DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING OCTOBER 3, 1914.

AN EXPERIMENT IN LOCAL HEALTH ADMINISTRATION.

Subjoined is an abstract of an executive memorandum, issued by the Commissioner of Health on September 30th, in which instructions are given for steps preliminary to the establishment of a "health district" in the neighborhood of Gouverneur Hospital, where the Department will test the value of a method of local health administration hitherto untried in New York. The new administrative feature consists in the proposed government of the district, for health purposes, from within the district itself, instead of from Department headquarters, and in the control of field workers by a local director in place of various bureau chiefs. The Department does not commit itself to the wider adoption of the plan, but wishes to study it in actual operation. The experiment will involve no extra expense to the City.

Executive Memorandum.

"Dr. Shipley will undertake at once the development of the plan outlined at the conference held in the office of the Commissioner on Wednesday, September 30th, in accordance with which an experimental health district, within which all the functions of the Health Department are to be locally directed, is to be established in the district bounded by Scammel, Division and Clinton streets and the East River.

"Dr. Leiser will furnish from the studies made in April figures showing the normal activities of the Department of Health in the district for one month.

"Mr. Fiske will arrange for the use of a headquarters building within the district. The district headquarters will include a milk station. The rented space should be large enough to include office room for district or 'social welfare' nurses connected with Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, whose co-operation will be asked for later.

"Dr. Bolduan will confer with Dr. Shipley relative to the formation of a representative local citizens' committee—a kind of local (volunteer) Health Board, whose relation to the Department will be analogous to the relation of the local school boards to the Department of Education.

"Dr. Guilfoyle has been directed to prepare mortality tables for the designated district. Morbidity studies also are contemplated.

"Bureau Chiefs are requested to keep in mind the general purpose of the proposed experiment, which is to try out the plan of local health administration; this plan aims at the avoidance of overlapping by different bureaus or departments concerned with health matters, and at increased usefulness through the establishment of intimate neighborly relations between the Department of Health and the local community. The plan outlined this afternoon is tentative, and is subject to modification.

"The Commissioner counts on the hearty co-operation of Bureau Chiefs in conducting this experiment."

SMALLPOX VACCINATION IN PAROCHIAL SCHOOLS.

The following instructive article by the Rev. Thomas McMillan, C. S. P., prepared for the New York Freeman's Journal, is here reproduced to show the cordial

support given the Department of Health by the Catholic school authorities of this city in its efforts to stamp out smallpox:

"At this time it is necessary to affirm clearly the friendly relations existing between the Board of Health and the Catholic parish schools in New York City. These schools are under the guidance of the parish priests, acting as local directors in co-operation with parents. They are aided in all matters relating to the public welfare by a Catholic School Board, appointed by Cardinal Farley, and by Bishop McDonnell in Brooklyn. After many years of experience as a member of this Board, the present writer can testify that every regulation for the sanitary welfare of the children has been rigorously upheld. The physicians and nurses sent by the Board of Health are cordially welcomed in all Catholic Schools.

"An inquiry in regard to recent communications printed and paid for in the advertising columns of several papers has revealed the fact that Mr. Charles M. Higgins (who personally is a very estimable gentleman and large manufacturer of Brooklyn), treasurer of the Anti-Vaccination Society of America, makes bold to appear as the champion of the private and parish schools, assuming that they can be of assistance in his opposition to compulsory vaccination. He ventures to stigmatize as 'an evil law' that which is approved as safe and sane by the medical profession. Under the circumstances, he must take the blame of putting himself in a false position before the public.

"In order to get a definite statement concerning the harmonious relations between the parish schools and the Department of Health under its present efficient head, Commissioner Goldwater, the undersigned consulted Dr. John J. Cronin, Acting Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene. From his detailed report, the following statement is condensed.

"When Commissioner S. S. Goldwater of the Department of Health deemed it advisable to vaccinate the children of the parish schools, his first move was to interview personally the President of the Catholic School Board, The Rt. Rev. Monsignor Joseph F. Mooney, V. G.

"This is the first time in the history of the Department of Health that a Commissioner has extended to the authorities of the Catholic schools such consideration. The result of the interview was the decision to place the adjustment of the work in the hands of the Superintendents of the Catholic School Boards, who in conjunction with a representative of the Bureau of Child Hygiene, would work out a plan.

"The plan adopted was that the Department of Health would prepare a circular letter to be revised by Rev. Joseph F. Smith, the Superintendent of the Catholic School Board of Manhattan, addressed to each Pastor and Principal, and sent out by the Department. The same plan was approved by the Rev. Joseph D. A. McKenna, Superintendent of the Catholic School Board of Brooklyn.

