). These sums to be paid at the expiration of the said agreement or at the time of the termination of the agreement if it be sooner terminated.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, relative to the vesting of title in the City of Pier, old 19, or Maiden Lane Pier, East, and Pier, old 20, or Burling Slip Pier, West, and the bulkhead between said piers, East river:

To the Executive Committee:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that it has received from the City Superintendent a communication, stating that additional school accommodations are urgently required in the vicinity of New York avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and recommending that the premises at the southeast corner of Atlantic and New York avenues, known as No. 63 New York avenue, be leased for the purpose of affording relief to this congested locality. The Departments of Health and Buildings have certified that the sanitary and structural condition of the premises is satisfactory.

Your Committee has carefully considered the matter, approves the recommendation of the City Superintendent and submits for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be, and they hereby are requested to authorize a lease of the three-story brick building known as the Bedford Academy, and situated at No. 63 New York avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period from February 1, 1905 to July 1, 1907, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of twenty-two hundred dollars; the lessor, George R. Rodemann, No. 63 New York avenue, Brooklyn, to keep the roof in repair, and give possession of the premises where alterations are to be made on January 1, 1905, the Board of Education to make the necessary alterations and exterior repairs during the term of the lease.

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they hereby are requested to authorize a lease of the three-story brick building known as the Bedford Academy and situated at No. 63 New York avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period from February 1, 1905, to July 1, 1907, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at annual rental of \$2,200; the lessor, George R. Rodemann, No. 63 New York avenue, Brooklyn, to keep the roof in repair, and give possession of the premises where alterations are to be made, on January 1, 1905, the Board of Education to make the necessary alterations and exterior repairs during the term of the lease."

Subsequently the Committee on Buildings of the Board of Education amended the foregoing resolution to read as follows:

"Premises on the southeast corner of Atlantic and New York avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, consisting of Nos. 63 and 65 New York avenue, and the lands adjoining, being a frontage of 106 feet on Atlantic avenue and 120 feet on New York avenue."

I have had the property examined and beg to report that the plot of ground on the southeast corner of Atlantic and New York avenues, size 106 feet by 120 feet, and has erected on one portion of it two three-story brick dwellings, size about 40 feet by 45 feet, with a two-story brick extension in the rear, known as Nos. 63 and 65 New York avenue.

No. 63 is occupied as a private academy, with three class rooms on the first floor, three on the second, and sleeping rooms on the third floor. The basement is fitted up as a gymnasium. There are two toilets in the house and two in the yard.

No. 65 is occupied by one family as a residence and is the same as No. 63, except that the extension is not so deep, and there is a bath room instead of a toilet on the first and second floors. The buildings are connected by a doorway in the party wall, which affords means of egress from one building to the other, but is now locked. The tenant has been notified to vacate by February 1. The assessed valuation for the purposes of taxation for the year 1904, for this property, is \$19,500.

The advantages of this property over many leased properties for school purposes is the amount of playground, about 60 by 100 feet on the corner of Atlantic and New York avenues.

The Board of Health and the Bureau of Buildings have reported favorably on the condition of the premises for school purposes. The rent asked, \$2,200 per annum, while full value, is not excessive, and I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the premises on the southeast corner of Atlantic and New York avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, consisting of the two three-story brick dwellings, Nos. 63 and 65 New York avenue, and the lands adjoining, having a frontage of 106 feet more or less on Atlantic avenue and 120 feet on New York avenue, for a term from February 1, 1905, to July 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$2,200, payable monthly, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, the lessor, George R. Rodemann, to keep the roof in repair, and to give possession of the premises where alterations are to be made, prior to the date of occupation, if possible, the owner to pay the taxes, assessments and the ground and building water tax, the Board of Education to make the necessary alterations and exterior repairs during the term of the lease, with the exception of repairs to the roof. Lessor George R. Rodemann.

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that on October 26, 1904 (see Minutes, page 2779), a resolution was adopted, requesting the Secretary to notify the owner of the premises at Potter and Steinway avenues, occupied as an annex to Public School 8, Borough of Queens, that the lease which will expire February 15, 1905, would not be renewed thereafter.

On January 9, 1905, your Committee agreed to restore certain partitions, which it was found necessary to remove, when the premises were surrendered, and this work, as well as the removal of the fire-escapes which were erected in accordance with the requirements of the Fire Department, render it essential to occupy these premises for another month.

