COMMISSIONER OF LICENSES.

Annual Report of the Commissioner of Licenses for the Year Ending May 1, 1911.

New York, April 29, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the accompanying report concerning the work of the office of the Commissioner of Licenses for the license year just ending, the period being from May 1, 1910, to May 1, 1911. This is the seventh annual report, the office having been established by act of the Legislature in May, 1904.

Attached to the report is a summary or table showing in statistical detail the work for the past license year. Respectfully, HERMAN ROBINSON, Commissioner of Licenses.

What the Employment Agency Law Does.

The employment agency law, passed by the Legislature seven years ago, has been amended almost every year since. All the amendments were designed to extend its scope. It regulates not only intelligence offices for servants, but theatrical, clerical stenographic, shipping and labor agencies and nurses' registries.

The enforcement of the law is given to the Commissioner of Licenses, who appoints a Deputy Commissioner and the necessary Inspectors. The office was not intended to be a revenue producing office. Its functions were to regulate and supervise. It was called into existence because of certain conditions which existed among employment agencies, and the Commissioner thinks he is justified in saying that those conditions—especially those relating to immorality and extortion—no longer

The number of employment agency licenses has been doubled since the office was brought into existence, and the revenue now exceeds \$20,000 a year.

As most of those dealing with employment agencies are foreign-speaking persons, it is necessary for some of the employees of the Commissioner's office to have a working knowledge of the various European tongues.

Complaints against all kinds of employment agencies are investigated, but many of them cannot be disposed of until after hearings at which witnesses testify. and stores, with definitely understood hours of labor. The increase in the number of

These hearings take place before the Commissioner or Deputy Commissioner. During the past license year there were 1,039 such hearings. The total number of complaints investigated was 2,275.

Employment agencies are now conducted on a practical business basis, as a result of strict enforcement of the law. No longer do they swindle the poor foreigner in search of work; no longer do the East Side agencies keep dishonest servants on their lists. In short, the employment agency business, which has grown immensely in volume in this City during the past five years, is on as high a plane as any other.

Some employment agencies who really swindle their clients try to prevent official interference by keeping outside of the law—that is, by refusing to take out licenses. The Commissioner has had to prosecute these concerns in the criminal courts. During the year there were 16 proceedings instituted in the criminal courts against unlicensed agencies.

The main object of the employment agency law is to afford protection to those who did not have it heretofore, poor persons in search of work. But it also affords protection to the employer who deals through the agency as well, and when the

This report deals in detail with the various features of the employment agency business in relation to the law. Incidentally it indicates that the employment agency business, which reflects accurately the conditions of commerce and industry, is far duller than it was a year ago.

Fees Refunded to the Unemployed.

Refunding of fees to those who paid them to get employment and were disappointed is a material part of the work of the office. A few years ago it was far from being the general custom among employment agents to return fees for any cause whatever. A fee once in possession of an agent would remain there as far as the customer was concerned unless the customer was particularly belligerent and haled the agent to court.

Some of the persons so imposed on were poor, such as unskilled laborers out of work or unemployed female servants. To these persons, under the circumstances, a dollar was a large sum of money.

During the past year, as shown by the summary at the end of this report, about 4,000 was refunded by agents upon the direct order of the Commissioner of Licenses.

Most of this money was in sums ranging from 50 cents to \$2. Every agent who accepts a fee, either from the employer or the employee, must give a receipt for it. This receipt is of prescribed form and has printed on the back that section of the law governing fees. And the printing, moreover, must be in a language which the person who gets the receipt can understand. There is no reason, therefore, that, with these safeguards, the humblest person should be robbed by an employment agent. All sorts of means are indicated whereby redress can be obtained. A complaint lodged with the Commissioner of Licenses, even if anonymous, is certain to result in an investigation.

The number of complaints investigated during the past license year exceeded 2,000. No doubt, the number would be greater if everyone who had a complaint would take the trouble to make it; but, nevertheless, the Commissioner sees a tendency on part of the agencies to lessen the number of complaints against them. The complaints average less than three per annum per agency, and these include the complaints that have no merit, as well as those which have. It is only fair to state that there are many agencies in The City of New York against whom no complaints of any kind has ever been made, and these are agencies which have been in ousiness several years.

Fewer Servants Sought This Year.

