

The 910 deaths represent a death-rate of 27.70, against 27.65 for the preceding week and 24.99 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 133, 265, 230, 11, 22 and 2, against 141, 209, 223, 14, 25 and 10 for the previous week, a total of 663 against 622, the increase being most marked in measles. Diphtheria increased between Broadway and the Bowery, below Canal street, between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, west of Avenue B, and between Fourteenth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, varying little elsewhere. The increase of measles was most marked below Liberty street, between Division street and the East river, between Houston and Fourteenth streets, west of Broadway, between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, between Twenty-sixth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, and Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, the changes elsewhere being slight. Scarlet fever showed an increase between Broadway and the Bowery, below Canal street, between Division street and the East river, between Division and Rivington streets, west of Norfolk street, between Houston and Fourteenth streets, Sixth avenue and Avenue B, and between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West, elsewhere varying little; 9 of the 11 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street.

A TTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property (who shall also be the owners of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and

assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are torever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.
