EXECUTED AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF NEW YORK AND THE LONG ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANY, PROVIDING FOR THE ELIMINATION OF GRADE CROSSINGS ALONG THE MAIN LINE, BETWEEN SUNNYSIDE YARD AND JAMAICA; THE MONTAUK DIVISION, THROUGH RICHMOND HILL, AND PORTIONS OF THE ATLANTIC DIVISION AND THE OLD SOUTHERN ROAD IN JAMAICA, BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

(At the meeting of the Board held on June 29, 1911, resolutions were adopted approving the agreement and authorizing its execution.)

The following were ordered printed in the minutes and filed:

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF NEW YORK AND THE LONG ISLAND RAILROAD COMPANY, PROVIDING FOR THE ELIMINATION OF GRADE CROSSINGS ON A NUMBER OF STREETS IN THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS, AND FOR A PAYMENT BY THE CITY TOWARD THE EXPENSE THEREOF.

This agreement, made and entered into this 21st day of July, 1911, by the Long Island Railroad Company, a railroad corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York (hereinafter referred to as the "Long Island"), as party of the first part, and The City of New York, a municipal corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York (hereinafter referred to as the "City"), as party of the second part.

Whereas, The "Long Island," for its corporate purposes and in order to promote the safety of the public and to facilitate the use of the railroad property of the said "Long Island," proposes, among other things, to eliminate all grade crossings on its existing line of railroad between Winfield and Jamaica avenue, near Dunton; on its Montauk Division through Richmond Hill; and on its Main Line, Montauk and Atlantic Divisions through a portion of Jamaica; to construct a new line of railroad between Woodside and Winfield commonly known and referred to as the "Woodside-Winfield Cut-off"; to lay certain additional tracks; to construct new and extended facilities at Jamaica for handling passengers and freight; to extend or lengthen certain bridges on its Main Line of railroad; to construct new bridges at certain points upon its railroad; and

Whereas, The "City" is desirous and willing that such work be done in order that the development of a permanent street system in The City of New York may be facilitated, and unnecessary changes avoided in the grade of the railroad of the "Long Island," and in the streets, avenues and highways now crossing said railroad or which may cross it in the future; and in order that all future grade crossings of the said railroad by City streets, avenues or highways may be also avoided; and is willing, among other things, to contribute towards the expense of such work a fixed and definite sum of money; and

Whereas, The "Long Island" is willing and proposes to convey to The City of New York such rights or interests as it may have or control in certain lands, and to acquire and cede to or reimburse the "City" upon its acquisition of certain other lands required for the construction of new or deflected streets, avenues or highways as hereinafter set forth; now, therefore, this indenture witnesseth:

That for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar (\$1) by each of the parties hereto to the other in hand paid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, and in consideration of the promises, covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, the parties hereto covenant and agree as follows:

The "Long Island" covenants and agrees:

First—To remove from that portion of its present route between Woodside avenue, Woodside, and a point slightly east of its present Winfield Station, its two Main Line and two North Side Division tracks, and substitute for them the six tracks named under "Fourth" of the obligations of the "Long Island" as the Woodside-Winfield Cut-off, eliminating thereby the ten (10) existing grade crossings on its line of railroad as at present constructed in this territory (at Woodside avenue, First street, Fifth street, Stryker avenue, Woodside avenue, Queens boulevard, Laurel Hill boulevard, Hyatt avenue, Fisk avenue, and Ramsey street), and to eliminate all existing grade crossings along the line of its railroad known as its "Main Line," from and including Maurice avenue at Winfield, to and including Jamaica avenue; and to construct and maintain at its own expense bridges and abutments therefor, in accordance with general plans and profiles hereunto annexed, over and across or under the following named streets, avenues or roads, as same are shown on the tentative or Final Maps or plans of the "City."

1. Woodside avenue, 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
2. First street, 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge having a clearance over the street grade of fourteen feet.
3. Fourth street, 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge having a clearance over the street grade of 17 feet.
4. Fifth street and Stryker avenue, 60 and 75 feet in width, respectively, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge with columns on curb lines and in centre of roadway of Stryker avenue having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
5. Eighth street, 70 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge with columns on curb lines, having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
6. Roosevelt avenue (new street), 80 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge with columns on curb lines, having a clearance over street grade of 14 feet.
7. Woodside avenue, 80 feet in width, which will be carried over the six-track railroad by a highway girder bridge with columns between tracks, having a clearance over the tracks of 16 feet 6 inches.
8. Rowan avenue, 60 feet in width, which will be carried over the six-track railroad by a highway girder bridge with columns between tracks, having a clearance over the tracks of 16 feet 6 inches.
9. Hyatt avenue, 80 feet in width, which will be carried over the six tracks by a highway girder bridge with columns between tracks, having a clearance of 16 feet 6 inches.
10. Burrough avenue—Foot subway under six tracks, having a headroom of 8 feet.
11. Lee avenue, 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge with curb columns, having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
12. Queens boulevard, 200 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track bridge having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet, to be of such design and with such supports as may be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.
13. Fisk avenue and Adams street, 80 and 60 feet in width, respectively, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge with columns on curb lines, having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
14. Ramsey and Monroe streets, both 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge, having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
15. Maurice avenue, 70 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge with columns on the curb lines, having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
16. Grand street, which will be carried over the six-track railroad on a steel structure encased in concrete, having a roadway 40 feet in width, and two 13-foot sidewalks, clearance 16.5 feet.
17. Caldwell avenue, 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.
18. Woodhaven avenue, 100 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track girder bridge with curb columns, having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
19. Penelope street, 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a six-track bridge having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.
20. Yellowstone avenue, 80 feet in width, which will be spanned by a four-track girder bridge with curb columns, having a clearance of 17 feet over the street grade.
21. Continental avenue, 80 feet in width, which will be spanned by a four-track girder bridge with curb columns, having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.
22. Metropolitan avenue, 100 feet in width, which will be spanned by a four-track girder bridge with centre of roadway and curb columns, having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.
23. Hillside avenue, 100 feet in width, which will be spanned by a four-track girder bridge, with centre of street and curb columns, having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.
24. Jamaica avenue, 100 feet in width, which will be spanned by a four-track girder bridge, with curb columns, having a clearance of 14 feet 7 inches over the street grade.
25. Ridgewood avenue (new street), 80 feet in width, which will be spanned by a four-track girder bridge, with curb columns, having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.

