BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1909.

New York, April 1, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals beg to report as follows concerning the quarter just closed:

THE DEPARTMENT AS A WHOLE.

Some important matters affecting the welfare of the Department as a whole have claimed the attention of the Trustees during the past three months. First of these is the appointment of Dr. Winford H. Smith, Superintendent of the Hartford General Hospital, at Hartford, Conn., to be General Medical Superintendent in place of Dr. S. T. Armstrong, resigned. The Municipal Civil Service Commission approved of Dr. Smith's appointment on January 23, and he took up the duties of his new position during the first week in February.

Dr. Smith was born in Westbrook, Maine, and received his preliminary education in the public school there. He graduated from Bowdoin College in 1899. Later he entered the Johns Hopkins Medical School, Baltimore, Md., from which he graduated in 1903. For the next two years he acted as resident gynecologist in Lakeside Hospital, Cleveland, Ohio. From Cleveland he came to New York and entered the service of the Department of Health as Hospital Physician assigned to the Kingston Avenue Hospital, Brooklyn, having passed a competitive examination for the place. He served in the Kingston Avenue Hospital until June, 1906, when he was appointed Medical Superintendent of the Hartford General Hospital, Hartford, Conn., which position he held until he received the appointment in this Department. He has made a specialty of hospital administration, and through his long association with hospitals in all branches is peculiarly well fitted for the place of General Medical Superintendent. During the years 1894 to 1903 he was engaged in the summer hotel business, being the manager of a large summer hotel on the Maine coast. He is a member of the American Hospital Association, which is representative of the leading hospitals of the country. Dr. Smith is exceptionally well recommended and the Trustees are confident of the successful administration of the Department in his hands.

The 1909 Supplies.

The advertisement for contract supplies of 1909 was so much delayed by the necessity of amendment, first to insert and afterwards to remove the so-called discount clause suggested by the Bureau of Municipal Research, that it became necessary to secure permission from the Board of Aldermen to purchase the January supplies in the open market at a sum not to exceed \$50,000. This was finally granted, the sum being reduced to \$35,000.

Permission to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables to the amount of \$11,200 in the open market was asked for and obtained, the increase of \$3,200 over the sum demanded last year being due to the taking over by the City of the new Nurses' Home with its 145 nurses and 30 employees.

The price of chickens and turkeys was so high in the month of January that the Board resolved to cease the purchase of poultry except for the patients until a new contract could be awarded.

An inquiry having been received from the Department of Finance concerning the weighing of coal and the system pursued in examining its quality, etc., it was found upon examination by the Superintendent that while the coal had always been weighed (with the exception of a few weeks at Gouverneur Hospital) and samples were regularly taken for testing, the actual testing had not been done owing to a disagreement between Department officials and those of the Board of Health. It was also ascertained that coal was being paid for on the basis of its net weight, although the contract provided that payment should be made on the basis of its heating value as determined by the British thermal unit. Steps were at once taken to correct this, and arrangements have been made with the Fuel Engineering Company for the systematic analyses of all coal delivered to the Department, in order that the value of the coal may be determined in accordance with the contract. In a report of the Commissioners of Accounts the Department has been complimented upon having the best coal specifications of any Department of the City Government.

Payroll and Budget.

