

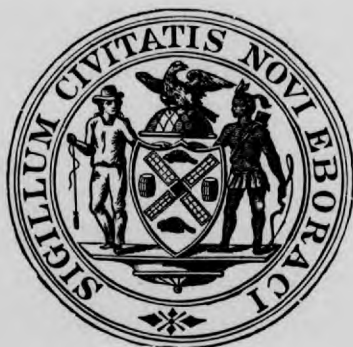

### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held August 4, 1887.

Present—Commissioners Matthews and Marshall.

Absent—The President, Commissioner Stark.

On motion, Commissioner Marshall was elected President pro tem.

The communication from the Counsel to the Corporation and Francis Lynde Stetson, attorney for C. P. Huntington, respecting the rebuilding of Pier, new 37, North river, was,

On motion, laid on the table.

The following communications were received, read and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From his Honor Mayor Hewitt:

1st. Advising the Board that the subject matter respecting increase in the salaries of the Commissioners, under a recent act of the Legislature, will be brought before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at their next meeting.

2d. Stating that the Board will be notified of all meetings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at which matters in relation to the Department are to be considered.

From Department of Public Works—In reference to repairing sewer at Pier 25, East river, and extending same to the outer end of the Pier. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report if repairs have been made to sewer at Pier 25, East river, as stated by Department of Public Works.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction:

1st. Requesting repairs to Pier at Twenty-sixth street, East river, and bulkheads at storehouse, and at Bellevue Hospital, in front of Erysipelas Pavilion. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Approving of the plans submitted by the Board for repairing Storehouse Pier at Blackwell's Island, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for removing old structure and building new structure at Storehouse Pier, Blackwell's Island, East river, as recommended in his report.

From Comptroller of the City—Approving sureties of the Morris & Cumings Dredging Co. for dredging at Piers 12, 13 and 14, East river.

From Police Department—Reporting that the bulkhead at Pier 40, East river, is in a dangerous condition. The action of the Secretary in sending Frank Phelps, lessee, copy of said report, and notifying him that he will be held responsible for any accident that may occur thereat, was approved.

From Simon Stevens, attorney—Transmitting agreements for extending the time for closing contracts with S. Charles Welsh and others to October 5, 1887.

From Nassau Ferry Co.—Requesting permission to erect two frame sheds over ferry bridges at and adjacent to the foot of East Houston street, East river. The action of Commissioner Marshall in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Archibald Scott—In reference to and stating that it would be a great obstruction to his business to remove at present the house erected on the bulkhead south of Twenty-second street, North river. The Secretary directed to notify Archibald Scott to comply with the conditions in regard to the erection of the structure owned by him on the bulkhead south of the foot of Twenty-second street, North river, which prescribed dimensions of eight feet by twelve feet, and which has been put up in excess of these dimensions without any authority either written or verbal being obtained from this Department. The structure alluded to must be reduced to the dimensions specified in the permit on or before the 15th August current, and in case of failure on his part to comply with this order, a fine will be imposed of \$20 per day for each and every day after the expiration of the time specified in this notice, and until the conditions contained therein shall have been complied with.

From Thomas Rochfort, attorney for Frank Phelps—In reference to repairs required to the bulkhead at Pier 40, East river. The action of Commissioner Marshall in replying thereto was approved.

From The East Side Improvement Association—Enclosing copy of preamble and resolutions, requesting the removal of dumping-board located foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Hoboken Land and Improvement Company—Submitting plans and specifications for improvement at ferry premises foot of Barclay street, North river. The action of Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From James W. Elwell & Co.—Reporting obstructions on Pier 28, East river. Referred to the Dock Master to examine and report.

From John D. Crimmins—Reporting that the necessary repairs will be made to the bulkhead foot of Ninety-sixth street, North river.

From J. A. Phillips, Postmaster, Long Beach—Stating that he had delivered letter to A. W. Tieman.

From Brown & Fleming—Acknowledging receipt of resolution adopted July 27, 1887, authorizing them to use dumping-board at Eightieth street, East river.

From Frederick W. Wright, lessee—In reference to the order to repair fender piles on the north side of Pier 43, East river, and reporting that the said piles were damaged by the dredging machine while dredging was being done in the slip between Piers 42 and 43, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From James H. Caulfield—Requesting payment of bill rendered for legislative documents. Referred to the Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews.

From Captain C. H. Gotham—Requesting a position in the Department.

From Equitable Gas-light Co.—Stating that they will make the repairs required to the bulkhead between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth streets, East river.

From The New York Mutual Gas-light Co.—Reporting partial completion of repairs to Piers at Eleventh, Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Co.—In reference to the stand located on the bulkhead at Pier 51, East river.

On motion of Commissioner Marshall, the order of the Board directing the removal of said stand was suspended for the present.

From S. Charles Welsh—Stating his inability to meet the Board at the time stated. The action of the Secretary in advising that the time has been postponed until Friday, 5th instant, at 11 A. M., was approved.