Second—To eliminate the existing grade crossings at Richmond Hill on the Montauk Division of its railroad, at St. Anns avenue, at Park street or Briggs avenue, and at Jamaica and Lefferts avenues; and the existing grade crossings of the Main Line, Montauk and Atlantic Divisions of its railroad, at Van Wyck avenue, Dunton, and at Rockaway road, Jamaica; and the existing grade crossings along the line of its railroad known as the "Old Southern Road," at Beaver, Catherine and South streets, all in the Borough of Queens, City of New York; and to construct and maintain at its own expense bridges and abutments in accordance with the general plans and profiles annexed, over and across or under the following named streets, avenues or roads, as same are shown on tentative or Final Maps of the "City," at

1. St. Anns avenue, 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a two-track girder bridge having a clearance over the street grade of 12 feet.
2. Ashland street (new street), 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a two-track girder bridge, with columns on the curb lines, having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
3. Briggs avenue, 100 feet in width, which will be spanned by a two-track girder bridge, with columns in the centre of street and on the curb lines, having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet.
4. Jamaica and Lefferts avenues, 100 feet and 80 and 60 feet in width, respectively, which will be spanned by a two-track girder bridge having a clearance over the street grade of 14 feet, with columns in the street.
5. Ridgewood avenue (new street), 80 feet in width, which will be spanned by a five-track girder bridge, with curb columns, having a minimum clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.
6. Maure avenue (new street), which will be carried beneath the tracks and property of the "Long Island" by a reinforced concrete arch, with a 32-foot span, so as to provide two 6-foot sidewalks and a 20-foot roadway, with a clearance at the centre of roadway of 14 feet.
7. Van Wyck avenue, 100 feet in width, which will be spanned by a thirteen-track girder bridge, with centre of roadway and curb columns, having a minimum clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.
8. Foley avenue (new street), which will be carried under the tracks and property of the "Long Island" by a reinforced concrete arch, with 32-foot span, so as to provide two 6-foot sidewalks and a 20-foot roadway, with 14-foot clearance at the centre of roadway.

9. Guilford street (new street), 100 feet in width, which will be spanned by a twelve-track girder bridge, with centre of roadway and curb columns, having a minimum clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.

10. Rockaway road, 80 feet in width, which will be spanned by a ten-track girder bridge, with centre of roadway and curb columns, having a minimum clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.

11. Church street, which will be carried beneath the tracks and property of the "Long Island" by a reinforced concrete arch of 32-foot span, so as to provide two 6-foot sidewalks and a 20-foot roadway, with clearance of 14 feet at the centre of roadway.

And across the "Old Southern Road" of the "Long Island" at

12. Beaver street, 60 feet in width, which will be spanned by a two-track girder bridge, having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.

13. Catherine street, 80 feet in width, which will be spanned by a twelve-track girder bridge with curb columns having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.

14. South street, 50 feet in width, which will be spanned by a four-track girder bridge, with curb columns, having a clearance of 14 feet over the street grade.

Wherever the words "Clearance over tracks" are used said words shall be construed as clearance over top of rail of said tracks as said elevation of top of rail is shown upon the plans and profiles attached hereto; and wherever the words "Street grade" are used said words shall be construed to mean the grade or elevation of the street as established or to be established, and as shown upon the tentative or Final Maps of the "City."

Third—To eliminate the existing grade crossing of the North Side Division of its railroad at Queens boulevard by the construction of the necessary bridge to carry its railroad over said street upon a steel structure supported upon temporary foundations, so constructed as to provide a vertical clearance of fourteen (14) feet and a clear width of roadway of thirty (30) feet at right angles to the street, with two (2) fifteen (15) foot sidewalks.

Fourth—To construct on the line of the said proposed Woodside-Winfield Cut-off a six (6) track railroad from Woodside avenue, Woodside, to a point just east of its existing Winfield Station, and to lay four (4) additional main running tracks on the line of its existing railroad known as the Main Line, from the said point just east of its existing station at Winfield to a point a short distance east of Penelope street; and two additional main tracks from the said last mentioned point to a point east of Van Wyck avenue.

Fifth—To lengthen the existing bridges on its Main Line of railroad at Woodhaven, Metropolitan and Jamaica avenues, to conform to the increased width of such streets, as shown on map or plan of The City of New York, and to raise its existing bridge at Hillside avenue to conform to the grades established by the City map.

Sixth—To build a new passenger station at Jamaica and greatly extend its facilities for handling passengers and safeguarding the conduct of its business, both passenger and freight, by the elimination of all crossings at grade for trains of different routes.