The work of bringing the payroll into agreement with the provisions of the new Budget has proved exceedingly difficult, and the Trustees have been obliged to ask for six months' time in which to make the changes required. The crux of the difficulty has been to find a means of retaining faithful and efficient employees who, as Hospital Helpers, have been engaged in a grade of service found only in hospital administration. To dismiss all of these employees at once would certainly have resulted in dire injury to the service, besides considerable injustice to the persons affected. At the same time the employment of some of them conflicted with the Civil Service Law, inasmuch as certain of their duties pertained to positions classified under the law, and the Trustees were notified that after March 1 the Municipal Civil Service Commission would no longer certify the salaries of these. Then, again, it was discovered that certain grades had never been legally established, or else that no record of their establishment had been preserved, and steps had to be taken with the approval of the Board of Aldermen and the Municipal Civil Service Commission to create these grades anew. A minor difficulty occurred through the practice of paying \$5 a month additional to such employees as were compelled by reason of lack of room in the hospital proper to room outside—this creating a different grade of salary from any mentioned in the Budget. Notice was served upon a number of the oldest and most capable employees that in accordance with the law their services would be dispensed with on April 1, but it has not yet been found necessary to proceed to this extremity, word having reached the Board informally that its request for time would receive favorable consideration. In the meanwhile request has been made for the creation in the Department of the new grade "Hospital Clerk," at a maximum salary of \$900 per annum. This grade exists in the hospital service of the Board of Health and its establishment here would permit of the retention of the employees principally affected, provided, of course, that they prove capable of passing the examination provided.

New Positions Asked For.

The grade of X-Ray Photographer, at a salary of \$1,800 per annum, has been requested for two incumbents. It has been found impossible to secure good men at \$1,200, the salary previously authorized.

Two additional Chaplains with salaries have been authorized and placed in the exempt list.

Action was taken looking to the appointment of an Assistant Architect in the Department, but this was modified later into a request for the creation of the grade "Architectural Draftsman" at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, and request was made simultaneously of the Civil Service Commission to permit the temporary employment of such a Draftsman pending the action of the Board of Estimate upon the first request. The need of this position is very great, the time of the Supervising Engineer being too much occupied with his other duties, even should he always possess the necessary qualifications.

Other positions asked for are a Stenographer (male) at \$1,500 per annum, to attend to the Board minutes and correspondence; Electrical Plumber, Junior Draftsman and Automobile Engineman. The Budget Committee, to which was referred the matter, reported against the employment of an expert to care for the hospital grounds.

It was decided to include in the next annual Budget the request for a certain number of anaesthetists to be paid annual salary of \$750.

Fire Protection and Defence.

Mr. Frederick A. Ross, fire expert and drill instructor, appeared before the Board of Trustees in January to explain his system of fire defence, and was invited to lay a proposition before the Board. His offer to install his system in all the hospitals of the Department for \$600 was accepted by the Board on February 9, and he was directed to begin drilling the employees on the 15th. Mr. Ross made a full investigation of the fire apparatus of all the hospitals with the result of many recommendations for its renovation and repair. New rubber-lined hose was ordered to replace the old linen

hose formerly recommended by the Board of Underwriters. Regular drills have been instituted at all the Hospitals and are attended by better results than was the case under the old system with no expert in charge.

Financial Affairs.

The Board of Estimate in January authorized an issue of revenue bonds in the sum of \$65,000 to make good the deficit in various appropriations for 1908.

From the 1908 appropriation for Supplies, Provisions, etc., the following transfers have been asked for; \$3,300 to supplies, medical, surgical and pathological; \$2,000 to supplies, mechanical, building and grounds; \$200 to telephone account; and \$2,000 to supplies for stable and ambulance.

Dr. Cleveland's completed plan for the keeping of the books of the Department was presented to the Trustees on February 9, and referred to the Finance Committee for examination and report. On February 16, a conference, attended by Dr. Cleveland and Mr. Leonhauser of the Department of Finance and also by the heads of departments, was held with the Board of Trustees to discuss any shortcomings observed in the new system, agree upon details and class of facts needed for information, and to decide upon details adjudged unnecessary in the completed scheme. A public statement made by Dr. Cleveland to the effect that the Board had overdrawn one of its corporate stock accounts was withdrawn by him as incorrect.

Proposed Legislation.

The advice of the Board upon pending legislation was asked frequently during the quarter. Among the matters considered were the following:

Bill requiring ambulance surgeons to have at least six months' experience. This was approved by the Board, the principle having long been recognized in this Department, but the Board advised an amendment permitting modification of the rule in cases of extreme urgency.

