

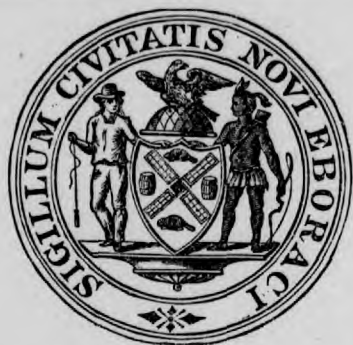

### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending June 22, 1878.*

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to communicate to this Board, at its next meeting, the annual cost since his administration—  
1st. Of pumping Croton water for high service.  
2d. Cost of repairs annually.  
3d. Height of water pumped.  
4th. Quantity of water pumped annually.  
5th. The number of houses supplied at present.  
6th. The annual revenue derived since his administration for said service.  
Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 11, 1878.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 17, 1878.

Resolved, That Frank Bollet be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of John C. Fraser, resigned.

Resolved, That John Brooks Leavitt be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of James F. Higgins, resigned.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Harry Miner to place two lamp-posts and lamps in front of his premises, Nos. 165 and 167 Bowery, providing the said lamp-posts do not exceed the dimensions prescribed by law, the gas to be supplied from his own meter, and the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; this permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.  
Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 11, 1878.  
Approved by the Mayor, June 17, 1878.

Whereas, The Hon. Samuel S. Cox, one of the representatives in Congress from this city, has delivered an effective and patriotic speech in the House of Representatives in behalf of humanity and the suffering; and as he has given almost his whole life to assist in perfecting the life-saving system, and to establish its workings on our coast from Maine to California, by which thousands of lives and millions of dollars have been saved to all nationalities; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen, in behalf of the City of New York, tender to the Hon. Samuel S. Cox, and to all members of Congress and other persons connected in any way with this life-saving and humane institution, their sincere and grateful thanks, not unmindful of the assistance given to it by the press of the country; and be it further

Resolved, That the Clerk of this Board be authorized and directed to have this resolution engrossed and forwarded to the Hon. Samuel S. Cox.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to lay Croton water-mains in Sixty-ninth street, between First and Second avenues, as provided in section 2, chapter 477, Laws of 1875; and also in Ninety-third street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, as provided in section 2, chapter 477, Laws of 1875.

Resolved, That two boulevard lamps be placed on the lamp-posts in front of the Church of the Annunciation in Fourteenth street, south side, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, in lieu of the old lamps now there, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That Twelfth avenue, between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets, be regulated and graded, the curb and gutter stones set, and the sidewalks flagged with one course of flagging four feet wide, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.
