

SANITARY BUREAU.

Summary of Work.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending June 30, 1886:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 61,122.

The number of complaints returned was 5,979.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 3,462, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 1,017 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 1,549 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 110 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; and 206 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending June 30, 1886, eight thousand four hundred and ninety-nine (8,499) permits were granted for burials. During the same period one hundred and eighty-four (184) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and fifty-six (756) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and sixty-one (961) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand seven hundred and two (1,702) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and one thousand and seventy-six

(1,076) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and thirteen (113) of marriages, and one hundred and five (105) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand eight hundred and eighty (5,880) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand nine hundred and eighty-four (6,984) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending June 30, 1886, the number of notices issued by the Board was 3.761. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

SIR—There were 887 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 31, 1886, which is a decrease of 45, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 39 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending July 24, 1886, was 930, which is 0.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 33.54 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,441,738.
