

The Committee designs in state that, in the preparation of the Estimate for 1898, the compilation, arrangement and reduction to uniformity have necessarily taken considerable time. The main reasons incidental thereto arise from the difficulties experienced by the School Boards of Queens and Richmond in procuring reliable information and statistics upon which to base their requests p and in this cannection it should be remembered that the changing of the rural school

trustee system, heretofore or vogue in the territory now covered by the boroughs mentioned, so as to confosm to the methods in use is a city like New York, is, of itself, a work of some magnitude. Some difficulty has also been experienced in connection with the Borough of Brooklyn, the business of its School Board having been conducted on different lines from those followed in New York. The School Board for Brooklyn has handled its own funds entirely, and received its appropriations under headings which were very different from those used in New York. The Committee would state that the instructions of the Comptroller, as to antiformity of appropriations, have been carefully complied with, and the estimate is herewith submitted with appropriations of the same names throughout the entire system.

In view of the amount of work involved to the preparation and compilation of the Estimate, and the consequent occessary delay in its final presentation, partial apportionments have heretofore been made through the courtesy of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Comptroller, for which courtesy the Committee desires to express its appreciation and thanks.