Bill forbidding any charge to patients having money in their pockets when admitted to the hospital. This was disapproved.

Bill creating a public hospital on the West Side. Approved.

Bill authorizing the Board of Health to establish an ambulance service. An amendment to this was proposed placing the control of the ambulance service in Manhattan and the Bronx in the hands of the Board of Trustees and in the other Boroughs in those of the Commissioner of Public Charities, and a bill authorizing the creation of ambulance bureaus by these two authorities was approved.

Bill creating a State Labor Colony for vagrants, habitual drunkards, and others. Approved.

Proposed amendment to the Federal tariff bill admitting surgical instruments, apparatus, etc., free of duty. This was approved and the Board addressed letters to all New York representatives asking for their support.

The provisions of the proposed new charter affecting the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals were approved.

Miscellaneous.

Dr. Brannan, whose term of office as Trustee had expired, was reappointed by the Mayor for a period of seven years beginning February 1. On the same date Mr. James A. Farley succeeded Mr. John J. Barry as Trustee, Mr. Barry having been appointed Commissioner of Correction by the Mayor. The Board reorganized during the month of February by the re-election of Dr. John W. Brannan as president, and of Mr. James K. Paulding as Secretary.

Permission having been received early in January to purchase without public letting one automobile ambulance at a cost not to exceed \$4,000, the president was authorized to make the purchase and the department came into the possession of a White steamer ambulance at a cost of \$3,000. Application was made at once for the establishment of the grade of automobile engineman, and pending this action chauffeurs were supplied by the company. The ambulance is similar to one used at the Kings County Hospital and has proved very satisfactory during the short period it has been in use.

A rule has been adopted restricting the number of X-Ray photographs permitted to be taken to those for which an order has been issued by the visiting physician or surgeon, or the assistant visiting physician or surgeon actually on duty in the outpatient department.

New rules defining the duties of the various sub-committees of the Board of Trustees have been adopted and are expected to contribute materially to the efficiency of the Board's work.

Steel stamps have been purchased, by means of which the name of the individual hospital will hereafter be stamped upon the surgical instruments used in the department.

Claims for overtime pay were advanced by the engineers and referred by suggestion of the Board of Finance Department.

The Board has been advised by the Law Department that it has no authority to permit the withdrawal of a bid once accepted. Another opinion from the same department permits the making of changes on a patient's record in certain cases, as, for instance, upon receipt of new information.

The question of compulsory vaccination of patients was referred to the General Medical Superintendent to take up for consultation with the Board of Health.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

Pathological Department and Men's Dormitory.

Fair progress has been made in these buildings during the past quarter. In the men's dormitory the finishing white coat of plaster has been applied to all walls and ceilings throughout the entire building; the marble partitions in the bath and toilet rooms are being erected; and the marble treads are being laid on the stairs. Boilers have been set for temporary heat.

In the pathological building all terra-cotta partitions have been erected; all wire lathing is completed, excepting for the ceiling of the sixth story and the autopsy room; the tile flues throughout the building are installed and connected to the main duct; and the work of plastering is now underway on the ground and first floors.

Boiler House and Coaling Station.

Work on this building has been unexpectedly delayed, owing to the failure of the Department of Finance to approve the contract, which was awarded to the R. J. Carlin Company for the construction of this building on December 8, 1908. The Comptroller's certificate was only signed on March 2, 1909, but preliminary arrangements have been made by the contractor and it is expected that the actual work of construction will be begun within the next few days.

Training School for Women Nurses.

The new building was certified by the architects on January 16, as ready for acceptance by the Board, but as the Board had received no notification concerning the time extension, if any, to be allowed under the terms of the contract, action was deferred at that time. On the 25, formal action was taken accepting the building upon the understanding that Mr. Parker, the contractor, should appear and make satisfactory statement of his reasons for not completing the work within the required time. This Mr. Parker did and his bill of \$76,801.63 for the final payment was presented on February 9, referred to the Building Committee, and approved for payment.

