

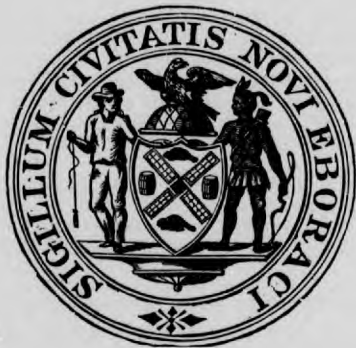

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Mooney—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to this Board, for amendment, a resolution and ordinance, adopted September 2, 1887, for flagging sidewalks of Washington avenue, from One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street to Samuel street.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The paper was subsequently returned by his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

Resolved, That the sidewalk on the west side of Washington avenue, from One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street to Samuel street, be flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Whereupon Alderman Mooney moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the resolution was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Mooney moved to amend by striking out the words "Commissioner of Public Works" wherever they occur in the resolution and ordinance, and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks."

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution as amended.

Which was decided in the affirmative on a division, as follows:

Affirmative—The President, Vice-President Divver, Aldermen Conkling, Cowie, Dowling, Farrell, Ficke, Fitzgerald, Flynn, Goetz, Long, Mooney, John Murray, Joseph Murray, Oakley, Sanford, Smith, Tait, and Walker—19.

By Alderman Conkling—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Stefano Cassasa to place and keep a stand for the sale of fruit inside the stoop-line at No. 101 West Fourteenth street, said stand not to exceed six feet long by three feet wide; permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Cowie—

Resolved, That a crosswalk of three courses of blue stone be laid across Eighth avenue, opposite the main entrance of "Miner's Theatre," No. 312 Eighth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, the expense to be paid from the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewals of Pavements and Regrading."

By Alderman Dowling—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to David Moffat & Son to lay a two-inch steam-pipe, enclosed in a six-inch cast-iron pipe, across Jacob street, from No. 5 to No. 10, under the surface of the street, for the purpose of conveying steam for heating the main office, provided the said David Moffat & Son shall stipulate with the Department of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may occur to any gas or water pipe, or sewer, or from any other cause during the progress or subsequent to the laying of such pipe, that may be caused or arise from the exercise of the privilege hereby granted, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, September 12, 1887.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return herewith, without my approval, the resolution granting permission to the Eden Musée to suspend two bracket lamps in front of their premises on Twenty-third street, between the Fifth and Sixth avenues. If, under the Consolidation Act, the Board of Aldermen has the right to grant this permission, it is already provided for in an ordinance adopted on the 30th of March, 1886, which provides that "Ornamental lamps and illuminated signs may be placed on the stoop of any building by the owner of such building, and upon or within the stoop-line by the occupants of the ground floor of any premises." If, on the other hand, the Common Council do not possess the necessary authority, the passage of the resolution under consideration would not give any valid consent to the erection of the bracket lamps provided for.

But, if the exercise of authority be doubtful, it should not be called into requisition in the case of the Eden Musée, which openly violates the law by maintaining upon the sidewalk two advertising structures, four feet by three feet in dimension, and crowned with two lamps, which, during the evening when I saw them, were not lighted. Why these obstructions to the highway are permitted to interfere with the public use of the sidewalk I do not understand; but it is possible that the infraction of law is tolerated because the Young Men's Christian Association maintains two unlawful bulletin boards in Twenty-third street, near the Fourth avenue, and it may be supposed that infractions of law committed by so respectable an organization give warrant for its violation by less reputable establishments. This, however, is an error, which I trust will thus be brought to the notice of the Department of Public Works and the remedy applied by the prompt removal of these advertising mediums, which are only lawful if placed within the stoop-line.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Eden Musée to suspend two gas bracket lamps, of the pattern designated in the drawing accompanying this resolution, from the wall of the building known as the Eden Musée, in Twenty-third street, north side, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, at a height of about twenty feet above the sidewalk, the work to be done and gas supplied at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted August 30, 1887, giving permission to Daniel Mahoney to retain the covered booth now located in Rutgers Slip, near South street, used for the sale of coffee and sandwiches. The Commissioner of Public Works reports that this booth is placed directly in the centre of the thoroughfare of Rutgers Slip and is an obstruction to the free use of the public street.

Under the law passed at the last session of the Legislature, the power of the Common Council to grant permits is limited to the erection of booths or stands within the stoop-lines, the owner of said premises consenting thereto, for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or fruit only. No right therefore exists to adopt the resolution.

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted September 2, 1887, that water-mains be laid in One Hundred and Eighty-third street, from Christian avenue to Ryer avenue, and in Ryer avenue, from One Hundred and Eighty-first to One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street.

The Commissioner of Public Works reports that One Hundred and Eighty-third street and Ryer avenue are only rough roads, no grades having been established. No expenditure, therefore, should be incurred by the city for laying water-mains in the street and avenue named in the resolution until they are permanently graded.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, September 10, 1887.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted September 2, 1887, that water-mains be continued from Creston avenue and One Hundred and Eighty-third street, through and along said avenue to One Hundred and Eighty-first street, thence through One Hundred and Eighty-first street to Ryer avenue, and that water-mains be laid from Creston avenue and One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, through One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street to Ryer avenue, thence through said avenue to One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

The Commissioner of Public Works reports that Creston avenue, One Hundred and Eighty-first and One Hundred and Eighty-fourth streets and Ryer avenue are only rough roads, no grades having yet been established. If water-mains are laid as proposed in this resolution, a long dead end will be increased with no chance to connect with main lines of pipes on account of streets and avenues not being graded. The resolution therefore appears to be premature at this time.

*To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :*

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted September 2, 1887, that the vacant lot on the southeast corner of Willis avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street be fenced in.

The President of the Department of Public Parks reports that this lot adjoins other vacant lots on both sides, and that to fence it would produce no beneficial effect. SIR.—There were 693 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 3, 1887, which is a decrease of 5, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 29 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending August 27, 1887, was 662, which is 17.0 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.12 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,488,801.

#### NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

**NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN** made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
