STATED MEETING WEDNESDAY, MAY 24, 1905.

I. No petition has been addressed to your Board in favor of the three and one-half hour day in any grade of the public schools, or in favor of making any change in the present hours of schooling.

III. After giving full public notice your Committee gave a public hearing in each borough. These hearings were attended by representatives of the various petitioning bodies, and by many other citizens interested in educational affairs. Every opportunity was given for the fullest and freest discussion. Condensed reports of the various addresses are attached to this report as appendixes A, B, C, D, E.

In response to a letter addressed by the President of this Board to a number of prominent physicians, letters were received which appear in appendix F.

The views expressed at these hearings and in these communications may be briefly summarized as follows:

I. Public sentiment is overwhelming in favor of retaining the five-hour day, and in this sentiment the Principals and Teachers fully concur.

II. The chief reasons urged in favor of retaining the five-hour day are the following:

(a.) It is confidently believed that, other things being equal, better educational work may be done in five hours a day than in three and one-half hours. The Teachers have more time, and the pupils regard their school work as the important occupation, while in the case of part-time pupils they look upon it merely as an incident in their daily life.

(b.) The five-hour day gives opportunity for that variety of exercise, and that deliberation in progress, which are essential to intellectual growth and physical welfare.

(c.) The fact that, owing to the enormous immigration, there are so many children—easily one-half of the whole number—who are beyond the normal age in the first year of school, renders the longer day necessary.

(d.) The large size of the classes in the first year of school, the average being about fifty pupils to a class, makes the longer day necessary.

(e.) The fact that so large a proportion of our pupils do not speak the English language at all, or speak it very imperfectly, when they enter the school, makes the longer day advisable, in order that they may have larger opportunities for learning the language.

(f.) The longer day is necessary because it withdraws children for a longer time from the dangers and influences, physical and moral, of the street.

(g.) The longer day is necessary because it relieves mothers who are obliged to do their own housework from the care of their children over six years of age, and this enables them to devote themselves to the care of the home and the younger children, while they are relieved of all anxiety regarding those who are older.

III. Those who favored the shorter day were so few—two in Manhattan, two in Brooklyn and one in Queens—that at first sight their arguments might be regarded as a negligible quality. The argument used was that for the children of the normal age of the first year—from six to seven—confinement in school for five hours a day is too long, and may result in disorders of the digestive and nervous systems highly dangerous to the health and happiness of children in after years. To this argument the reply was made that such disorders are, as a rule, not the result of properly diversified school work, but of eating improperly prepared food at irregular intervals, of lack of sleep in tenement house neighborhoods and of sleeping in apartments from which fresh air is excluded by carefully closed windows. Doubtless there is much truth on both sides of this argument. The remedy, however, is not to curtail the school time for all children, the great majority of whom are physically able to stand the strain, but to lighten, by giving shorter hours, the work of those who cannot profit by full-time instruction, in cases where this is proved by proper medical authority.

IV. While the course of study was not specifically under consideration at these hearings, the speakers found it practically impossible to omit discussion of this important subject. Your Committee was deeply gratified to find that the various civic organizations represented had given most careful and intelligent consideration to the subject, and that public opinion is overwhelmingly in favor of retaining drawing and constructive work, physical training, cooking, sewing, singing and organized play in the curriculum of our public schools. These subjects should be retained, not only for their culture value, but for purposes of relaxation.

Your Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. No change should be made in the schedule length of the school day, but where competent medical authority shows that a child suffers physically from five hours a day of school work, the work should be arranged for said child in such a way that he may attend school for a shorter period each day.

2. Greater facilities for play are needed in connection with nearly all our schools. To secure these facilities, we recommend that, in connection with all our new buildings, adequate play space should be provided, and that the Board of Education recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that, in purchasing sites for public playgrounds, such sites should be secured, as far as possible, in the immediate neighborhood of old school buildings where the facilities for play are inadequate. In this connection we desire to commend especially the form of playground connected with Public School 188, Manhattan, in which there is ample space, light and air, while the children are protected both from excessive heat and from excessive cold.

3. While the present course of study is undoubtedly a great improvement over preceding courses, we believe that more stringent regulations should be adopted to secure in all grades more frequent intervals of play, more regular alternations between hand work or physical exercise and head work, and more frequent excursions to neighborhood fields and parks under the direction of teachers, in connection with nature study. In this connection we desire particularly to commend the work now being done by the authorities of the Museum of Natural History in Central Park and of the Botanical Garden in Bronx Park, where nature study is admirably combined with outdoor exercise and entertainment.

The following resolutions are offered for adoption:

Resolved, That it is inexpedient to make any change in the by-laws governing the length of the school day.

Resolved, That it is the judgment of the Board of Education that the play space in connection with the majority of the public schools is insufficient; that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to select sites for public playgrounds as nearly as possible contiguous to schools which are lacking in playground space, and that care be taken to secure sufficient playground space in each site purchased for school purposes.

Resolved, That it be referred to the Board of Superintendents to devise the means for securing greater alternation and variety in school exercises, in order to promote the physical health of children as well as their intellectual progress.

Resolved, That every effort should be made to increase school accommodations so rapidly that the present part-time classes shall be done away with, and that every child of school age shall be afforded the opportunity to attend school five hours a day, and that in particular the financial department of the City Government be urged to greater expedition in the acquisition of sites selected by the Board of Education.