From Joseph Walsh—Reporting that he has been delayed in the prosecution of his contract for building new Pier foot of Thirty-second street, North river, by the failure of the Department to furnish timber when required. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From J. Dobbins—Requesting lease of bulkhead at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Harlem river, with permission to fill in. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From W. C. Andrews—Requesting permission to build bulkhead between Seventy-second and Seventy-third streets, East river, as per plans and specifications submitted. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Ward & Olyphant—Requesting permission to place hoisting engine and building to cover same at bulkhead southeast corner of Houston street, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From David W. Bogart, Dock Master—Reporting that he had served notices on the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company and the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey to remove advertising signs from Piers, old 26 and 15, and new 23, North river.

From Charles B. Husted, Dock Master—Reporting that he had notified the Albany Day Line to remove advertising sign from Pier at Twenty-second street, North river.

From Patrick J. Brady, Dock Master—Reporting that he had served notice on Thomas Scully and Michael McGirr to vacate dumping-board at Pier foot of Thirty-seventh street, North river.

From Patrick Curley, Dock Master:

1st. Recommending that the bulkhead between Piers, old 42 and new 43, North river, be cleaned, and also recommending that the pavement in front of Pier, new 43, North river, be raised. The action of Commissioner Marshall in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Reporting that he had served notice on the White Star Line to remove advertising signs from north side of Pier, new 44, North river.

From Joseph B. Erwin, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that he had served notice on William H. Cornett to remove sign on building foot of Fifty-first street, North river.

2d. Reporting that he had notified J. H. Miller to remove brick from Pier foot of Forty-seventh street, North river, on or before July 20, 1887; said brick not removed July 30, 1887. The Secretary directed to notify J. H. Miller to show cause, on Wednesday, 9th instant, why penalty should not be imposed for violation of law.

From Charles P. Blake, Dock Master—Reporting hole on the north side of Pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river. The action of Commissioner Marshall in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair was approved.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending July 30, 1887.

3d. Reporting that repairs have not been commenced to the bulkhead and dumping-board at East Thirty-ninth street, East river, by the Long Island Land Fertilizing Co. The Secretary directed to advise said company of the report made by the Engineer-in-Chief, and request an explanation why said work has not been done.

4th. Reporting non-commencement of dredging at the bulkhead north of Fifty-fourth street, East river. The Secretary directed to request Mr. Guggenheimer to advise the Board when he proposes to do said work.

5th. Reporting non-commencement of repairs to bulkhead between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth streets, East river.

6th. Reporting loose fender-pile south side of Pier at Seventy-ninth street, North river. Notify Union Dredging Company to refasten pile, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6479, dredging required in half slip adjoining Pier at Fifty-first street, North river.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6820, in reference to the application of John Gillies, requesting that the time to complete work under Contract No. 240, building Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, be extended to August 15, 1887.

On motion, the time was extended as requested.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6814, repairs required to Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street and the bulkhead between East Twenty-fourth and East Twenty-fifth streets, East river. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6799, recommending that permit be granted to the Consolidated Gas Co. to renew gas-pipe under Pier, new 46, North river. The action of Commissioner Marshall in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6735, that he had superintended placing pipe under Pier, new 32, East river, by George V. Hecker & Co.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6687, that he had superintended the erection of coal pockets on the bulkhead between Houston and East Third streets, East river.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6721, that he had superintended the work of making alterations and additions to the rooms on the north side of Pier A, North river.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6740, that he had repaired Pier at Thirty-eighth street, North river.

14½. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6778, that he had repaired Pier at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, North river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6817, that he had directed and superintended the fitting of a new lamp-post and lamp at pier foot of Thirty-seventh street, East river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6750, that he had superintended repairing bulkhead between Piers 3 and 4, East river.

Commissioner Marshall, to whom was referred the communication from C. H. Mallory & Co., requesting the Board to suspend the order to dredge slip adjoining the easterly side of Pier 20, East river, submitted the following report:

In reference to the communication of C. H. Mallory & Co. in reply to an order from the Department dated July 18, 1887, to dredge the easterly side of Pier 20, East river, to a depth of twenty-five feet at mean low water, I beg to report that the lease executed by C. H. Mallory has less than one year to run, namely, to May 1, 1888, and that when it was entered into the depth of the water adjoining the premises occupied by C. H. Mallory & Co. was, according to their statement, but ten feet at mean low water; it would seem, therefore, somewhat of a hardship to exact from them so large an amount of work just prior to the expiration of the contract with this Department, and I would accordingly recommend that the order be suspended.

On motion, the report was received and the recommendation adopted.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to erect a dumping-board on the south side of Pier foot of Forty-sixth street, North river.

Commissioner Marshall, to whom was referred the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 6537, in reference to the application of C. H. Mallory & Co. for permission to extend shed on Pier 21, East river, offered the following preambles and resolutions, which were adopted:

Whereas, C. H. Mallory & Co. have made application to extend and complete shed on Pier 21, East river, for the distance of ninety-four feet or thereabouts, in accordance with plans which have been submitted to this Department; and

Whereas, It appears that a portion of the pier has already been covered with a shed by C. H. Mallory & Co., permission to construct which was granted by this Board on the 5th December, 1883, with modifications and changes subsequently recorded under resolution dated April 26, 1886, and October 21, 1886;

Resolved, That permission now be given to C. H. Mallory & Co. to construct and complete the extension asked for in accordance with the plans submitted, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and provided that both the original shed and the extension now made or to be made revert to and become the property of the City on the expiration or sooner termination of the lease now held by C. H. Mallory & Co. from this Department, of the right to collect wharfage on said Pier 21, East river, and provided that the covenants, conditions and agreements of said lease shall in no way be affected by anything contained in the permission now granted.

