The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,570.

During the past week 194 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health

Officer of the Port, 63 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits. There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 5 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 68 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 70 visits were made, and 13 disinfections and 8 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital, was 7.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,747 of which 797 were primary and 950 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 10,175 pounds of meat and 16,870 pounds of tea.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 54, the number of analyses of same made, was 1, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 10, the number of arrests made was 4, and the amount of fines imposed was \$105.

The certificates of 651 births, 63 still-births, 303 marriages, and 676 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 23, 1886. This shows an increase of 47 births, I still-birth and 20 marriages, and a decrease of 39 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885 there was an increase of 42 births, 51 marriages and 107 deaths, and a decrease of 3 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the pre-ceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; croup, 3; whooping cough, 5; typhoid fever, 9; malarial fevers, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; inanition, 4; alcoholism, 7; cancer, 4; bron-chitis, 6; pneumonia, 1; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular menin-gitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 16; convulsions, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 23; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; drowning, 2; while the deaths from measless increased 1; diptherna, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 11, apolexy, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; premature and preternatural births, 3; suicide, 3. The number of deaths from eryspelas, rheumatism and gout, and surgical operations, was the same in the two successive weeks. suicide, 3. Hours at which Deaths Occurred.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 128 were in institutions, 395 in tenement-houses, 132 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 114 on the first, 183 on the second, 121 on the third, 80 on the fourth, 29 on the tifth, 1 on the sixth; 657 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 19 non-residents; 85 were stated to be single, 175 married, 83 widowed, and the condition of 333 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.