The interior equipment of the building remained incomplete, the first need being the lighting fixtures. Advertisement for bids upon the greater efficiency metalized filament lamps recommended by the architects was authorized on January 22. The bids received in response to this advertisement proved unsatisfactory and the Board felt obliged to reject them and to advertise anew. The same course was taken again in regard to the second bids received, and it was decided to require a sample of the fixture upon which the bid is made. At the third bidding, reported to the Board on March 9, the bid of L. Perelson for \$4,496.50, being the lowest received, was accepted. In the meanwhile permission had been received from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to install temporary drop lights in this building. Authority to advertise for bids upon the cutlery, china and linen required has just been obtained from the Board of Estimate. Additional helpers have been assigned to the Training School to keep the building in proper condition and protect the property until it can be put into actual use.

Advertisement for bids upon the work of laying out the training school grounds was authorized on January 25, but permission to award the contract has only just been received from the financial authorities. It is estimated that the work will cost \$12,000.

The New Laundry Building.

Approval of the designs and location for the new laundry building was received from the Art Commission in January, and the final plans and specifications were furnished by the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead and White, during the first week in March. A resolution was adopted at that time asking for an appropriation of \$585,000 for the construction and equipment of this edifice, the next to be undertaken in the creation of a new Bellevue.

The Fence and Grounds.

The contractors for the erection of a fence about the grounds have asked an extension of the time allowed them for the work, on the ground that they had not been permitted to begin as soon as they had counted on doing. Upon recommendation of the architects, it has been decided to reckon the time on their contract from March 15.

Mr. Barta, an expert in the lay-out of grounds, recommended by Mr. Samuel Parsons of the Park Department, has been retained at a fee of \$150 to go over the ground conditions at Bellevue and prepare specifications for the improvement as to soil, tree-planting, etc., that he may recommend.

Isolating Ward, Doctors' Rooms and Reception Office.

At the request of the Trustees, \$10,000 has been appropriated for the purpose of converting one of the wards into an isolation room for the care of patients who may develop contagious disease, and two others into additional rooms for the house staff, who have long suffered from insufficient accommodation. Upon receiving word from the Finance Department that the sureties would be approved and the contract certified when ready, the matter was referred to the President to confer with Messrs. McKim, Mead and White, upon the appointment of an assistant architect to complete the necessary plans and specifications.

Special revenue bonds in the amount of \$4,700 have been voted by the Aldermen to erect a temporary reception office at the Twenty-sixth street gate and to construct a transfer room on the ground floor of the hospital proper. This must receive the approval of the Board of Estimate before the money becomes available.

The Roosevelt Ambulance District.

The Trustees having received notice from Roosevelt Hospital of the intention of the managers of that institution to abandon the ambulance service hitherto maintained by them in the middle West Side district, Dr. Brannan was named a committee to confer with the Roosevelt Hospital authorities regarding the assumption of this service by Bellevue. A resolution of the Board of Aldermen later requested the Board of Trustees to take up and provide for the service, and a letter from Mr. Nathan Bijur, recommending the same course, was forwarded from the Mayor's office. In furtherance of this plan considerable time was spent in negotiations for a lease of the premises at No. 210 West Fifthty street, which seemed suitable by situation and adaptability for the purposes of a relief station in connection with the ambulance work. A ten days' option on the house has been obtained, but in the meanwhile the Board has been informed that the Police Commissioner has divided the abandoned district between the Flower and the J. Hood Wright Hospital districts and that accordingly there remains nothing for the Trustees to do in the matter.

Fire Protection.

The theft of couplings and nozzles from the fire hose in the hallways has called renewed attention to the need of vigilance against the possibility of fire. The recommendations of Mr. Ross, recently appointed Fire Expert for the Department, have been numerous and comprehensive, and the necessary steps have been taken to carry them out. Two Watchman's time clocks with twenty-four key stations each have been ordered for Bellevue, and it has been decided to install a fire alarm system, for which bids are now being asked.

