Resolved, That for the proper care and prevention of contagious disease in this city it is necessary to continue in the service of this Board the Medical Inspectors and Disinfectors whose term of service expire March 31, 1894, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to appropriate, pursuant to chapter 535, Laws of 1893, the sum of five thousand dollars to pay the salaries of twenty-five Medical Inspectors for two months from March 31, 1894, at one hundred dollars per month, and the sum of one thousand three hundred dollars to pay the salaries of ten Disinfectors for two months from March 31, 1894, at the rate of sixty-five dellars per month; total, six thousand three hundred dollars.

additional amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is
hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:
Resolved, That section 5 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as

follows:

SEC. 5. *That the word "Physician" shall include dentists, and every other person who practices about the cure of the sick or injured, or who has the charge of, or professionally prescribes for, any person sick, injured, or diseased, and any person who pursues the business of or acts as midwite; that the phrase "contagious disease" shall be held to include all persons sick, affected, or attacked by or of a disease of an infections, contagious, or pestilential nature (more especially, however, referring to cholera, yellow fever, small-pox, chicken-pox, diphtheria, ship or typhus, typhoid, spotted, relapsing and scarlet fevers and measles), and also including any new disease of an infectious, contagious or pestilential nature, and also any other disease publicly declared by this Board dangerous to the public health; and every physician in said city shall at all times cause his or her name, office and residence, and also his or her kind and class of practice, to be registered within the Sanitary Bureau and in a manner according to the regulations prescribed by this Board.

The 787 deaths represent a death-rate of 21.19 against 23.22 for the previous week, and 30.64 for the corresponding week of 1893.

The decrease of 75 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 5 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 14 from phthisis, of 14 from diseases of the nervous system, of 15 from diseases of the respiratory organs, and of 23 from violence, partially offset by an increase of 6 in the deaths from influenza, and of 4 from congenital debility.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Nineteenth Ward, from measles also in the Nineteenth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Twelfth Ward.



The 821 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.07 against 23.49 for the previous week, and 31.97 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 202, 335, 147, 6 and 21, against 188, 375, 169, 19 and 21 for the previous week, a total of 711 against 772. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh, Twelfth, Seventeenth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth Ward. The increase of measles was most marked in the Twelfth Ward, and the decrease in the Thirteenth, Eighteenth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eighth and Twelfth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh, Eleventh, Seventeenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-third Wards. Four of the 6 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street, and 2 were above Eighty-sixth street. Thirteen of the 21 cases of small-pox were above Fortieth street, and 4 of the remaining 9 were below Fourteenth street, 1 of them coming from the Marine Hospital on Staten Island.
