

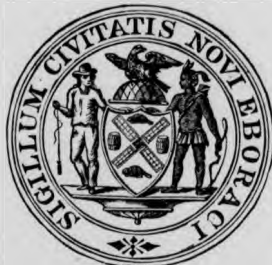

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, February 10, 1886, at 3 o'clock, P. M.

Commissioners present—Commissioner of Public Works; Commissioners Spencer, Dowd and Baldwin.

Also Chief Engineer Church; and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works.

Vice-President Dowd presided.

The minutes of stated meeting of February 3, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of the monthly estimate for work done by the contractor upon the New Aqueduct during the month of January, and included in vouchers Nos. 1452 to 1462, as follows:

By Smith & Brown, Section 1.....	\$11,629 53

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, all of the above vouchers were approved by the Commissioners and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

A communication was received from the Mayor, addressed to him by Lewis G. Morris, Esq., in relation to powder magazines upon the line of the New Aqueduct, which was read and ordered placed upon file.

The Secretary presented a copy of the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, approving an agreement of the Aqueduct Commissioners with Jeremiah Mahoney, for the taking in fee of lands and premises belonging to him; whereupon Commissioner Spencer offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the President and Vice-President are hereby authorized and requested, either one or the other of them, on behalf of the Aqueduct Commissioners, to execute the agreement between the said Commissioners and Jeremiah Mahoney, for the taking in fee of the land and premises belonging to him at the Pocantico river blow-off in the town of Mount Pleasant, Westchester County, containing about one and three-quarters (1 $\frac{3}{4}$) acres, for which the consideration money is the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), the making of the said agreement having been duly approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 1st day of February, 1886, as required by section 23, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883.

In compliance with the request of the Commissioners at their last meeting, the Counsel to the Corporation submitted his opinion adverse to the jurisdiction asserted by the Commissioners of Accounts, in relation to accidents occurring upon the work on the New Aqueduct now being done by contractors under authority of this Commission. The opinion was read and ordered placed on file, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy thereof to the Commissioners of Accounts.

The Chief Engineer presented an opinion received by him from the Counsel to the Corporation upon the subject of change in the method of timbering in the aqueduct tunnels, and certain allowances for excavation asked for by the contractors. The opinion was read and the matter discussed, and on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, was laid over for further consideration.

The Chief Engineer next presented a request from the Division Engineers for an increase of their compensation, and recommended that such increase be made. On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the matter was laid over for future consideration.

The Chief Engineer reported that he had succeeded in obtaining the services of Mr. William R. Hutton, C. E., to assist him during the temporary absence of Consulting Engineer Davis and the sickness of Deputy Chief Engineer Freley, and at the same rate of compensation as that paid Mr. Davis, and that Mr. Hutton had entered upon the discharge of his duties on the 8th instant. On motion of Commissioner Spencer, this action of the Chief Engineer was approved by the Commissioners, and the temporary employment of Mr. Hutton authorized, with compensation at the rate of \$6,000 per annum, dating from the 8th instant.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. All power and authority possessed or exercised by or vested in the "Bureau of Permits" on the 29th day of January, 1886, in granting or issuing permits or licenses for dogs, gutter-bridges or hoistways, and all power and authority possessed or exercised by or vested in the Mayor of said city on said day to grant or issue licenses, except in cases where, by the statute of this State, such licenses are required to be granted or issued by the said Mayor, are hereby vested in a bureau of licenses. The said bureau of licenses shall consist of the First Marshal, appointed under article III., chapter I. of the Revised Ordinances, and such clerks and subordinates as may be necessary for the discharge of the duties of said bureau, and be appointed as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. Said clerks and subordinates shall be appointed by and shall be removable at the pleasure of the said Mayor, and subject to the appropriation for said bureau shall respectively, receive such compensation as shall, from time to time, be fixed and established by said Mayor.

Sec. 3. The power and authority hereby vested in the said Bureau of Licenses shall be exercised by them subject to the control and direction of the said Mayor.