Medical and Nursing Services.

The temporary appointment of a fourth year student as substitute on the outside service had to be allowed early in March, it being found impossible to secure the services of a graduate.

A member of the house staff was assigned temporarily to sleep in one of the new pavilions at night in case of emergency service.

The proportion of mental and physical cases in the alcoholic division has given rise to considerable discussion, and a committee has been appointed to investigate with a view to determining the best system of management for this service.

The tuberculosis service also formed the subject of a conference with the Medical Board, and while no change in its management was suggested, it was decided to require reports to the Medical Board. In connection with this service a room has been set aside for the fumigation of patients' clothing.

Permission to reprint the Bellevue Nomenclature in the Medical Journal has been gladly accorded by the Board of Trustees.

The introduction of nurses from the Mills Training School (men) into the Psychopathic Ward has been agreed to upon recommendation of Dr. Gregory, the resident alienist, and the appointment of a woman nurse for night duty in the male Psychopathic Ward is expected to make for better discipline and increased efficiency there.

So many special nurses for particular patients have been requested of late by the visiting physicians that the Executive Committee of the Medical Board have been asked to investigate the matter and to make some recommendations.

It was decided to ask in the coming Budget for an increase of \$300 per annum in the salary of the Assistant Alienists and \$600 in that of the Assistant Pathologists, the reason for the difference being that the Alienists live within the hospital and receive their maintenance, while the latter live outside.

Improvements and Repairs.

The Supervising Engineer was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for a covered passageway to lead from the main building to Pavilions A and B.

The appropriation of \$10,000 will make possible many renovations and repairs on the old ferryboat "Southfield," now used as a day camp for consumptives. The same appropriation is available for the "Westfield" at Gouverneur.

Slight changes have been made in the sterilizing and Crane operating room at a cost of \$100.

A signal improvement in the Superintendent's office has been effected by the erection of a glass screen reaching to the ceiling, thus accomplishing the purpose of a private office.

In compliance with the order of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity all gas stoves have been removed from the Mills Training School.

New telephones have been installed in the Doctors' dining room, the workshop of the Carpenter, Painter, Plumber and Electrician, the fifth floor of the main hospital building, the ferryboat "Southfield," the convalescent relief office, and an additional one in the office of the General Medical Superintendent. All were judged necessary, those in the several workshops rendering it possible to dispense with the services of one or more Messengers.

Miscellaneous.

A new safe has been purchased for the Property Clerk's office at a cost of \$325.

A present of two hundred bath robes has been received from Messrs. S. Pearson & Son, contractors for the East River Tunnel. These have been assigned to the use of the tuberculosis patients.

The matter of paying an additional amount to employees living outside the hospital has been taken up for adjustment with the financial authorities. The present practice is to allow \$5 per month additional.

A temporary breach to allow the entrance of the contractors' dredges has been left in the new bulkhead wall at the foot of East Twenty-ninth street.

Census.

The total number of admissions and the average daily census for the quarter were 9,251 and 1,064, respectively, as compared with 8,536 and 925 during the corresponding quarter of 1908. The total number of patients treated was 10,194, as compared with 9,454. The number of visits made to the Out-Patient Department was 24,732, as compared with 22,655 during the same quarter of last year.

GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

The trouble with the former contractors having been at last adjusted and the way opened for the completion of the hospital upon proper lines, great difficulty has been experienced in finding a contractor to come in and undertake the unsatisfactory labor connected with repairing the defective work left by the previous firm Mr. Van Name, the first contractor approached, offered approximate estimates only, feeling that actual conditions could only be learned after the work had begun. As under this plan the commissions to the architect and builder, as well as the salary of our own Inspector, would amount to a large sum, it was determined to take the matter up piece-meal, getting bids from various contractors for the large jobs and attending to the smaller ones wherever possible with the Department's own workmen. The contract for piping and making all necessary repairs was accordingly let to Gillis & Geoghegan for the sum of \$4,550, being \$1,000 less than that previously offered for the job.

