## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

New York, June 23, 1908.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

From the City Clerk (77338)—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen May 12, 1908, and approved by his Honor the Mayor, May 20, 1908, allowing three days, with pay, from August 19 to August 21, 1908, to employees of the City who are Exempt Veteran Firemen, in order to attend the annual convention to be held at Otsego N. Y. Filed; orders issued for compliance with terms of resolution.

From the Police Department (77417)—Requesting permission to place a float alongside of the extension of the dock in front of police station foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street; also to use the platform northerly and adjoining the pier foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street. Permit granted for the placing of the float and the use of the platform, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, it being understood that the use of the pier foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street by the Department of Public Charities will in no way be interfered with.

From John H. Starin (77345)—Requesting permission to open asphalt pavement in front of Pier 13, North River, for repairing water main. Permit granted, on usual terms, work to be done under supervision of Chief Engineer.

From Frank B. Arnzen (77442)—Requesting permission to occupy a plot of ground at Broad Channel, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens. Privilege granted to occupy Lot No. 7 of Block 10, an area of 1,008 square feet, to commence July 1, 1908, and to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not longer than May 1, 1912, rental to be at the rate of \$23.98 per annum, payable annually in advance to the Cashier.
