Resolved, That requisition be and is hereby made upon the Comptroller, in pursuance of section 262, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, for the following sums of money for the month of June, 1885, being one-twelfth part of the total amount estimated, levied, raised and appropriated for the support and maintenance of the Police Department and force for the current year, viz:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be respectfully informed that the foregoing differs from the usual monthly requisition, in this respect: The item of "Police Station-houses, Alterations, etc.," has been increased by adding thereto the sum of \$2,916.66, being the balance of the entire appropriation (\$5,000) for the year for repairs to the steamboat "Patrol," and the said amount of \$2,916.66 has been deducted from the item of "Supplies for Police." The item, including the balance of the appropriations for the repairs to the steamboat "Patrol," together with all the other items requisitioned for, does not exceed one-twelfth of the total amount appropriated for the Department.

The contract for repairs to the steamboat "Patrol" was made and executed May 25, 1885, the work to be completed in thirty days. Under the terms of the contract the amount of \$463 will be due to Messrs. lenkins & Tregarthen, contractors, when the work is finished. There are other expenses chargeable to the same appropriation, such as printing of specifications, etc., so that it becomes necessary for the entire amount of said appropriation to be in the hands of the Treasurer of Police at this time. Police at this time.

Resolved, That the following extract from an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, to the Board of Police, dated May 28, 1885, be respectfully referred to the Comptroller. * * " "In the final estimate for the current year there was an express appropriation of \$5,000 for coppering, recalking and general repairs to the steamboat 'Patrol.' This work has been done and the money is now due the contractor, and the question arises whether, upon the expiration of the current month, he can be paid all the money due him for the work, or only five twelfth parts thereof, upon the theory that only one-twelfth of that particular appropriation is available for the use of the Department each month

"There are a great many other items of appropriation included in the final estimate, namely: Salaries for members of the force of different grades, supplies for police, expenses of detectives, alterations and fitting up of station-houses, etc.

"It is provided in section 262 of the Consolidation Act, that the Police Department, through its Treasurer, shall pay all salaries and wages, and all bills, claims and obligations lawfully incurred by the authority of the Board. The Comptroller shall pay over to the Treasurer of Police on the requisitions of the Board the total amount annualy estimated, levied, raised and appropriated for the support and maintenance of the Police Department and force, from time to time, and in such sums as shall be required (not exceeding the one-twelfth part of said total annual amount in any one month), and the Treasurer of Police, if required by the Comptroller, shall transmit to the Department of Finance each month duplicate vouchers for the payment of all sums of money made on account of the Police Department during each month.

** I see nothing in this section to prevent the Board of Police from making a requisition upon the Comptroller for the entire sum required to pay the amounts now due for the repairs to the steamboat, provided that the money so requisitoned for, together with all the other items called for in the course of the same month, does not exceed one-twelfth of the total annual appropriation for the Department. In other words, I am of opinion that the restriction in the section is not to be so construed as to apply severally to the various items making up the total appropriation, but should be so interpreted as to allow the Department to call for more than one-twelfth of one particular appropriation and less than one twelfth of another particular appropriation in any current month, whenever the necessities of the Department require it. This, however, would be in no sense a payment from one appropriation for the account of another."