Industrial conditions are reflected in employment bureaus, and at present the najority of agents say business conditions must be 25 per cent, poorer than a year ago. The tendency of the modern family of means is to abandon the private dwelling for the up-to-date apartment house or hotel, and to dispense with the family servants, but this would not explain the decided falling off in the number of requests for servants, inasmuch as, under normal conditions, a natural increase is expected. Many agents have recently gone out of business, and many more merely retain their business in the belief that there will soon be a marked change for the better.

Of 480 agencies supplying domestic help, 288 report a decrease in the number of their orders, 108 an increase, and 84 estimate the volume of their business to be the same as it was during the early part of 1910. Their explanation is simply that fewer people want servants, but, in spite of this, the servants ask and get higher wages than they did last year because the supply of servants is still below the demand.

New York City suffers no more from a scarcity of available domestic servants than other places. The demand in Canada is even greater, and the wages offered in some parts of the Dominion are nearly as high as the average wages paid to domestics here. Canadian employment agents have this year invaded the South and are taking negro help into Canada. Several employment agents in New York City were engaged in this line of work a few years ago, but most of them have abandoned it. The Southern negress was willing enough to come to New York when her fare was paid by the agent, who was later reimbursed by the employer. The girl was to work for a stated wage until her transportation was paid. Very often she refused to work the specified time or was dissatisfied with the place, and the arrangement was broken, with a loss of money either to the agent or the employer. Of course, the girl gained her point by having had her fare paid to New York.

Much thought is directed towards solving the servant problem. All who think on this subject are of a mind that, if domestic service were made more attractive, many more girls would desire to go into it. But it must be made more attractive in more ways than one. When the servant in the house is placed more nearly on the same footing with the business girl in the office, the supply of servants will be greatly increased. Many families in apartment houses are now employing young women by the day to do certain prescribed duties, and find the arrangement working fairly well.

The employment agencies attached to the Young Women's Christian Association in Brooklyn and one or two others report that above 5 per cent. of the servants placed by them this year are white native-born American girls. This would be significant if it were not that the tendency of native-born American girls to accept domestic service is still slight. Even the English-speaking foreign girl does not wish domestic service except as a last resort. As far as the domestic servants' agencies are concerned, therefore, the great bulk of their business is done with girls from middle and eastern Europe, who may, however, have been in this country for several

Beginners in Stenographic Work Plentiful.

It may look strange that employment agencies who provide positions for young women as typists, office assistants, telephone operators, inexperienced stenographers, etc., where the wages run from \$6 to \$8 a week, are literally crowded with girls every day in search of employment, while in the agencies where the domestic servants can get places at far better wages (for their hire includes board and a comfortable home), there is a painful scarcity of applicants for work. The same class of young women who apply at the stenographic agencies are willing to go into department stores at very low wages. The contrast is best shown by the scale of fees which the agencies charge for getting work. The girl in the stenographers' agency willingly pays the whole of her first week's salary for a job, while the servant is so much in demand that she need pay nothing to the agent for putting her in a situation. The latter makes the employer pay the fee for both.

Solving the Servant Problem.

The servant question is agitated persistently and from various viewpoints. No one should have a better understanding of it than the employment agents whose business it is to bring servant and employer together, and probably no one's opinion is less sought. Any woman in public station or any sociologist will undertake to solve the servant problem on the basis of some trite theory. The employment agents seem to think that the nearest the heads of households can come to solving the problem for themselves is not to try to show the servant that she is a menial, but to freely concede that she has rights which should be respected. Some families have voluntarily increased the wages of their servants when they thought such increases were deserved by faithful attention to duties, just as progressive employers will voluntarily increase the pay of their bookkeepers or stenographers. Such families are able to keep their servants, not perhaps because of the wages, but because of their tolerant attitude towards the servants' rights and independence.

The more observant of the employment agencies give it as their opinion that employers of servants are finding it to their advantage to lift the household worker out of the dependent class and make her status more like that of employees in offices

"day workers," or servants who work by the day and return to their own homes at Licenses. If the labor agent sends men (on speculation) to a place where there is no night, is indicative of the tendency in this direction. But it is clear that the working hours of servants, as well as their periods of recreation, must be better systematized than at present if the difficulties of the problem are to be lessened.

Servants' Wages Going Higher.

While, as shown above, the demand for servants has diminished in 1911, there is no reduction in the wages paid or offered. The servant is still master of the wage situation. On the East Side of Manhattan, where foreign-born girls are furnished exclusively, the average wage scale (including board, of course), for 1910 and 1911 is about as follows:

In the other agencies throughout the City where English-speaking servants are furnished the wage scale varies more and is higher. Cooks who last year received \$25 a month are, many of them, working for \$35 a month now. Waitresses and general houseworkers receive as high as \$25 a month, as against \$22 a year ago, while laundresses ask for \$25 and \$30 a month. When servants are paid more than this they are not frequenters of employment agencies.