Resolved, That the Board of Education approve the plan of organizing special classes for children who cannot speak English, in order that they may receive special instruction in speaking and writing the English language, so that they may be transferred at the earliest possible moment to the grades which their other attainments entitle them to enter, and urges the Board of Superintendents to organize such classes wherever they may be necessary.

The Committee on Studies and Text Books respectfully reports that it has had under consideration a communication from the Board of Superintendents, under date of June 5, 1905, recommending that sundry changes be made in the course of study for elementary schools. Your committee concurs in the recommendations of the Board of Superintendents and submits for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the following changes in the course of study for elementary schools be and they are hereby approved:

Note—New matter is in italics. Matter inclosed in single parenthesis is to be omitted. Matter inclosed in double parenthesis is to be retained in brackets.

Physical training and hygiene—No change.

Electives. French, German (Latin, stenography), Spanish.

## ENGLISH.

(Study and writing tonic, dominant and subdominant triads in minor keys, and of the diminished triad on the leading tone in major and minor, with its resolution.) Sight singing continued; special attention to changed voices; song interpretation.

Mr. Man moved that the resolutions attached to the report of the Committee be taken up one by one.

The motion was seconded and lost.

Mr. Schmitt moved that the report of the Committee be laid on the table.

The motion was seconded and lost.

Mr. A. S. Stern offered the following as an amendment to the resolutions attached to the report of the Committee on Elementary Schools:

Resolved, That in full-time classes not less than one and one-half hours shall be allotted to recesses and play, under proper supervision; that wherever practical such recesses and play shall be out of the classroom, in play grounds, roof gardens, neighborhood fields, or other places available; that the course of study be modified by simplifying the same to permit of such recreation—the foregoing to be applicable to the first year only.

Mr. Greene moved, as a substitute, that the resolution adopted by the Board on March 29, 1905 (see Journal, pages 533-34), to the effect that the school day be shortened to three and one-half hours in the first year, be rescinded.

Mr. Donnelly raised the point of order that the motion offered by Mr. Greene was unnecessary, as the resolution referred to was simply an expression of opinion.

The Chair ruled that the point of order was well taken.

Mr. Field moved that the amendment offered by Mr. A. Stern be referred to the Committee on Studies and Text Books for consideration.

The motion was seconded and lost.

\*Advanced sewing is to be pursued by girls in the seventh and eighth years in schools not provided with kitchens.

Mr. Schmitt offered the following as a substitute for the pending resolution:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on Elementary Schools and the report of the minority on the shorter school day and the proposed amendment of Mr. A. Stern be referred to a Special Committee of Nine, to consider, determine and harmonize the same, and present to this Board a plan which will embody the features of both reports as far as practicable.

The resolution was seconded and lost.

The President put the question whether the Board would adopt the amendment offered by Mr. A. Stern, and it was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

The President put the question whether the Board would approve the report of the Committee on Elementary Schools and adopt the resolutions attached thereto as amended, and it was decided in the affirmative.

The President announced for consideration the report of the Committee on High Schools and Training Schools, relative to the transfer of William S. Stevens from the Stuyvesant High School to the Morris High School. (See Journal, page 950.)

Mr. Aldcroft moved that this report be laid over.

## Reports Laid Over.

The President announced for consideration the report of the Committee on Studies and Text-books, relative to changes in the course of study.

Mr. Greene moved to strike out the caption "Manual and Domestic Arts." The motion was seconded by Mr. A. Stern.

Mr. Greene moved to amend the motion offered by him so as to insert, instead of the words "Manual and Domestic Arts," the words "Arts and Handicrafts," as applicable exclusively to drawing and constructive work and that the words "Domestic Science" be substituted for the word "Cooking" wherever the latter occurs. It was ordered that the amendment be divided and that the two parts be voted on separately.

The President put the question whether the words "Arts and Handicrafts" should be substituted for the caption "Manual and Domestic Arts," said words being applicable exclusively to drawing and constructive work, and it was decided in the negative.

The President put the question whether the words "Domestic Science" should be substituted for the word "Cooking" wherever the latter occurs, and it was decided in the negative.

The President put the question on the motion offered by Mr. Greene, that the caption "Manual and Domestic Arts" be stricken out, and it was decided in the affirmative.

Mr. Man moved that all the items of drawing and constructive work be grouped under the heading "Drawing and Constructive Work"; that all the items of cord work and raffia work be grouped under the heading "Cord Work and Raffia Work"; that all the items of sewing be grouped under the head "Sewing," and that all the items of cooking be grouped under the heading "Cooking"—each to be a separate heading.

Mr. Harkness moved, as a substitute, that the words "Manual Work and Domestic Work" be substituted for the caption "Manual and Domestic Arts."

The motion was lost.

The President put the question on the motion offered by Mr. Man, and it was decided in the affirmative.

The President put the question whether the Board would approve the report of the Committee on Studies and Text-books and adopt the resolution attached thereto, as amended, and it was decided in the affirmative by unanimous vote.

A resolution was adopted authorizing the Committee on Supplies to have printed twenty thousand copies of the revised course of study for the elementary schools and of the syllabuses to accompany said course, in forms to be prescribed by the Board of Superintendents.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