Seventh—To cede to the "City" for use as a public highway—subject to the "Long Island's" right to operate its railroad by bridge over same—the bed of Guilford street at Jamaica, as shown on the attached plans and profiles, 100 feet in width, from the southerly line of its right of way and property to the southerly line of Jamaica avenue, as shown thereon; and to construct a bridge, with curb and centre of roadway columns, and a minimum clearance of fourteen (14) feet over the street grade, as shown on the said profiles, to carry all of its proposed twelve (12) tracks over said street; also to cede to the "City" for use as a public highway that part of Wisner place, near North Wyckes street, where the "City" is hereinafter required to change the street lines; also to cede to the "City" for highway purposes such portions of the present right of way of its existing line between Woodside avenue, Woodside, and Winfield, as may be abandoned by the construction of the Woodside-Winfield Cut-off, and as would fall within the lines of streets regularly mapped; also to acquire and cede to the "City" or to reimburse the "City" for the expense of acquiring land needed for a fifty (50) foot marginal street adjacent to the northerly slope of the proposed Woodside-Winfield Cut-off to connect Trimble and Hicks streets; also to cede to the "City" the land required for the bed of Calamus avenue at Newtown Heights, to connect Woolley and Woodhaven avenues, and to regulate and grade same; and to construct foot bridge across its tracks for the purpose of connecting Remsen avenue and Joost place. Also to compensate the "City" for any expense which the latter may incur in acquiring title to land required for new portion of Beaver street, Jamaica, where it is hereinafter proposed to change the lines of said street at the first angle point east of Church street; also to regulate, grade and pave said Beaver street where relocated; also to grade and pave for temporary use a marginal street on the south side of its property between Prospect and Washington streets, Jamaica.

The "Long Island" will also cede to the "City" for street purposes where it now owns or may acquire land for the extension or opening of Archer place, from Van Wyck avenue to Division street; Johnson avenue, from Van Wyck avenue to Division street, and unnamed streets proposed on the property now occupied as a freight yard on the southerly side of Fulton street, between Tyndale street and Vanderbilt avenue, as shown on the plans hereto attached.

In case the "Long Island" is unable to purchase the land required for the extension of Archer place or Johnson avenue, the "City" may acquire the same by condemnation proceedings, and the "Long Island" will reimburse the "City" for the expense of such condemnation.

Eighth—In all cases where the necessity for laying out, opening or constructing new streets across the right of way and tracks of the railroad of the "Long Island" is uncontested, or, if contested, the necessity shall be duly determined by the proper authority or tribunal, as provided by law, it shall grant, across its property, to the "City" easement for street purposes, subject to the "Long Island's" right to operate its railroad on same.

In carrying any streets which may hereafter be opened across the portions of any of the divisions of the "Long Island" included within the limits of this improvement, the "City's" share of the expense of such crossings shall be limited to one-half the cost of structures sufficient to accommodate or to cross a two-track railroad, except that on the line of the Woodside-Winfield Cut-off between Woodside avenue, Woodside, and Ramsey street, Winfield, the "City's" share of the cost of future bridges, in addition to those provided for by this agreement, shall not exceed one-half the cost of structures sufficient to accommodate or cross a four-track railroad, this being the number of tracks on the Main Line and the North Side divisions now traversing the territory between the points named. This limitation of the "City's" share to one-half of structures sufficient to accommodate a two-track railroad shall not apply to the Jamaica Yard between Jamaica avenue and Washington street.

Ninth—That where the grade of any street, as now fixed or established, shall have been changed in accordance with its request, in order to conform to the proposed improvements as shown by the plans and profiles hereto annexed, and such change of grade shall necessitate the raising or lowering of the approaches carrying, or which shall be constructed to carry, said street across the railroad, it will bear the cost of the physical work done in raising or lowering the grade of the approaches above or below the grade as now fixed and established, and will indemnify the "City" against, and will save it harmless from, any legal liability for damages, if any, which shall accrue to the lands, tenements and hereditaments abutting upon any of said streets in consequence of such change of grade.

Tenth—That it will, upon demand, grant to the "City" a perpetual easement to construct and maintain any necessary sewers, pipes, mains, conduits or passageways in and through the discontinued portion of the streets hereinafter named, and the right to enter upon the same from time to time as may be necessary for purposes of inspection or to make repairs, provided that such sewers, pipes, mains, conduits and passageways shall be so constructed as not materially to interfere with the reasonable construction and operation of the railroad or any appurtenance of the Long Island Railroad Company; and the "City" covenants and agrees to reimburse the "Long Island" for any reasonable and proper expense to which it may be put by reason of the construction, maintenance or repair of any such sewers, pipes, mains, conduits or passageways, upon or across the property or any part thereof in which said easement is granted.

Eleventh—That it will, in the vicinity of Jamaica, construct, in accordance with plans and profiles prepared by the "City," an 18-inch sewer in Van Wyck avenue, from the depression under the tracks of the "Long Island" southerly to Chichester avenue, and easterly on Chichester avenue to the existing storm water sewer; a sewer in Guilford street, from the southerly side of Jamaica avenue to Johnson avenue, easterly along Johnson avenue to Rockaway road, northerly along Rockaway road to the southerly side of the property of the "Long Island," and thence easterly near the southerly property line of the "Long Island" to the existing sewer outlet in the

southerly side of Beaver street, said sewer in Guilford street, Johnson avenue, Rockaway road and on property of the "Long Island" to vary in size from eighteen to thirty-three inches; a sewer in Church street, 30 inches in diameter, from the northerly side of the property of the "Long Island" to the existing sewer outlet in the southerly side of Beaver street; and an extension of the existing 18-inch sewer or drain on property of the "Long Island" from Prospect street to New York avenue.