Employers Now Get Honest Servants Through Agencies.

People hiring servants through employment bureaus get better help now than they did when agencies were not strictly regulated. References of all servants are investigated, and it is only when the employer waives such investigation that an agency can furnish a servant without references.

This fact is of public importance. No servant who has been dishonest with a former employer can foist herself upon a new employer through the aid of an agency. Heretofore agencies could give fictitious references to prospective employers who had neither time nor opportunity to investigate them. Now the references themselves are investigated as part of the regulative work of the office of the Commissioner of Licenses and an agency dealing in counterfeit references is bound to lose its license.

The effect of this regulation is two-fold. Employers can count upon getting reasonably honest servants through agencies, and the latter have gained appreciably in general reputation. The majority of dishonest servants are not hired through employment agencies. Occasionally a dishonest servant is found in an agency, but in such an event the agent must show a clear record in regard to references or suffer the

Nor can agents now use the services of three or four girls for the sole purpose of collecting fees. Formerly an agent could send a girl to work in a place just long enough to collect the fee from the employer, when he would order the girl to leave and send her to a new place, where the process would be repeated. When an instance occurs of an agent sending the same girl to more than one place within a given time, the circumstances are investigated, and if the agent is guilty of wrongdoing he is disciplined.

It is no longer profitable, therefore, for agencies to deal crookedly with customers and as a consequence the business of the employment agent is on a higher plane than it ever was. The more undesirable agencies have been abolished, and it is no longer necessary to make wholesale revocations of licenses in order to assure fair business dealings between the agencies and the public.

Unskilled Labor Market Poor.

Labor agencies report conditions worse than last year. The present spring was not nearly so good as the spring of 1910. Railroad construction work was not pushed this year, in spite of the fact that railroad presidents have said that the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission forbidding an increase in freight rates would not affect the policy of improving and extending the railroads.

One employment agency sent 1,200 letters to different parts of the United States a month ago requesting facts as to the demands for labor; almost all the replier received to date say that the demand is far below that of last year. The same agency received 250 letters from persons representing gangs of laborers of from 20 to 40 men, each asking whether the agency could find work for the men. Such inquiries are unusual, showing so many unskilled laborers out of work.

An Italian labor agency, which in March, 1910, got orders for 884 men, had in March this year orders for only 119. The wages have fallen from an average of \$1.65 a day to \$1.50 a day.

The demand for experienced farm help has always exceeded the supply, but this year it shows a marked drop. Four typical agencies in Greenwich street which supply farm help exclusively furnished 611 farm hands during January, February and March, 1910, and only 510 during the same period of the present year. The average if he likes. wages paid to farm hands is \$18 a month, which is a very small fraction under the average wage of a year ago. Neither the Federal labor bureaus nor the State Department of Agriculture have been able to place any more men on farms this spring than they were formerly.

The chief demand for unskilled labor at present comes to the employment agencies from county and village officials who are pushing public works and building roads If the railroad men are backward in making improvements, the growing popularity of the motor car and the corresponding demand for better roads has to some extent compensated the labor market.

Why Men Decline Farm Work.

Persons interested in the subject ask why men insist on looking for work a railroad building, road making, quarrying, drain digging, stone breaking and so forth when the farmers are calling for men and when the farm laborer can find a better home with better food on the farm than he can when he is living with gangs of his fellows in a railroad shanty in the midst of, sometimes, deplorable surroundings Employment agencies say that the fault lies mainly with the farmer, who is loath to pay fair wages, who works his farm hands from sunrise to sunset, denies them recreation and keeps them only in the rush season. But the fact is probably that experienced farm hands form but a small percentage of the immigrants who comto the United States. Canada and other countries get the best class of farm hands because they send agents abroad to seek them out and direct them where to go.

The farm hands sent out by the New York employment agencies compose the following percentages by nationalities: Polish, 52; German, 22; Irish, 9; Hungarians, 4: Swedish, 4; native born, 7; scattering, 2. The Italian and Greek laborers prefer to travel in gangs or communities, and neither desire nor are asked to do farm work

The total number of men sent out of the City by employment agents as contract laborers during the license year ending April 30, 1911, was 39,539, of whom 3,267 were sent on transatlantic ships as cattle attendants. These figures do not include the number of farm hands furnished, as the law makes no provision for the employment agencies reporting the number of farm workers they supply.