In pursuance of their policy of renting or purchasing new quarters for the overcrowded dispensary, the Trustees have requested the Sinking Fund Commission to rent for a period of one year with privilege of renewal and, if possible, with option of purchase, the property at Nos. 6, 8 and 10 Gouverneur slip, the annual rental to be \$2,500. In the meanwhile plans and specifications for the changes that would be necessary in the building to adapt it to dispensary purposes are under preparation.

In the meanwhile it is believed that something can be done to relieve the congestion in the dispensary by paying small salaries to certain of the physicians and medical attendants, thus placing the authorities in a position to command their services at regular hours when most needed. The Board approved of this suggestion at the meeting of February 9 when it was first made, and it was decided later that a sufficient sum of money should be asked for as would permit the payment of twenty physicians the sum of \$300 annually. A resolution inviting the Board of Estimate to establish a grade in accordance with this recommendation was passed, and the matter of selecting the doctors to be paid was referred to the General Medical Superintendent and Miss Stowers, Supervising Nurse of the Hospital.

An eye clinic has been established at the dispensary, the hour being placed late in the afternoon so as to interfere as little as possible with the other classes.

Money has been secured to put the old ferryboat "Westfield" into proper condition for use this summer as a day camp for tuberculosis patients.

Steps have been taken to repair the fire alarm and watchman's time clock service, in accordance with the suggestion of Mr. Ross. The basement has been cleared of refuse and some of the tanks near the elevator shaft removed.

At the request of the Supervising Nurse an increase of five Pupil Nurses for duty in the wards has been approved and arrangements made with the Charities Commissioner for their appointment.

Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

On January 14, Dr. W. H. Stewart was appointed Photographer and X-ray Operator to Gouverneur Hospital at a salary of \$150 a month and the following were appointed Clinical Assistants: Dr. Newton Craig, eye, nose and throat; Dr. J. H. Friedman, medical; Dr. H. J. Epstein, medical; Dr. J. A. B. Kanter, eye, nose and throat, and Dr. William Levy, nose and throat.

On February 16, Dr. A. R. Braunlich, Assistant Visiting Physician, resigned.

On February 23, Dr. B. M. Dear, interne, resigned; Dr. E. C. Axtel's term of service was shortened from eighteen to twelve months; Dr. Joseph F. Fallon was appointed to a 12-month service dating from January 1, and Dr. M. Rosenthal, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, was dropped from the roll.

Census.

The total number of admissions and the average daily census for the quarter were 1,108 and 157, respectively, as compared with 879 and 135 during the corresponding quarter of 1908. The total number of patients treated was 1,253, compared with 991. The number of visits made to the out patient department was 27,344, as compared with 23,375 during the same quarter of last year.

HARLEM HOSPITAL.

A plan devised by the Medical Board under which each interne shall serve twenty months in the hospital has been approved by the Trustees and will be tried for an experimental period.

The contractors for supplying the grounds of Harlem and Fordham Hospitals with trees and shrubs did not set out the number specified in the contract and were directed to make good the shortage. At the time when they presented their bill it was impossible to determine whether the plants would thrive or not, and the Trustees finally took from them a bond guaranteeing the City against loss in case any trees or shrubs should not survive.

Two lamps are to be placed at the main entrance to the hospital on Lenox avenue. Mr. John F. Kuhn, the contractor for furnishing and setting new cast iron floors to the balconies, has rendered a bill for final payment amounting to \$933. Before paying it the Board instructed him to prepare a written statement of the cause for the delay in the work. This will be referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion of the Board's power in the matter. The painting of the balconies has been completed and estimates have been asked on the work of removing the rust stains from the window sills and stone trimmings.

The lease of the building, No. 113 West One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, now in use as a home for the Nurses, has been renewed, and the house next door containing accommodation for 13 additional Nurses, has been leased at an annual rental of \$1,200. It is hoped that the construction of the new building will soon be authorized by the City, as it is badly needed.

