AN ORDINANCE to amend "An Ordinance establishing fire limits in The City of New York," adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 30, 1914, and approved August 14, 1914, and establishing additional restricted limits.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. An Ordinance establishing the fire limits in The City of New York, adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 30, 1914, and approved by the Mayor August 14. 1914, is hereby amended:

(a) By adding a section, to be known as Section 2, to read as follows: Section 2. Except as otherwise specifically provided in any other ordinance, no frome or wood structure shall be built hereafter within the following areas or limits hereinafter referred to as Suburban Limits, and it shall be unlawful to maintain, occupy or use any such structure erected in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the erection, maintenance or occupancy of any frame building to be used exclusively for residence purposes with not more than fifteen sleeping rooms and covering not more than eighty-five per cent. of the width of the lot or plot on which it is erected, and maintaining on at least one side an open space or open spaces as may be necessary to preserve such restriction, or of any one-story frame stable or garage not exceeding 600 square feet in area or 15 feet in height and erected on the same plot with a one or two-family building and maintained on all sides at least 4 feet from any lot line.

No frame, wood or other combustible structure shall be moved from without to within the fire limits, nor from one lot to another within the fire limits, except that when condemnation proceedings have been held and the property has been acquired by the City previous to the enactment of this ordinance, frame buildings located on such property may be moved to any vacant lot within the fire limits provided such buildings shall be so moved before July first, 1915.

(d) By changing the number of Sections 3, 5 and 8 to 4, 6 and 9, respectively. (e) By substituting for Section 6 the following:

Section 7. Enforcement; Penalties. This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code, and each superintendent of buildings shall, in his own borough, enforce its provisions. Any and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall subject the owner, lessee or agent of the building or premises where such violation has been committed or shall exist, and the architect, builder, contractor, or any other person who has assisted in the commission of such violation, to the same legal procedure and the same penalties as are prescribed for violations of the Building Code; and such violations shall be subject to the same legal remedies and prosecuted in the manner prescribed in said building Code.

(f) By substituting for Section 7 the following: Section 8. Existing Provisions Repealed. The following ordinances and sections

(1) That part of Section 142 of the Building Code reading:

No wood building within or without the fire limits shall be moved from one lot to another until a statement setting forth the purposes of said removal and the uses to which said building is to be applied is filed in the Department of Buildings, and a permit be first obtained therefor. No wood building shall be moved from without to within the fire limits";
(2) Section 143 of the Building Code;

(3) Section 145 of the Building Code;



of the second part, WITNESSETH:
WHEREAS, Pursuant to an agreement entered into or about to be entered into between the Company and the Public Service Commission for the First District, the Company agreed or will agree to convey to The City for rapid transit railway purposes, a certain easement in and through the so-called North Shore Freight Yard of the Company located in the First Ward, Bor-ough of Queens, in consideration of the payment by the City to the Company of the sum of two hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$230,000) to reimburse the Company for the cost of altering, relocating and rearranging the tracks and structures of the Company, made necessary by the occupation of said yard by the rapid transit railway (which is a portion of the route known as the "Steinway Tunnel and Queensboro Plaza Route" or "Steiwnay Tunnel Line"), and to be in full payment and satisfaction to the Company

for the easement so to be granted and WHEREAS, The Company, in order to carry applied to the Board for a franchise to construct and maintain certain retaining walls within the lines of Sixth Street, East Avenue and Jackson Avenue, and to construct, maintain and operate certain additional tracks under and across Vernon, East and Jackson Avenues, all in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens, City of New

York: and WHEREAS, The Company agrees that the granting of the franchise so applied for will permit it to make all the alterations and relocations that may be necessary to carry out the rearrangement of its tracks contemplated by such agreement;
Now, THEREFORE, in order to permit the en-

tering into and the performance of said agreement on the part of the Company, and in consideration of the Company's agreeing to enter into said agreement and of the conveyance to be made pursuant thereto, and of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

If grades other than those shown on said map are established, then such other established grades shall be followed.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said structures shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until October 1, 1939, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board. If the parties shall not agree upon the compensation to be paid, if any, during the renewal term, on or before the day nine (9) months before the expiration of the original term, then the matter shall be submitted to three disinterested freeholders to be selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this con tract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties. If such appraisers shall determine that any compensation shall be paid to the City during the renewal term, the parties shall enter into a written agreement providing for the payment of the compensation so fixed and the time and manner of making such payment. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

The filing of such agreement shall constitute a condition precedent to the passing or vesting of the rights hereby granted, or of any nortion thereof, or of any right, interest or property therein. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all louse sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated. and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against

the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all macessful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and sezvants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description herought. demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the remova of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

Party walls and fences, when existing against adacent property not sold, shall not be taken All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed

by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of he Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized cause the sale to be advertised and to direct he sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read. and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless,

as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the adver-tisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart ment, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department,

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do. Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to-gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon applica-tion therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