The City of New York covenants and agrees:

First—That it will change the map or plan of The City of New York and legally close and discontinue the following streets in the vicinity of Woodside and Winfield.

Seventh street, from a point on the easterly line thereof about 175 feet southerly from the southerly line of Stryker avenue to a point also on the easterly line of 7th street, about 350 feet southerly from the southerly line of Stryker avenue.

Poe place, from the northerly line of Woodside avenue to the southerly line of Roosevelt avenue.

Trimble place, from the northerly line of Woodside avenue to a point about 140 feet northerly therefrom measured on the east side of the street.

Hicks avenue, from the southerly line of Woodside avenue to a point about 147 feet southerly therefrom measured on the east side of the street.

Grout avenue, from Hyatt avenue to Burrough avenue.

Burrough avenue, from the southerly line of Sinclair avenue a distance southerly of 205 feet measured along the easterly line thereof.

Laurel Hill boulevard, between Columbia avenue and Fisk avenue;

And it will change said map or plan and lay out upon property to be acquired or paid for by the "Long Island" a fifty (50) foot marginal street adjacent to the northerly slope of said Woodside-Winfield Cut-off to connect Trimble place with Hicks place;

And, in the vicinity of Jamaica, it will change its map or plan and legally close and discontinue all those parts of Division street, Jamaica, as lie between the northerly and southerly right of way lines of the "Long Island"; all those parts of Linwood street, from Wisner place (Old Walnut street) on the west, to Wisner place (Old Jefferson street) on the east; Wisner place (Old Walnut street), from Atfield place on the west to Linwood street on the south; Atfield place, from Wisner place to Linwood street; North Cochran avenue, from the southerly side of Ridgewood avenue to a point 140 feet from said southerly line of Ridgewood avenue, and those portions of Tyndall street, Bryan and Rose avenues, from the northerly side of Johnson avenue to the southerly side of the right of way of the "Long Island"; and it will modify the said plan or map of The City of New York by changing the lines of Wisner place and North Wickes street at and near their intersection, as more particularly shown on plan hereto attached; and it will change the line of Beaver street, Jamaica, at the first angle point east of Church street, as more particularly shown on plan hereto attached, and legally close and discontinue such portions of said named streets lying without the lines thereof as changed, and will also temporarily close for vehicular traffic that portion of Prospect street, Jamaica, lying between the northerly and southerly right of way lines of the "Long Island."

Second—That it will grant and convey to the "Long Island" such title as may be vested in the City to the aforesaid portions of 7th street, Poe place, Trimble place, Hicks avenue, Grout avenue, Burrough avenue, Laurel Hill boulevard, Division street, Linwood street, Wisner place, Atfield place, North Wickes street, Beaver street, North Cochran avenue, Tyndall street, Bryant avenue and Rose avenue. Such grant or conveyance shall be made as soon as the said streets or portions thereof shall have been discontinued and closed.

Third—That it will change the map or plan of The City of New York and legally lower the grades of Van Wyck avenue, Dunton; of Beaver and Catherine streets and Rockaway road, Jamaica; at and near the points where they are intersected by the tracks of the railroad; and legally raise or lower the grade of the following named streets: Fifth street and Stryker avenue, Rowan avenue, Hyatt avenue, Lee avenue and Queens boulevard at or near the points where intersected by the said Woodside-Winfield cut-off, so that the grades of said streets as changed shall accord with the grades therefor as shown upon the plans and profiles attached hereto.

Fourth—That upon the legal opening of Queens boulevard to any width in excess of the present width of 100 feet, it will bear fifty per centum (50%) of the cost of reconstructing the bridge hereinabove proposed for carrying the two existing North Side Division tracks of the "Long Island" over the said Queens boulevard, while the entire cost of providing for any tracks in addition to the two now existing shall be borne by the "Long Island."

Fifth—That the "Long Island," its successors and assigns may forever maintain and use the structures now erected and to be erected in connection with the work contemplated and provided for by this agreement, in a proper and lawful manner for the purposes of its railroad and without charge or payment of any kind whatsoever to the "City," except for taxes and assessments, properly imposed, and the "City" hereby grants unto the "Long Island" such rights and privileges, which it is within its power to grant, as may be required by the said "Long Island" to enable it to carry out the terms of this agreement, and to maintain and use its railroad and property as contemplated thereby. And the "City" hereby expressly and specifically consents to the relocation of that part of the railroad of the "Long Island" between Woodside and Winfield and to the abandonment of that portion of its present line between said points as is contemplated and provided for by this agreement. That the "Long Island" may, under the supervision of the President of the Borough of Queens, maintain such structures and occupy and use such portions of the public streets and property of the "City" as may reasonably be required by the said "Long Island" while carrying out the terms of this agreement, and the said President of the Borough of Queens shall issue to the "Long Island" such permits as may be necessary to enable it to perform the work required to be done under this agreement.

Sixth—That it will contribute five hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars (\$575,000) as its proportion of the cost of eliminating the grade crossings hereinabove mentioned, the widening of the several bridges and all the other details included in the improvements covered by this agreement; said payments by the "City" to be made to the "Long Island" in three installments, the first of one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars (\$175,000) on December 31, 1911, the second of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) on June 30, 1912, and the third and final payment upon the satisfactory completion of all of the work herein described. Within thirty (30) days after the receipt by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the "City" of notice from the "Long Island" that all of the work covered by this agreement has been performed, the said Board shall satisfy itself as to the correctness of said certificate. If it shall be found that the work is incomplete or has been done in an unsatisfactory manner, the said Board shall promptly notify the "Long Island" of this fact, specifically indicating the omissions or the respects in which the work is unsatisfactory. If the work is found to have been satisfactorily completed, or upon the correction of all omissions or defects, the said Board shall authorize and direct the Comptroller of the "City" to pay to the "Long Island" the remaining sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000).

