MINORITY REPORT:

That the minority of the Committee signing this report has never been regularly notified of any intended meeting of the Committee.

That no opportunity whatever has been offered the public to present objections to the fireless engines, either as to the character of the engine itself, or the utility of its substitution as motive power on our street railroads.

That in the report of the majority of the committee there is not stated a single reason why the members signing that report "are in favor of granting the permission asked for," or why they believe "the same to be an improvement;" and it is but fair to presume that they have no reasons to state, else they suppress information from the members of this Board to which, as legislative officers, we are entitled.

That a perusal of the report of the majority of the committee will satisfy the members of this Board that in a desire to "railroad" those fireless engines, the members of the committee signing that report have not even read the resolution referred to them, as we find it stated in their report, as a resolution "in favor of giving permission to use the railroads of the city."

Accordingly, the minority of your committee recommends that the annexed resolution be adopted.