"The important point is, that not only was a child 'not compelled' to be vaccinated, but that the order of the Department to the Medical Inspectors were that 'a child must not be vaccinated unless it presents a consent card properly signed by a parent or guardian, allowing the child to be vaccinated.'

"The good sense of any community is a very dependable quantity. Evidence of the good sense of the parents of the Catholic school children is given in the annexed report of the work performed by the Medical Inspectors and Nurses in the parish schools.

"The Commissioner of Health, acting on an estimate submitted, requested the sum of \$6,400, to provide 36 medical inspectors and 36 nurses to vaccinate approximately 125,000 parish school children, during the month of May, 1914. When the request was presented to Mayor Mitchell, His Honor immediately allowed Dr. Goldwater \$7,000 to carry on the work.

"There was not one case of illness, nor a serious case of sore arm in all the 68,000 cases vaccinated by the special corps during the month of May.

SANITARY BREAD.

A Bacteriological Study of Wrapped and Unwrapped Loaves.

Some experiments recently made in the Health Department's Research Laboratory bear out the contention that the only clean bread is that wrapped in the bakery, the wrapping being done in such manner that after baking no hand touches the loaf till it reaches the consumer.

From the details of the study as here reproduced, it will be seen that the wrapped bread at present on the market is generally free from bacilli of the colon group but that the unwrapped loaves, directly in proportion to their exposure, are usually so contaminated*. A report of a similar study made under the auspices of the U. S. Department of Agriculture appears in the September number of the American Journal of Public Health and presents similar conclusions. Only 7% of the samples of wrapped bread showed bacilli of the colon group, as compared to 62% for the unwrapped bread.

The federal investigators found that wrapping added less than 5% to the cost of a loaf, and that the keeping qualities of the bread were greatly enhanced, no change in flavor being discoverable after 42 or even 114 hours. During the 42 hour period, loaves wrapped three hours after baking, in various varieties of paper (waxed and unwaxed) lost on an average less than two per cent in weight from evaporation, and only one-half per cent in paper waxed on both sides. Compared to this, unwrapped bread exposed lost about twelve per cent, and even in a glass case ten per cent during the same period. Since evaporation (drying) is the chief factor tending to make stale bread unsalable, the possibility of saving to a baker is evident and would, undoubtedly, more than balance the extra cost of wrapping.

Loaves of bread were purchased in various stores and brought to the laboratory. Here the crust of the loaf was scraped onto sterile paper. This scraped portion was placed in sterile test tubes and to it was added 20 c. c. of salt-free broth. The mixture was shaken 25 times and plated on agar and Conradi medium in the following amounts: 1/10 c. c., 1/2 c. c., 1 c. c. and 2 c. c. These amounts were also placed in lactose-neutral-red fermentation tubes and the presence of gas was taken as an indication that members of the B. Coli group were present. The results are given in the appended tables.

Table I gives the result of the preliminary experiment made with samples of bread which it is claimed no human hand touches until it comes to the wrapping table. Three loaves were used. The bread was carefully unwrapped, scraped upon sterile paper, and the scrapings treated as above. The loaves were then placed in a sterile bag and taken to different persons to handle.

Sample No. 1 was given to two men employed in the stable.

Sample No. 2 was handled by the glassware washers.

Sample No. 3 was handled by the clerical force.

The count represents the total bacterial count per loaf.

*Since colon bacilli are always derived from intestinal excreta, the significance of such findings is obvious.

Table II gives the results obtained from bread purchased under varying conditions. It will be observed that the conditions under which the bread was handled agree fairly well with the results.

It was thought that the labels, being frequently applied by hand, might show an increased number of bacteria. Two labels an inch square each were, therefore, carefully removed and treated (shaken in 20 c. c. broth and plated) as previously outlined. The results are given in Table III.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF

Resolved, That Section 167 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 167. No interment, cremation, or other disposition of the dead body of any human being shall be made within the City of New York without a permit therefor granted by the Board of Health, nor otherwise than in accordance therewith, and said dead body shall be placed in a metallic or tin-lined box, or a box so constructed as to prevent the issuance of any liquids therefrom; and no sexton or other person shall assist in, or assist to, or allow any such interment, or aid or assist about preparing any grave or place of deposit for any such body, or assist in the cremation of the same, for which such permit has not been given authorizing the same. And it shall be the duty of every

person who shall receive any such permit, to preserve and to return the same to the Department of Health, as its regulations may require.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC. WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-ends, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