A communication from A. M. Earle, President Consumers' Ice Co., respecting the use of Pier foot of Horatio street, North river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following preamble and resolution, offered by Commissioner Marshall, was adopted:

Whereas, A certain resolution was adopted by this Board at the meeting of June 1, 1887, as follows:

"Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the Consumers' Ice Co. to use and occupy, during the will of the Board, the Pier at the foot of Horatio street, North river (except reservation for public bath at the outerly northerly side), at the rate of \$150 per month, payable monthly or during occupancy, to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing May 1, 1887," now be it

Resolved, That the above resolution be and is hereby rescinded, and that the Dock Master of the district be notified to collect wharfage on all vessels, including those of the Consumers' Ice Co., lying at or making use of said pier.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending August 2, 1887, amounting to \$117,935.62, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

The person or persons making an estimate shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing Stationery and Printing," and with his or their name or names, and the date of presentation to the head of said Department, at the said office, on or before the day and hour above-named, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made to the lowest bidder with adequate security as soon thereafter as practicable.

For particulars as to the quantity and kind of stationery and printing required, reference must be made to the specifications, blank forms of which may be obtained at the office of the Chief Clerk in the Central Department. Bidders will state a price for the work and material furnished in accordance with the specifications. The price must be written in the bid and stated in figures. Permission will not be given for the withdrawal of any bid or estimate, and the right is expressly reserved by the head of said Department to reject any or all bids which may be deemed prejudicial to the public interests.

No estimate will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.



The entire quantity of stationery and printing is to be put up in boxes and delivered at such times and places and in such quantities in each place, as shall be directed by the Chief of the Bureau of Elections.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security, for the performance of the contract in the manner prescribed by law, in the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars.

Each estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same; the names of all persons interested with him or them therein; and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, Head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. When more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. **PROPOSALS FOR ESTIMATES FOR FURNISHING materials and performing carpenter work in the erection of an Armory Building, on Fourth avenue, extending from Ninety-fourth to Ninety-fifth street, New York City, will be received by the Armory Board, at the Mayor's Office, City Hall, until 2 P. M. of the twenty-fifth day of August, 1887, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read by said Board.**

Any person making an estimate for the above work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to the President of said Armory Board, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing Materials and Performing Carpenter Work in the Erection of an Armory Building, on Fourth avenue, extending from Ninety-fourth to Ninety-fifth street," and also with the name of the person or persons presenting the same, and the date of its presentation.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, in the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).

Bidders are required to submit their estimates upon the following express conditions, which shall apply to and become part of every estimate received:

1st. Bidders must satisfy themselves by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, and by such other means as they may prefer, as to the accuracy of the estimate, and shall not at any time after the submission of an estimate, dispute or complain of the statement of quantities, nor assert that there was any misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the work to be done.

2d. Bidders will be required to complete the entire work to the satisfaction of the Armory Board, and in



substantial accordance with the specifications of the contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra compensation beyond the amount payable for the work before mentioned, which shall be actually performed, at the prices therefor to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the whole of the work to be done, in conformity with the approved form of contract and the specifications therein set forth, by which price the bids will be tested. This price is to cover all expenses of every kind involved in or incidental to the fulfillment of the contract, including any claim that may arise through delay, from any cause, in the performing of the work thereunder.

Bidders will distinctly write out, both in words and in figures the amount of their estimates for doing this work.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to attend at this office with the sureties offered by him or them, and execute the contract within five days from the date of the service of a notice to that effect; and in case of failure or neglect so to do he or they will be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet, and so on until it be accepted and executed.

Bidders are required to state in their estimate their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, the estimate shall distinctly state the fact; also that the estimate is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, Head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if said person or persons shall omit or refuse to execute the contract, they will pay to the Corporation of the City of New York any difference between the sum to which said person or persons would be entitled on its completion, and that which said Corporation or the Armory Board may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work to be done by which the bids are tested; the consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered is to be approved by the Comptroller of the City of New York, after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of \$1,250. Such check or money must not be enclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Board who has charge of the Estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk, and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned by the Comptroller to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him by the Comptroller.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

### NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

Third—That the limits embraced by the assessment aforesaid are as follows, to wit: All those lots, pieces or parcels of land, situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by the centre line of the block between One Hundred and Seventeenth and One Hundred and Eighteenth streets; easterly by the westerly side of Eighth avenue; southerly by the centre line of the block between One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Seventeenth streets, and westerly by the easterly side of Ninth avenue; excepting from said area all the streets and avenues heretofore opened, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, at the City Hall, in the City of New York, on the nineteenth day of August, 1887, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