And it is mutually covenanted and agreed by and between the parties hereto:

1. That any alterations which might be required to the City sewerage or drainage system, or to any subsurface structures, pipes, etc., of the City laid in the street, on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the "Long Island," and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe. But whenever in the prosecution of the hereinabove mentioned work it shall be necessary to alter or change the location of any street surface railways, power, telephone or telegraph conduits or poles; power, light, telephone or telegraph wires; water or gas pipes and mains, or other property of corporations or individuals occupying streets or highways under grant, license or franchise, imposing upon the corporation or individuals holding the same, the cost and expense of such changes; the necessary changes and alterations shall be procured by the "City" without any expense to the "Long Island"; if the grant, license or franchise does not impose upon the holders thereof the obligation of making such changes in the location of its structures, the necessary changes shall be procured by the "City" and the reasonable cost thereof shall be paid by the "Long Island."

2. That all work within, upon or over the public streets and avenues, shall be subject to the inspection of the proper municipal officer or officers, and under such regulations or conditions as he or they may determine and be authorized by law to impose.

3. That the character, design and construction of all bridges which shall have already been built under this agreement, and which shall hereafter be built in accord-

ance with the terms of this agreement and with the plans hereto annexed, shall be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. All such structures shall be constructed of steel, concrete or masonry or a combination of these materials.

4. That in the case of elevated construction, all bridges or viaducts over City streets shall, unless otherwise specified above, be constructed in a single span, except that where the same shall be more than seventy-five (75) feet in length, intermediate columns to support the structure may be placed on the curb line or in the centre of the roadway of the street, upon approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans for the same, and to their location. Such bridges or viaducts shall be floored throughout, shall be watertight, and the roadway on the same shall be ballasted throughout its entire length with a sufficient quantity of broken stone.

5. That the plans and profiles of the proposed improvements hereto annexed are to be deemed a part of this agreement and are to be construed with reference to the text hereof. Said plans and profiles may from time to time be amended or altered in any detail or particular upon the written consent of the parties hereto.

6. That the City shall proceed with diligence, and within a reasonable time after the execution of this agreement shall change the maps or plans of the "City," and perform such other acts as may be required of it by this agreement, and convey such title as it may have to the portions of the discontinued streets as hereinbefore provided, and that the "Long Island" shall begin the construction of its Jamaica Station improvement and bridges therein involved, of the change of its line and the elimination of grade crossings between Woodside and Winfield and at other points hereinabove mentioned, and shall complete its main line improvement between Maurice and Jamaica avenues, within six (6) months after action by the City, as set forth in this paragraph, and shall complete the Jamaica, the Woodside-Winfield Cut-off and other improvements hereinabove mentioned, at the earliest practicable date, but within three years after said last-mentioned action by the "City," subject to delay caused by strikes, labor difficulties or other unforeseen contingencies.

7. That whenever and wherever this agreement shall provide for the execution and delivery of releases or conveyances, or for a cession by either party, the execution and delivery of an instrument conveying whatever title either party may possess shall be sufficient compliance with the said provisions of the agreement.

8. That the "Long Island" shall furnish a bond from a guarantee or surety company, duly authorized by law to act as surety, conditioned for the faithful performance of all the terms and conditions of this agreement, in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), at the time of the signing of this agreement. The said bond shall terminate upon the completion of the construction work hereby agreed upon.

9. That the relocation and abandonment of any part of the railroad of the "Long Island" contemplated or provided for in this agreement shall be made by the "Long Island" in conformity with the provisions of the statute in such case made and provided.

In Witness Whereof, The Long Island Railroad Company has caused its corporate seal to be hereto affixed and this instrument to be signed by its President and attested by its Secretary, and The City of New York, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, has caused its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed and duly attested and this instrument to be signed by its Mayor, the day and year first above written.

Resolved, That this Board hereby assents to the following preamble and resolutions duly adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York at a meeting of the said Board held on the 29th day of June, 1911, to wit:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 1, 1910, adopted a resolution approving as to substance and form a proposed contract between The City of New York and the Long Island Railroad Company providing for the elimination of grade crossings on a number of streets in the Borough of Queens and for a payment by the City toward the expense thereof, which contract provided for the performance of certain acts by The City of New York with respect to changes of street lines and grades; and

Whereas, It is proposed to add certain crossings not provided for in the contract originally proposed and to increase the amount to be paid by the City from \$450,000 to \$575,000, such increase being its share of the estimated increased cost due to these additional crossings; and

Whereas, The various changes of street lines and grades required for the proposed solution of the problem have been adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment after a public hearing; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment do and it hereby does approve the amended form of proposed contract between The City of New York and the Long Island Railroad Company submitted to the Board on this date; and be it further