A new operating room stand for the use of students and attending surgeons has been supplied. A dispute arose over the bill, and as the changes required did not seem to be due to any neglect on the part of the contractor, he was allowed \$50 additional on the work.

It has been decided to construct a small shed back of the boiler house for the storage of the garbage cans. These have hitherto presented a very unsightly appearance upon the hospital grounds. This shed will also be used to store the alcohol, oils, and other inflammable material which would be a menace in case of fire. This material will be kept in a separate apartment under lock and key.

A watchman's clock with twenty-four key stations has been installed and specifications are being prepared for the installation of a new fire alarm system.

The Medical Board has requested an entirely new set of surgical instruments, and the matter has been referred to the General Medical Superintendent for investigation.

Census.

The average daily census for the quarter has been 147, as compared with 115 for the same quarter of 1908. There have been 1,379 admissions during the quarter, as compared with 1,223 during the corresponding quarter of last year. The total number treated has been 1,529, as compared with 1,334 during the corresponding quarter of 1908; 26,698 visits were made to the Out Patient Department, as compared with 19,447 during the same quarter of last year.

FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

The Civil Service Commission has been requested to hold a promotion examination for Miss Detwiler, who has been Acting Supervising Nurse at Fordham Hospital. It is hoped as the result of this to appoint her permanently to the place.

On account of illness among the seniors, request was made to allow one of the junior house Surgeons to take the ambulance calls. Rather than abrogate its rule requiring six months' experience as an Ambulance Surgeon, the Trustees appointed as a substitute a graduate with three years' general experience.

It was decided not to proceed at present with the plan of erecting a work shop on the hospital grounds.

The wooden doors throughout the hospital are badly split, and a proposition has been made to replace them with American compound doors. These doors have a two-inch thick flush veneer birch, and the firm offers to supply 87 of them at a cost of \$667.51. The matter is at present under advisement by the Committee on Buildings. Estimates have also been obtained on painting and varnishing the entire hospital. Another matter requiring attention is the condition of the sinks in the pantries, bath rooms and kitchen. These are at present of wood, but it is proposed to replace them with alberene stone, this substance answering better to the requirements in a hospital.

The privilege of removing the ashes from the hospital grounds was accorded to M. E. Wilkinson for one year for the sum of \$25. The Board at first declined Mr. Wilkinson's proposition, proposing to dump the ashes in the low ground to the north of the hospital, which is now being filled in by the authorities of St. John's College, but it was found that no wagon was available for use in this work and that it would involve considerable expense to obtain one for the purpose.

A watchman's clock with twenty-four key stations, as at Harlem, has been ordered for the hospital.

Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

On February 23, the resignation of Dr. H. Eichel from the house staff was accepted.

On March 16, Dr. K. S. Kennard, Clinical Assistant in the Out Patient Department, resigned.

Census.

The average daily census for the quarter has been 142, as compared with 109 for the same quarter of 1908. There have been 661 admissions during the quarter, as compared with 516 during the corresponding quarter of last year. The total number treated has been 778, as compared with 619 during the corresponding quarter of 1908.

Five thousand four hundred and eighty visits were made to the Out Patient Department, as compared with 3,502 during the same quarter of last year.

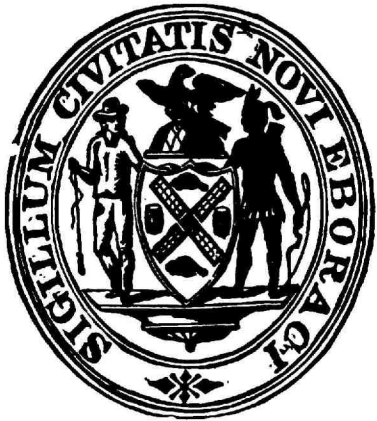

No water closet or privy vault shall be constructed without adequate provision for the effectual and proper ventilation and cleansing thereof.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