It is therefore recommended that the former action of this Committee be rescinded, and that the lease be renewed on a month to month basis.

The following resolutions are submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That so much of the resolution adopted October 26, 1904, as relates to the non-renewal of the lease of the premises at Potter and Steinway avenues, be and it is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they hereby are requested to authorize a lease from month to month of the premises at Potter and Steinway avenues, occupied as an annex to Public School 8, Borough of Queens, said lease to date from February 15, 1905, at a rental at the rate of \$2,000 per annum, otherwise on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Owner, Mrs. Mary A. Williamson-Boyd, Central avenue, Flushing, Long Island.

SIR—The Board of Education, at a meeting held January 25, 1905, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they hereby are requested to authorize a lease from month to month of the premises at Potter and Steinway avenues, occupied as an annex to Public School 8, Borough of Queens, said lease to date from February 15, 1905, at a rental at the rate of \$2,000 per annum, otherwise on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Owner, Mrs. Mary A. Williamson-Boyd, Central avenue, Flushing, Long Island."

No report has been received from the Bureau of Buildings or the Department of Health on the condition of these premises, and from the preamble of the above resolution it appears that the premises will not be occupied by children or teachers after the expiration of the present lease. It is also stated that on January 9, 1902, the Committee on Buildings agreed to restore certain partitions which it was found necessary to remove when the premises were surrendered, and this work, as well as the removal of the fire-escapes which were erected in accordance with the requirements of the Fire Department, renders it essential to occupy these premises for another month.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the renewal of the lease of the premises at Potter and Steinway avenues, Borough of Queens, from month to month, from February 15, 1905, at an annual rental of \$2,000; otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; lessor, Mrs. Mary A. Williamson-Boyd.

JANUARY 31, 1905.

Sinking Fund Commission, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The Citizens' Committee of Brooklyn, who are endeavoring to find a remedy for the crowding at the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge, respectfully ask if the Sinking Fund Commission will consider the proposition of having an arrangement made by which the Fulton and Catharine ferries shall be run without charge to foot passengers between the hours of 5 to 7 P. M. It is believed that if this was done the crowd seeking transportation to Brooklyn at the time named would be divided. The passengers crossing the ferries would find at the foot of Fulton street, Brooklyn, the same trolley and elevated cars as they now use from Park row, Manhattan.

If the suggestion meets with your approval we will appoint a sub-committee to confer with you in regard to details and obtain from the Brooklyn Ferry Company their views in regard to such an arrangement.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their offices, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, Tuesday, December 20, 1904, at 2 P. M.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and Chief Engineer Smith.

Minutes of December 6 and 13, 1904, were read and approved.

- (39) That Road No. 36 be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications, the Engineer having verbally reported that no change is desired thereon.
- (40) That all requests for ripping of embankments above elevation 2,06, or where it is otherwise provided for in contract for new highways, be declined.

The recommendations of the Committee were adopted.

Report No. 1133 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 21, 1904, supplementing Report No. 1014, dated July 11, 1904, recommending with the concurrence of Prof. William H. Burr, Expert Engineer, the modification of plans for the easterly half of Jerome Park Reservoir, was received and laid over.

Second—That the abstract of our said supplemental and amended estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in said City, there to remain until the 9th day of March, 1905.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz:

Beginning at the point of intersection of the middle line of the blocks between Kelly street and Beck street with the middle line of the blocks between Leggett avenue and Avenue St. John; running thence northwesterly along the last mentioned middle line to its intersection with the southwesterly prolongation of the middle line of the blocks between Prospect avenue and Hewitt place; thence northeasterly and northerly along said last mentioned prolongation and middle line and its northerly prolongation to its intersection with a line parallel to and 100 feet northwesterly from the northwesterly line of Westchester avenue; thence northeasterly along said parallel line to its intersection with the middle line of the blocks between Kelly street and Tiffany street; thence southerly and southwesterly along said middle line of the blocks and along the middle line of the blocks between Kelly street and Beck street to the point or place of beginning; as such streets are shown upon the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York, excepting from said area all streets, avenues and roads or portions thereof heretofore legally opened, as such area is shown upon our benefit maps deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our supplemental and amended report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part III., to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on the 11th day of May, 1905, at the opening of the Court on that day.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