Resolved, That in approving the said proposed form of contract as amended, it is the understanding of this Board, and the execution and delivery of this said proposed contract shall be upon the express understanding with The Long Island Railroad Company, that the consideration moving to the Long Island Railroad Company in this proposed contract which induces the said Company to enter into it, is that the map or plan of the City has already been changed by laying out certain streets, closing certain streets, and changing the lines and grades of certain other streets, and that the City will convey to The Long Island Railroad Company such title as the said City shall have to certain of the streets closed, and also as a further consideration the approval by the City of all the alterations of the railroad provided for in said proposed contract as amended, and, further, that if there shall be found any valid, technical or other objections to the power of the City, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in any respect to authorize the provisions or conditions of the proposed contract the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will submit to the Legislature a recommendation that proper legislation be enacted to enable the City or the said Board to authorize and carry out all such provisions and conditions, but that such lack of power, if any there shall be, shall not in any way affect the obligations of The Long Island Railroad Company under said proposed contract or affect the obligations of the City to carry out such articles, provisions and conditions thereof as it may not yet have fulfilled but which may have lawfully been included in such proposed contract as amended; and be it also

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment submit to the Public Service Commission for the First District the said proposed amended contract and plans with the request that the said Commission pass upon the physical features of the proposed elimination of existing crossings and the establishment of new crossings and upon the distribution of the expense thereof; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board hereby agrees that the consideration moving to the Long Island Railroad Company in the contract referred to in the said foregoing resolutions is as stated therein, and that the President be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to agree on behalf of this Company that the consideration moving to the Long Island Railroad Company in the contract referred to in the said resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is as stated therein; and be it further

Resolved, That the proper officers of this Company be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to execute for and on behalf of this Company, and under

its corporate seal, the contract between this Company and The City of New York entitled "Proposed agreement between The City of New York and The Long Island Railroad Company, providing for the elimination of grade crossings on a number of streets in the Borough of Queens and for a payment by the City toward the expense thereof" in the form presented to the Board at this meeting.

Sirs—I am in receipt of a communication of even date from Joseph Haag, your Secretary, reading as follows:

"I enclose herewith, for your approval as to form, six similar agreements between The City of New York and the Long Island Railroad Company, providing for the elimination of grade crossings on a number of streets in the Borough of Queens and for a payment by the City toward the expense thereof. ACQUIRING TITLE TO IRVING PLACE, FROM EAST 14TH STREET TO 4TH AVENUE, BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The Secretary presented the following:

Report No. 9896.

July 31, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on July 27, 1911, your Engineer was directed to prepare a report in the matter of the acquisition of title to the extension of Irving place, from East 14th street to 4th avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

This street, having a width of 75 feet and a length of three short blocks, was placed upon the city map under a resolution adopted by the Board on July 1, 1910, and after an investigation made by the President of the Borough and the Chief Engineer acting as a Select Committee. From the report presented by this Committee it appears that while the occupancy of the land within the street lines was essential to the carrying out of the plan for the proposed Broadway-Lexington Avenue Subway, it was believed that the street would provide a needed additional north and south artery of traffic, and particularly if provision were to be made for extending it across Gramercy Park. The laying out map was re-adopted on March 23, 1911, in order to include in it details as to the location and grades which were omitted from the previous plan.

At the meeting of the Board held on July 13, a communication was presented from the Chairman of the Public Service Commission calling attention to the fact that the letting of the contract for Section 4 of the Lexington Avenue Subway, extending from 14th street and Irving place to a point in Broadway between Houston street and Bleecker street, would have to be held in abeyance until after title to Irving place could be vested in the City. The matter was at this time referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee.

Acting upon the recommendation of this Committee, the Board, at its meeting of July 27, authorized an issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$100,000 in order to meet a portion of the expense of carrying out the desired proceeding, the further consideration of which was postponed to its next meeting.

For the purpose of meeting expenses of this character in which a substantial local as well as general benefit is derived, and at the same time avoid long term increases of the City debt, the Board sought legislation at Albany during the last session, as a result of which chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911 was enacted, this permitting of levying and collecting a local assessment for a part of the cost of improvements involving both local and general benefits, while the remainder can be placed upon one or more Boroughs and collected with the annual taxes. It appears to your Engineer that the benefits which will result by reason of carrying out the Irving place extension are of such a character as to warrant the treating of this improvement as one which might be fully paid for through assessment under the new law. Accepting this view, it might also be assumed that since the proposed use of the street for subway purposes would result in advantage, not only to the Borough of Manhattan but also to the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, it would seem proper to ask the two latter Boroughs to join the Borough of Manhattan in meeting the expense. I have conferred with the Borough President in the matter of the respective local and Borough benefits which this street will afford both as a public highway and as a necessary link in the Tri-Borough Subway for which it is primarily desired, and concur with him in the suggestion that 25 per cent. of the expense might properly be placed on a local area of benefit and the remainder divided among the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx in the respective proportions of 40 per cent., 25 per cent. and 35 per cent. It seems probable that the expense of acquiring the land will aggregate about \$2,000,000, in which case the effect of the proposed Borough assessment plan, on the basis of the present assessed valuation, will be to raise the tax rate in the year when it is imposed \$.012 per \$100 in Manhattan; \$.022 in Brooklyn; and \$.087 in The Bronx.

I would recommend that after giving a public hearing, and pursuant to the provisions of chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911, a resolution be adopted providing for acquiring title in fee to Irving place; that 25 per cent. of the entire cost of the proceeding be assessed upon a local area of benefit; and that the remaining 75 per cent. be placed upon the real estate in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx in the respective proportions of 40 per cent., 25 per cent. and 35 per cent., to be collected with the annual taxes in the year succeeding that in which the proceeding is confirmed.