Law Helps Laborers.

Laborers get more protection from the employment agency law than any other class of wage earners. A few years ago it was the custom of agencies to send unskilled laborers out of the City in gangs to work under conditions of which they these proposals, may offer suggestions relative to the difficulties which must surround could possibly know nothing in advance. Bad food, poor wages and quarters in any such plan. Some persons advocate free bureaus for the supply of domestic which it would be improper to house even cattle were their lot. In the case of Italian laborers, the greater part of their wages went to the commissary man or padrone. The men, being mostly foreigners and unable to speak the language of the country, had no redress. To the contractors and their foremen the laborers were known by numbers only, and were treated as if they were not human beings.

Even now they have inadequate remedy for the injustices of unfeeling taskmasters, and the impositions of the commissary men, but the employment agency law governs absolutely the labor agent who sends laborers to the work and compels him to furnish them with such details of the conditions governing the employment that they know what to expect in advance. Any deception or misinformation regarding these conditions may result in the revocation of the labor agent's license and keep him out of the business.

Each agent must give to every man sent out of the City as a contract laborer a statement in a language which he can understand, containing the following particulars of his employment: Name of contractor, nature of work, hours of labor, wages offered, place where work is to be done, cost of carfare to place and by whom raid. The agent must also tell, if asked, whether or not there is a strike at the work. A duplicate copy of every such statement must be filed with the Commissioner of alities are varied, and the characteristics diversified. This fact should be considered.

work, he must refund to them the amount which it costs them to go and return.

Many complaints are received regarding non-payment of wages, etc., over which the Commissioner of Licenses has no jurisdiction, because the law gives him no power over employers, but all such are referred to the proper quarters, so that any laborer aggrieved may have some redress.

The receipts given the men when they pay fees for work, the copies of the law, etc., displayed in all agencies are all printed in languages which the men can understand. All of these circumstances have been of benefit to the laborers, and do much to relieve them from the extortion and injustices hitherto imposed.

Agency Law Confuses Theatrical Performers.

Business methods of theatrical employment agents are so different from those of other employment agents that it is difficult, if not impossible, to draft a statute which will regulate all in a common-sense way. The employment agency law, as originally drafted, was devised for domestic servants' agencies. The regulation of theatrical agencies came in as an afterthought.

A year ago an organization representing vaudeville performers had the act amended to rather radical views. The result was a cumbersome law, contradictory in places, and imposing a mass of work upon the office of the Commissioner of Licenses, which has since been found to be unnecessary. Besides, it was difficult of interpretation, the phraseology being involved. But, with the aid and by the advice of the Corporation Counsel, the Commissioner has been able to get it into a kind of working order.

The employment agency law regulates the agents only in their relations with the principals, these being the employer and the employee. But theatrical agents appear to be more than mere agents, in some cases assuming the functions of the theatre manager or owner, and in some cases representing the vaudeville performer. The methods of employment agents dealing with dramatic performers are entirely different from those dealing with vaudeville performers. There were other agents, known in the business as club agents, furnishing performers to clubs and societies on occasions, but the Corporation Counsel, in a recent opinion, held these to be actually employers and not agents and consequently not amenable to the employment agency law.

Therefore, the situation is involved. The theory of the law is to protect the performer (or any employee) in his relations with the agent. But it does not interfere with the relationship of the manager and the performer. What they do in the way of making contracts is their own business. In practice, however, the law does not attempt to regulate the agent, even when he is acting as the representative of the manager. The performers themselves (for whose protection the law was amended) are far from understanding the purport of the law, because most of the complaints lodged by them in this office were based upon statements that managers defaulted in the payment of their salaries. The collection of salaries from managers is no part of the employment agency law, but the vaudeville performer argues that the agent, acting for the employer, should be responsible. Otherwise, why does the Legislature compel the agent to procure a license and to furnish a bond of \$1,000 to the City, he asks. There is now pending in the United States Circuit Court a proceeding to test the constitutionality of certain sections of the employment agency law relative to theatrical agencies.

The Commissioner of Licenses this year redrafted the law in an effort to clarify it. and submitted it in its amended form to the Legislature in the hope that that body would pass a law governing employment agencies of all kinds, which law could be understood and at the same time enforced.

Only Poorly Paid Performers Need Protection.