I would also recommend that the local area of benefit be laid out to comprise the following district:

Beginning at a point on the easterly line of Union Square East where it is intersected by a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of East 16th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 16th street, and running thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with East 16th street to the intersection with a line midway between Union Square East and Irving place; thence northwardly and along the said line midway between Union Square East and Irving place to East 17th street; thence northwardly along a line always midway between 4th avenue and Irving place and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of East 20th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 20th street; thence eastwardly along the aforesaid line parallel with East 20th street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Irving place and 3d avenue; thence southwardly along a line always midway between Irving place and 3d avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of East 16th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 16th street; thence eastwardly along the aforesaid line parallel with East 16th street to the intersection with a line midway between 3d avenue and Rutherford place; thence southwardly along the aforesaid line and always midway between 3d avenue and Rutherford place, and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of East 14th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 14th street; thence eastwardly along the aforesaid line parallel with East 14th street to the intersection with a line midway between 3d avenue and 2d avenue; thence southwardly along a line always midway between 3d avenue and 2d avenue with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Stuyvesant street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Stuyvesant street; thence westwardly along the aforesaid line parallel with Stuyvesant street to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of 3d avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to 3d avenue; thence southwardly along the said line parallel with 3d avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Astor place as this street is laid out between Lafayette street and 4th avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Astor place; thence westwardly and along the said line parallel with Astor place and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Waverly place, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Waverly place; thence westwardly along the said line parallel with Waverly place and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Broadway; thence northwardly and along the said line parallel with Broadway to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of East 10th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of East 10th street; thence westwardly and along the said line parallel with East 10th street to the intersection with a line bisecting the angle formed between the westerly line of Broadway and the easterly line of University place as these streets are laid out in the block between East 11th street and East 12th street; thence northwardly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with the southerly line of East 14th street; thence eastwardly along the said southerly line of East 14th street to the intersection with the prolongation of the easterly line of Union Square East as laid out in the block between East 16th street and East 17th street; thence northwardly along the said easterly line of Union Square East and along the prolongation thereof to the point or place of beginning. A—Local area (to bear 25 per cent. of the cost of the proceeding).

Beginning at a point on the easterly line of Union Square East where it is intersected by a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of East 16th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 16th street, and running thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with East 16th street to the intersection with a line midway between Union Square East and Irving place; thence northwardly and along the said line midway between Union Square East and Irving place to East 17th street; thence northwardly along a line always midway between 4th avenue and Irving place and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of East 20th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 20th street; thence eastwardly along the aforesaid line parallel with East 20th street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Irving place and 3d avenue; thence southwardly along a line always midway between Irving place and 3d avenue, and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of East 16th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 16th street; thence eastwardly along the aforesaid line parallel with East 16th street to the intersection with a line midway between 3d avenue and Rutherford place; thence southwardly along the aforesaid line and always midway between 3d avenue and Rutherford place, and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of East 14th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to East 14th street; thence eastwardly along the aforesaid line parallel with East 14th street to the intersection with a line midway between 3d avenue and 2d avenue; thence southwardly along a line always midway between 3d avenue and 2d avenue to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Stuyvesant street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Stuyvesant street; thence westwardly along the aforesaid line parallel with Stuyvesant street to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of 3d avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to 3d avenue; thence southwardly along the said line parallel with 3d avenue to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Astor place as this street is laid out between Lafayette street and 4th avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Astor place; thence westwardly and along the said line parallel with Astor place, and along the prolongation thereof, to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Waverly place, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Waverly place; thence westwardly along the said line parallel with Waverly place and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Broadway, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of Broadway; thence northwardly and along the said line parallel with Broadway to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of East 10th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to the line of East 10th street; thence westwardly and along the said line parallel with East 10th street to the intersection with a line bisecting the angle formed between the westerly line of Broadway and the easterly line of University place, as these streets are laid out in the block between East 11th street and East 12th street; thence northwardly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with the southerly line of East 14th street; thence eastwardly along the said southerly line of East 14th street to the intersection with the prolongation of the easterly line of Union Square East, as laid out in the block between East 16th street and East 17th street; thence northwardly along the said easterly line of Union Square East and along the prolongation thereof to the point or place of beginning.

B—Assessment Area B is to bear 30 per cent. of the cost of the proceeding, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 679, Laws of 1911, and is to comprise the entire Borough of Manhattan.

C—Assessment Area C is to bear 18.75 per cent. of the cost of the proceeding, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 679, Laws of 1911, and is to comprise the entire Borough of Brooklyn.

D—Assessment Area D is to bear 26.25 per cent. of the cost of the proceeding, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 679, Laws of 1911, and is to comprise the entire Borough of The Bronx.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed areas of assessment at a meeting of the Board to be held in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, in the City Hall, on the 31st day of August, 1911, at 10.30 a. m., and that at the same time and place a public hearing thereon will then and there be had.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 31st day of August, 1911.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting Presidents of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

2. All pavements paid for out of corporate stock issued by The City of New York, which were laid to replace any pavements paid for as above.

3. All sheet asphalt, asphalt block, granite wood block, vitrified brick, Medina sandstone, and iron slag block pavements, laid on a foundation of concrete, macadam or granite, subsequent to June 20, 1910.

Class "B."

Cobble, macadam, bituminous macadam, Belgian and granite on sand pavements, and all other pavements laid subsequent to June 20, 1910, and not classified as Class "A," shall be considered as Class "B" pavement.

The following resolution was then adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 546, Laws of 1910, designates the following as Class "A" pavement:

1. All pavements laid prior to June 20, 1910, accepted by The City of New York, or the local authorities having jurisdiction prior to consolidation, which were laid at the expense of the abutting property owners or by local taxation or by bond issues paid by the locality before consolidation.

2. All pavements paid for out of corporate stock issued by The City of New York, which were laid to replace any pavements paid for as above.

3. All sheet asphalt, asphalt block, granite, wood block, vitrified brick, Medina sandstone, and iron slag block pavements, laid on a foundation of concrete, macadam or granite, subsequent to June 20, 1910.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 546, Laws of 1910, designates the following as Class "B" pavement:

Cobble, macadam, bituminous macadam, Belgian and granite on sand pavements, and all other pavements laid subsequent to June 20, 1910, and not classified as Class "A."

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting Presidents of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond—13.

Present and not voting—The Comptroller—3.

SEASIDE PARKS AT ROCKAWAY AND CONEY ISLAND.

The Comptroller asked and obtained unanimous consent for the present consideration of these matters and presented the following:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, August 2, 1911.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On July 27, 1911, this Board adopted resolutions providing for the laying out of public parks at Rockaway and at Coney Island. In both cases the resolutions contained descriptions of premises to be acquired, but in neither case was there any provision that the land under water adjoining the upland to be acquired should be included.

Inasmuch as both of the proposed parks are to be seaside parks, it is very important that the land under water be acquired together with the upland. Otherwise accretions of uplands over and upon land now submerged might be claimed by private individuals as their property and the City might sometime face the situation where parks planned as seaside parks would be no longer on the seaside. In order to guard against such a possibility I recommend that action be taken now to make sure that the City will, if it should acquire the uplands, be the owner of the riparian and littoral rights as well.

Attached hereto are two resolutions, one amending the description of the proposed park at Coney Island so that it will agree in all respects with the City maps; the other providing that the Corporation Counsel shall be directed to institute all necessary proceedings to acquire the land under the waters of the Jamaica Bay and the land under the waters of the Atlantic Ocean adjoining the property which it is proposed to acquire for the park at Rockaway.

I recommend the adoption of these resolutions.

Bounded on the north by a line 200 feet southerly from and parallel with Surf avenue, as laid out on October 9, 1879; on the east by the west line of West 5th street and the east line of the land and water grants of Catherine Balmer; on the south by the Atlantic Ocean, including all grants of land under water, and on the west by a line 150 feet westerly from and parallel with the centre line of West 8th street as acquired by the Town of Gravesend on August 3, 1885 (this centre line being the original division line between Parcels 10 and 15 on the map of the common lands on Coney

Island belonging to the Town of Gravesend, surveyed in 1878 by William Kowalski), and by the prolongation of the said line; the amended resolution to read as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment deems it for the public interest so to do and proposes to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out a public park on premises described as follows:

Bounded on the north by a line 200 feet southerly from and parallel with Surf avenue, as laid out on October 9, 1879; on the east by the west line of West 5th street and the east line of the land and water grants of Catherine Balmer; on the south by the Atlantic Ocean, including all grants of land under water, and on the west by a line 150 feet westerly from and parallel with the centre line of West 8th street, as acquired by the Town of Gravesend on August 3, 1885 (this centre line being the original division line between Parcels 10 and 15 on the map of the common lands on Coney Island, belonging to the Town of Gravesend, surveyed in 1878 by William Kowalski), and by the prolongation of the said line.

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby directed to prepare a map laying out a park as indicated herein, and as more particularly set forth in the accompanying detailed description of the property annexed hereto and made a part of this resolution.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall consider the proposed change of the map or plan of The City of New York at a meeting of the Board to be held at the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 31st day of August, 1911, at 10.30 o'clock a. m.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be directed to have published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the date set for the hearing, this resolution and a notice to all persons affected thereby, that the proposed change in the map or plan of the City will be considered at a meeting of said Board to be held at the aforesaid time and place.

Resolved, That upon the adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the aforesaid map of the public park the Corporation Counsel be and hereby is directed to institute proceedings on behalf of the City to acquire by condemnation the afore-mentioned property, title to vest on the filing of the oaths by the Commissioners of Estimate and Apportionment, and not later than October 1, 1911, if possible.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

VESTING TITLE IN THE CITY TO PLEASANT AVENUE (OLIN AVENUE), FROM GUN HILL ROAD TO EAST 219TH STREET, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx asked and obtained unanimous consent for the present consideration of this matter and presented the following:

City of New York, President of the Borough of The Bronx, August 1, 1911.

HON. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—On July 8, 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment instituted a proceeding for acquiring title to Olin avenue, from Gun Hill road to East 219th street. In May, 1910, certain property owners petitioned the Board to discontinue these proceedings. This petition and a report of the Chief Engineer were presented to the Board on June 3, 1910, laid over two weeks and on June 17 referred to the Borough President. Several public hearings were given by the Borough President, after which it was determined that the proceeding had gone too far to be stopped, on account of the expense incurred, and in consequence the Board denied the petition on October 7, 1910.

The proceeding of reference will result in widening to 60 feet an old street having a width of 50 feet, the widening to consist of a strip 5 feet wide on each side of the old road. All of the buildings fronting upon the street are set well back of the proposed lines, and the only damage occasioned to them relates to stoops and fences, except at the extremely northerly end, one building falls within the street lines.

Notwithstanding the action of the Board in regard to the petition, I am advised that every effort is being made to discontinue the proceeding, thereby throwing the entire expense upon the City.

In my communication to the Board dated September 17, 1910, and upon which the denial of the petition was based, I stated the expression of the Local Board, that is to say "that the vesting of title shall be delayed as long as possible, so as to prevent the running of interest, as their assessments will be very large."

Since the presentation of the above, matters have changed, and I would request that title be vested in the City at the earliest possible date. Your truly,

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting Presidents of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond—16.