If anyone wants protection from the agent, it is the poorly paid performer, rather than the "star" who commands a fantastic salary. The vaudeville artist, who gets \$1,000 a week, is not likely to be robbed by the agent. If there is any virtue in the law, it should be extended to the singer, the pianist or other performer at the moving picture exhibition, who gets on an average \$3 a night, while employed. Many of these are employed for one night only, or for two or three nights at a time, to appear at small theatres in New York City and in suburban towns. But in each case where the performer deals with an agent there must be a contract drawn, and this contract must be submitted to the Commissioner of Licenses and must be approved by him before it can be operative.

Frequently a performer is engaged at an agency in Forty-second street or in Brooklyn, at 6 o'clock in the evening to appear the same night at 7 o'clock at a small theatre in Newark or some nearby city, and the law holds that the contract must first be transmitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Licenses. The sponsors of the law argue that this is for the protection of the actor. In such an instance as that referred to here, the actor wants his \$3, and he hurries to Newark to get it, telling the agent he can have the contract approved next week, or next year,

Theatrical Agencies Surrendered Licenses.

One result of the amending of the law last year was that several agents became the representatives of the managers outright, ceasing to be agents, and surrendering their licenses. Others undertook to be the representatives of the performrs outright, also ceasing to be agents. In this way, they got outside of the law altogether. The number of theatrical agency licenses surrendered since the amended agency law went into effect was 84, including 30 known as club agents. Of 158 theatrical agencies licensed during the license year, there are but 74 in business now.

The real purpose in licensing theatrical agents was to prevent extortion in the collection of fees or commissions. If an agent representing the manager, or employer, collected a commission another agent representing the performer also collected a commission and the combined commissions might amount to 12 or 15 per cent, of each week's salary, payable by the performer. The employment agency law provided that the gross fees charged individually and collectively by agents must in no case

exceed 5 per cent. of the salary. This and other features, such as compelling the agents to keep books and record entries of transactions, to furnish certain information to the performer and to refrain from giving false information regarding bookings, are all commendable. But, when the law imposed the approval of contracts on the Commissioner, submitted by a person who was not supposed to represent either of the parties to such contracts, and also caused the agent to give to the performer a verified statement regarding the financial standing of every manager with whom he did business (a statement which the performer cares little or nothing about and which is of no use because only the agent and not the person making it is required to swear to it), it seems to go beyond the bounds of mere regulation, and to become prohibition altogether. It would look more honest to suppress the business of the agent, and indeed in some cases (as the surrender of licenses attests), the law has done so, but with no apparent benefit to the performer. The agent merely devises a plan to operate outside of the law, untrammeled by any restriction.

The number of contracts submitted by theatrical agents and approved by the Commissioner of Licenses will average about 140,000 a year.

Proposed Free State or Municipal Employment Bureaus.

Regarding the propositions often made to establish free employment bureaus at the expense of the City or State, the Commissioner of Licenses, while not opposing servants, such as those existing in Europe. Many more favor the plentiful establishment of labor bureaus.

There is such an element of individuality in the employment agency business that it is doubtful if it could ever be carried on successfully on a large scale. The only purpose of a free employment bureau is to give a suitable employee to the person who wants one. If the employee does not suit, or even if the employer does not suit the employee, the effort is a failure. This is where the personality of the man or woman conducting the employment agency counts. That such bureaus can be properly conducted in New York City on a theory, or according to legal rules and regulations, is improbable.

Women hiring servants through City or State bureaus might expect so much of these servants that the latter would not stay in their employment. Undoubtedly, such employers would look for better service from public than from private agencies, and failing to give it, the public employment bureaus would be condemned. Even if they are fairly successful in other countries, their success here must be regarded as doubtful.

Other countries, as a rule, deal with one nationality principally. Here the nation-

The theory supporting the establishment of State labor bureaus is that unemployed immigrants should be distributed. Of course, they must be sent to places where work exists, and, if the work exists at different points, the problem of transportation, including expense, must be considered. If the employees sent a distance by State bureaus do not suit the employers, the result can readily be imagined.

Several philanthropic labor bureaus have been established in this City, but they have not supplanted private labor agencies to any appreciable extent, and they are undoubtedly conducted more conscientiously than public bureaus would be conducted. Incidentally, they are conducted at a financial loss.

One labor bureau conducted by the State of New York for several years was finally abandoned. The only State bureau in existence now is that of the Department of Agriculture. The Federal labor bureau is really more of a bureau for giving information to immigrants than anything else.
